



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

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General Information

HOTEL CHECK-OUT TIME: 11 A.M. on Sunday

I.D.: Your badge identifies YOU as a member and gets you into all the convention activities. DON'T LOSE IT.

ESTHER M. FRIESNER

Nebula Award winner Esther Friesner is the author of thirty-one novels and over one hundred short stories, in addition to being the editor of seven popular anthologies. Her works have been published in the United States, the United Kingdom, Japan, Germany, Russia, France, and Italy. She is also a published poet, a playwright, and once wrote an advice column, "Ask Auntie Esther." Her articles on fiction writing have appeared in Writer's Market and Writer's Digest Books.

Besides winning two Nebula Awards in succession for Best Short Story (1995 and 1996), she was a Nebula finalist three times and a Hugo finalist once. She received the Skylark Award from NESFA and the award for Most Promising New Fantasy

Writer of 1986 from Romantic Times.

Her latest publications include a short story collection, Death and the Librarian and Other Stories from Thorndike Press, Turn the Other Chick from Baen Books, fifth in the popular "Chicks in Chainmail" series that she created and edits, and the paperback edition of E.GODZ, also from Baen, which she co-wrote with Robert Asprin. She is currently working on three YA novels as well as continuing to write and publish short fiction.

Educated at Vassar College, she went on to receive her M.A. and Ph.D. from Yale University, where she taught Spanish for a number of years. She lives in Connecticut with her husband, two all-grown-up children, two rambunctious cats, and a fluctuating population of hamsters.

HARRY TURTLEDOVE

Harry Norman Turtledove was born in Los Angeles, CA on 14 June 1949. After failing out of his freshman year at Caltech, he attended UCLA, where he received a Ph.D. in Byzantine history in 1977. His dissertation was on The Immediate Successors of Justinian: A Study of the Persian Problem and of Continuity and Change in Internal Secular Affairs in the Later Roman Empire During the Reigns of Justin II and Tiberius II Constantine (A.D. 565-582). In 1979, Turtledove published his first two novels, Wereblood and under the pseudonym "Eric G. Iverson." Werenight, Turtledove later explained that his editor at Belmont Towers did not think people would believe the author's real name was "Turtledove" and suggested that he come up with something more Nordic. He continued to use the "Iverson" name until 1985 when he published his "Herbig-Haro" and "And So to Bed" under his real name. During the later '70's and early '80's, Turtledove worked as a technical writer for the Los Angeles County Office of Education. In 1991, he left the LACOE and turned to writing full time. From 1986-1987, he served as the Treasurer for the Science Fiction Writers of He is married to mystery writer Laura Frankos. They have three daughters: Alison, Rachel, and Rebecca. His brother-in-law is fantasy author Steven Frankos. Turtledove won the HOMer Award for Short Story in 1990 for "Designated," John Esthen Cook Award for Southern Fiction in 1993 for Guns of the South, the Hugo Award for Novella in 1994 for "Down in the Bottomlands." "Must and Shall" was nominated for the 1996 Hugo Award for Best Novelette, the 1996 Nebula Award for Best Novelette, and received an honorable mention for the 1995 Sidewise Award for Alternate History. The Two Georges also received an honorable mention for the 1995 Sidewise Award for Alternate History. The "Worldwar" series received a Sidewise Award for Alternate History Honorable Mention in 1996. On August 1, 1998, Turtledove was named honorary Kentucky Colonel while Guest of Honor at Rivercon XXIII in Louisville, KY.

Her work has been published in Japanese, Spanish, German, Italian, Portuguese, French, and Thai, among others. MARVIN KAYE

Author of 15 novels, 6 nonfiction books, several plays & play adaptations, and editor of 29 (and counting) fantasy, mystery and theatre anthologies, Marvin Kaye currently is editor of H. P. Lovecraft's Magazine of Horror, Sherlock Holmes Mystery Magazine, and contributes his column, "Marvin Kaye's Nth Dimension," to the SF-fantasy trade magazine, Chronicle. He has published books through his imprint, Marvin Kaye's Nth Dimension Books, a division of Wildside Press. A native of Philadelphia, he lives in New York, where he heads the tutoring staff of the Manhattan campus of Mercy College. He is also Adjunct Professor of Creative Writing at NYU, and serves as Artistic Director for The Open Book, New York's oldest readers' theatre company.

NANCY KRESS

Nancy Kress is the author of twenty-three books: eleven SF novels, three fantasy novels, two thrillers, three collections of short stories, one YA novel, and three books on writing fiction. She is perhaps best known for the "Sleepless" trilogy that began with Beggars in Spain. The novel was based on a Nebula- and Hugo-winning novella of the same name; the series then continued with Beggars and Choosers and Beggars Ride. The trilogy explores questions of genetic engineering, social structure, and what society's "haves" owe its "have-nots." In 1996 Kress temporarily switched genres to write Oaths and Miracles (Forge, 1996), a thriller about Mafia penetration of the biotech industry. This was followed in 1998 by Stinger (Forge/Tor), about the introduction of a genetically-engineered and very nasty form of malaria into Maryland. Her most recent books are Nothing Human (Golden Gryphon Press, 2003), which concerns the long-term consequences of global warming, and the "duology" Crossfire and Crucible (Tor, 2003. 2004).

Kress's short fiction, much of which concerns the consequences of genetic engineering, has appeared in all the usual places. She has won three Nebulas: in 1985 for "Out Of All Them Bright Stars," in 1991 for the novella version of "Beggars In Spain" (which also won a Hugo), and in 1998 for "The Flowers of Aulit Prison." Her novel **Probability Space** won the 2003 John W. Campbell Memorial Award. Her work has been translated into Swedish, French, Italian, Greek, German, Spanish, Hebrew, Portuguese, Polish, Croatian, Lithuanian, Romanian, Japanese, and Russian. Also, in a development more

startling to the author than anything else, into Klingon.

In addition to writing fiction, Kress regularly teaches at various places, including Clarions East (University of Michigan) and West (Seattle). In a former life she was a copywriter for Xerox, Bausch & Lomb, and various other corporations in Rochester, New York, where she lives now.

Her short story, "My Mother, Dancing," is on the final

ballot for a 2005 Nebula Award.

JOHN-ALLEN PRICE

John-Allen Price was born on August 19th, 1954 in Washington, D.C. He earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Liberal Arts and Sciences from Bradley University in Peoria, Illinois, where he won the Pendell journalism award for his work on the school newspaper in 1977. ROBERT J. SAWYER

Robert J. Sawyer—called "the dean of Canadian science fiction" by the Ottawa Citizen and "just about the best science-fiction writer out there" by the Denver Rocky Mountain News—is one of only sixteen authors in history to win the science-fiction field's two highest honors: the Nebula Award for Best Novel of the Year (which he won in 1996 for The Terminal Experiment) and the Hugo Award for Best Novel of the Year (which he won in 2003 for Hominids); he has eight other Hugo nominations to his credit.

Rob has won Japan's Seiun Award for best foreign novel three times (for End of an Era, Frameshift, and Illegal Alien), and he's also won the world's largest cash-prize for SF writing-the Polytechnic University of Catalonia's 6,000-euro Premio UPC de Ciencia Ficción—an unprecedented three times, as well. In addition, he's won nine Canadian Science Fiction and Fantasy Awards ("Auroras"), an Arthur Ellis Award from the Crime Writers of Canada, Analog magazine's Analytical Laboratory Award for Best Short Story of the Year, and the Science Fiction Chronicle Reader Award for Best Short Story of the Year.

Rob's novels are top-ten national mainstream bestsellers in Canada, appearing on the Globe and Mail and Maclean's bestsellers' lists. His books have also hit number one on the bestsellers' list published by Locus, the U.S. trade journal of the SF field. His sixteenth novel, Mindscan, was recently published by Tor, and twenty-two of his forty published short stories

were recently collected as Iterations.

His novella "Identity Theft" is on the final ballot for a 2005

Nebula Award.

Rob has over 400 radio and TV appearances to his credit, including *Rivera Live* with Geraldo Rivera and NPR's *Talk of the Nation*. He has taught SF writing at the University of Toronto, Ryerson University, and the Banff Centre for the Arts; edits the Robert J. PAT YORK: In Memoriam

On May 21, 2005, one of the best conversations I've ever had ended with a phone call from a stranger. A kind, sorrowful voice on

the other end-"I'm so sorry to have to tell you this . . ."

My family and I moved from Maine to Western New York in the summer of 1999. As we were getting ready to move, I contacted Anne Bishop, asking about the area and mentioning that we planned to buy a house in East Aurora. Anne immediately emailed back that I must get in touch with her friend, Pat York, a science fiction writer who lived there. "You'll just love her. Here's her email address." Or words to that effect, anyway.

I emailed Pat, and within hours had a reply—not just a polite response, but a warm, welcoming and very informative letter, and an invitation to have coffee as soon as we got here. I mark that as

the beginning of our five and a half year conversation.

I took Pat up on the coffee invite— the first of hundreds, as it turned out. Pat and I had a lot of common ground: our work, our families, political and social interests. We started talking and we never really stopped, just took breaks to sleep and tend to our families and work. But then one phone or the other would ring: "Hey, got time for a quick cup of coffee/lunch/movie/I need help with this plot" and the conversation would pick right back up as if we'd never been apart. You could talk to Pat about anything and she always had something insightful to say.

Pat was one of the most interesting, open minded and generous people I've ever met. I'm a bit on the shy side, but Pat went out of her way to introduce me to other interesting people, included my family in holiday meals, even paid my kids exorbitant rates for

yard work and pet sitting.

We went to conventions together, too, where Pat seemed to know everyone. There I watched her encourage new writers, often people she'd just met, with that same open heartedness. She was tremendously modest about her own accomplishments-Clarion, Nebula finalist, special ed teaching career, publications in major magazines, organizer of writer's retreats, just to name a few—but passed on her considerable experience with both hands. We did the same for each other, reading each other's work critiquing, and cheerleading each other through dry spells. Pat was a great, soulful writer and a wonderful sounding board. At this writing, I'm finishing up a novel she helped midwife out of the doldrums; it hurts to think she won't get to see the finished book, or the

She talked me into going to my first Eeriecon, and last year's con was one of the last times we were together. We had our usual good time with everyone, and afterwards my husband and I took her to the casino and coached her through her first blackjack game. She had a terrific streak of beginner's luck and, in typical Pat fashion, felt bad that we'd lost a bit and tried to split her winnings with us. We laughingly fended her off, finally convincing her to keep her winnings as her stake, so she could come out gambling with us again.

We had coffee a time or two after that, and then she was gone.

Her family decided to have a two-night wake instead of a funeral, and it was astonishing to see how many lives she'd touched in so many different ways. The house was crowded both nights with family and friends, and in good Irish wake fashion, it was a warm, happy, if bittersweet, time for all. Pat, the great introducer and social director, must have been pleased to have so many people she'd loved and talked about finally meet. I can't think of a better tribute for her.

It still doesn't seem possible that she's gone. All these months later I find myself reaching for the phone or pulling up an email, wanting to share my latest chapters with her or see if she's free for lunch.

So I prefer to think that our conversation is just on hold for now, to be picked up later at some celestial coffee shop or in a future lifetime.

Pat, I look forward to catching up on all the news.

Remembering Pat

I met Pat York at Contradiction in 1994. Nancy Kress introduced us. This was my first timid venture into the Land of Conventions, and the only person I knew was Nancy, with whom I had taken a workshop the year before.

I remember Pat's smile. That bright, welcoming

smile.

Shortly after that, we met for dinner and played Pat's game of "Get to know you in 20 questions or less." Having discovered someone else who lived in the area and spoke the Language of Genre, we continued to meet, continued to talk (boy, did we continue to talk), and we

became friends.

In some ways, we had a "you say po-tay-to and I say po-tah-to" kind of friendship. Pat absorbed the world through news and science. I walked the landscapes of archetypes and myth. We celebrated each other's writing successes and commiserated over the rejections (and turned the 5-Minute Whine into an art form).

We were friends. And now she's gone.

We had both done a lot of living since 1994, and a lot of things had changed for both of us. But there was one thing that never changed during those years: that smile.
