### Guest of Honour

RON SMITH was born in Hemit, California thirty-five years ago, which makes him almost as old as Lee Harding (and much handsomer). Like most of us he developed an early interest in s-f and went on to become an active fan, eventually publishing for several years the award-winning fanzine INSIDE. During this period he also wrote and sold numerous short s-f pieces to American magazines and generally moved around with a talented group of New York layabouts who have since moved on to individual fame. He roomed for a while at the legendary apartment on 116th Street, New York, and once had Robert Silverberg for a roomate. At various other times people like Harlan Ellison, Randall Garret and, I believe, many others, also shared these famous quarters.

When the political and social climate in America began to look cloudy, Ron decided to emigrate to Australia. He arrived here early in 1962, the third piece of a cosmic jig-saw that somehow conspired to bring Lee Harding, John Baxter and Ron Smith together in the Harbour City for a prodigious Xmas period. For a while he bummed around on various jobs before finally landing a position with SQUIRE Magazine. By dint of hard work and the application of a little imagination (among other things) he eventually rose to the assistant editor's chair of that magazine. At about the same time he collaborated with John Baxter on two 'Library Service' stories which were sold to ANALOG under the 'Martin Loran' by-line (you may remember The Case of the Perlurea Planet') and wrote several stories for magazines in the U S.A.


In 1967 Ron moved to Horwitz Publications and it was there, in his capacity of editor for their pulp-paperback line, that he made his first endevours to publish s-f novels by Australian writers. He bought and published two books in this proposed series, Bert Chandler's FALSE FATHERLAND and John Baxter's THE GOD KILLERS, and later still, David Rome's SQUAT. Whether the series would have prospered is a moot point, for shortly after this Horwitz axed the pulp-paperback section of their empire and Ron was unemployed again.

About six months ago he moved down to Melbourne and worked for a while as a free-lance, writing t-v scripts and 'ghosting' for Peter Carter Brown. He is currently editing again - this time for GOLD STAR PUBLICATIONS, and is working on a new series of quality paper-back novels with a "high erotic content".

# RON SMITH



FLASH GORDON: a 13 episode serial made in 1936, starring Buster Crabbe as Flash Gordon. Our legendary s-f hero always seems to get a rough deal when Melbourne fans look forward to viewing his fabulous adventures on a Universal inspired planet Mongo. On the first occasion when we turned out to see him do battle with the merciless Ming - this was four years ago - the drama that ensued turned out to be more diverting than the serial. The print was a privately owned 35mm. copy and the owner was being very helpful and generous in allowing us to see it. We hired a Greek owned theatre in Windsor and over 100 eager fans gathered outside the venue at the appointed time. But alas, our showing was not to be. The projectionist - a nasty old fellow who should have retired fifteen years previously - got very heated and decided that he didn't want to screen this particular film, and proceeded to cause no end of disturbances. He even managed to break the film in three places before it reached the projector, so we decided to pack up and move to a privately owned theatrette that we knew could seat 45 people in comfort. Well, we somehow managed to pack 95 anxious fans into that room and we sat enthralled at last while Flash defeated the multiple evils of Ming the Merciless. The second projected screening of this classic serial was to have been at the 1971 New Year

UFO: two episodes will be screened in COLOUR, so you'll be able to see those beautiful Moonbase girls in their purple wigs and enjoy many other facets of this intriguing t-v series in a new light. Both episodes will be screened twice during the course of the Convention.



### MELBOURNE SCIENCE FICTION CLUB.


