

FANHISTORICON 6 PROGRAM

THEME A: HISTORICAL PROGRAMS

From MITSFS to NESFA to MCFI to ??? — the letterscape of Boston Fandom

A progressive history through Boston area fandom. Maybe we will even deign to acknowledge some of the rest New England fandom. New England fandom has had very little exposure. Outside of the early 40's of Widner and Chauvenet and Don D'Ammassa in the '70s, the area has not been known as a fannish publishing mecca (despite 400 odd issues of *Instant Message*). But there has actually been a lot of activity. Let's talk about it.

Fan Funds — What They Are? Who They Were? What's Wrong With Them Now?

How did the fannish funds start? Who are some of those people and what did they do to deserve a free trip across the ocean? There are ongoing controversies as well as past disputes. How did we/do we get over them? Are fan funds still a viable form of fanhistorical egoboo?

Fan History 101: From the Sublime to the Ridiculous

A distillation of the legends and silliness that have made fandom what it is today. Who created the SPWSSFM? What is the *Fancyclopedia*? Why did Swedish fans try to live the trufannish life according to the teachings of *The Enchanted Duplicator*? Where is the real Tower of Trufandom? When was the first fan? How can you tell if you are a real fan?

Scurrilous Fandom

Were you banned from Boston? Now is the time to come and confess! Tell all and hear all! No lawyers allowed! From the 1939 Expulsion Act to the New England Sex Scandals — From Coventry to Convention bankruptcy! We sweep the dirt out from under the carpet.

Forgotten Fen

Forry Ackerman, Claude Degler, Bob Tucker and Walt Willis are virtually household names to most fen. But who are John V. Baltadonis, Walt Leibscher, Jeffrey Smith, Francis Towner Laney, Sandy Sanderson, J. Michael Rosenblum, Maurice Hanson and Joan Carr? Each of these fen had a major influence on the fandom of their time — find out why? And tell us who you think should be remembered. People suggested at this panel will be noted for future research for Fancyclopedia III and maybe for the Who's Who in SF Fandom.

The Mid Sixties: the Black Hole of Fandom

There is a big gap in fanhistorical knowledge in the mid-sixties. Dick Lynch is working on that but there is quite a bit known and written about up to about 1962 and from about 1967 on. Fandom was in a big breakup and reconfiguration of itself in the mid-sixties.
