## DISCLAVE--1958

Most of east coast fandom received a prior announcement that there would be a conference in Washington, D. C., 10-11 May 1958. This is to confirm that earlier announcement.

The conference will be held at the Arva Motor Hotel, 2201 Arlington Boulevard, Arlington, Virginia. Saturday, May 10th, 1958, is the big day, though we expect some people to arrive Friday and some to stay well into Sunday. Conference headquarters will be room 54, which is directly over the office. Room 54, however, is reserved only for Saturday; anyone arriving Friday will find assorted members of local fandom in room 53, which is also directly over the office.

This is a disorganized conference. No speeches. No banquet. Nothing but fans and a place to have a party. There will be a tape recorder and a slide projector available, and anyone wanting to bring either a tape or slides along will be welcomed. If anyone has the desire to show films a location can be arranged but no projector can be furnished.

Rates are as follows: 1 person, one double bed \$7; 2 persons, one double bed \$10; 2 persons, two single beds \$11; 3 persons, one double and one single bed \$12; 3 persons in 3 single beds \$13; four persons in 2 doubles \$14; 4 in 1 double and 2 singles \$15; 5 in two doubles and a single \$16; suites from 20 to 30 dollars. Reservations are mandatory, since the Arva has only twice in its history had any rooms vacant overnight. Rooms will be held until 6p.m. without deposit, for later arrival a deposit is required. Reservations should be in ten days in advance if possible. Send them to the Arva, address above. People without reservations may have some trouble finding overnight accommodations—Washington is a popular tourist town in the spring.

There are two other motels in this same general area, the Iwo Jima and the "50". Both are on the same road, about  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile closer to Washington. Both are new, and rates should be comparable to the Arva. I don't have the address for these, but either could doubtless be reached by addressing your letter to the motel by name, Arlington Boulevard, Arlington, Virginia.

The Arva is located on U.S. Route 50 slightly over 1 mile south-west of Washington, opposite of the entrance to Fort Myer, Virginia. Drivers from the north can enter Washington via U.S. 1, U.S. 29, U.S. 240, or the Baltimore-Washington expressway (best route from Baltimore and points north) or even via the Chesapeake Bay Bridge and U.S. 50. Go through Washington and cross into Virginia on Memorial Bridge, which is U.S. 50. (Highway Bridge (U.S. 1) can be used but it's a trifle longer and more confusing.) Proceed out U.S. 50 slightly over one mile after crossing Memorial Bridge to the Arva Motel on your right. (It is approximately one-half mile past the Iwo Jima and "50" motels.) From the south, U.S. 350 or U.S. 1 is recommended. Follow these to Memorial Bridge, but do not cross. At Memorial Bridge, you will pick up U.S. 50. Follow this, to the west, as described above. From the west, approach Washington via U.S. 29, 50, 211, or Virginia 7. All of these routes either cross or join U.S. 50. Conce on U.S. 50, follow it until you reach the Arva. In this case, the Arva will be on your left, and the best indication that you've reached it will be Fort Myer on your right.

More over.

The Arva can also be reached by taxi or bus. Taxi fare should be about \$2.00 from any downtown point (such as the bus or train station) but ask the driver the fare <u>first</u>—some taxi drivers like to make money, and D.C./Virginia law does not establish a set fare for rides from Washington into Virginia. The Arva should also be fairly easily reached from the airport, but again inquire about fare before trusting your money to an airport limousine.

Saturday night is party night in room 54. Bring your own bottle (or friend with bottle). Room 54 is <u>big</u>, so there will be room for all. Guests from states with high liquor prices can save money by buying in Washington with its low prices. Liquor by the drink is not sold in Virginia. Beer by the drink is sold, as is liquor by the bottle at state stores.

The Arva is not ideal. The only convenient restaurants are one in the motel and a nearby delicatessen, plus a drug store. Its accommodations are excellent. Next year we will try to find a place with a wider variety of places to eat or adjoining motels, but the Arva will do for this year. There is a swimming pool, but there are only slight chances that the weather will be suitable for swimming at that time of year.

If you can bring slides or other entertainment it will be appreciated. With or without, we hope you can come, and that you enjoy yourselves. Don't forget--reservations are required; you're taking an awful chance if you don't reserve a room in advance. If you have any further questions, drop me a line or ask White, Eney, Madle, Evans, Derry or Magnus, any one of whom can get the answer for you.
