WEAPONS: All weapons must be peace bonded at all times except for the contestants during the SCA demonstration and the masquerade. Please use common sense.



### Guest of Honor

#### A Brief Conversation with

## OCTAVIA BUTLER

#### 1. Who is Octavia E. Butler? Where is she headed? Where has she been?

Who am I? I'm a 53-year-old writer who can remember being a 10-year-old writer and who expects some day to be an 80-year-old writer. I'm comfortably asocial — a hermit living in a large city — a pessimist if I'm not careful; a student, endlessly curious; a feminist; an African American; a former Baptist; and an oil and water combination of ambition, laziness, insecurity, certainty, and drive.

#### 2. What have you written?

Novels, short stories, and essays. I've had 11 novels published so far. Parable of the Talents won a Nebula award as best novel of 2000. I've also had published a book of short fiction and nonfiction called Bloodchild and Other Stories. One story in this collection, "Speech Sounds," won a Hugo award as best short story of 1984. The title story, "Bloodchild," won both the 1985 Hugo and the 1984 Nebula awards as best novelette. And, speaking of awards, in the summer of 1995 I received a MacArthur Fellowship from the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation and in October, 2000, I received a "Lifetime Achievement Award" in writing from PEN.

#### 3. What were your educational preparations for a writing career?

I graduated from Pasadena City College in 1968 (Pasadena is my home town). Then I attended California State University, Los Angeles. I also took a few extension classes at UCLA. But

the most valuable help I received with my writing came from two workshops. The first was the Open Door Program of the Screen Writers' Guild of America, West (1969-1970). The second was the Clarion Science Fiction Writers Workshop (1970).

# Guest of Honor DARRELL SCHWEITZER

Darrell Schweitzer was a World Fantasy Award finalist (collaboratively, with Jason Van Hollander) for best collection in 2000, for Necromancies and Netherworlds. His most recent book is a collection, The Great World and the Small. Other recent books are another collection, Nightscapes, and a volume of poetry, Groping Toward the Light. This last, he hastens to point out, is "the real stuff," not another pamphlet of funny Lovecraftian rhymes, though he has some of those out too, such as the aptly entitled Stop Me Before I Do It Again! and a humorously eldritch verse pamphlet, They Never Found the Head: Poems of Sentiment and Reflection. His two novels, The Mask of the Sorcerer and The Shattered Goddess are available from the Science Fiction Book Club. His stories have appeared in Interzone, Twilight Zone, Amazing, Night Cry, Weirdbook, Whispers, and numerous anthologies, including the recent Barnes & Noble Crafty Cat Crimes, in which he preempted the hyper-specialization of modern theme anthologies by contributing an alternate historical vampire cat detective story. His story "The Fire Eggs" was just reprinted in Year's Best Science Fiction edited by David Hartwell. Some of his other collections are Tom O'Bedlam's Night Out, Transients, We are All Legends, and Refugees From an Imaginary Country. He has written book-length studies of Lord Dunsany and H. P. Lovecraft and reviews for The New York Review of Science Fiction

He has been co-editor of Weird Tales since 1988.

## Artist Guest of Honor HEATHER BRUTON

For an artist, talking about oneself is always kind of difficult. I prefer to talk about my art and let it say what it can about the person that produces it! But I guess my art is a product of my life; my interests and my roots; where I've been and what sparks my interests. So... here goes.

I was born in Nova Scotia, Canada, on November 7, 1961. The ocean and the east coast are a very strong part of what I am. Living on the edge of the Atlantic formed my strong interest in the natural world and a deep love of nature which continues to be a strong theme in my work to this day. In 1984 I moved to Toronto, and ten years later I moved to my present home in Kitchener, Ontario.

In 1978 I attended my first SF convention and showed my work for the first time. I was flattered to sell it all and win two art show awards. Since then I've garnered over one hundred and fifty art show awards including three WorldCon art show awards. Over the years, I've worked to hone my skills, constantly learning and experimenting. During that time I've produced hundreds of originals as well as both photo and litho prints. In the early '90s, I began to work in the gaming industry, producing art for a myriad of companies.

I love working in the fantasy field and adding my own touches to it. I've often joked that I'm a frustrated wildlife artist, and animals are a big part of what I love most to paint.

My two greatest influences are the Czech Art Nouveau Master Alphonse Mucha, and the British romantic J. [continued on page 14, middle]

# Poetry Guest of Honor DAVID CLINK

David Livingstone Clink was born in Medicine Hat, Alberta. He was the third child, and first son, of William and Blanche Clink. His first two years were spent living near the Anthrax storage facility for Canada (also stored were Mustard Gas and Lewisite).

From this idyllic beginning, he was dragged off to live in West Hartford, Connecticut. There it was expected that all parents would have five children, so David's two younger brothers were born in the USA. Eventually, the statute of limitations expired, and his family was allowed to return to Canada. They settled in Willowdale, a suburb of the Toronto metropolis.

David ran his high-school Science Fiction Club and co-chaired NASFAcon III, a one-day SF convention in 1982. After high school, David attended many institutions, eventually earning a bachelor's degree in English. Luckily, he already had a union job at one of York University's libraries as a circulation coordinator.

Since graduation, David's kept busy by: attending three Worldcons, wrestling an octopus, playing softball, building cheeze-doodle sculptures, playing street hockey, taking a bartending course, starting his own press (believe your own press), and writing a heck of a lot of great poems.

If there's a dark side to David, it is this: there is no pun so bad that he can resist making it. They turnip everywhere in his poetry. So, be warned. Also, if asked, I will tell how David fell out of a tree, put a needle through his foot, and recite each of his food allergies. After all, what is a big sister for?

W. Waterhouse. I also love the work of Robert Bateman, Bev Dolittle, Lawrence Alma-Tadema, Michael Whelan, Brom, Van Gogh, Alicia Austin, Erte, James Gurney, N.C. Wyeth, Stephen Lyman and others too numerous to mention. I love all kinds of art, but have a special fondness for the British Romantics of the late Victorian period.

I love all kinds of music, especially British- and Celtic-inspired folk. I read voraciously, everything from Regency romances to SF and fantasy to nonfiction books on a number of topics. I love history from the Napoleonic War on back, especially that of Egypt and Japan, plus the Native history of North and South America. I'm also interested in paleontology (I adore dinosaurs!), archeology, and natural history of just about any sort — but especially the study of big cats, raptors and cetaceans.

Most of the time I'm happily ensconced in my living room, listening to way too much TV and sketching, inking and painting. I love what I do, but it is a solitary job most of the time. 
### CAROLYN CLINK


A former teacher, Merri Lee was born and raised in Western New York. She feels lucky to have the strong influence of many

## **DAVID DEGRAFF**

David DeGraff teaches Physics and Astronomy at Alfred University, where he uses science fiction short stories in most of his classes as a means of making the abstractions more concrete and to bring the distant locations closer to home. In addition to the usual physics and astronomy classes, he also teaches classes on science in science fiction, living in space, visions of the future, and the theory and practice of time travel.



## MARCOS DONNELLY

Marcos Donnelly published short fiction throughout the 1990s, and has recently quit his day job to become a full-time freelance writer and novelist. His novel, Prophets For The End Of Time, was praised as "utterly gripping, very funny, and very clever" by the New York Review of Science Fiction; was lauded for its "delightful voice, comic zip, and brio" by Asimov's Science Fiction; and was disparaged as "kind of racy" by the author's 75 year old mother. Donnelly has recently submitted his novel, The Asarkos Letters, to David Hartwell at Tor Books. His current work-in-progress is entitled The Wicca Wars.

### LYNN FLEWELLING

Lynn Flewelling's latest novel, **The Bone Doll's Twin** (Bantam Spectra, Oct., 2001), is the first of a trilogy. She recently sold the audio rights to her popular "Nightrunner Series" to Blackstone Audio, who will produce the books on tape, CD, and electronic formats. Flewelling currently lives in East Aurora, NY.

## **CHARLES E. GANNON**

Dr. Charles E. Gannon is a professor of American Literature at St. Bonaventure University. Past publications range from Novellas in Baen's "War World" series to mainstream poetry and documentaries for the UN.

Major upcoming book (this one is non-fiction) is Rumors Of War and Infernal Machines: Techno-Military Agenda setting in American and British SF (Liverpool Univ. Press), which was written while a Fulbright fellow in the UK.

### MARK A. GARLAND

Mark read a copy of Arthur C. Clark's **The Sands of Mars** when he was twelve, and proceeded to exhaust the local library's supply of SF. Book stores and magazines like F&SF and Galaxy came next, and he tried writing some stories of his own. Then he got interested in writing songs and playing in rock bands, building race cars, and a career in service management. Until finally he came full circle, back to science fiction and fantasy.

He's spent the last fifteen years reading, going back to school, attending conventions, and writing. Works include **Sword of the Prophets** and three more Baen fantasy novels, two "Star Trek" novels (**Voyager** and **DS9**), a Dinotopia novel titled **Rescue Party** and more than fifty published short stories, poems and articles. Mark is also the Managing Editor of a regional specialty newspaper, cir. 50,000, and Executive Editor of an associated book publisher, Beerly Legal Press.

Mark lives in Upstate New York with his wife (also an avid reader), their three children, and (of course) a cat. He is currently at work on a new Baen fantasy novel.



### JAMES ALAN GARDNER

James Alan Gardner lives in Kitchener Ontario with his adoring wife, Linda Carson, and a rabbit who is confused but sincere. Gardner got his master's degree in applied mathematics (with a thesis on black holes) and then immediately gave up academics for writing. He has published five science fiction novels, the latest of which is Ascending. His next novel, Trapped, will be published by Eos in the fall. Gardner has won the Aurora award twice, and has been a finalist for both the Hugo and Nebula awards.

### SEPHERA GIRON

Sephera Giron is the author of horror novels, House of Pain and Eternal Sunset. In 2002, watch for Eternal Nightmare and The Birds and the Bees as well as several short stories in anthologies such as Hot Blood 11, Decadance, Random Acts of Weirdness, Asylum 2 and Tales from the Backseat.

She has written a non-fiction book, House Magic: The Good Witch's Guide to Bringing Grace to Your Space under her pen name Ariana.

Sephera lives in the outskirts of Toronto with her sons and several pets. When she isn't writing, she reads tarot, works at a dance studio and runs a boutique called "Ariana's House Magic" at Dixie Mall on the lower level, Saturdays and Sundays.



#### LOIS H. GRESH

Lois H. Gresh is the author of five novels and three nonfiction books in the science fiction and fantasy genre. Recent releases include Technolife 2020 (fiction and nonfiction), Chuck Farris and the Tower of Darkness, Chuck Farris and the Labyrinth of Doom, and the extremely popular Dragonball Z. Upcoming 2002 releases include Chuck Farris and the Cosmic Storm and The Science of Superheroes. Lois has also written dozens of short stories. Her fiction has been on the Nebula, Theodore Sturgeon, and Bram Stoker Award ballots six times. Lois serves as Creative-Technical Director of Novatek Communications, Inc., in Rochester, New York.

#### **DERWIN MAK**

Derwin Mak is an author of quirky science fiction short stories, including "The Snow Aliens" (Tales From the Wonder Zone: Explorer, edited by Julie Czerneda), "Luck of the Irish" (a black humour story about a Titanic survivor in The Ultimate Unknown, issue 21, spring 2001), and "All Dancers Go to Heaven" (novella, Oortworks Corporation, 2000). He writes anime articles for Parsec. He is also an accountant, decorated volunteer in St. John Ambulance, and member of the Royal Canadian Military Institute.

Education: After graduation from West Orange High School, I attended Bradley University in Peoria, Illinois, from 1973 to 1977. I earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Liberal Arts and Sciences and in 1977 I won the Pendell journalism award for my work on the

school newspaper, the Bradley Scout.

Books Published: Doomsday Ship, Operation Night Hawk, Extinction Cruise (including a Japanese edition), A Mission for Eagles, The Pursuit of the Phoenix, The Siege of Ocean Valkyrie, Phoenix Caged. All of these were published by Zebra books. My first SF novel, Mutant Chronicles II: Frenzy, was published by ROC books in June, 1994.

Robert J. Sawyer won the Nebula Award for best novel of 1995 for his **The Terminal Experiment**; he's also been nominated six times for the Hugo Award. He has twice won Japan's top SF award, the Seiun, and twice won Spain's top SF award, the Premio UPC de Ciencia Ficción. His twelfth novel, Calculating God, hit number one on the bestsellers' list published by Locus: The Newspaper of the Science Fiction Field, and was also a top-ten national mainstream bestseller in Sawyer's native Canada. His latest novel, **Hominids**, a June 2002 hardcover, was the third of Sawyer's novels to be serialized in Analog, the world's number-one bestselling SF magazine. ## HAL CLEMENT

Hal Clement (Harry Clement Stubbs) was born in Somerville, Massachusetts, on May 30, 1922, to Harry Clarence Stubbs and Marjorie (White) Stubbs. He attended schools in Arlington and Cambridge, finishing Rindge Tech in 1939.

He received his B.S. from Harvard in 1943, an M.Ed from Boston U. in 1946, and an M.S. in chemistry from Simmons College

in 1963.

In 1943 he entered the Army Air Corps Reserve, received pilot wings at Steward Field, N.Y., in March, 1944, and flew 35 combat missions in Liberator (B-24) bombers with the 8th Air Force. Recalled in 1951, he spent eight months as a squadron officer at Bolling Air Force Base and 16 months as a technical instructor at the Special Weapons School at Sandia Base, New Mexico. He retired as a full colonel in 1976.

His interest in both science and science fiction started in 1930 when he saw a Buck Rogers comic strip. His father, unable to answer young Harry's scientific questions, took him to the local public library; he returned with an astronomy book under one arm and Jules Verne's Trip To The Moon under the other. His first story, "Proof," appeared in the June, 1942, issue of Astounding Science Fiction (now Analog) Magazine, and Needle was serialized there in 1949. Mission of Gravity appeared in 1953, and has been in print most of the time since. Other novels are Iceworld, Close to Critical, Star Light and Still River. Fossil was published in November, 1993, by DAW Books, and Half Life by Tor in Sept. '99.

He was inducted into the First Fandom Hall of Fame in 1997, the Science Fiction and Fantasy Hall of Fame in 1998, and given the Grand Master Award by the Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America in 1999 (for 1998).

Mr. Stubbs married Mary Elizabeth Myers in 1952. They have two sons, George Clement and Richard Myers, and a daughter, Christine (Mrs. David O. Hensel). A grandson, Jackson Clement Stubbs, is now almost 13 years old (warning: Hal carries pictures).

He is a 26+ gallon Red Cross blood donor. He taught high school science for forty years, two in a public school and thirty-eight at Milton Academy, from which he retired in 1987. He has served the

New England Association of Chemistry Teachers as a Division Chairman, in various positions for its regular summer conferences, and finally as President. He is an honorary member of NEACT and of Aula Laudis, an honor organization of high school chemistry teachers.

Since 1972 he has also painted astronomical and science fiction art as "George Richard."

#### DAVID STEPHENSON

Dr. David Stephenson is a space physicist who came to Canada in 1970 and studied the aurora and winds in the high atmosphere at the University of Saskatchewan. In 1979 he moved to Germany to build systems for a deep space probe. When the project was canceled he spent a year as a consultant to Lloyd's space insurance in London before returning to join the Geological Survey of Canada. He was downsized to genteel poverty and moved to the village of Merrickville, south of Ottawa, in 1990. He now writes unaccepted novels, grows rhubarb and talks to the world with a Morse key.

His publications include twenty reviewed papers, editorials in the Interdisciplinary Science Reviews, various articles and reports and the "Ulysses Speaks" satirical column in Canadian Research. He is a member of the International Academy of Astronautics committee on Moon and Mars exploration. He is a frequent panelist at science fiction conventions across Canada and at world cons.
