INFORMATION

<u>CONCOURSE 1</u> will be open to DISCLAVE MEMBERS during the hours of the main daytime program. It will be a place for small children to nap, play, be fed, and get their diapers charged. IT IS NOT TO BE USED AS A CRASH SPACE. Babysitters must be found by the parents themselves; we suggest they make co-op arrangements. Volunteers who are willing to babysit for parents while they eat, attend programming, etc, will be loved and appreciated.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES



YELLOW SUBMARINE

A sensible, peaceful sort named Jeremy has his home invaded by a wierd-looking craft and gets involved in a war over noisepollution. Strongly influenced by William Hope Hodgeson.

ELIZABETH A. LYNN: A SHORT COURSE

The following short descriptions are those convention members who are not for familiar with Elizabeth A. Lynn's novels. Her first, A DIFFERENT LIGHT, is a romanspace opera with homoerotic tendentic cies. Her theme is Love and Art; the central character, Jimson Alleca, is an ac/dc graphic artist with terminal cancer and a penchant for self-pity. Bored with his life, he decides to leave the world he lives on and do some planetary sightsee-Once on a different world, Jimson ing. attaches himself to a rather disreputable bar, begins to draw, and has an affair. He cannot forget his first love, however, a boyhood chum named Russell, and the reader cannot therefore be surprised when Chum turns up. Chum is now a starship captain who likes to steal for hire. Artist, captain, artists's ex--a pilot--and an eight foot tall telepath go off to steal a work of art from an uninhabited planet. The planet of course turns out to be inhabited and the thieves become involved in a rather standard adventure in which they are tied up and talked to interminably in High Pidgen. Ultimately the artist gets to do some Art, the captain gets to steal his artifact, and the fourteen-year-old telepath who has somehow joined the party gets to go to Psi Center (isn't that a cute name?) and be trained. At Psi Center it is discovered that Jimson's incurable cancer has Gotten Worse. An implausible convolution of the plot finally deposits him as a parasite in yet another telepath's brain. The movement of the novel depends wholly on coincidence, and it abounds with science fiction cliches, including hyperspace and several bar scenes; the story seems pointless and mildly silly, without any really classy sexual deviations. The writing gets a B, the story a C, and the current cover (on which none of the people look like people in the story) a D-.

The next three of Lynn's novels are three volumes of a fantasy trilogy, THE CHRONICLES OF TORNOR. Tornor is a Keep in the imaginary land of Arun. In WATCHTOWER (unfortunate title, conjuring up visions of stout ladies carrying tracts) Ryke, the

only surviving retainer to Prince Errel, rightful ruler of Tornor Keep, goes into the service of Col Istor, who has just usurped the castle and killed everyone, including Athor, the prince's father. Ryke doesn't really mean his defection, however, and when two warriors with odd reputations show up at Tornor, Ryke and Errel (who has been forced to serve as Col Istor's jester) escape with them to Vanima, a mysetrious valley. The two warriors turn out to be old friends of Errel: an amusing coincidence, isn't it? Once more Lynn permits coincidence to create plot. Vanima, which sounds suspiciously like a commune in Mendocino County, California, is actually a community of philosophi-cally-minded misfits; Van, the community's leader, is a pompous messianic bully who wants to End War by teaching people to dance (1?) and offers to help Errel reconquer Tornor, with the assistance of a neighbouring Keep's army. This is done. Much of the story takes place on horseback. People speak enigmatically. There is no sex. The novel's pretense to gritty realism is no doubt why it won a World Award, but it really is terribly Fantasy dreary. The best thing to be said for it is that in her desire for pseudo-historicity Lynn chooses not to write about yet another one of those magical countries abounding with dragons, wizards, giants, and magical rings or swords. A for Effort. C for Fun.

Can a sheltered adolescent from an obscure border keep find acceptance out in the great world and also get laid? That is the question posed by THE DANCERS OF ARUN, the second book in the trilogy. The good news is, this is not a middle book. It is a complete novel, set one hundred years after the adventures in WATCHTOWER, with a whole new set of problems and characters. The bad news is, it is a silly, saccharine story, in which again coincidence substitutes for plotting and everyone, even the Bad Guys, is disgustingly and suspiciously noble. Kerris, an orphan, is doomed to a life of scribing accounts and having wet dreams until his handsome, dynamic, graceful, blond, greyeyed, etc. etc. brther, arrives at Tornor

Keep. Kel is a travelling dancer. Accompanied by his troupe, Kel takes Kerris to Elath where both brothers were born, and where the brother's lover runs a school for telepaths. In fact, Elath appears to be populated mostly by telepaths and it is under siege by a band of (you guessed it!) renegade telepaths from a neighbouring culture who want Power. The telepaths of Elath, who are kind, courteous, reverent, gentle, etc. etc. help the marauders to understand that Aggression is Evil. Isn't that comforting? Oh, and Kerris gets laid. Much bucolic imagery (much of it incompetent) and some kinky sex distinguish this book. Call it a B.

THE NORTHERN GIRL is the final volume of the trilogy. Once more Lynn skips ahead a hundred years, and we are now in a place which she seems able to describe with reasonable plausibility: the largest city in Arun, the coastal town of Kendraon-the-Delta. The novel's principal characters are Sorren, a dumb blonde bondser-vant, Paxe, Sorren's lover and captain of a noble family's private army, and Arre Med, a bad-tempered aristocrat with a sweet tooth. Sorren is Arre Med's bondservant and the army is Arre Med's army. The story involves a plot on the part of the other ruling families of the city, who are trying to introduce swords into the city's defense system, probably because they are all dying of boredom. Arre Med's charming but evil brother tries to assist the innovators and ends up hiring assassins to attack his sister, an impulse fully understood by any reader who has plodded this far into the story. Paxe foils the killers, Arre Med foils the rest of the plot, and Sorren, freed, travels north to Tornor Keep, where she finds her Roots and True Love. The novel is actually a pacifist tact, but if the reader can stomach the moralizing, the writing's pretty good and the swordplay actually makes sense, a quality rare in most fantasy no-vels. B+.


Lynn's other books are a short story collection, THE WOMAN WHO LOVED THE MOON AND OTHER STORIES, and a novel, THE SARDO-NYX NET. It is impossible to review short story collections. THE SARDONYX NET is not impossible to review, but, lacking space, this reviewer suggests you wait for the forthcoming review in Venom No. 3.





The purpose of the show is to promote original art work with a Fantasy, SF, or Fannish theme. Graphic art prints may appear in the show, but not mechanical reproductions (multilith, photograph, offset, etc.) All items usually available in the Hucksters Room are excluded.

Set-up and Registration begins Friday afternoon. Please come and help: as soon as the hanging begins the show will be open to the public (did you ever attend a public hanging?)

BIDDING: All work will be sold only by written or voice bid. Please do not erase your bids or make bids without intending to honor them. Three written bids will automatically get a piece into the Saturday Night voice auction. Two will probably get it in, but as the time available for the Saturday auction is limited, we can not promise. All items receiving two or more bids will be put up for voice auction. Pieces receiving their first written bid on Friday or Saturday and which don't get another bid by 1/2 hour prior to the Sunday auction will have been sold to the bidder, will not go to voice auction, and can be bicked up by the bidders before the auction or during it. Items receiving their first bid on Sunday will go into the voice auction, even if there is only one bid. Thus there is no advantage to last minute bidding.

WHAT DO THE COLOR DOTS ON THE BID SHEETS MEAN?

GREEN: First written bid on Friday or Saturday: If no more bids are made, it is sold by time of Sunday auction RED: Two or more bids: Probably auctioned off Sat. nite ELUE: 1st bid on Sunday: goes into Sunday auction.

PAYING FOR ART: We accept Cash, Traveler's cheques, and personal checks with I.D. NO CREDIT CARDS. Purchases may be paid for and picked up during the auctions, and after them. Purchases not picked up by 6:00 PM on Sun. will be returned to the artist.

COURTESY IN THE ART SHOW

The usual rules apply: No smoking, drinking, eating, etc Please don't wear bulky costumes or masks into the show Don't gather into little groups and talk inside, as it blocks the narrow aisles. Please leave your packages bags, packs, etc. up in your room, but NOT AT THE DOOR. We will not be responsible for them. No photographs to be taken without permission of the artist and of the Art Show Director. Do not touch or handle the artwork, please keep close control of your children: Children please remind your parents that they too must abide by the rules.

<u>CASH PRIZES</u>: You can vote cash prizes for your favorite artists simply by bidding on their work. Highest prize goes to the piece receiving the most money. 90 $^{\prime}$ /.will go to the artist, a tiny 10 $^{\circ}$ /. to the Con. So bid for the works which deserve encouragement, and then PAY for them (money is very encourageing to artists).

INFORMATION FOR ARTISTS PARTICIPATING IN THE SHOW FEES: NO HANGING FEE: 10 °/. COMMISSION ON SALES.

All work must remain in the show until normal pick-up time on Sunday, unless early departure arrangements are made with the Director at the time you register.

AGENTS/CARRIERS: You must present an original, signed, dated, letter from the artist authorizing you to represent them. This letter must specify that it is for the Disclave Art Show and specify how payment is to be made If payment is not specified, the check will be mailed to the artist. No work will be accepted for re-sale.

GETTING YOUR WORK BACK: During the Sunday auction we will break down the show and pack the hangings in the truck. Then, the artwork will be distributed to the artists. We ill need the bid-sheet from each unsold piece. When the sales desk is closed, we will dc a short accounting of the money, and after this is done you may pick up your check for art sold. We may be able to cash some of these on site.

Work sold at auction but not picked up by 6:PM will be returned to the artists. Checks not picked up by that time will be mailed, and will not be given out on Sunday night or on Monday. Once we leave the area - we are gone - don't even ask.

WE WILL PRESUME. THAT ANY ART WORK ABANDONED AT THE CON AFTER 6:00 PM ON SUNDAY IS A GIFT TO US. So don't go to dinner presuming our children are in safe hands.









