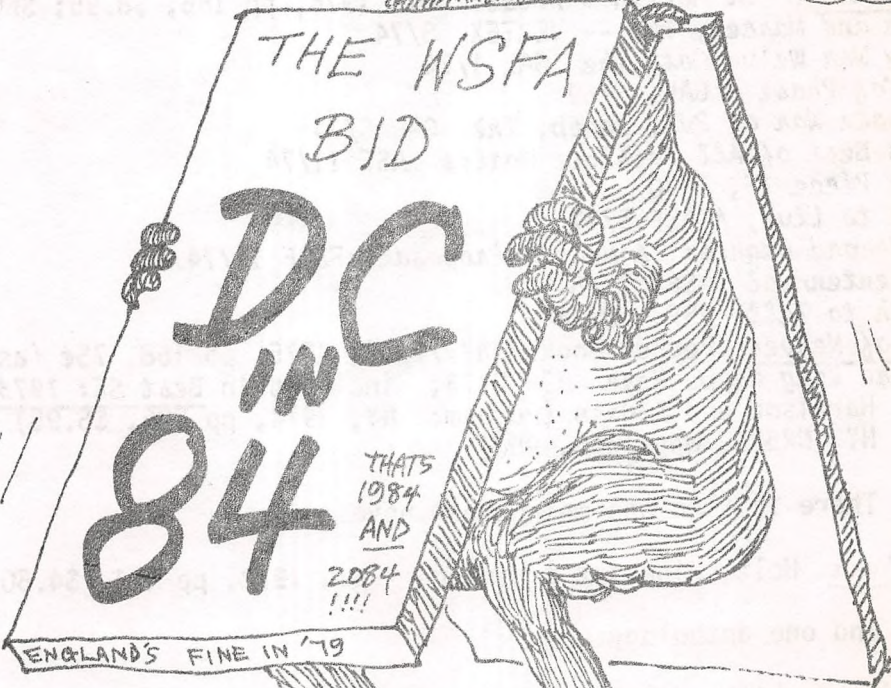

- ROMA, 3419 Connecticut Ave., NW. Lunch: 11:30-3:30 p.m. Dinner;  
open until 2 a.m. L: \$2.95 - \$4.50. D: \$3.25 - \$8. Interesting  
decor. Italian food. Ask if the garden is open.
- BARON'S GOURMET, 2643 Connecticut Ave., NW. Open 10 a.m. - 7 p.m.  
Up to \$ 3.95. Interesting assortment of food, including chili,  
knishes, empanadas, sandwiches, platters, pastries, etc.
- SEAFAIR, 2655 Connecticut Ave., NW. \$4.25 - \$10.75. You could do lots  
better. Specials, weekdays, \$3.25+
- TUCSON CANTINA, 2605 Connecticut Ave., NW. Up to \$3 or so. South-Western  
Food. Snacks, \$1.39+; Dinner, \$2.64+.
- TOKYO SUKIYAKI RESTAURANT, 1736 Connecticut Ave., NW. Japanese  
cuisine.
- YENCHING PALACE, 3524 Connecticut Ave., NW. L: \$2.50 - \$3.75. Dinner,  
\$4.50 - \$9.75. Popular with the delegation from the People's Republic  
of China. Sunday Buffet: 12-2:30 p.m., \$3.25. You'd do better  
in Chinatown.

If you are driving, there are excellent Chinese restaurants on H Street, NW, between 7th and 9th Streets, e.g. THE NEW VILLAGE INN (service is poor but the food is fine), JADE PALACE (usually have *din sum* available-- Chinese meat pastries); RUDY'S, etc. On I St., N.W., the SZECHUAN. Or, try the THAI ROOM on Connecticut and Nebraska Ave., especially if you like spicy food. Recommended.

For fine and expensive fare, M St., N.W., between Connecticut and 21st Street, has French, Italian, and everything else. Lots of places in the area. Or M St., from 27th St. to Wisconsin Ave., (Georgetown: very "in"). Lots of good French Restaurants, EL TIO PEPE for excellent Spanish food and entertainment, etc.

Good ice-cream can be gotten in Georgetown on Wisconsin Ave: at SWENSON'S ICE CREAM FACTORY. Interesting Sandwiches at the BOOEYMONGER in Georgetown, 32nd and Prospect, N.W. e.g. the Guruben (\$2.65, near the top of the range) consisting of turkey, avocado, and bean sprouts on a Clementine. Yeah! On Pennsylvania Avenue, between 19th and 10th Streets, is a good Italian Restaurant, MAROCCO'S, moderately priced, with good food, and, for dessert, home-made tortoni. Recommended.

Locally, Sherry's at Connecticut and Calvert, N.W., contains not only wines, beers, and milk, but also French bread, bagels, etc.; and there is a small grocery at 24th and Calvert Streets, N.W.
