Art show schedule: Fri., TBA; Sat., 10 AM to 6 PM;



SF Guest of Honor

LARRY NIVEN

Born April 30, 1938, in Los Angles, California, to Waldemar Van Cott Niven and Lucy Estelle Doheny Niven (now Washington). Raised in Beverly Hills, California: Hawthorne Public School (Beverly Hills), Cate School (Carpinteria). California Institute of Technology, September 1956 to February 1958. Flunked out after discovering a book store jammed with used science fiction magazines.

Honest employment: gas station attendant, summer, 1960.

Graduated Washburn University, Kansas, June, 1962. B.A. in Mathematics with a Minor in Psychology. Half the university was scattered to the winds by a tomado a month after I left. They later gave me a D. Litt., an honorary doctorate in Letters.

First story publication: "The Coldest Place," Worlds of If,

December, 1964.

Met Marilyn Joyce Wisowaty at the Nycon World Science Fiction Convention, 1967. Married September 6, 1969. No

children. We reside in Chatsworth, California.

I have written fiction at every length, and speculative articles, speeches for high schools and colleges and conventions, television scripts, political action in support of the conquest of space, graphic novels, and a couple of comic book universes. I've collaborated with a wide variety of writers.

My interests:

Science Fiction conventions. Role playing games, live and computer. AAAS meetings and other gatherings of people at the cutting edges of science. Comics. Filk singing. Yoga and other approaches to longevity. Hiking and racquetball.

Saving civilization and making a little money. Moving mankind into space by any means, but particularly by making space

endeavors attractive to commercial interests.

In 1980 Jerry Pournelle talked me and Marilyn into hosting a gathering of the top minds in the space industry in an attempt to write a space program for the Reagan government, with goals, timetables, and costs. The Citizens Advisory Council for a National Space Policy met four times during the Reagan Administration, and twice since, for harrowing three day weekends. Attendees have included spacecraft designers, businessmen, NASA personnel, astronauts, lawyers. Adding science fiction writers turns out to by stunningly effective. We can translate! We can force these guys to speak English.

We've had some effect on the space program. SDI (Space Defense Initiative, or Star Wars) was drafted at our house in Tarzana. In '93 we watched the DC-X1 fly. It was a toy version of a single-stage ground-to-orbit spacecraft, and the Council generated it. Our design lost out to the current Skunk Works X-33, but the

Council caused the revival of the X Program itself.

I grew up with dogs: Keeshonds, the breed my mother raised and shaped for sixty years. I live with a cat, and borrow dogs to hike with. I have passing acquaintance with raccoons and ferrets. Associating with nonhumans has certainly gained me insight into alien intelligences.

I've written on computers since 1978.

Horror Guest of Honor

BRIAN LUMLEY

With Harry Keogh: Necroscope, & Others, Brian has recently completed his epic Necroscope saga in an amazing fourteen volumes. Brian's list of titles now runs to 50 and counting. A prolific if not compulsive writer, the bulk of his work has seen print in the last twenty-three years, this following a full span of twenty-

two years of military service.

Although he retired from the Army in December 1980, Lumley's first works — short stories, and eventually two collections — had been published many years earlier by the then dean of macabre publishers, August Derleth, at Arkham House in Wisconsin, USA. Thus, though he had long been an acknowledged master of the "Cthulhu Mythos" sub-genre inspired by H. P. Lovecraft's fiction, it wasn't until 1986, with his military career behind him, that the UK saw first publication of Brian's dead-waking, ground-breaking horror novel Necroscope, featuring Harry Keogh, the man who talks to dead people.

The-not-quite instant success of Necroscope resulted in four more books in the original series: Wamphyri!, The Source, Deadspeak and Deadspawn. Complemented by George Underwood's jacket paintings in the UK, and by Bob Eggleton's in

America, these books have all seen multiple reprints.

This success spawned Lumley's massive "Vampire World" Trilogy: Blood Brothers, The Last Aerie, and Bloodwars, and almost seven years after first publication of Necroscope in paperback, such was its continuing impact that TOR re-issued the novel in hardcovers — a very rare event! Since then, three more of the first five have appeared in hardcover, with Deadspawn due any time now.

Thirteen countries (and counting) have now published or are in the process of publishing these books, which in the US alone have sold well over 2,000,000 copies. In addition Necroscope comic books, graphic novels, a role-playing game, and quality figurines have been created from themes and characters in the books, and Brian has gone on to add his "real" voice to "Dangerous Ground," a Downliners Sect rock-&-roll album released in the UK.

Other books to Brian's credit are: The House of Doors and the sequel Maze of Worlds, Demogorgon, six novels in the "Titus

Crow" series, four in the "Dreams" series, the Psychomech Trilogy, several other one-off novels, and over 100 short stories — one of which, Fruiting Bodies, won a British Fantasy Award in 1989 and became the title of a TOR Books hardcover Lumley collection. A year later in 1990, Fear Magazine readers voted Brian the best established genre author for The Source, and he received the award accordingly. Also, recently, The Brian Lumley Companion has been released by TOR Books.

Another short story, "Necros" (nothing to do with Necroscope), was adapted for Ridley Scott's "The Hunger" series on the Showtime Television Network, and other tales from Brian's short fiction list have often been selected for various Year's Best Horror anthologies. At the World Horror Convention in Phoenix, Arizona, 1998, Lumley received the genre's much coveted Grand Master

Award in recognition of his work...

A widely travelled man, Brian has visited or lived in the USA, France, Italy, Cyprus, Germany, Malta, not to mention at least a dozen or more Greek islands. His hobbies have included hang-gliding in Scotland and spear-fishing and octopus-hunting in the Greek islands. He still makes regular visits to the Mediterranean, indulging his passion for moussaka, retsina, just a little ouzo ... and Metaxa, of course! In addition — as icing on the baklava — Necroscope and its sequels are now appearing in Greek translation!

As for the future: "well, the future is always uncertain." But with several books from Brian's extensive backlist awaiting reissue, it certainly isn't over yet, and he is making a welcome return to the short story and novelette forms ... which is where he came in.

When not travelling, Brian and his American wife Barbara Ann

("Silky") keep house in Devon, England.



Genre poems have also appeared in Analog, Weird Tales, On-Spec, TransVersions, Star*Line, and Tales of the Unanticipated. She is a member of the Science Fiction Poetry Association and the Algonquin Square Table poetry workshop.

DAVID CLINK

David Livingstone Clink was born in Medicine Hat, Alberta. He was the third child, and first son, of William and Blanche Clink. His first two years were spent living near the Anthrax storage facility for Canada (also stored were Mustard Gas and Lewisite). From this idyllic beginning, he was dragged off to live in West Hartford, Connecticut. Eventually, his family returned to Canada. They settled in Willowdale, a suburb of the Toronto metropolis. David ran his high-school Science Fiction Club and co-chaired NASFAcon III, a one-day SF convention in 1982. After high school, David attended many institutions, eventually earning a bachelor's degree in English. Luckily, he already had a union job at one of York University's libraries as a circulation coordinator.

Since graduation, David's kept busy by: attending three Worldcons, wrestling an octopus, playing softball, building cheeze-doodle

sculptures, playing street hockey, taking a bartending course, starting his own press (believe your own press), and writing a heck

of a lot of great poems.

If there's a dark side to David, it is this: there is no pun so bad that he can resist making it. They turnip everywhere in his poetry. So, be warned. His first chapbook, His name was Gord, and he used to run with the bulls, was published by Junction Books in May, 2001. The follow up is The Surley Blondes of Earth, which was released in March, 2002. In the fall, a collection of nature poems, Come on from the Horse on Seventh Avenue, was published.

David was the 2002 Poetry Guest of Honor at Eeriecon.

MERRI LEE DEBANY

Merri Lee weaves her stories around Folk Tales, Fairy Tales, and Fables from around the world as well as creating her own original tales. With warmth and ease, and using many dialects, she engages her listeners in animated, high energy performances. Her audiences range from preschoolers to senior citizens.

A former teacher, Merri Lee was born and raised in Western New York. She feels lucky to have the strong influence of many

different cultures around her.

"Although I have performed publicly as a storyteller since 1987, my mother says I've been making up wild stories of one kind or another my whole life. (She says it comes from my father's side of the family.)"

DAVID DEGRAFF

David DeGraff teaches Physics and Astronomy at Alfred University, where he uses science fiction short stories in most of his classes as a means of making the abstractions more concrete and to bring the distant locations closer to home. In addition to the usual physics and astronomy classes, he also teaches classes on science in science fiction, living in space, visions of the future, and the theory and practice of time travel.

GLENDA C. FINKELSTEIN

Glenda C. Finkelstein is a passionate writer, both of fiction and non-fiction as well as poetry. She began pursuing her passion with vigor in the early 1990s. She has a unique way of tapping into the human heart and encouraging the reader. Her writing is an extension of her soul, as she pours everything she is into each work. Writing has been a part of her life ever since she learned to read and write. Glenda is a fourth generation poet expressing profound feelings in a special way so that each reader might make her work their very own. She continues to burst forth with high-energy science fiction adventure novels and soul-searching inspirational books and has attained several honors since the betting of her publishing career.

She won 1st runner up in the Inspirational/Spiritual category of the 2002 Royal Palm Book Awards sponsored by the Florida Writers Association for her work, "Mary and Joseph." Her most current release, The Edge of the Universe, won 2nd place in the Science Fiction category of the 2003 Royal Palm Book Awards. Pensacola Junior College honored all of Mrs. Finkelstein's works in spring, 2003. She has also had her poetry and song lyrics published in a variety of publications. A sampling of her poems is posted on

her site.

Mrs. Finkelstein has made numerous television appearances on "HomeKeepers," with host Arthelene Rippy which aired on CTN, and on "Impact the Morning Show," with hosts Ed & Janice Russo which aired on ABC across central Florida. In addition, she has made several public appearances at Barnes & Noble stores statewide.

Glenda has long enjoyed the genre of science fiction, as it provides a place where imagination and possible reality can meet and inspire people to aim for the stars. Glenda also believes that the genre of science fiction promotes understanding among different cultures. Her favorite examples of science fiction at its best are movies like "Forbidden Planet," as well as the works of Arthur C. Clark and Frank Herbert, who treat the genre with intelligence, adventure, and yet touch the human heart in ways that make us examine ourselves and give us the desire to improve.

She is currently working on another science fiction novel that will be her most ambitious project to date. The work's overall theme is overcoming fear, an evil which too [continued p. 17]

HAL CLEMENT

Harry Clement Stubbs is not a guest at Eeriecon this year. We wish he could be. He was a wonderful guest at previous Eeriecons and served as Guest of Honor at Eeriecon Three in 2001. He died at his home in Milton, Massachusetts, on October 29, 2003. He is survived by his wife Mary, two sons George and Richard, daughter Christine Hensel, and grandson Jackson. As for the Eeriecon committee: we miss him.

He was born in Somerville, MA, on May 30, 1922, and attended schools in Arlington and Cambridge, finishing at Rindge Tech in 1939. He received his B.S. from Harvard in 1943, an M.Ed. from Boston U. in 1946, and an M.S. in chemistry from Simmons College in 1963. He taught high school science for forty years, two in a public school and thirty-eight at Milton Academy, from which he retired in 1987. He served the New England Association of Chemistry Teachers as a Division Chairman, in various positions for its summer conferences, and ultimately as President.

In 1943 he entered the Army Air Corps Reserve, received pilot wings in March, 1944, and flew 35 combat missions in Liberator (B-24) bombers with the 8th Air Force. Recalled in 1951, he spent eight months as a squadron officer at Bolling Air Force Base and 16 months as a technical instructor at the Special Weapons School at Sandia Base, New Mexico. He retired as a full colonel in 1976. He

was a 25-gallon blood donor (or more).

He was inducted into the First Fandom Hall of Fame (1997) and the SF and Fantasy Hall of Fame (1998). He received the Grand Master Award by the SFFWA in 1999. He received a Retro-Hugo

Award in 1996 for his 1945 story "Uncommon Sense."

His first story, "Proof," appeared in ASF (now Analog) in June, 1942. His novels include Needle, Mission of Gravity, Iceworld, Close to Critical, Star Light, Still River, Fossil, Half Life, The Nitrogen Fix, and Noise. The Essential Hal Clement, in three thick hard cover volumes, has been published by NESFA Press and features both novels and short stories. For more information on these high-quality volumes, go to www.Nesfa.org/press.

The Boston Globe called him "the grandfather of hard science fiction, a subgenre that incorporates and tries to extend current scientific principles and knowledge." He also used his sons' names as an artist: his astronomical and science-fiction art was painted under the name of "George Richard."

MARK A. GARLAND



JAMES ALAN GARDNER



Derwin Mak is an author of quirky science fiction short stories. published by ROC books in June, 1994.

Current Works: I since completed work on a Hard SF Military Adventure titled Sail a Distant Sea, and I'm currently at work on outlines/proposals for a cruise ship techno-thriller, a W.W.I Alternate History and another Alternate History set in the 1930s. I have recently committed the unpardonable act of poetry with [_____] (name withheld to protect Herb Kauderer's image).

Affiliations: I'm a member of the National Rifle Association as

well as Science Fiction Writers of America.

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ROBERT J. SAWYER

Robert J. Sawyer is the most recent winner of a best-novel Hugo Award, which he received at Torcon 3 for his novel Hominids, the first volume of the "Neanderthal Parallax" trilogy. The second volume, Humans, was a top-ten national mainstream bestseller in Canada (as was Rob's previous Hugo nominee, Calculating God, which in addition hit number-one on the Locus bestsellers' list). The concluding volume, Hybrids, was published by Tor in hardcover in September 2003 ("A fine combination of love story, social commentary, and ecothriller closes a terrific series with a bang," says Booklist).

Rob is also the winner of a best-novel Nebula Award from the Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America for his The Terminal Experiment. Both Hominids and The Terminal Experiment, plus Sawyer's Hugo and Nebula Award-nominated Starplex, were serialized in Analog; Sawyer's latest short story in that magazine, "Shed Skin," appeared in the January/February 2004

issue.

Among Rob's other honors are eight Canadian Science Fiction and Fantasy Awards ("Auroras"); three Japanese Best-Foreign-Novel Seiun Awards (for End of an Era, Frameshift, and Illegal Alien); an Arthur Ellis Award from the Crime Writers of Canada; and the Science Fiction Chronicle Reader Award.

Tor has been aggressively reissuing Rob's older titles in trade paperback: Golden Fleece (which Orson Scott Card named the best SF novel of 1990), End of an Era (called "one of the most accomplished SF novels of the last 10 years" by the Canadian publishing trade journal Quill & Quire), and Factoring Humanity (named one of the year's top ten novels by authors of any nationality in any category by The Ottawa Citizen) are already out in that format; Rob's acclaimed "Quintaglio Ascension" trilogy is soon to follow, starting with Far-Seer in May 2004.

Rob lives in Mississauga, Ontario (just west of Toronto), with poet Carolyn Clink, his wife of 20 years. For more on Rob and his work, see his massive website (over one million words of text) at

DARRELL SCHWEITZER

Darrell Schweitzer was a World Fantasy Award finalist (collaboratively, with Jason Van Hollander) for best collection in 2000, for Necromancies and Netherworlds. His most recent book is a collection, The Great World and the Small. Other recent books are another collection, Nightscapes, and a volume of poetry, Groping Toward the Light. This last, he hastens to point out, is "the real stuff," not another pamphlet of funny Lovecraftian rhymes, though he has some of those out too, such as the aptly entitled Stop Me Before I Do It Again! and a humorously eldritch verse pamphlet, They Never Found the Head: Poems of Sentiment and Reflection. His two novels, The Mask of the Sorcerer and The Shattered Goddess have been published by the Science Fiction Book Club and are now available from Wildside Press. His stories have appeared in Interzone, Twilight Zone, Amazing, Night Cry, Weirdbook, Whispers, and numerous anthologies, including the recent Barnes & Noble Crafty Cat Crimes, in which he preempted the hyper-specialization of modern theme anthologies by contributing an alternate historical vampire cat detective story. His story "The Fire Eggs" was just reprinted in Year's Best Science Fiction edited by David Hartwell. Some of his other collections are Tom O'Bedlam's Night Out, Transients, We are All Legends, and Refugees From an Imaginary Country. He has written book-length studies of Lord Dunsany and H. P. Lovecraft and reviews for The New York Review of Science Fiction.

Some of his forthcoming projects include The Neil Gaiman Reader, Sekenre: The Book of the Sorcerer, and The Innsmouth Tabernacle Choir Hymnal by "Brother Darrell."

He has been co-editor of Weird Tales since 1988.



JOSEPHA SHERMAN

Josepha Sherman is a fantasy and science fiction novelist and short story writer for adults and children, a non-fiction writer for adults and children, a working folklorist and a storyteller. He fantasy novels include: The Shining Falcon (Avon, 1989), winner of the Compton Crook Award; Child of Faerie, Child of Earth (Walker, 1992), an ALA Best Book and a NY Public Library Bool for the Teen Age; the national bestseller Castle of Deception (with Mercedes Lackey, Baen Books, 1992); A Strange and Ancient Name (Baen Books, 1993), Science Fiction Book Club edition 1993); an ABA Pick of the List, a Junior Library Guild Selection and a NY Public Library Book for the Teen Age; the nationa bestseller A Cast of Corbies (with Mercedes Lackey, Baen Books 1994); Gleaming Bright (Walker, 1994), a Junior Library Guild Selection, the national bestseller The Chaos Gate (Baen Books 1994); King's Son, Magic's Son (Baen Books, 1994), A NY Public Library Books for the Teen Age; The Shattered Oath (Baer Books, 1995), A NY Public Library Book for the Teen Age Forging the Runes, sequel to The Shattered Oath (Baen Books 1996), dark urban fantasy novel; Son of Darkness (Roc Books 1998, Science Fiction Book Club edition 1998); a "Xena" book Xena: All I Need to Know I Learned From the Warrior Princess, by Gabrielle, "translated" by Josepha Sherman (Pocket Books 1998); and a "Highlander" novel, The Captive Soul (Warner Aspect, 1998). Josepha Sherman has also sold over 125 short stories and articles to books and magazines, and has written for the animated TV

show, "Adventures of the Galaxy Rangers."
