My second order of business involves the preservation of Concave itself! Well, our History... In preparation for our 40th anniversary we hope to compile a book of Concave Art. The idea is to have a print to order book on Amazon book consisting of 40 years of Concave promotional art, programming information, and maybe a few short stories. Any proceeds from the sale of this book will go towards the Production Costs of our next proposed project... A 50th Anniversary Documentary! We want to compile our 50 year-long Oral History with footage, photos, and art to tell the story of fifty years of Concave! Consequently, you will see signs at Registration, the Consuite, and elsewhere that have contact information for our volunteer videographers. They will be ready to schedule a time for you to contribute to Concave's Oral History; either on video or audio recording. They will have a fancy release form to sign. We are looking for contributions of art, photos, stories, etc. This means You!

CONCAVE GOES DEEP

You may have noticed that the program book this year is a bit thicker than usual, and that there seems to be more than usual going on for a typical Concave. When we started Concave in 1980, we were broke college students so we ran it as a "relaxacon". That's Fanspeak for doing it on the cheap. We had no professional guests, a small local fan base, fewer than 100 attendees, and no enthusiasm for programming. That's pretty much how it remained for 38 years.

In 2015, Claude approached me with a grand vision to take Concave to the next level. He asked me if we could bid Concave for DSC 55. After floating the idea by the committee, we ran a bid at Contraflow/DSC 53 and lost by one vote. Undeterred, we bid again at JordanCon/DSC 54 and won by a single vote. One criticism of local conventions doubling as DSCs is that the DSC tends to get lost in the glare of the host convention. Concave is a good match for the DSC because while Concave has a strong tradition, there was also room for the DSC to stand out as a never-before offered program.

If you like the added programming to upgrade to the DSC, then Claude and I are vindicated. I invited John Hemry as a professional GoH because his books have kept me company on innumerable business trips and I'd never seen him as a guest at a Southern convention. I've known Rick Norwood for over 20 years from monthly fannish gatherings over Indian food and engaging conversations. I knew he'd fit right in at Concave. I've tried to add programming looking at fannish traditions which should appeal to both Concavers and DSC fans. I hope we've added enough to be a credible DSC while preserving the ambiance of Concave. If this year's experiment is successful we'll consider continuing it into Concave's fourth decade. If not, then there's nothing to keep us from returning to Concave Classic format! Please let us know which direction you prefer at this crossroads!

GUEST OF HONOR: JOHN G. (JACK CAMPBELL) HEMRY



John Hemry and his writing alter-ego Jack Campbell constitutes one of the most prolific writing teams currently working in Science Fiction. John manages to publish three novels per year. John began writing after graduating from the US Naval Academy and retiring as a career officer in the US Navy.

His first novel, A Just Determination, published in 2003 follows the adventures of Ensign Paul Sinclair, a fresh graduate of the US Space Navy Academy who is unlucky enough to have some legal training. Paul is appointed as his ship's legal officer and must defend a warship captain who may have started an interplanetary war by firing on a hostile vessel without orders. Paul's adventures continued for three more novels, but the series was discontinued. How silly to think that there might be an audience for obscure military legal systems like, hypothetically, NCIS or JAG!

The Paul Sinclair novels were John's warm-up exercise before launching into an even more ambitious project under the pseudonym of Jack Campbell. There's absolutely a coincidence between John's choice of *nom de plume* and the legendary Golden Age writer/editor John Campbell Jr. Indeed, John's "Jack Campbell" writings over the last 12 years would have been very comfortable if published next to those of Robert Heinlein, Gordon Dickson, of Isaac Asimov.

In 2006 with the publication of *The Lost Fleet: Dauntless*, John begins a story arc which carries over six novels, and has generated two spin-off series. In *Dauntless*, John introduces Black Jack Geary, a legendary leader lost at the beginning of a century-long war. Black Jack, however, is not dead yet, only resting in cryostasis in an emergency escape pod. He is discovered and revived on the eve of a climactic battle in which the Terran Alliance he fought for expects to decisively defeat the enemy Syndicate Worlds. The battle doesn't go quite as planned as 75% of the Alliance fleet is destroyed far behind enemy lines. As the most senior surviving officer it falls to Black Jack to somehow save the remnant of the Alliance fleet and run through a gauntlet of enemy systems between the battlefield and Alliance space. It doesn't help that some of the surviving admirals aren't keen on accepting the command of a 100-year time traveler who has heretical ideas about how to fight. Geary must face both external and internal enemies in order to save his crews and return to friendly space.


The final installment of the series, *The Lost Fleet: Victorious* answers a question that very few military-themed stories dare to ask, "What do we do if we win?" What happens with the people want to raise a military hero to lead the government when the Powers that Be want nothing to do with that? In Black Jack's case it is to send him back out to explore and possible undo some of the damage he's done to pacified systems that once belonged to the enemy. In the two spin -off series, *Beyond the Frontier* and *The Lost Stars*, Admiral Geary's fleet encounters both friendly and hostile aliens, and helps an ex-Syndicate World to build a functioning society from the aftermath of war. Sure, there are still space battles, but there's also a lot of thought about what makes humanity redeemable, and how to strike a balance between government and military.

If that wasn't enough, John has begun another series aimed at young adults, *The Pillars of Creation*. These books are set on a colony planet that's forgotten its origins. Society is ruled by The Magician's Guild and the Engineer's Guild. The Engineers build infrastructure, computers, communications, and weapons. The Mages can manipulate reality, keep order, and check the power of the Engineers. In a Romeo and Juliet-like twist a young Engineer girl and Mage boy discover that despite their different talents and incompatible paradigms, they are still human, and can fall in love. It's intriguing to see how the Mages and Engineers are so indoctrinated in their respective worldviews that they cannot perceive the workings of the other side. A Mage can't see a locomotive as a manufactured object, and an Engineer can't appreciate the level of understanding a Mage must have to work the magic.

John lives in Maryland with his wife and three children. One can only imagine the discipline it takes to manage a family, especially with two autistic kids, and produce 3-4 novels a year! With a schedule like that It's a privilege that Jack took some time off to come here this weekend as our Pro Guest of Honor. Please join me in welcoming him to Bowling Green, and Concave. I hope you are looking forward to getting to know him. Better yet, buy books!

FAN GUEST OF HONOR: DR. FREDERICK (RICK) NORWOOD



Rick Norwood is a living legend in Southern Fandom. He may have attended the first DSC in 1963 at Dave Hulan's house in Huntsville. Rick was a frequent visitor at Dave's house, which was a nexus of fannish activity at the time. Nobody can remember if Rick was there on that particular weekend. Rick was certainly there at the subsequent early DSCs and certainly at DSC 6 in New Orleans in 1968 since he was the cochairman of that one along with Don

Markstein!

Rick was born in 1942 in Franklin, LA. While studying mathematics at MIT, Rick was one of the writer-editors *God Comics*, one of the first undergrounds. He went on to earn a PhD in Mathematics in 1979 from the University of Southern Louisiana as well as membership in the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton, NJ. As a mathematician, Dr. Norwood has published numerous papers on algebraic topology as well as a book on logical thinking, *How to Think*. He is a currently a Professor of mathematics at East Tennessee State University.

Rick has always loved comics, with several letters published in Silver Age DC and Marvel comics as well as getting permission from Julius Schwartz to publish fan fiction using the DC superhero, Captain Midnight. He continues to publish the journal *Comics Review*, as well as publisher and editor of his small press publishing house, Manuscript Press. Over the years Manuscript Press has released a previously unpublished novel by Hal Clement, *Left of Africa* as well as collections of comic strip reprints.

Rick also has numerous SF story writing credits with work published in *Twilight Zone Magazine*, *Black Gate*, *Analog Science Fiction*, and *The Magazine of Fantasy and Science Fiction*. Rick is actively writing new fiction, with rumors of a novel in the can. We recently collaborated over dinner to come up with plausible chemistry for a story he was writing and needed to make normally inert materials explode. Somehow, the secret ingredient wasn't Aloo Gobi Massala.

It does not take long in conversation with Rick to realize he's a person with a wide range of interests and knowledge. He's someone you can talk to about just about anything and come away knowing more than you did. He's also one of the Founding Fathers of Southern Fandom, contributing to fanzines, amateur press alliances, letter columns, semi-pro and professional magazines. He's been with us since the early beginnings of organized Southern Fandom, and it is a great pleasure to have him with us this weekend as the Fan Guest of Honor at Concave/DSC 56, on the 50-year anniversary of his chairmanship of DSC 6. I hope you all make it a point to renew your acquaintance with Rick if you already know him, or get to know him if you don't. I promise you'll find something to talk about! - GARY ROBE

MUSICAL GUESTS: FIVE YEAR MISSION



Five Year Mission barely needs an introduction since this is their fourth straight year in concert at Concave! If you aren't familiar with them yet, this Fantastic Five from Indianapolis takes filk to Warp 8.7 (approximately). The band's mission is no less than to write at least one original song for each of the 79 episodes of *Star Trek* The Original Series. The result is more fun than a load of tribbles in a Klingon engine room. Noah Butler, Andy Fark, Patrick O'Connor, Mike Rittenhouse, and Chris

Spurgin share an innovative approach to songwriting. Each band member studies ST:TOS and develops song ideas for each episode. The band then works on each treatment and picks one best-liked version for inclusion in their repertoire. So far they've released Year One, Year Two, Year Three, The Trouble with Tribbles, and Spock's Brain. Their collaborative writing process stalled when considering The Trouble with Tribbles and Spock's Brain. With such fertile material to work with, they simply couldn't pick a favorite, so they recorded a CD for each!

A Five Year Mission concert is a high-energy experience. The constant factor is Andy Fark on drums. Noah, Patrick, Mike, and Chris all switch instruments and lead vocalist duties as each song demands. The styles of the songs range from silly honky-tonk with A Wolf in the Fold to hard driving rock for The Doomsday Machine. The moods vary from the lilting ballad of Friday's Child to savage slash in Miri (Bonk Bonk! Bonk bonk in the head!). The constant factor is the sharpness and inventiveness of the lyrics with a remarkable ability to both set quotes from the shows to music and tell the stories in their own words.

This year we'll be certain to get a generous serving of new tracks from Year Four, if not the CD itself! The band members always enjoy themselves at Concave, and they're certain to be around to hang out with before and after the show. 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HISTORY OF DEEPSOUTHCON AND THE SOUTHERN FANDOM AWARDS

THE CONVENTION The first DeepSouthCon in 1963 was called MidSouthCon and was a gathering of five or six fans in Dave Hulan's house in Huntsville, AL. Larry Montgomery was responsible for establishing the name DeepSouthCon and the idea of moving the convention from city-to-city by hosting DSC 2 in Anniston, AL in 1964. Larry also instituted the tradition of the Rebel Award by giving the first one to Al Andrews. It is known that something that happens once is an Event, twice is a Coincidence, and three times is a Tradition. The DSC became Tradition in 1965 with number 3 in Birmingham when the attendance tripped into double digits (19). In 1968 the DSC broke out of Alabama by moving to New Orleans where attendance tripled to 72. From then on the DSC has not spent two consecutive years in the same city. DSC 8 in 1970 held in Atlanta, GA instituted the Phoenix Award given to a Southern creative professional artist. In 1986 at DSC 24 bylaws were introduced at the business meeting and ratified the next year in Huntsville. The adoption of bylaws instituted two-year advance site selection, rules for awarding the Rebel and Phoenix Awards, and defined the eligible region for holding a DeepSouthCon.

THE REBEL AWARD Instituted at DSC 2 in 1964, The Rebel Award is given to one or more science fiction fans who have resided in the DSC region whose fannish activities have made a positive contribution to southern fandom.

THE PHOENIX AWARD Instituted in 1970 at DSC 8, The Phoenix Award is given to one or more science fiction or fantasy professional who have at some point resided in the south or have demonstrated kinship with Southern fandom by supporting Southern fannish activities.

These awards are considered a lifetime achievement award so no individual can be given the award twice although it may be awarded posthumously and a DSC committee may choose to present Rebel and Phoenix Awards to more than one recipient in a single year. Winning the Rebel or Phoenix Award does not disqualify an individual from being given the other award should a candidate demonstrate qualification for the second award.

THE DEEPSOUTHCON BYLAWS

(Section 1. Paragraph 1. The Deep South Con in an unincorporated literary society whose functions are to choose the locations and committees of the annual DeepSouthCon Science Fiction Convention (hereinafter referred to as the DSC); to attend the DSC; and to perform such other activities as may be necessary or incidental to these purposes.

Section 1. Paragraph 2. The membership of the DSC shall consist of (A) anyone paying the membership fee established fy the current DSC committee, or (B) anyone upon whom the current DSC committee confers a complimentary membership. Only members attending the DSC will have voting privileges and each person shall have one vote. Absentee and proxy votes are not allowed. An optional class of non-voting supporting membership may be established by the current DSC committee for persons who wish to receive DSC publications but cannot attend the convention and participate in the business meeting.

Section 1 Paragraph 3. No part of the DSC's net earnings shall be paid to its members, officers, or other private persons except in furtherance of the DSC's purposes. The DSC shall not attempt to influence legislation or any campaign for public office. Should the DSC dissolve, its assets shall be distributed by the current DSC committee or the appropriate court having jurisdiction exclusive for charitable purposes.

Section 1. Paragraph 4. A Deep SouthCon committee may present such awards as it deems appropriate. The traditional awards given out by the DSC are the Rebel Award for fannish activity and the Phoenix Award for professional science fiction and fantasy activity. Should a DSC choose to award the Rebel and/or Phoenix, the following guidelines shall be followed:

a. The Rebel Award is given to one of more science fiction fans who have, at point, resided in the south (as defined in Section 2, paragraph 2) or whose fannish activities have contributed to Southern fandom in a positive way.

b. The Phoenix Award is given to one of more science fiction professionals who have, at some point, resided in the south; whose professional work reflects the south in a positive way; or who have demonstrated friendship with Southern fandom through support of regional fan activities.

c. Either award may be given posthumously

d. Rebel and Phoenix Awards are considered lifetime achievement award, therefore no individual shall be given the same award a second time. However a past winner of either award may also win the other award as long as they meet the criteria outlined in subparagraphs (a) and (b).

Section 2. Paragraph 1. The voting membership of the DSC shall choose the location and committee of the DSC to be held in the calendar year two years after the current DSC. Voting shall be by ballot cast at the current DSC. Counting of all the votes shall be the responsibility of the DSC committee, using the preferential ballot system as it is used in site selection voting for the World Science Fiction Convention.

Section 2. Paragraph 2. A committee shall be listed on the ballot if it submits to the current DSC by 6:00 PM on Friday of the current DSC, the following: A list of committee officers, a contract or letter of agreement with a facility adequate to hold the DSC, and a statement that the committee agrees to abide by these rules. A committee may

bid any site in the states of Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Tennessee, Texan and Virginia.

Section 3. Paragraph 1. Any proposal to amend this constitution shall require two-thirds vote of all the votes cast on the question at the DSC meeting held at two successive DeepSouthCons.

Section 3. Paragraph 2. DSC meetings shall be held at advertised times at each DSC. The current DSC committee shall provide the Presiding Officer for each meeting. Meetings shall be conducted in accordance with Roberts Rules of Order, Newly Revised, and any standing rules the meeting shall adopt.

Section 3. Paragraph 3. The DSC by-Laws shall be published in the program book of each DSC. Any amendments eligible for ratification at the DSC shall also be published in the program book.

No action items, amendments to the bylaws or old business are known to have been passed on to DSC 55 business meeting from the DSC 54 business meeting. The agenda for the DSC 56 business meeting will be:

- 1. Call to order
- 2. Call for old business
- 3. Call for new business
- 4. Debate and voting on new business items
- 5. DSC 58 bid presentations and site selection voting
