



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

David Brin

Author Guest of Honor



David Brin is a scientist, public speaker, and author. Several of his novels have been New York Times Bestsellers, winning multiple Hugo, Nebula and other awards. His 1989 ecological thriller, Earth, foreshadowed global warming, cyberwarfare and near-future trends such as the World Wide Web. A 1998 movie, directed by Kevin Costner, was loosely based on The Postman. His fifteen novels have been translated into more than twenty languages.

Brin's 1998 non-fiction book — The Transparent Society: Will Technology Force Us to Choose Between Freedom and Privacy? — deals with a wide range of threats and opportunities facing our wired society during the information age. His chief argument, that openness is more effective than secrecy at fostering freedom, sparked controversy and garnered the prestigious Freedom of Speech Prize from the American Library Association.

David Brin's papers in scientific journals cover an eclectic range of topics from astronautics, astronomy, and optics to alternative dispute resolution and the role of neoteny in human evolution. His Ph.D in Space Physics from the University of California at San Diego followed a masters in optics and an undergraduate degree in astrophysics from Caltech. He was a postdoctoral fellow at the California Space Institute and the Jet Propulsion Laboratory.

David's latest novel - Kiln People - has been called a book of ideas disguised as a fast-moving and fun noir detective story, set in a future when new technology enables people to physically be in more than two places at once. This fall, DC/Wildstorm will release a 144 page hardcover graphic novel "The Life Eaters" which they call "the most exciting work in our field since Watchmen."

David's science fictional Uplift Universe explores a future when humans genetically engineer higher animals like dolphins to become equal members of our civilization. He also recently tied up the loose ends left behind by the late Isaac Asimov, bringing to a grand finale Asimov's famed Foundation Universe. Reaching out to a new generation, Brin developed the Out Of Time series of novels for young adults. His "Webs of Wonder" Contest offered cash prizes to promote web sites that help teachers convey difficult subjects with exciting stories.



Todd Lockwood grew up in Boulder, Colorado, and has been drawing ever since he was old enough to pick up a pencil. As a kid Todd taught himself to draw by making his own comic books. Later on he studied at the Colorado Institute of Art. Right out of school he landed a job in a design firm and won several awards, but soon left design to begin his career as an illustrator.


He spent 15 years doing ad work (one of his larger clients was Coors — the man knows how to draw beer cans). Although his career as an illustrator was quite successful, he became frustrated with his work and was not happy with the market he felt stuck in.

Luckily for us, Todd, who had always loved science fiction, fantasy and mythology, got an opportunity to do a few covers for Asimov's and found his calling in SF and fantasy art. (I met him at a world con soon afterwards, and found him to be quite a nice fellow. I also managed to pick up a couple of his pieces in the art auction).

Since he joined the TSR (now WotC) art staff in back in 96, his art as graced various RPG books, CCGs, and other gaming titles. His work has also appeared on the covers of Asimov's, Analog, Dragon, and in the pages of Science Fiction Age and Realms of Fantasy. Among the honors his artwork has received are two World Fantasy Artshow awards, two Chesleys, and appearances in Spectrum II, III, and IV.

Gaming Guest of Honor




David Williams designed his first board game when he was 8 (don't ask -- it was horrible). In High School, he told his guidance counselor that he wanted to be a game designer, but didn't have any idea how to do it, so he would settle for being an engineer. He chose to leave cold and wet Syracuse NY for the sunshine at Harvey Mudd College in Claremont, CA.

Twelve years, some strange twists of fate and many incredible fans later, David has been the Lead designer for 3 different Trading Card Games that have won the Origins award for "Card Game of the Year" and has been involved in the design of a number other board, card, and role-playing games. Besides his primary design work in card games, he helped develop the mechanics for a pair of Origins award winning Role-playing games, as well.

During the nine years he has spent as the Lead Designer of Alderac Entertainment Group, David has designed over 10,000 different cards for their games. His best-known games are "Legend of the Five Rings", Doomtown", and "Warlord: Saga of the Storm".

Michael Sheard

Toastmaster



Michael Sheard played Admiral Ozzel in *Star Wars*. He has also been in two Indiana Jones movies – playing Hitler in one. Fans of Dr. Who will recognize him as he has worked with more Dr. Whos than any other actor. Mr. Sheard has made over 800 other TV appearances (including The Invisible Man, The New Avengers, Dr. Who, Space: 1999, Blake's Seven) and 43 feature films including the aforementioned Star Wars and Indiana Jones appearances as well as non-genre classics such as: *Force Ten From Naverone* and *Les Miserables*.

He was born in the Scottish city of Aberdeen, the son of a minister of the kirk. He attended The Royal Academy of Dramatic Art (RADA) in London, leaving to do two years National Service in The Royal Air Force as an Aircraftsman. His experiences are chronicled in the three (so far) volumes of his Autobiography: Yes, Mr. Bronson – Memoirs of a Bum Actor; Yes, Admiral – SciFi and Further Memories; and Yes, School's Out – SciFi Conventions, Parties, and Much, Much More! He now resides on the Isle of Wight in the UK.

Michael first visited us in 2002. He had such a good time (and so did we!) that this is his third year as our guest! We are very pleased that he has returned to MidSouthCon as our Toastmaster.


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
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Cullen Johnson

His lecture covers what skills you will need to be successful in Hollywood and will include a demonstration of expensive materials that Hollywood regularly uses to create props. He will bring many one-of-a-kind props to view and handle, in addition to behind the scenes video of how props are created.

At that time she joined forces with a new publisher, DAW Books, which published *Jerlayne* in March 1999. *Jerlayne* is a story that combines the elves of Fairie with the streets of New York City. She is still working with ACE which in July of 2000 published *Out of Time*, the first of a series of novels about a librarian who belatedly discovers that she has the talent (and obligation) to travel back in history to free people from curses. Lynn has since written two more books about her librarian, Emma Merrigan: *Behind Time*, published in 2001, and *Taking Time*, is scheduled for publication in April 2004.

For the past two years the bulk of Lynn's time has been taken up with the resurrection of THIEVES' WORLD. SANCTUARY, the "epic" TW novel was published in April of 2002 and TURNING POINTS, the first allnew TW anthology in more than a decade, came out in November of 2002. Right now, Lynn is working on the fourth book about Emma (Down Time), assembling a TW reprint volume (FIRST BLOOD), and putting together the second anthology.

M.M. Buckner

M.M. Buckner, has a B.A. in English Literature from the University of Memphis, studied writing at Harvard University and also earned an M.A. in Creative Writing at Boston University. She has traveled through Europe, New Zealand and North America, lived in California, Alaska, Maine and Massachusetts, and now resides in Nashville, Tennessee. After a decade as marketing Vice President for a nationwide financial firm, she is currently a freelance writer, environmental activist, and an ardent whitewater kayaker. Her publishing credits include magazine features, marketing materials, and content for numerous web sites. She recently authored a major research report for the World Wildlife Fund. What has given M.M. Buckner the best professional credits in her life is "Hyperthought", her first science-fiction novel which is full of allegories to show a possible dark future that could become a reality. This novel has received the best comments and reviews, and it has been Nominated for the 2003 Phillip K. Dick Award. It is a brilliant, exciting and breathtaking science-fiction novel.

C.J. Cherryh

If you missed seeing Carolyn Cherryh in 2002, you missed a great deal. As our GoH she was incredibly accessible and approachable and she handled our Federal problem (if you weren't there you'd never believe it) with aplomb. You've got another chance - she has decided to return again this year. John Campbell award winning, Hugo award winning, polymath, author of numerous Science fiction and Fantasy books, Ms. Cherryh can talk entertainingly on just about any subject you can think of. She has been a teacher of Latin, Greek and Ancient History and is experienced in Archeological Photography. For many years she has been a full time writer and, fortunately for us, a prolific one with over 50 books to her credit. She is best known for her Merchanter novels (although she prefers Alliance-Union as more inclusive), which have generated her Best Novel Hugos for Downbelow Station and Cyteen and her recent return to the world of her Foreigner series. Her Chanur books have an alien protagonist with whom we identify so well, the humans seem alien. C. J. writes fantasy, too, including the Russian based Russalka series.

David B. Coe

David has a Ph.D. in U.S. Environmental History but he gave up the academic life to write. He has three fantasies out from Tor which make up the LonTobyn Chronicle: Children of Amarid (1997), The Outlander (1998), Eagle Sage (2000). He is the Winner of the 1999 IAA Crawford Award as author of the Best First Fantasy book or series. He is currently working on a new fantasy series. David is married with 2 daughters.

Glen Cook

Glen was born in New York and grew up in northern California. He began writing while in seventh grade. He served in the U. S. military and attended the University of Missouri and the Clarion Writers' Workshop. He produced his first paid work in 1970. It began with a dream...literally. There was a girl, she was blonde and she was beautiful. There was candlelight and romance and Hanther was in his early teens. We¹re talkin¹ adolescent fantasy here. Suddenly this warrior, looking as though he had just walked out of King Arthur,

Stephen and Suzie Lackey

Stephen Lackey went to Middle Tennessee State University to study broadcasting and Marketing. Suzie Lackey went to Watkins Art Institute, a nationally respected college of art and film, studying cinematography and film history. Suzie and Stephen first got married, then became a filmmaking team. The duo's first commercially available film: "Fans and Freaks: The Culture of Comics and Conventions" took a year to film and over another year to edit.

The film is a documentary about the worlds of science fiction, fantasy, anime, horror, and comic books. It begins at a small comic book store in Tennessee before expanding to conventions of various sizes all over the southeast. However, his love for comic books and fantasy has always brought him back. Martheus has spoken on many different panels and teaches illustration to inmates in the Federal Prison System. He is currently promoting his 5th book; an 80 page action packed Jetta: Tales of the Toshigawa story.

Eddy Zeno

Eddy is a comics historian and author of magazine articles and of the biography "Curt Swan: A Life In Comics." In compiling the book, Zeno came to realize the importance of one specific Superman writer who often worked with Swan during comics' Silver Age. Noted science fiction author Edmond Hamilton's first pulp story appeared in 1926. As he continued to pen some 300 short stories and novels combined, he also scripted comics for twenty years (1946-66). Zeno is currently doing research for an article exploring the relationship between Hamilton and Swan under the aegis of their editor at that time, Mort Weisinger. Mort was another man of two worlds, that of comics and SF. Before he worked in comics he edited Thrilling Wonder Stories. Turns out the science fiction aspects of The Man Of Steel run deeper than we thought.

For the Curious:

The first MidSouthCon was really the first DeepSouthCon in Huntsville, AL, in 1963, with 5 in attendance. Our numbering starts with the MidSouthCon held in Huntsville on June 20-22, 1980, with Frederik Pohl as Guest of Honor, Frank Kelly Freas as Toastmaster and Wilson Tucker as Fan Guest. When MidSouthCon I Chairbeing Andy Purcell gafiated, we asked if we might use MidSouthCon for our convention name, and, with his permission, we have done so since then. There was no convention in 1998 due to hotel problems beyond our control.

Rules and Regulations

Rule #1 - Yes, you DO need your stinkin' badges!
Bedges must be prominently displayed (e.g., not under your cape) at
ALL times, so that con staff can easily see them without having to ask.

Flash Photography

No flash photography permitted during Opening Ceremonies and during the Masquerade. There will be a photo session for Masquerade entrants AFTER the actual Masquerade. Video cameras are allowed, but no bright lights, please.

Drinking Age

Legal drinking age in Tennessee is 21. You MUST provide identification at registration so that your badge will indicate that you may obtain alcohol in the con suite. NO Alcoholic Beverages will be allowed to leave the Con Suite.

Weapons Policy

All weapons and look-alike costume props MUST be <u>peace-bonded</u> for the duration of the convention. The ONLY exceptions to this rule are during the masquerade (during presentation only) and in the dealers room (for commercial purposes only). NO props are allowed in the Video Room for Rocky Horror. <u>Violators will be asked to leave the convention</u>. Due to state and local regulations, Security must reserve the right to inspect all weapons and look-alike props to ensure that they are properly bonded. If we ask to see your weapon or prop, please don't be offended — we are only doing our job.

Convention Etiquette

Do not argue with any hotel employee — refer any convention-related problem to MidSouthCon security. No alcohol allowed in hotel hallways, lobby, or meeting rooms. Anyone found violating these or any other rules will be evicted immediately from the convention.


Art Show Rules

- 1. Eating, drinking and smoking are prohibited in the art show.
- 2. No cameras, handbags, packages, or other assorted items of the same general description are allowed in the art show area. They are to be checked in upon entrance to the art show.
- 3. To make a bid, write your name, badge number and bid amount on the bid sheet. All pieces with a minimum of 2 bids will go to auction.
- 4. All sales will be made through the art show personnel. All minimum bidders and auction high bidders will be confirmed by badge number/name before purchases are finalized.
- 5. All art not sold at auction will be available for sale on Sunday.
- 6. All art not for sale will be tagged NFS.
- 7. There is to be a security person in the art show at all times.

Masquerade Rules

Entrants will be judged on costume and on skit quality and performance. Remember, the Masquerade depends on entrants. So, if you wear a costume, would like to win a great prize, and like to have fun, then enter the Masquerade! Registration forms can be picked up and turned in at the registration desk.

- 1. Entries for the Masquerade must be turned in before pre-judging on Saturday. Pre-judging will take place at 9 pm Saturday evening in one of the panel discussion rooms.
- 2. Please indicate on your entry form if you are in need of any special assistance, such as having trouble getting on and off the stage, etc.
- 3. You are responsible for any special effects. We are limited in what assistance we are able to provide. If possible, check with Masquerade personnel in advance to see what we can accommodate.
- 4. Display any weapons with care. (SEE above WEAPON'S POLICY!)
- NO flame, laser, or projectile weapons are allowed. THIS INCLUDES WATER PISTOLS.
- 6. Judges' decisions are final.

St. Jude's Children's Research Hospital

Have you ever wanted to be a hero? Did you ever wonder what it would be like to actually be the Paladin in that RPG you were playing and save the day, or someone's life? Or maybe you'd like to have enough money to donate a few grand a year to a good cause. How about doing both at the same time? Check out the info below and call them for an appointment: be a hero.

At St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, many patients with catastrophic diseases like leukemia need Apheresis blood products daily. Apheresis is a special kind of blood donation that allows whole blood to be withdrawn from a donor and separated into its component parts with all but the needed component being returned to the donor. The needed blood component, platelets, is then made immediately available to the patient.

Many times during chemotherapy and radiation treatment both cancer cells and healthy cells are destroyed, so patients need transfusions to prevent bleeding or to fight infection. Platelet donations are completely safe and each donation is closely supervised by trained staff who observe the donor throughout the process. The donation does not significantly decrease the number of platelets in the donor's body and the donated platelets are quickly replaced.

Platelet donation takes about two hours. Donors are welcome to watch television or read during the process. With every platelet donation, donors save St. Jude an average of \$500. Also, your donation could support a child through a critical time during his or her treatment. A platelet donor is an extraordinary person. When platelet donors are called to donate, they know someone is in critical need of a blood component that only the platelet donor is specially qualified to give. These special blood component donations save lives. If you already donate blood, you know how it feels to be a lifesaver.

This is the fourth year we are supporting the Memphis Literacy Council. All items to be auctioned for charities are on display in the Art Show and will be "on the block" during the Art Auction.

The Memphis Literacy Council

MidSouthCon is pleased to be working again this year with the Memphis Literacy Council, 902 S. Cooper, Memphis, TN, 38104, phone 327-6000.

Established in 1974, the Memphis Literacy Council is a private, non-profit organization dedicated to offering services to adults seeking to improve their reading and writing abilities. Hundreds of trained volunteers study weekly with adult students in one-to-one tutorial sessions, in small classes, or in computer learning labs. VISTAs (Volunteers in Service to America) work to supplement the efforts of a small professional staff and a community-oriented board of directors. The Council not only operates its own programs but assists many other groups who are committed to providing access to effective literacy instruction.

According to the U.S. Department of Education, 1 in 5 American adults is functionally illiterate – that is 20% of the total adult population in this country. This means that they cannot read, write, or perform basic math problems well enough to function effectively in everyday life.

Everyone can play a part in defeating illiteracy. And in turn, experience the satisfaction of helping other people discover whole new lives. Here are some ways you can help: volunteer to be a tutor or help teach a small class; volunteer to help with other literacy-related activities; invite the Council to present a program to your board, staff, service club or church group; refer adults to the Council who need help with their basic reading and writing skills; make a tax deductible contribution; spread the word about the program.

Volunteers are desperately needed. Potential volunteers should be caring and have both the time and the interest to help someone improve their reading and writing skills. Because it takes time for new adult learners to develop reading, writing and computer skills, volunteers are asked to think seriously about this task and then to make a commitment. Volunteer tutors are asked to work a minimum of two hours each week for one calendar year. The Memphis Literacy Council is funded by the United Way of Greater Memphis, by City of Memphis' Community Development Program, by individual donations, and by private grants. MLC is an affiliate member of Laubach Literacy Action, an organizational member of Literacy Volunteers of America, and a charter member of the Tennessee Literacy Coalition. DeepSouthCon ByLaws

Section 1. Paragraph 1. The DeepSouthCon is an unincorporated literary society whose functions are to choose the locations and committees of the annual DeepSouth Science Fiction Convention (hereinafter referred to as the DSC); to attend the DSC; and to perform such other activities as may be necessary or incidental to these purposes.

Section 1. Paragraph 2. The membership of DSC shall consist of (A) anyone paying the membership fee established by the current DSC committee, or (B) anyone upon whom the current DSC committee confers a complimentary membership. Only members attending the DSC will have voting privileges and each person shall have one vote. Absentee and proxy votes are not allowed. An optional class of non-voting supporting membership may be established by the current DSC committee for persons who wish to receive DSC publications but cannot attend the convention and participate in the business meeting.

Section 1. Paragraph 3. No part of DSC's net earnings shall be paid to its members, officers, or other private persons except in furtherance of the DSC's purposes. The DSC shall not attempt to influence legislation or any political campaign for public office. Should the DSC dissolve, its assets shall be distributed by the current DSC committee or the appropriate court having jurisdiction exclusive for charitable purposes.

Section 2. Paragraph 1. The voting membership of DSC shall choose the location and committee of the DSC to be held in the calendar year two years after the current DSC. Voting shall be by ballot cast at the current DSC. Counting of all votes shall be the responsibility of the DSC committee, using the preferential ballot system as it is used in site selection voting for the World Science Fiction Convention.

Section 2. Paragraph 2. A committee shall be listed on the ballot if it submits to the current DSC, by 6:00 PM on Friday of the current DSC, the following: a list of committee officers, a contract or letter of agreement with a facility adequate to hold the DSC, and a statement that the committee agrees to abide by these rules. A committee may bid any site in the states of Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, Arkansas, Texas, and all states both south and east of any of these.

Section 3. Paragraph 1. Any proposal to amend this constitution shall require two-thirds vote of all the votes cast on the question at the DSC meeting held at two successive DSCs.

Section 3. Paragraph 2. DSC meetings shall be held at advertised times at each DSC. The current DSC committee shall provide the Presiding officer for each meeting. Meetings shall be conducted in accordance with Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, and any Standing Rules the meeting shall adopt.

Section 3. Paragraph 3. The DSC constitution shall be published in the program book of each DSC. Any amendments eligible for ratification at the DSC shall also be published in the program book.



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CON-CHAIR SPEAK

DSC BY-LAWS

Section 1. Paragraph 1. The DeepSouthCon is an unincorporated literary society whose functions are to choose the locations and committees of the annual DeepSouth Science Fiction Convention (hereinafter referred to as the DSC); to attend the DSC; and to perform such other activities as may be necessary or incidental to these purposes.

Section 1. Paragraph 2. The membership of DSC shall consist of (A) anyone paying the membership fee established by the current DSC committee, or (B) anyone upon whom the current DSC committee confers a complimentary membership. Only members attending the DSC will have voting privileges and each person shall have one vote. Absentee and proxy votes are not allowed. An optional class of non-voting supporting membership may be established by the current DSC committee for persons who wish to receive DSC publications but cannot attend the convention and participate in the business meeting.

Section 1. Paragraph 3. No part of DSC's net earnings shall be paid to its members, officers, or other private persons except in furtherance of the DSC's purposes. The DSC shall not attempt to influence legislation or any political campaign for public office. Should the DSC dissolve, its assets shall be distributed by the current DSC committee or the appropriate court having jurisdiction exclusive for charitable purposes.

Section 1. Paragraph 4. A DeepSouthCon committee may present such awards as it deems appropriate. The traditional awards given out by the DSC are the Rebel Award for fannish activity and the Phoenix Award for professional science fiction and fantasy activity. Should a DSC choose to award the Rebel and/or Phoenix, the following guidelines shall be followed:

- a. The Rebel award is given to one or more science fiction fans who have, at some point, resided in the south (as defined in section 2, paragraph 2) or whose fannish activities have contributed to southern fandom in a positive way.
- b. The Phoenix award is given to one or more science fiction or fantasy professionals who have, at some point, resided in the south; whose professional work reflects on the south in a positive way; or who have demonstrated friendship with Southern fandom through support of regional fan activities.
- c. Either award may be given posthumously.
- d. Rebel and Phoenix awards are considered lifetime achievement awards, therefore no individual shall be given the same award a second time. However, a past winner of either award may also win the other award, as long as they meet the criteria outlined in subparagraphs (a) and (b).

Section 2. Paragraph 1. The voting membership of DSC shall choose the location and committee of the DSC to be held in the calendar year two years after the current DSC. Voting shall be by ballot cast at the current DSC. Counting of all votes shall be the responsibility of the DSC committee, using the preferential ballot system as it is used in site selection voting for the World Science Fiction Convention.

DSC BY-LAWS

Section 2. Paragraph 2. A committee shall be listed on the ballot if it submits to the current DSC, by 6:00 PM on Friday of the current DSC, the following: a list of committee officers, a contract or letter of agreement with a facility adequate to hold the DSC, and a statement that the committee agrees to abide by these rules. A committee may bid any site in the states of Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, and Virginia.

Section 3. Paragraph 1. Any proposal to amend this constitution shall require twothirds vote of all the votes cast on the question at the DSC meeting held at two successive DSCs.

Section 3. Paragraph 2. DSC meetings shall be held at advertised times at each DSC. The current DSC committee shall provide the Presiding officer for each meeting. Meetings shall be conducted in accordance with Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, and any Standing Rules the meeting shall adopt.

Section 3. Paragraph 3. The DSC constitution shall be published in the program book of each DSC. Any amendments eligible for ratification at the DSC shall also be published in the program book.




