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

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General Information

CHECK-OUT TIME: Noon on Sunday

I.D.: Your badge identifies YOU as a member and gets you into all the convention activities. DON'T LOSE IT OR SCOTTY WILL BEAM YOU UP AND DUMP YOUR ATOMS IN THE VAN ALLEN BELTS. (You won't like that.)

POSTERS: Please do not post anything in the hotel without the permission of Big Brother (or Big Sister).

JAIL: The legal drinking age in New York State is 21 (years, not months). If you wish to drink at con parties or in the Con Suite, you must be prepared to show proof of age. Illegal drugs are — well — illegal. Don't use them at this convention; we won't smuggle you into Cuba or pay your lawyer's fees.

WEAPONS: All weapons must be peace bonded at all times except for the contestants during the SCC demonstration and the masquerade. Please use common sense.

When you show proof of age at registration, your badge will be marked. You must display it while drinking alcoholic beverages. Do NOT borrow someone's badge to obtain drinks or BOTH badges will be confiscated. If your birthday is on or before April 20, 1980, you can drink. If your 21st birthday occurs during the weekend, let us know. Beverages may not be taken outside the Con Suite.

SMOKING ROOM: When not in use otherwise, the Reception Lounge will be available for your smoking pleasure (tobacco only, please).

General Information

THE POCKET PROGRAMS: The main schedule of events is in the center of this program booklet. It may be torn out and used as a pocket program. You will also find another tear-out sheet giving video schedules. Extra copies of these pocket programs will be available at the registration desk (and perhaps elsewhere).

GAMING: "The Gathering" is with us again this year. Gaming will be held in the Executive Room. There is a \$5 fee for the sanctioned Magic Tournament which starts on Saturday. All other gaming events are free to con members. See pages 4 and 5 for more complete information on gaming at Eeriecon 3.

VIDEO ROOM: Room 111. Once again, from the genres of SF, Horror, and Fantasy, we are proud to present some of the best films ever made! Unfortunately, we'll also present some less stellar ones and one or two absolute turkeys.

We're back to 24 hours-a-day videos and as usual the more adult fare begins after 11 PM. Friday night features three terrifying films from Alfred Hitchcock. Saturday night starts with American animation before switching to Japan's anime.

Look for the tear-out pocket video schedule in the center of this program booklet (right behind the main pocket program) — or pick up an extra copy at registration.

READING ROOM: Room 113. Yes! — once again, a room of their own! No other events will be scheduled here but authors' readings.

MASQUERADE: The masquerade will be held on Saturday in the Reception Lounge. Registration forms are available at the convention registration desk until 7:30 PM on Saturday. Please register by 7:30 P.M. Registered contestants must check in for the Masquerade at 8:00 PM in the Reception Lounge.

Nudity is not a costume. Photographers are welcome.

Judging begins at 8:00 PM. Awards will be presented in various categories, including "Best in Show." Weapons must be

peace-bonded except while on stage.

ART SHOW: Located in the Horseshoe Room. We are featuring fine work by both amateurs and professionals. Sorry, but artists insist that we prohibit cameras. Also unwelcome in the Art Show are food, beverages, smoking, loose children and large packages. Moreover, certain costumes can be rough on the art—so watch out if you are wearing long, flowing capes and dresses, or swords, staffs, bows etc. Please exercise care! If you are unable or unwilling to check something at the front desk in the art show, please leave it in your room or in your car. Artist's setup times will be on posted on the door.

Art show schedule: Fri., TBA; Sat., 10 AM to 6 PM; Sun., 10 AM to 12 noon (pickup & breakdown).

ART AUCTION: The art auction begins on Saturday at about 9:15 PM in the Reception Lounge, as soon as the Masquerade is over. We will accept cash (Canadian currency will be charged the current exchange rate) and traveler's or personal checks with appropriate ID. Sorry, we are not equipped to handle credit cards, doubloons or gold dust.

Guest of Honor HAL CLEMENT

Hal Clement (Harry Clement Stubbs) was born in Somerville, Massachusetts, on May 30, 1922, to Harry Clarence Stubbs and Marjorie (White) Stubbs. He attended schools in Arlington and Cambridge, finishing Rindge Tech in 1939.

He received his B.S. from Harvard in 1943, an M.Ed from Boston U. in 1946, and an M.S. in chemistry from Simmons College in 1963.

In 1943 he entered the Army Air Corps Reserve, received pilot wings at Steward Field, N.Y., in March, 1944, and flew 35 combat missions in Liberator (B-24) bombers with the 8th Air Force. Recalled in 1951, he spent eight months as a squadron officer at Bolling Air Force Base and 16 months as a technical instructor at the Special Weapons School at Sandia Base, New Mexico. He retired as a full colonel in 1976.

His interest in both science and science fiction started in 1930 when he saw a Buck Rogers comic strip. His father, unable to answer young Harry's scientific questions, took him to the local public library; he returned with an astronomy book under one arm and Jules Verne's **Trip To The Moon** under the other. His first story, "Proof," appeared in the June, 1942, issue of Astounding Science Fiction (now Analog) Magazine, and Needle was serialized there in 1949. Mission of Gravity appeared in 1953, and has been in print most of the time since. Other novels are Iceworld, Close to Critical, Star Light and Still River. Fossil was published in November, 1993, by DAW Books, and Half Life by Tor in Sept. '99.

He was inducted into the First Fandom Hall of Fame in 1997, the Science Fiction and Fantasy Hall of Fame in 1998, and given the Grand Master Award by the Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America in 1999 (for 1998). Mr. Stubbs married Mary Elizabeth Myers in 1952. They have two sons, George Clement and Richard Myers, and a daughter, Christine (Mrs. David O. Hensel). A grandson, Jackson Clement Stubbs, is now almost 13 years old (warning: Hal carries pictures).

He is a 25 gallon Red Cross blood donor, now working on 26. He taught high school science for forty years, two in a public school and thirty-eight at Milton Academy, from which he retired in 1987. He has served the New England Association of Chemistry Teachers as a Division Chairman, in various positions for its regular summer conferences, and finally as President. He is an honorary member of NEACT and of Aula Laudis, an honor organization of high school chemistry teachers.

Since 1972 he has also painted astronomical and science fiction art as "George Richard."





LYNN FLEWELLING



Affiliations: I belong to an aircraft museum group, the National Warplane Museum in Geneseo, NY. I'm also a member of the National Rifle Association and Science Fiction Writers of America.

DARRELL SCHWEITZER


