SUPPORTING MEMBERSHIP of Skycon provides you with each Progress Report and the Convention Booklet. The cost is £2, deductible from the cost of full membership.

FULL MEMBERSHIP entitles you to attend Skycon as well as to receive the literature. The cost is £4.50---£2.50 for supporting members---for which you have the run of the hotel's facilities, the full range of programmed events and, of course, the even wider range of unprogrammed events.

HOTEL RATES & BOOKING

The price for a double or twin room is £13.80 per night, inclusive of 15% service charge but not of VAT. For a person wishing to share a twin room the price is precisely half---£6.90. For Eastercons as they are now these prices are not likely to be repeated. The full double room rate at the Heathrow Hotel is already over £20 per night. There are no single rooms as such.

Breakfast will be an extra cost if you have it. A full English breakfast should cost about £1.60 and a continental breakfast 85p, but these prices are not yet firm.

And now, an innovation. The hotel is offering a massive discount On normal room rates; but it requires a deposit from con members for booking rooms. This deposit is half the basic room rate, i.e. £6 per night for a double or twin and £3 for sharing a twin. The amount payable should accompany your hotel booking form; the full booking details will follow in PR3 in November. This will enable you to spread the costs of attending the con, which will no doubt please the book dealers.

Should you pay the deposit and later find yourself unable to attend Skycon, we will refund the money provided someone else can be found to take the room. *Please* don't request room bookings or send deposits before you receive the booking forms later this year.

THE HEATHROW HOTEL

This hotel, situated on the edge of Heathrow Airport, is the biggest, most luxurious and best equipped hotel ever selected for an Eastercon. The con facilities include the Wessex Ballroom, which can seat 550 people and will serve as the main con and banqueting hall; the Windsor Room with a floor area of 1250 square feet will be the book room; the Hanover suite, divided by a sturdy partition into George I and George II, will house the fan room and art show; and, pride of the hotel, the York Videotheatre with a capacity of 262 and a wide screen will allow all-day film showing to complement the con hall programming. And, of course, the bars which will house most of the fans for most of the time.

The additional facilities of the Heathrow are more than an Eastercon hotel has had before. A heated swimming pool with an attached bar, a sauna and solarium and a shopping arcade can all be found in the hotel.

The rooms are very well equipped with double or twin beds, bedside radio, and a colour television offering a continuous choice of two first-run feature films as well as normal programmes. Each bedroom has a fully equipped bathroom and shower, and, it says in the brochure, a "versatile personal drinks dispenser". We haven't yet tested the limits of its versatility, but the device is there all right.

All rooms have full air conditioning. One of our committee---Dermot---stayed in the hotel during an exhibition and, feeling hot in his room, turned the air conditioning down to *cold*. He woke in the night shivering, with condensation running down the walls. Unlike some hotels, the Heathrow has air conditioning that works!

And needless to say (though that won't stop us), the Heathrow is fully soundproofed. The aeroplanes, and the traffic on the A4, can be seen but not heard.

You'll also find that at least one of the hotel's restaurants is always open, 24 hours a day.



PROGRAMME: THE STATE OF THE ART

Some programme notions were roughly outlined in Progress Report 1---such star items as the talks from Guest of Honour Robert Sheckley and from Bob Shaw, and such regular institutions as the banquet, fancy dress, book room, art show and quiz. Other panels and special items are in preparation (some, indeed, will remain under our various hats until The Day itself), while the Fan Room continues to fester and to pullulate under the guiding hand of Ian Maule.

We have arranged for the appearance of the *Iridescent Village* disco, which has terrorised the eardrums of all Oxfordshire; big Dermot Dobson will be in charge of this. Dermot is also collecting material for the Auction---send your surplus H.G.Wells first editions or copies of *Hyphen* to him at 41 Boswell Road, Cowley, Oxford. Or save them up in a cardboard box and bring them with you at Easter.

John and Eve Harvey, meanwhile, are struggling with innumerable film catalogues; we are confident that their efforts will succeed in netting at least a few of the following: Young Frankenstein, The Phantom of the Paradise (vastly enjoyed by a handful of fans at Silicon and deserving of a wider audience), Rollerball, Rosemary's Baby, Silent Running and Barbarella. Also, for light relief, we have ordered such gems as Billy the Kid vs. Dracula and the ever-popular Plan 9 from Outer Space.


