

If you are driving, there are excellent Chinese restaurants on H St.,NW, between 7th and 8th Sts., e.g., THE NEW VILLAGE INN (service is poor but the food is fine), JADE PALACE (usually has $dim\ sum\ available--Chinese\ meat\ pastries)$, etc. On I St., NW, the SZECHUAN. Or, try the THAI ROOM on Connecticut & Nebraska, NW, especially if you like spicy food. Recommended.

Super sandwiches at the BOOEYMONGER, or crepes at the MAGIC PAN, up at 5252 Wisconsin Ave, NW, with fine ice cream at SWENSON'S ICE CREAM FACTORY a few doors away at 5310 Wisconsin Ave., NW (not to mention the Mazza Gallerie, with Nieman-Marcus to browse through). A little closer is ARMAND'S CHICAGO PIZZERIA, 4200 Wisconsin Ave, NW, with a Swenson's across the street.

For fine and expensive fare, M St., NW, between Connecticut and 21st St, has French, Italian, and everything else. Or M St., from 27th St. to Wisconsin Ave, NW and up Wisconsin Ave. (Georgetown: very "in"). Lots of good French, Indian, Vietnamese, Greek, Spanish, and you name it. The bars are fun, too. And there's a SWENSON'S around Wisconsin & N St., NW, and a BOOEYMONGER sandwich shop a block past Wisconsin, at Potomac & Prospect. Oh yes, on Pennsylvania Ave, between 19th & 20th Sts., is a good Italian restaurant, MAROCCO'S, moderately priced, with good food, and for dessert, home-made tortoni! Recommended.

Locally, Sherry's at Connecticut & Calvert, NW, contains not only liquor, but French bread, cheese, bagels, etc.; and there is a small grocery at 24th & Calvert Sts., NW
