AFTERMATH FROM ANGLE TWO by Allan C. Leverentz*

For millennia they had been thus, serene and placid, content beneath the eye of their god and yielding themselves up to the light and flippant tread of generations of the children of that god. They had so long been imbued with divinity, for such uncounted kalpas of time served as a great, unchanging shrine, that the memory of what the first days had been, and what had been ere those long days were born, lay forgotten within their vibrant, living depths.

They had stirred for centuries only to the great hymn of their god and the joyous obeisance of his native children, and they had drunken long and deeply of all the beauty and all the sweetness of the universe. And thus was to be their last day; the climax of their eternity.

It was like a great darkening of the sun, and the voice was brought on a wind that was cold with a coolness not of the sea or of sonorous evening, but with the iron chill of death. It was a voice that had no sound, and yet it burst in unison upon the ears of all the children of the great god, halting them, numbing them, crying out in its silence the fate that had at last overtaken them.

"Great Pan," sighed the wind, wrapt in its melancholy and breathing its despair, "is dead."

Silence descended upon all those green precincts. The cry of a syrinx, piping somewhere in a hidden copse, ceased, and the last note halted for a moment, as if beseeching, and then slid in amidst the green of the leaves and the purple shadows of the glades, and was gone forever. The eternal hymn had ceased, and the temple of life sighed its emptiness and its loss.

The Dryads, sad always, though they lay in the bosom of all content, were suddenly sad as they had never been before. The tears that formed in their soft eyes were salt and sharp, biting against the fragile lids they touched. And their trees, their dear trees, wept with them.

"Great Pan is dead," the wind murmured, and the leaves shrank back from it, fearing it, hating it, knowing it brought them death as well.

Far away the image was born, but it formed before all their eyes. The saddened fauns, the tear-masked eyes of the tree-maidens, the nymph who had been caught at the edge of an iridescent pool, and on whose cheek the flush of innocent, unthinking happiness faded away — all saw it, taking shape in sombre, oppressive tones, the tyrannical, hated symbol which would gather up their freedom and crush the life and the joy out of them.

It was the brand that would seal their tomb. It was the end of life and the true meaning of life; the new metamorphosis of faith, the dominion of a sepulchre, the reign of blood.

Guest of Honor

JACK McDEVITT

Jack McDevitt is a Philadelphia native. He is a graduate of LaSalle and holds a master's in literature from Wesleyan University. He has been a naval officer, an English teacher, a customs officer, and a motivational trainer. He has directed high school theater groups, appearing (like Hitchcock) in cameos: a native in South Pacific, and a Nazi bodyguard in The Sound of Music. His proudest moment came playing the corpse in Arsenic and Old Lace.

He wrote his first SF story in 1980 at the suggestion of his wife, Maureen, as an antidote to the routine of training customs inspectors. "The Emerson Effect" sold to Twilight Zone Magazine. Since then, McDevitt says, it's been downhill all the way. His third story "The Jersey Rifle," was described by Charles Sheffield as "the best chess story ever written." (Look for it in Standard Candles.) His fourth, "Cryptic," was a final ballot Nebula Award nominee.

His first novel, The Hercules Text (an Ace Special), won the Locus Award for best first novel and the Philip K. Dick Special Award. A revised version, together with A Talent for War (Ace, 1989), can be found in the omnibus volume Hello Out There. "Ships in the Night," won the \$10,000 UPC International competition. He won the Homer Award for the novella "Time Travelers Never die," and also received the 2000 Phoenix award. The Engines of God was a finalist for the Arthur C. Clarke Award for the best SF novel published in the UK. Three recent novels, Ancient Shores, Moonfall, and Infinity Beach, have been on the short list for the Nebula.

He is married to the former Maureen McAdams of Philadelphia. McDevitt and his wife live in Brunswick, Georgia.

Guest of Honor LYNN FLEWELLING

Lynn Flewelling grew up in Maine and lived on both coasts before coming to rest rather unexpectedly inland in the Buffalo area in 1999.

Her first novel, Luck in the Shadows, was published in 1996 and was a finalist for the Compton Crook "Best First Novel" award, as well as being chosen as a Locus "Editor's Pick" and "Reader's Pick" for that year. Stalking Darkness (1997) and Traitor's Moon (1999) followed in what has become the popular "Nightrunner" Series, currently in print in nine countries, including Russia and Spain.

Her dark new trilogy (and yes, this one is a trilogy) debuted in 2001 with the highly acclaimed book, **The Bone Doll's Twin**. The sequel, **Hidden Warrior**, will be on the shelves in the US, UK, and Australia in July of this year. Flewelling is currently working on the third and final book.

In addition to novel writing, Flewelling works as a freelance writer/editor, and teaches writing and Tarot reading (separately, usually).



Artist Guest of Honor CHARLES MOMBERGER

We have an Artist GOH, this year, in absentia. He is Charles Momberger, a charter member of the Buffalo Fantasy League. A technical illustrator for Bell Aircraft Corporation for 33 years, Charlie has illustrated many small press books and innumerable fanzines. He lives in Orchard Park, N.Y., where he contributes a weekly editorial cartoon to the Orchard Park newspaper and has been doing so for 32 years. For over 50 years he has been conducting research, along with Paul Ganley and myself, on the merits of various pool tables of the Niagara Frontier and the relative qualities of Labatts and Molsons. There used to be a billboard, in Fort Erie by the Peace Bridge, saying, "Drink Canada Dry!" Although we tried, we never quite succeeded. Current examples of Charlie's art can be seen in the B. F. L. logo, the con name badges, con T-shirts, and the program book.

Fan Guests of Honor

LLOYD and YVONNE PENNEY

Yvonne Penney is a native of Toronto, and claims she's old enough to have watched the original run of Star Trek. After two years in much warmer climes (San Diego and Yuma), she returned to Toronto in 1978 and discovered fandom and SF cons.

She was introduced to fandom through Star Trek, Star Wars and other SF/media films and TV shows, and also through reading SF books by Arthur C. Clarke and Isaac Asimov. Reading also brought about interests in astronomy, the space programme, and space exploration. Yvonne got bitten by the con bug in a big way. She and Lloyd were two of the founders and chairmen of Toronto Trek Celebration, the predecessor of the Toronto Trek series of conventions, and Yvonne was the chairman of the Toronto Trek Celebration 2. She worked on the Ad Astra committee on and off for 20 years, and started Ad Astra's long-standing tradition of tacky tropical shirts for the committee and guests.

After working on the successful "Toronto in 2003 Worldcon" bid, Yvonne has returned to one of her first loves, space, and is now the senior Canadian volunteer for the X Prize Foundation. She is also a member of The Planetary Society, The Mars Society, the Canadian Space Society and the Royal

Astronomical Society of Canada.

Lloyd Penney was also born in Toronto, and also remembers the first run of Star Trek, and he knows that dates him terribly. While watching the show with his parents, his mother later introduced him to science fiction anthologies of short stories. After finding a few books with mention of it, he found the insanity of

fandom in 1977 through a Star Trek club in Victoria, BC.

He moved back to Toronto to attend university, and instead of studying soon found local fans and their activities. After graduation, he joined the Ad Astra committee in 1982 to give convention work a try. Lloyd was on the committee for 20 years, including two years as chairman. With Yvonne, he was among the founders of Star Trek Toronto, and he's been involved with clubs and conventions ever since, including the successful Toronto in 2003 Worldcon bid. He is a member of the Ottawa Science Fiction Society and the Canadian Space Society [continued on page 27]

CAROLYN CLINK

Carolyn's speculative poetry has appeared in Northern Frights (all five volumes), Tesseracts (volumes 4 and 7), Packing Fraction, Analog, On-Spec, TransVersions, Star*Line, and Tales of the Unanticipated. She is a member of the SF Poetry Association and the Algonquin Square Table poetry workshop.

DAVID CLINK

David Livingstone Clink was born in Medicine Hat, Alberta. He was the third child, and first son, of William and Blanche Clink. His first two years were spent living near the Anthrax storage facility for Canada (also stored were Mustard Gas and Lewisite).

From this idyllic beginning, he was dragged off to live in West Hartford, Connecticut. Eventually, his family returned to Canada. They settled in Willowdale, a suburb of the Toronto metropolis.

David ran his high-school Science Fiction Club and co-chaired NASFAcon III, a one-day SF convention in 1982. After high school, David attended many institutions, eventually earning a bachelor's degree in English. Luckily, he already had a union job at one of York University's libraries as a circulation coordinator.

Since graduation, David's kept busy by: attending three Worldcons, wrestling an octopus, playing softball, building cheeze-doodle sculptures, playing street hockey, taking a bartending course, starting his own press (believe your own press), and writing a heck of

a lot of great poems.

If there's a dark side to David, it is this: there is no pun so bad that he can resist making it. They turnip everywhere in his poetry. So, be warned. His first chapbook, **His name was Gord, and he used to run with the bulls**, was published by Junction Books in May, 2001. The follow up is **The Surley Blondes of Earth**, which was released in March, 2002. In the fall, a collection of nature poems, **Come on from the Horse on Seventh Avenue**, was published.

David was the 2002 Poetry Guest of Honor at Eeriecon.

DAVID DEGRAFF

David DeGraff teaches Physics and Astronomy at Alfred University, where he uses science fiction short stories in most of his classes as a means of making the abstractions more concrete and to bring the distant locations closer to home. In addition to the usual physics and astronomy classes, he also teaches classes on science in science fiction, living in space, visions of the future, and the theory and practice of time travel.

CHARLES E. GANNON

Dr. Charles E. Gannon is Associate professor of English at St. Bonaventure University and has published both fiction and non-fiction in the SF field. His next publication is the novelette "The Power of Visions" in Analog, and past publications include several novellas in Jerry Pournelle's "War World" series. His upcoming non-fiction book (from Liverpool University Press), Rumors Of War and Infernal Machines: Techno-Military Agenda Setting in American and British SF, was the end product of his 1996-97 Fulbright Fellowship, and has already been discussed and featured in pre-release on WBFO/NPR (Buffalo). He also worked as a television scriptwriter and producer for 8 years, creating programming for the united Nations, PBS, and various Fortune 500 corporations.

HAL CLEMENT

Hal Clement (Harry Clement Stubbs) was born in Somerville, Massachusetts, on May 30, 1922, to Harry Clarence Stubbs and Marjorie (White) Stubbs. He attended schools in Arlington and Cambridge, finishing Rindge Tech in 1939.

He received his B.S. from Harvard in 1943, an M.Ed from Boston U. in 1946, and an M.S. in chemistry from Simmons College

in 1963.

In 1943 he entered the Army Air Corps Reserve, received pilot wings at Steward Field, N.Y., in March, 1944, and flew 35 combat missions in Liberator (B-24) bombers with the 8th Air Force. Recalled in 1951, he spent eight months as a squadron officer at Bolling Air Force Base and 16 months as a technical instructor at the Special Weapons School at Sandia Base, New Mexico. He retired as a full colonel in 1976.

His interest in both science and science fiction started in 1930 when he saw a Buck Rogers comic strip. His father, unable to answer young Harry's scientific questions, took him to the local public library; he returned with an astronomy book under one arm and Jules Verne's Trip To The Moon under the other. His first story, "Proof," appeared in the June, 1942, issue of Astounding Science Fiction (now Analog) Magazine, and Needle was serialized there in 1949. Mission of Gravity appeared in 1953, and has been in print most of the time since. Other novels are Iceworld, Close to Critical, Star Light and Still River. Fossil was published in November, 1993, by DAW Books, and Half Life by Tor in Sept. '99.

He was inducted into the First Fandom Hall of Fame in 1997, the Science Fiction and Fantasy Hall of Fame in 1998, and given the Grand Master Award by the Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America in 1999 (for 1998).

Mr. Stubbs married Mary Elizabeth Myers in 1952. They have two sons, George Clement and Richard Myers, and a daughter, Christine (Mrs. David O. Hensel). A grandson, Jackson Clement Stubbs, is now almost 13 years old (warning: Hal carries pictures).

He is a 26+ gallon Red Cross blood donor. He taught high school science for forty years, two in a public school and thirty-eight at Milton Academy, from which he retired in 1987. He has served the [continued on page 17]

New England Association of Chemistry Teachers as a Division Chairman, in various positions for its regular summer conferences, and finally as President. He is an honorary member of NEACT and of Aula Laudis, an honor organization of high school chemistry teachers.

Since 1972 he has also painted astronomical and science fiction art as "George Richard."

JAMES ALAN GARDNER

James Alan Gardner lives in Kitchener Ontario with his adoring wife, Linda Carson, and a rabbit who is confused but sincere. Gardner got his master's degree in applied mathematics (with a thesis on black holes) and then immediately gave up academics for writing. He has published six science fiction novels, the latest of which is **Trapped** (from EOS). Gardner has won the Aurora award twice, and has been a finalist for both the Hugo and Nebula awards.

MARK A. GARLAND

Mark read a copy of Arthur C. Clark's **The Sands of Mars** when he was twelve, and proceeded to exhaust the local library's supply of SF. Book stores and magazines like F&SF and Galaxy came next, and he tried writing some stories of his own. Then he got interested in writing songs and playing in rock bands, building race cars, and a career in service management. Until finally he came full circle, back to science fiction and fantasy.

He has written book-length studies of Lord Dunsany and H. P. Lovecraft and reviews for The New York Review of Science Fiction.

He has been co-editor of Weird Tales since 1988.


school newspaper, the Bradley Scout.
