He is a chartered accountant, a viceof the library chairman committee of the Royal Canadian Military Institute (RCMI), and an Officer of the Most Venerable Order of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem. He has Masters degrees in accounting (University of Waterloo) and military studies (American Military University). He gives annual Hallowe'en lecture at the Royal Canadian Military Institute.


His stories include "The Siren Stone", which was a finalist for a 2004 Prix Aurora Award (Canada's science fiction award); and its sequel, "Transubstantiation", which won the 2006 Prix Aurora Award for Best Short-Form Work in English. Other short stories include "Family Tradition", "The Polar Bear Carries the Mail", and his latest, "The Shepherd's Blessing".

His novel <u>The Moon Under Her Feet</u> was a finalist for a 2008 Prix Aurora Award for Best Long-Form Work in English. His second novel, <u>The Shrine of the Siren Stone</u>, was published in 2010, as was The Dragon and the Stars, the first anthology of science fiction and fantasy written by authors of Chinese ancestry who live outside China, which he co-edited with Eric Choi.

Mak has also written about anime and East Asian pop culture for the *Parsec*, a science fiction magazine, and *RicePaper*, the magazine of Asian Canadian art and culture.

Guests of Honor



Larry Niven was born on April 30, 1938, in Los Angeles, California, and briefly attended California Institute Technology in 1956 before being sidetracked by a bookstore carrying used science fiction magazines. After graduating Washburn University, from Topeka, Kansas in 1962 with a B.A. in mathematics and a minor in psychology, he spent time on graduate work mathematics before selling his first story, "The Coldest Place," for \$25 in 1964.

His best-known work, <u>Ringworld</u> (1970), received Hugo, Locus, Ditmar, and Nebula awards. Many of Niven's stories take place in his Known Space universe, in which humanity shares the solar systems with over a dozen alien species. The Known Space universe also contains his most famous contribution to the SF

genre, the concept of the Ringworld itself.


His work is primarily hard science fiction, using big science concepts and theoretical physics. It also often includes elements of detective fiction and adventure stories. His fantasy includes The Magic Goes Away series, rational fantasy dealing with magic as a non-renewable resource. Niven also writes humorous stories; one series is collected in The Flight of the Horse. He has co-authored books with Steven Barnes, Jerry Pournelle, David Gerrold and many others.

Not limited to just short stories and novels, Niven has written scripts for the television shows Land of the Lost, Star Trek: The Animated Series, and The Outer Limits. He has also written for the DC Comics character Green Lantern including in his stories hard science fiction concepts such as universal entropy and the redshift effect, which are unusual in comic books. Niven wrote the bible for Green Lantern.

Outside of writing, Niven was an adviser to Ronald Reagan on the creation of the Strategic Defense Initiative anti missile policy. And in 2007, Niven, in conjunction with a group of other science fiction writers, began advising the U.S. Department of Homeland Security as to future trends affecting terror policy and other topics.

David was the Artistic Director of the Art Bar Poetry Series (Canada's largest and longest running poetry-only reading series) for three years, and was the Artistic Director of the Rowers Pub Reading Series its first three seasons. David edited A Verdant Green (The Battered Silicon Dispatch Box, 2010), a collection of environmental poetry. David most recently had 8 poems appear in TESSERACTS FOURTEEN: Strange Canadian Stories (Edge, 2010).

Dr. David DeGraff teaches Physics and Astronomy at Alfred University, where he uses science fiction short stories in most of his classes as a means of making the abstractions more concrete and to bring the distant locations closer to home. In addition to the usual physics and astronomy classes, he also teaches classes on science in science fiction, living in space, visions of the future, and the theory and practice of time travel.

Carl Frederick is a theoretical physicist (relativity & quantum measurement theory, and astrophysics), formerly at Cornell and NASA, and now Chief Scientist of a small AI software house located in the college community of Ithaca, NY. He is also an epee fencer, a bagpiper, a nut on animals, and enjoys learning languages as a hobby. He attended the year 2000 Odyssey SF Writers Workshop.

James Alan Gardner writes science fiction and fantasy, novels and short stories. He has won the Theodore Sturgeon Memorial award for short stories and has twice been a finalist for the Hugo and Nebula awards.

Mark Garland read a copy of Arthur C. Clark's <u>The Sands of Mars</u> when he was twelve, and proceeded to exhaust the local library's supply of SF. Bookstores and magazines like *F&SF* and *Galaxy* came next, and he tried writing some stories of his own. Then he got interested in things like writing songs and playing in rock bands, building and driving race cars, and a long and convoluted career in service management, until finally he came full circle, back to science fiction and fantasy (and playing in rock bands!). He's spent the past two decades reading, going back to school, attending conventions, and writing. Published works include <u>Demon Blade</u>, <u>Sword of the Prophets</u> and two more Baen fantasy novels, two *Star Trek* novels (*Voyager* and *DS9*), a <u>Dinotopia</u> novel and more than sixty short stories, poems and articles.

Mark is also the Managing Editor of a regional specialty newspaper (cir. 50,000) and Executive Editor of specialty book publisher, Beerly Legible

Press.

Mark lives in Upstate New York with his wife, a couple of kids and (of course) a couple of cats.

Lois Gresh is the New York Times Best-Selling Author (6 times), Publishers Weekly Best-Selling Paperback Author, and Publishers Weekly Best-Selling Paperback Children's Author of 27 books and several dozen short stories. Her books have been published in approximately 20 languages. Current projects include weird SF vampire novel Blood and Ice (Jan 2011, Elder Signs Press), short story collection Eldritch Evolutions (March 2011, Chaosium), weird SF novel Deadly Dimensions (2011, Arkham House), an untitled volume from St. Martin's Press (2012); and editor of anthology Arkham Nightmares (2013, Arkham House). Lois has received Bram Stoker Award, Nebula Award, Theodore Sturgeon Award, and International Horror Guild Award nominations for her work.

Marvin Kave is the author of sixteen novels, including his Dickensian pastiche. The Last Christmas of Ebenezer Scrooge, now optioned to be made into a feature film, and his just-completed sequel to Frankenstein, as well as the terrifying Fantastique and Ghosts of Night and Morning: the SF cult classics. The Incredible Umbrella and (coauthored with Parke Godwin) The Masters of Solitude, and the critically-acclaimed mysteries Bullets for Macbeth and My Son the Druggist. His short story "Ms. Lipshutz and the Goblin," was included in a DAW Books Year's Best Fantasy anthology, and his horrific "The Possession of Immanuel Wolf" was written with the great macabre comedian, Brother Theodore. His numerous best-selling anthologies include 13 Plays of Ghosts and the Supernatural and other theatre collections: The Game is Afoot and other Sherlock Holmes anthologies, and many fantasy/science fiction books for the Science Fiction Book Club, such as Ghosts, Masterpieces of Terror and the Supernatural, The Vampire Sextette, and The Fair Folk, which won the World Fantasy Award for Best Anthology of 2006. His column. "Marvin Kaye's Nth Dimension," appears online at spaceandtimemagazine.com. He is the editor of Sherlock Holmes Mustery Magazine.

A native of Philadelphia, PA, he is a graduate of Penn State, with an M. A. in theatre and English literature; he recently headed the tutoring staff of the Manhattan campus of Mercy College; is Adjunct Professor of Creative Writing at New York University, has taught mystery writing in England for the Smithsonian Institute, has served as a judge for the Edgar, Nero and World Fantasy Awards, and is Artistic Director for The Open Book, New York's oldest readers theatre company.

He is listed in both Who's Who in America and Who's Who in Entertainment.



Mark Leslie (born 1969) is a Canadian author of horror and speculative fiction as well non-fiction articles on the subject of bookselling and publishing technology. Mark's short fiction has appeared in numerous magazines and anthologies (most recently Fear of the Dark, Necrotic Tissue and Northern Haunts. Mark has a collection of previously published stories called One Hand Screaming (2004), edited the science fiction anthology North of Infinity II (2006) and the horror anthology Campus Chills (2009). Mark's first novel, I. Death, will be published in 2012 and launched at the World Fantasy Con 2012. When he is not writing, Mark tacks "Lefebvre" back onto his name and works as a bookseller. He is currently on the board of directors for BookNet Canada and president of Canadian Booksellers Association.

Mark currently lives in Hamilton, Ontario with his wife Francine and their son Alexander.

Dr. Alex Pantaleev is an Assistant Professor of Software Engineering at SUNY Oswego. He wasted his youth on computer games and other computer-related activities. This turned out to be an excellent career choice, to the astonishment of well-meaning relatives. In addition to his participation in various open-source projects, such as the Google Web Toolkit, he is the proud creator of the first Bulgarian Massively Multiplayer Online Game---Imperia, a browser-based strategy game. Alex is in the process of implementing a game development concentration at SUNY Oswego, and is a regular presenter at science fiction, fantasy, and gaming conventions.

John-Allen Price was born on August 19th, 1954 in Washington, D.C. He earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Liberal Arts and Sciences from Bradley University in Peoria, Illinois, where he won the Pendell journalism award for his work on the school newspaper in 1977. His books include Doomsday Ship, Operation Night Hawk, Extinction Cruise A Mission For Eagles, The Pursuit Of The Phoenix, The Siege Of Ocean Valkyrie, and Phoenix Caged. His first SF novel, Mutant Chronicles II: Frenzy, was published in 1994. He has since completed work on a hard SF military adventure, Sail a Distant Sea, as well as his first non-fiction book The War that Changed the World, about the Franco-Prussian war.

David Sakmyster is an award-winning author and screenwriter, with over two dozen short stories and three novels in print, including from Variance Publishing <u>The Pharos Objective</u>, book one in a series about remote-viewers and psychic archaeologists searching for ancient mystical



artifacts. In 2009 Dragon Moon Press published his epic tale. Silver and Golda Finalist in the Foreword Reviews' Book of the Year Awards for Historical Fiction. His stories have appeared in ChiZine. Horrorworld, the Writers of the Future Anthologu. Black Static, Talebones, Abuss & Apex, and others. He lives in upstate New York, but you can visit him at www.sakmyster.com.

He inspired a few of his good friends to play these beautiful drums so that he could hear how they sounded. Soon, casual playing became serious, and the little "taiko garage band" began to take off.

Before long Steve and Ray started writing original music based on traditional Japanese rhythms. 9 years of blistered palms and fingers, pulped sticks, broken drumheads and endless requests to play "Freebird" and "Wipeout" have resulted in the group you hear today. Pure, unvarnished taiko. No special effects, no fiery explosions, no loincloths or gymnastics. They hope you enjoy it as much as they do!

Darrell Schweitzer is the author of The White Isle, The Shattered Goddess, and The Mask of the Sorcerer in addition to about 300 short stories, which may be found in various collections, some of them published by the Buffalo Fantasy League's own W. Paul Ganley. His work has appeared in Twilight Zone, Interzone, Azimov's SF, Analog, Alfred Hitchcock's Mystery Magazine, Postscripts, Whispers, Weird Tales (every issue for 23 years!), H.P. Lovecraft's Magazine of Horror, and in many anthologies. He is also a poet, critic, interviewer, essayist, and would-be Young Adult Fantasy writer, which is to say his 4th novel, The Dragon House, which is aimed at younger readers, is presently making the rounds. He was co-editor of Weird Tales magazine for 18 years and has recently begun editing anthologies with Martin Greenberg, the first of which. The Secret History of Vampires, appeared from DAW in 2007. A second, with the working title of Urban Werewolves, is forthcoming from Pocket Books. Besides that, he's famous for rhyming "Cthulhu" in a limerick. He also rewrote The Lord of the Rings into a limerick. His most recent books are Ghosts of Past and Future, a collection of poetry published by Wildside Press, and Living with the Dead, a novella published by PS Publishing.
