

JOE HALDEMAN

Joe Haldeman (born June 9, 1943) is an American science fiction author.

Joe William Haldeman was born in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. His family traveled and he lived in Puerto Rico, New Orleans, Washington, D.C., Bethesda, Maryland and Anchorage, Alaska as a child. Haldeman married Mary Gay Potter in 1965. He received a bachelor of science degree in astronomy from the University of Maryland in 1967. That same year he was drafted into the army and served as a combat engineer in Vietnam. He was wounded in combat and his wartime experience was the inspiration for War Year, his first novel. In 1975, he received a MFA in Creative Writing from the University of Iowa Writer's Workshop. He currently resides in Gainesville, Florida and Cambridge, Massachusetts and teaches at MIT.

Haldeman's most famous novel is **The Forever War**, inspired by his Vietnam experiences, which won both the Hugo and Nebula Awards. He later turned it into a series. Haldeman also wrote two of the earliest original novels based on the 1960s Star Trek TV series universe, **Planet of Judgment** (August 1977) and **World Without End** (February 1979).

Haldeman is the brother of Jack C. Haldeman II (1941-2002), also a science-fiction author whose work includes an original *Star Trek* novel (**Perry's Planet**, February 1980).

"Worlds, Worlds Apart, and Worlds Enough & Time comprise what I consider to be my best work, a trilogy that I worked on from 1975 to 1992."

In recent months she's sold short stories to the DAW anthology Ages of Wonder, as well as Sporty Spec and Ruins: Extraterrestrial which are currently in print. Several of her poems garnered honorable mentions in the most recent edition of the Year's Best Fantasy and Horror anthology. She also works as an associate editor for Flash Me Magazine, an online journal of flash fiction.

DAVID DEGRAFF

Dr. David DeGraff teaches Physics and Astronomy at Alfred University, where he uses science fiction short stories in most of his classes as a means of making the abstractions more concrete and to bring the distant locations closer to home. In addition to the usual physics and astronomy classes, he also teaches classes on science in science fiction, living in space, visions of the future, and the theory and practice of time travel.

CARL FREDERICK

"I'm a theoretical physicist (relativity & quantum measurement theory, and astrophysics), formerly at Cornell and NASA, and now 'Chief Scientist' of a small AI software house located in the college community of Ithaca, NY. I'm an epee fencer, a bagpiper, a nut on animals, and learn languages as a hobby. I attended the year 2000 Odyssey SF Writers Workshop."

JAMES ALAN GARDNER

James Alan Gardner is a 1989 graduate of the Clarion West Science Fiction Writers Workshop. Many of his science fiction stories and novellas appear in publications such as *Isaac Asimov's Science Fiction Magazine*, *Amazing Stories*, and *The Magazine of Fantasy and Science Fiction*. He is the author of several novels. He was the grand prize winner of the 1989 Writers of the Future contest, has won the Aurora Award, and has been nominated for the Hugo and Nebula Awards.

MARK A. GARLAND

Mark read a copy of Arthur C. Clark's **The Sands of Mars** when he was twelve, and proceeded to exhaust the local library's supply of SF. Bookstores and magazines like F&SF and Galaxy came next, and he tried writing some stories of his own. Then he got interested in things like writing songs and playing in rock bands, building and driving race cars, and a long and convoluted career in service management. Until finally he came full circle, back to science fiction and fantasy (and playing in rock bands!).

He's spent the past two decades reading, going back to school, attending conventions, and writing. Published works include **Demon Blade**, **Sword of the Prophets** and two more Baen fantasy novels, two "Star Trek" novels (**Voyager** and **DS9**), a "Dinotopia" novel and more than sixty short stories, poems and articles.

Mark is also the Managing Editor of a regional specialty newspaper (cir. 50,000) and Executive Editor of specialty book publisher, Beerly Legible Press.

Mark lives in Upstate New York with his wife, a couple of kids and (of course) a couple of cats.

DAVID CLINK

David Clink was born in Medicine Hat, Alberta and now lives in Thornhill, Ontario. He recently completed a 3-year term as Artistic Director of the Art Bar Poetry Series (artbar.org) and is the webmaster of poetrymachine.com, a resource for poets. He is co-publisher, along with Myna Wallin, of believe your own press. His poetry has appeared recently in Analog, Asimov's. The Dalhousie Review, Descant, Grain Magazine, The Literary Review of Canada, and On Spec.

GAY HALDEMAN

Gay Haldeman (Mary Gay Potter Haldeman) has a Master's degree in Spanish Literature from the University of Maryland and another in Linguistics, from the University of Iowa. She teaches in the Writing Center at Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) every fall, specializing in English as a second language. The rest of the year she resides in Florida, where she manages writer Joe Haldeman's career, dealing with editors, answering correspondence (in Spanish and French as well as English; isn't e-mail wonderful?), serving as travel agent, answering the phone, typing and filing, arranging publicity, selling Joe's out-of-print books, etc. She's been going to SF conventions since 1963 (so has Joe) and loves to meet new people. After 42 years of marriage, she still thinks Joe's the best thing that ever happened to her.

JOHN-ALLEN PRICE

John-Allen Price was born on August 19th, 1954 in Washington, D.C. He earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Liberal Arts and Sciences from Bradley University in Peoria, Illinois, where he won the Pendell journalism award for his work on the school newspaper in 1977. His books include Doomsday Ship, Operation Night Hawk, Extinction Cruise, A Mission For Eagles, The Pursuit Of The Phoenix, The Siege Of Ocean Valkyrie, and Phoenix Caged. His first SF novel, Mutant Chronicles II: Frenzy, was published in 1994. He has since completed work on a hard SF military adventure, Sail a Distant Sea, and is currently working on outlines/proposals for a cruise ship techno-thriller, a W.W. I alternative history, and another alternative history set in the 1930s.

NANCY KRESS

Nancy Kress is the author of 23 books of SF, fantasy, and writing advice. She has won three Nebulas, a Hugo, a Sturgeon, and the John W. Campbell Memorial Award. In 2008 she will have three books appear: Nano Comes to Clifford Falls and other stories, a collection from Golden Gryphon Press; Dogs, a biothriller from Tachyon; and Steal Across the Sky, an SF novel from Tor. Nancy teaches writing, often at various locations, including Clarion (ten times). She lives in Rochester, NY with the world's most spoiled toy poodle, Cosette.

KIM PAFFENROTH

Kim Paffenroth is professor of religious studies at Iona College. He has recently turned his research on the religious themes he finds in SF and horror. He first published an examination of science fiction, The Truth Is Out There: Christian Faith and the Classics of TV Science Fiction (Baker Books, 2006). Shortly after that, his analysis of Romero's zombie films, Gospel of the Living Dead: George Romero's Visions of Hell on Earth (Baylor, 2006), won the 2006 Bram Stoker Award in the non-fiction category. Since then he has published his first zombie novel, Dying to Live (Permuted Press, 2007), which has garnered much praise from fans and fellow authors. The sequel to this novel is due out in 2008. Most recently he edited an anthology of zombie tales, History Is Dead (Permuted, 2007).

DERWIN MAK

Derwin Mak is a writer of quirky science fiction and fantasy stories in Toronto. His story "The Siren Stone" was a finalist for a 2004 Prix Aurora Award, Canada's science fiction award. Its sequel, "Transubstantiation," won the 2006 Prix Aurora Award for Best Short-Form Work in English. His first dark fantasy story, "Seventy-two Virgins," was published in the anthology Thou Shalt Not, from Dark Cloud Press of Monroeville, Pennsylvania, in September 2006. His novel The Moon Under Her Feet was published by Windstorm Creative of Port Orchard, Washington, in 2007. In addition to writing fiction, Derwin also wrote articles about anime and East Asian pop culture for *Parsec* magazine and *RicePaper* magazine.

His stories are known for their intriguing characters, who include: tiny insect-like aliens ("The Snow Aliens"), an unlucky Titanic survivor ("Luck of the Irish"), an incompetent suicide bomber ("Seventy-two Virgins"), the ghost of a University of Oregon cheerleader ("The Siren Stone"), ballet dancers in a love triangle ("All Dancers Go to Heaven"), a Roman Catholic priestengineer who quotes Martin Luther ("The Moon Under Her Feet"), a Chinese-American Hooters Girl ("It Came to Eat Our Chicken Wings"), and a teenaged girl in a Catholic schoolgirl uniform who thinks she's Jesus ("Transubstantiation"). Curiously, "Transubstantiation" has become popular reading among young Jesuits in training at a Jesuit residence in Toronto.

ROBERT J. SAWYER

Robert J. Sawyer is one of only seven writers ever to win all three of the science-fiction field's top awards for best novel of the year: the Hugo Award (which he won in 2003 for Hominids), the Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America's Nebula Award (which he won in 1996 for The Terminal Experiment), and the John W. Campbell Memorial Award (which he won in 2006 for Mindscan).

Rob is the only writer in history to win the top sciencefiction awards in the United States, China, France, Japan, and Spain, and he has won a record-setting ten Canadian Science Fiction and Fantasy Awards ("Auroras"). His 17 novels include two popular trilogies: the "Neanderthal Parallax" (Hominids, Humans, and Hybrids), about a gateway that opens to an alternate Earth where Neanderthals survived to the present day, and the "Quintaglio Ascension" (Far-Seer, Fossil Hunter, and Foreigner), about a world of intelligent dinosaurs.

In addition to his Hugo win for Hominids, he has nine other Hugo nominations under his best for such novels as Starplex, Frameshift, Factoring Humanity, and Calculating God. His latest novel is Rollback (which received starred reviews, denoting a book of exceptional merit, in both Publisher's Weekly and Library Journal); his next, Wake, begins his new "WWW" trilogy about the World Wide Web gaining consciousness.

Called "the leader of SF's next-generation pack" by Barnes and Noble, "the best science-fiction writer out there" by the *Rocky Mountain News*, and "a writer of boundless confidence and bold scientific extrapolation" by *The New York Times*, Rob's novels are top-ten national mainstream bestsellers in Canada and have hit #1 on the bestsellers' list published by *Locus*, the US trade journal of the science-fiction field.

In other media, Rob wrote the original series bible for the science-fiction TV series *Charlie Jade* and did conceptual work on the revival of *Robotech*.

On June 2, 2007, Rob received an honorary doctorate (Doctor of Letters, *honoris causa*) from Laurentian University in Sudbury, Ontario. The degree was awarded in recognition of his international success as a science-fiction writer.
