KENNETH BULMER first appeared in science-fictional print in TALES OF WONDER No. 12, Autumn, 1940. He placed first in Walter Gilling's SEARCH FOR IDEAS contest with the piece about the Conquest of Space. In this particular competition, Arthur C. Clarke was placed second, third was John F. Burke and fourth was H.E. Turner. This was the first time Ken had tried, he gave the next comp a miss and tried again for the Conquest of Time. Again he placed first; and as far as we know no one else ever managed to win twice. The the army engulfed him (Africa, Sicily, Italy,) and after the war; with Vince Clarke they did a giggle joo for the old cruddy Panther and were amused when it was bought. When Ken and Vince saw the money though - the huge sum of 630, they stopped laughing

and began to do more. That's how Ken started uriting paperbacks. Ken's first sale to a post-war magazine was to Bert Campbell's AUTHENTIC, followed by sales to Carnell and Peter Hamilton. He did the only serial NEBULA ever ran, and also had four serials in the old NEW WORLDS. Some of the vest-liked of Ken's stories appeared in SCIENCE FANTASY - Beyond The Silver Sky is often noted. Latestone from 4ce: To Outrun Doomsday indicates a new departure for ken, and The Doomsday Men published by Doubleday also shows

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



7/6 to Harry Nadler makes you a member of THIRDMANCON and brings all future issues of METEOR and other con publications.

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

Any other ideas for the feature or the shorts will be welcome.


HUM AND SWAY
