

## JULIE E. CZERNEDA

Former biologist, publisher, and textbook author Julie E. Czerneda has been a finalist for both the John W. Campbell Award (Best New Writer) and the Philip K. Dick Award (Most Distinguished Science-Fiction Novel), as well as having her work on two Nebula Award Preliminary Ballots. She is winner of three Prix Aurora Awards, the Canadian version of SF's Hugo, for her novel In the Company of Others (which also received the Best SF of 2001 Award from RT Reviewers), her short story, "Left Foot on a Blind Man," published in Silicon Dreams, edited by Martin H. Greenberg and Larry Segriff, DAW Books and as editor, for her anthology Space Inc., DAW Books. Julie has eight science fiction novels in print from DAW Books, with more to come, the most recent being a new hardcover trilogy set in part along the northwest Pacific coast about a salmon researcher caught in an interstellar mystery, exploring the consequences of biological drives societies: Species Imperative: Survival, Migration, Regeneration (DAW, May 2004/5/6). She returns to her "Trade Pact" series in 2007 with a prequel.

As editor, Julie's Space Inc. explored daily life off this planet, while Revisions, coedited with Dr. Isaac Szpindel, DAW Books, looked at alternate science history. She is also editor of the original SF anthology series based on science curriculum topics for grades 4 to 8, Tales from the Wonder Zone, winner of the 2002 Special Award for Science and Technology Education from the Golden Duck Committee (YA Hugo), and the new Realms of Wonder YA fantasy anthology series, based on grade 8 through 10 language arts themes, published by Fitzhenry and Whiteside. The second title in the "Realms" series, Fantastic Companions, debuts

this spring.

Author of the acclaimed teacher resource, No Limits: Developing Scientific Literacy Using SF, Trifolium Books, Julie pursues her passion for using science fiction in the classroom through workshops for educators. She coordinated the "SF in the Classroom" Educator's Program for the 61st World Science Fiction Convention, Torcon 3, and has twice been featured at weekend workshops at the Wright Center for Innovations in Science Education at Tufts University, sponsored by the Smithsonian Astronomical Institute. Julie is the SF consultant for Science News for Kids, a division of Science News. A featured speaker for the Ontario Science Teachers' Association for over ten years, Julie will continue working with educators with upcoming events for the Yukon Science Institute, the SF Museum in Seattle, and the Pennsylvania Science Teachers' Association, to name a few.

## ALLEN M. STEELE

Allen Mulherin Steele, Jr. became a full-time science fiction writer in 1988, following publication of his first short story, "Live From The Mars Hotel" (Asimov's, mid-Dec. '88). Since then he has become a prolific author of novels, short stories, and essays, with his work appearing in England, France, Germany, Spain, Italy, Brazil, Russia, the Czech Republic, Israel, Poland, and Japan.

Steele was born in Nashville, Tennessee. He received his B.A. in Communications from New England College in Henniker, New Hampshire, and his M.A. in Journalism from the University of Missouri in Columbia, Missouri. Before turning to SF, he worked for newspapers as a staff writer for daily and weekly newspapers in Tennessee, Missouri, and Massachusetts, freelanced for business and general-interest magazines in the Northeast, and spent a short tenure as a Washington correspondent, covering politics on Capitol Hill.

His novels include Orbital Decay, Clarke County Space, Lunar Descent, Labyrinth of Night, The Jericho Iteration, The Tranquillity Alternative, A King of Infinite Space, Oceanspace, Chronospace, and Coyote. He has also published four collections of short fiction: Rude Astronauts, All-American Alien Boy, Sex and Violence in Zero-G, and American Beauty. His work has appeared in Asimov's Science Fiction, Analog, Fantasy & Science Fiction, Omni, Science Fiction Age, Journal Wired, Science Fiction Chronicle, Locus, Pirate Writings, and The New York Review of Science Fiction, as well as in many anthologies. He writes regular columns for Absolute Magnitude and Artemis.

His novella "The Death Of Captain Future" (Asimov's, Oct. 95) received the 1996 Hugo Award for Best Novella, won a

1996 Science Fiction Weekly Reader Appreciation Award, and received the 1998 Seiun Award for Best Foreign Short Story from Japan's National Science Fiction Convention. It was also nominated for a 1997 Nebula Award by the SFWA. His novella "...Where Angels Fear to Tread" (Asimov's, Oct./Nov. '97) received the Hugo Award, the Locus Award, the Asimov's Readers Award, and the Science Fiction Chronicle Readers Award in 1998, and was also nominated for the Nebula, Theodore Sturgeon Memorial, and Seiun awards.

His novelette "The Good Rat" (Analog, mid-Dec.'95) was nominated for a Hugo in 1996, and his novelette "Zwarte Piet's Tale" (Analog, 12/98) won an AnLab Award from Analog and was nominated for a Hugo in 1999. His novella "Stealing Alabama" (Asimov's, 1/01) was nominated for a Hugo in 2002 and won the Asimov's Readers' Award, and his novelette "The Days Between" was nominated for a Hugo in 2002 and a Nebula in 2003. Orbital Decay received the 1990 Locus Award for Best First Novel, and Clarke County, Space was nominated for the 1991 Phillip K. Dick Award. He was First Runner-Up for the 1990 John W. Campbell Award, received the Donald A. Wollheim Award in 1993, and the Phoenix Award in 2002.

Steele serves on the Board of Advisors for both the Space Frontier Foundation and the Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America, and is a former member of the SFWA Board of Directors. In April, 2001, he testified before the U.S. House of Representatives, Subcommittee on Space and Aeronautics, in hearings on the future of space exploration.

He lives in western Massachusetts with his wife Linda and their two dogs. His hobbies including collecting vintage SF books and magazines, Nordic skiing, and building model spacecraft. His novel, Coyote Rising, was published in December 2004.

#### ANNE BISHOP

Anne Bishop won the 2000 Crawford Award for the Black Jewels Trilogy (Daughter of the Blood, Heir to the Shadows, and Queen of the Darkness), was a finalist for the 1998 Sapphire Award (for Daughter of the Blood), received an Honorable Mention in Year's Best Fantasy and Horror for her story "Match Girl," and has had several of her novels make the Locus bestsellers list. She recently completed Dreams Made Flesh, which is four new stories about the Black Jewels world, and also has a Surreal story coming out in Powers of Detection: Tales of Mystery and Fantasy. She is currently working on a duology set in a world of changing landscapes. In her free time, she enjoys gardening, reading, and music. You can visit her at www.annebishop.com.

Marilyn "Mattie" Brahen has had seven or eight stories published. Her first novel, Claiming Her, is now in print from Wildside Press. Carolyn's speculative poetry has appeared in the Canadian anthologies Northern Frights (all five volumes), Tesseracts (volumes 4 and 7), Packing Fraction, land/space, and The Stars as Seen from this Particular Angle of Night. Genre poems have also appeared in Analog, Weird Tales, On-Spec, TransVersions, Star\*Line, and Tales of the Unanticipated. She is a member of the Science Fiction Poetry Association and the Algonquin Square Table poetry workshop.

#### DAVID CLINK

David Clink was born in Medicine Hat. Alberta, and grew up in West Hartford, Connecticut and Toronto, Ontario, and he now lives in Thornhill, Ontario. He is the Artistic Director of the Art Bar Poetry Series (artbar.org) and is the webmaster of poetrymachine.com, a resource for poets. He is co-publisher (along with Myna Wallin) of believe your own press. He has published 4 poetry chapbooks (most recently, Shapeshifter), and is the editor of 5 others. His poetry has appeared in Analog, The Dalhousie Review, Descant, Grain Magazine, The Literary Review of Canada, and On Spec. He has recently had two poems accepted at Asimov's Science Fiction.

David was the 2002 Poetry Guest of Honor at Eeriecon.

#### MERRI LEE DEBANY

Merri Lee weaves her stories around Folk Tales, Fairy Tales, and Fables from around the world as well as creating her own original tales. With warmth and ease, and using many dialects, she engages her listeners in animated, high energy performances. Her audiences range from preschoolers to senior citizens.

A former teacher, Merri Lee was born and raised in Western New York. She feels lucky to have the strong influence of many

different cultures around her.

"Although I have performed publicly as a storyteller since 1987, my mother says I've been making up wild stories of one kind or another my whole life. (She says it comes from my father's side of the family.)"

#### JAMES ALAN GARDNER

James Alan Gardner lives in Kitchener Ontario with his adoring wife, Linda Carson, and a rabbit who is confused but sincere. Gardner got his master's degree in applied mathematics (with a thesis on black holes), then immediately gave up academics for writing. He has published seven science fiction novels, plus one Lara Croft book (oooh!). His next book is a short story collection called GRAVITY WELLS, to be published by Eos in May. Gardner has won the Aurora award twice, and has been a finalist for both the Hugo and Nebula awards.

#### LOIS H. GRESH

Lois H. Gresh is the author of five novels and five nonfiction books in the science fiction and fantasy genre, and she's currently working on her eleventh book. Her recent releases include The Science of Superheroes, Chuck Farris and the Tower of Darkness, Chuck Farris and the Labyrinth of Doom, The Termination Node, and the extremely popular Dragonball Z. Her upcoming 2004 titles include The Science of Supervillains and an untitled speculative science book, both from John Wiley, and The Reader's Guide to Lemony Snicket: Everything Your Teacher Didn't Want You to Know from St. Martin's Press. Lois has also written dozens of short stories. Her fiction has been on the Nebula. Theodore Sturgeon, and Bram Stoker Award ballots six times.

Lois has been a guest speaker on national television programs half a dozen times and on national radio programs approximately 100 times. She's also appeared on Canadian national cable many times, as well as Irish radio and the BBC. She has been interviewed for and her work has been reviewed in USA Today, New York Times Book Review, Publishers Weekly, Kirkus Reviews, School Library Journal, U.S. News and World Report, Official U.S. Playstation Magazine, Physics Today, San Francisco Chronicle, National Public Radio, and many others. Her work ("Digital Pistil" short story and Science of Superheroes speculative science book) is required reading at many universities. She currently works as a computer research nerd aka Assistant Professor at the University of Rochester

Medical School.

#### DAVID DEGRAFF

Dr. David DeGraff teaches Physics and Astronomy at Alfred University, where he uses science fiction short stories in most of his classes as a means of making the abstractions more concrete and to bring the distant locations closer to home. In addition to the usual physics and astronomy classes, he also teaches classes on science in science fiction, living in space, visions of the future, and the theory and practice of time travel.

### LYNN FLEWELLING

Lynn Flewelling grew up in Maine and lived on both coasts before coming to rest rather unexpectedly inland in the Buffalo area in 1999.

Her first novel, Luck in the Shadows, was published in 1996 and was a finalist for the Compton Crook "Best First Novel" award, as well as being chosen as a Locus "Editor's Pick" and "Reader's Pick" for that year. Stalking Darkness (1997) and Traitor's Moon (1999) followed in what has become the popular "Nightrunner" Series, currently in print in nine countries, including Russia and Spain.

Her dark new trilogy (and yes, this one is a trilogy) debuted in 2001 with the highly acclaimed book, The Bone Doll's Twin. The sequel, Hidden Warrior, appeared in the US, UK, and Australia in July of last year. Flewelling is currently working on the third and

final book of this group.

In addition to writing novels, Flewelling works as a freelance writer/editor, and teaches writing and Tarot reading (separately, usually). She was a Guest of Honor at Eeriecon Five.

### WILL MCDERMOTT

Depending on who you ask, Will McDermott is best known as the author of the "Magic: The Gathering" novels Judgment and Moons of Mirrodin, editor-in-chief of Duelist and TopDeck magazines, or just simply "Dad." Will's other fiction credits include three "Magic: The Gathering" short stories and a short story in the upcoming Children of the Rune anthology by Malhavoc Press. Will lives in Hamburg, New York, with his comely wife, three young ruffians, and one large, insane dog.

## MARK A. GARLAND

Mark read a copy of Arthur C. Clark's The Sands of Mars when he was twelve, and proceeded to exhaust the local library's supply of SF. Book stores and magazines like F&SF and Galaxy came next, and he tried writing some stories of his own. Then he got interested in writing songs and playing in rock bands, building race cars, and a career in service management. Until finally he came full

circle, back to science fiction and fantasy.

He's spent the last fifteen years reading, going back to school, attending conventions, and writing. Works include Sword of the Prophets and three more Baen fantasy novels, two "Star Trek" novels (Voyager and DS9), a Dinotopia novel titled Rescue Party and more than fifty published short stories, poems and articles. Mark is also the Managing Editor of a regional specialty newspaper, cir. 50,000, and Executive Editor of an associated book publisher, Beerly Legal Press.

Mark lives in Upstate New York with his wife (also an avid reader), their three children, and (of course) a cat. He is currently at

work on a new Baen fantasy novel.

#### **DERWIN MAK**

Derwin Mak is an author of quirky science fiction short stories. Recent stories: "It Came to Eat Our Chicken Wings," about a Hooters Girl, an alien, and a car show (in RicePaper, Winter 2002); "The Siren Stone" (in Space Inc., Julie Czerneda, editor, DAW Books, 2003). He was an anime correspondent for Parsec magazine. In addition to his writing, Derwin was and still is involved in fandom through costuming. He was masquerade director of Anime North, still makes costumes, holds the record for entering the Toronto Trek masquerade without interruption (15 consecutive years and counting), was the first workmanship judge at an Eeriecon masquerade (2002), and is keenly interested in clothes and costumes (Notice how his stories describe their characters' clothes). Derwin has Master's degrees in accounting and military history and is a member of the Royal Canadian Military Institute. He also had the peculiar honor of being the sole literary personality invited to the invitation-only VIP opening party of a new Hooters restaurant in midtown Toronto.

### **NANCY KRESS**

Nancy Kress is the author of twenty-three books: three fantasy novels, eleven SF novels, two thrillers, three collections of short stories, one YA novel, and three books on writing fiction. She is perhaps best known for the Sleepless trilogy that began with Beggars in Spain. The novel was based on a Nebula- and Hugowinning novella of the same name: the series then continued with Beggars and Choosers and Beggars Ride. The trilogy explores questions of genetic engineering, social structure, and what society's haves owe its have-nots. Kress's most recent books are Crossfire and Crucible (Tor), and Characters, Emotions, and Viewpoint from Writers Digest Books.

Kress's short fiction has appeared in all the usual places. She has won three Nebulas: in 1985 for "Out Of All Them Bright Stars," in 1991 for the novella version of "Beggars In Spain" (which also won a Hugo), and in 1998 for "The Flowers of Aulit Prison." She also won the John W. Campbell Memoria Award for her novel PROBABILITY SPACE. Her work has been translated into Swedish, Greek, French, Italian, German, Spanish, Portuguese,

Polish, Croatian, Lithuanian, Romanian, Japanese, and Russian.

She is the bi-monthly "Fiction" columnist for Writer's Digest magazine.

She lives in Rochester, NY.

## DAVID STEPHENSON

David Stephenson came to Canada in 1970 after earning a doctorate by building and using a radar system to observe meteors. In Saskatoon he observed the aurora and winds at very high altitudes. In the 1980's he built systems for a deep space probe in Germany and was a consultant to Lloyds space insurers in London, before returning to Canada and joining the Geological Survey of Canada. school newspaper, the Bradley Scout.

Books Published: Doomsday Ship, Operation Night Hawk, Extinction Cruise (including a Japanese edition), A Mission for Eagles, The Pursuit of the Phoenix, The Siege of Ocean Valkyrie, Phoenix Caged. All of these were published by Zebra books. My first SF novel, Mutant Chronicles II: Frenzy, was

published by ROC books in June, 1994.

Current Works: I since completed work on a Hard SF Military Adventure titled Sail a Distant Sea, and I'm currently at work on outlines/proposals for a cruise ship techno-thriller, a W.W.I Alternate History and another Alternate History set in the 1930s. I have recently committed the unpardonable act of poetry with [\_\_\_\_\_] (name withheld to protect Herb Kauderer's image).

Lovecraft and reviews for The New York Review of Science Fiction.

Some of his forthcoming projects include The Neil Gaiman Reader, Sekenre: The Book of the Sorcerer, and The Innsmouth Tabernacle Choir Hymnal by "Brother Darrell."

He has been co-editor of Weird Tales since 1988.

Movies like Wizard of Speed and Time, Wallace and Gromit and Nightmare Before Christmas are examples of this type of movie.
