Several years ago Pamela Dean gave me two books for my birthday, and introduced me to two writers I hadn't previously encountered. One of the books was *Charmed Life* by Diana Wynne Jones.* I was the one charmed by this story of a more-or-less modern England where magic worked, and went looking for other books by her. I discovered that there is no such thing as a typical Diana Wynne Jones book.

She has written modern urban fantasy (*Archer's Goon*), stories set in the world of fairy tales (*Howl's Moving Castle*), science fiction (*The Homeward Bounders*), a wonderful retelling of Tam Lin crossed with Thomas the Rhymer (*Fire and Hemlock*), and a handbook for avoiding those tasks everyone hates (*The Skiver's Guide*).

Along with many other books, she has also written three plays for children and edited the anthology *Hidden Turnings*. She has a marvelously warped sense of humor, is an excellent panelist, and is charming to nervous liaisons calling overseas for the first time. I look forward to meeting her.

Once described as "a fundamentally really decent guy," Tom Doherty is one of the

best known publishers of fantasy and science fiction. His publishing house, Tor Books, was founded about a dozen years ago, and since then, has produced books by just about every author you can name, often winning recognition and acclaim in doing so.

Starting at Simon & Schuster, Tom Doherty worked his way up the publishing ladder from the very bottom, all the way to the top - something very few other people in the publishing industry can boast about. And he has a commitment to the science fiction and fantasy field that no one can doubt: when the hotel hosting the Nebula Awards this year suddened demanded payment, he posted a cashier's check to cover the bill without batting an eye.

Still, all of this doesn't give a really good picture of Tom Doherty, himself. If you are going to find out about Tom Doherty, the man, you will likely have to step up and talk to him (he doesn't bite). And if you are feeling *very* brave, ask him about the time he picked up an award for Harry Harrison in Dublin...

Sheraton Park Place Hotel 5555 Wayzata Blvd. (SW corner of Hwy. 100 & I-394) Minneapolis, Minnesota (612) 542-8600

• From the airport, take Highway 5 to I-494 going west. Drive on I-494 to Highway 100. Take Highway 100 north, to Cedar Lake Road. Follow Cedar Lake Road under Highway 100; it will turn into Vernon Avenue and the hotel will be on the right.

• From the train station, take University Avenue west, to Vandalia. Turn south onto Vandalia, and get onto I-94 going west. Follow I-94 around downtown Minneapolis, and get onto I-394 going west. Follow I-394 to just past Highway 100; the hotel will be on the south side of the freeway.

• When making travel arrangements, please keep in mind that there is highway construction going on around the hotel; please call Sheraton Park Place if you have any questions about the best way to get to the hotel.

• There is complimentary limousine service between the hotel and Mpls.-St. Paul Int'l. Airport.
