

# GUEST OF HONOUR

"Mother, poor dear, raised me to be a genius, and might have succeeded if the general IQ average could have been lowered to about 50. Instead, all she got was the modern version of a polymath - one who knows all about everbody else's ideas and has none of his own.

"I was raised in Kalgoorlie until the Age of six, by which time I was fully competant to deal with alien invasions, having survived measles, whooping cough, diptheria, hepatitis ('yellow jaundice' we called it in those naive days) and the 'flu epidemic of 1918-19. Ancient old bastard, aren't I?

"By age sixteen, and then living in Melbourne, I had suffered and disapproved of schools and was about to face life - i.e. get some dreary job - with practically no education of practical ability. The job was dreary all right, and the war (WW2 for those historically inclined) arrived just in time to rescue me from dying of boredom. For six interminable years it did its best to kill me in spectacular and unsubtle ways, but I'm a survivor type with really slippery genes.

"The war collapsed, my resistance to a bloody frightful way of life collapsed with it and I retreated into the Public Service. That turned out to be even more disgusting (at least in a war you can <u>sometimes</u> figure out what you are doing and why) and the list of my jobs since then is longer than memory will tolerate.

"I work at whatever is available for reasonable money - even to writing s-f reviews for greasy pelf - and have been employment officer, waiter, instructor of motor trade apprentices, laboratory technician, matriculation coach, general factory hand, owner of a taxi truck ( a famous disaster) and God only can recall what else.

"None of these things interest me greatly; I do them in order to live in a style slightly better than that to which I like to think I am accustomed, but mainly to buy time to write novels. Nobody in his right mind expects to make money out of novels, particularly when he refuses to take advice from his agent or his publisher and tends to scream the place down at editorial conferences. (You <u>devils</u>! You are <u>castrating</u> my <u>child</u>!) Therefore I slave for a living and write as I please about what pleases me and don't have to worry about financial return; the only concern is whether the work is done as well as I can do it.

"Not, mind you, that I wouldn't love to be involved in a runaway best seller, with great wads of automated dollars beating a path to my door, but it won't be achieved by writing the contemptible shit the trade would like me to turn out. Because I won't write it. Therefore I won't achieve it. Except, perhaps, by accident.

"Art for art's sake? Not at all, Virginla - satisfaction for personal satisfaction's sake. Which is not quite the same thing, being less rareified and much cosier. (And, of course, thoroughly self-centred.) So I have published five novels (not s-f) which have paid their way and a little more, although one of them did carry off the Miles Franklin Award for the best Australian novel one year. (You may not have heard of Miles Franklin, but it is pretty prestigious and I'm proud of it.) A sixth is flitting from publisher to uninterested publisher as you read this (that nice man, my agent, loves it, but nobody clse does) and a seventh is sitting in my typewriter, refusing momentarily to unravel itself from a knotty bit of plotting.

"Number seven, by the way, is s-f. Which means, after some years of critical sniping at other writers in the field, that I will eventually have to stand up and be counted. See if I care!

"Which brings me to age fifty-six in a life quite unusual in its lack of achievement. I'm not even married. Well, I was once, for the space of a few sharp breaths and sharper words, but nobody has asked me since and I haven't quite reached the stage where I need some good woman to sweeten my declining years. When I have, I suppose I'll ask one.

"If she has any sense she'll refuse. I'm a terrific provider but - well, you know - erratic."

Australia in '75 news. We expect to be able to announce soon which hotel the Convention will use. The choice is between the Southern Cross and the new Hilton, which will open in less than a year. These are the only two hotels in Melbourne that will be open by 1975 that have meeting rooms big enough for the sort of attendance we expect. We cannot announce the names of our Professional or Fan Guests-of-Honour until we have won the vote at Toronto this year, but can guarantee that they will be fascinating and well-known personalities. The name of the Convention will be chosen and announced in the next few days, as will the price of memberships. It is necessary to buy a membership through Torcon or its agents to be able to vote for Australia in '75, and you also must be a Torcon member. Happily, since Torcon 2's Australian agent is Robin Johnson, that will not be difficult. There's an advantage in fixing up your membership early, too- we expect the cost of attending membership to rise steeply by the time 1975 rolls around: but by getting your 1975 membership now through Torcon (applications on the ballots to be distributed in June) you will not be stung for the higher rates. Attending membership will cost (Australian) \$5 over the supporting membership, regardless of when you convert, making a total of \$7. At the door, the price will be a minimum of \$10, and maybe more. Maybe MUCH more,

If you want to support Australia's bid for a World Convention you should first get your Torcon membership.(\$3.50 from Robin Johnson), and he will see you get the ballot form and 1975 membership blank. We also need help more directly- we plan to make another film for showing at Toronto and elsewhere in North America to publicise the bid: that is not cheap, and needs actors and other support. Then again, you can help the overseas campaign by urging friends there to join Torcon if they haven't already, and to vote for us there if they intend to be present, or by post if they do not: remember the deadline for receipt in Toronto of postal ballots is lst August.



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


We've been around for more than twenty years and hope to be around a lot longer.




BREAKFAST IN THE RUINS Michael Moorcock

> Frank Herbert

Michael Moorcock's first book about Karl Glogauer, BEHOLD THE MAN, was hailed as one of the modern masterpieces of imaginative fiction, and won its author the "Nebula" Award. Here is a second book, a divine tragedy, in which Karl carries his search for harmony and peace of mind through time and space. Times, locates, personalities, change and merge with kaleidoscopic brilliance. Moorcock introduces the reader to the boy Karl. amidst the death, famine and cruelty of the Paris Commune in 1871; by 1905 he is in London - working with his parents in an East End sweat shop (until the anarchists kill them). Later chapters show Karl in Kiev, in the aftermath of the Rcd Revolution and the White Terror, and in Auschwitz in 1944. As a journey in time, from the Commune to My Lai, and as an exploration of man's inhumanity to man, this promises to be one of the most absorbing books of the year, BOOKS AND BOOKMEN describe Moorcock as "Britain's most way out science fiction writer", and say of his new book. "If anything can be labelled 'the new SF' this is it".
