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& Handicapped Access

What do you do if you're new at Loscon and you have special needs? Check in with Handicapped Access. This department has several services. Suppose that you are physically unable to read your pocket program? Copies are available on audio cassette, and for a deposit you may borrow a Walkman player as well.

Another service Handicapped Access offers is special seating, not only for people who need to use a wheelchair, but for anyone who needs to sit closer to the program event because of a physical limitation, such as visual or hearing impairment, etc. Fans who need this service are usually permitted to enter the room before everyone else so they'll have time to get to the seating they need.

Alas, the one service they cannot offer at this Loscon is interpreters for the deaf/hearing impaired. Experienced translators cost money. When I asked Lee Wygand, who runs Access, whether she'd tried using established interpreters who are also fans, she said she'd run into the same problem: money. And as for using interpreters who aren't seasoned... Lee said, what if someone volunteered to interpret and they're green and they were to try and translate what all was being said at a panel? What kind of information would the hearing-impaired get out of such a translation?

One person in the newsroom suggested that Loscon might have better luck getting seasoned translators by allowing him or her to accompany the hearing impaired Loscon member for free. Personally, I think this is a great idea. Fluent translators for the deaf are hard to come by—it takes years to be a fluent interpreter—and though Access cannot afford to pay for a sign language interpreter, we could offer him or her a free membership. Like many Loscon departments, Handicapped Services runs on a zero budget.

I was asked to do a review of this year's artshow for an unusual reason: for the past two years I've been legally blind and now I can see—thanks to the miracle of cataract surgery.

So what did I observe?

For starters, at this particular artshow I saw more fantasy paintings than in years past, rather than the usual reproductions of popular science fiction TV characters like "Star Trek," and there was certainly more fantasy than SP.

One Loscon artist, Sarah Clemens, tried to tell a story by "painted panels" (like comic strips) and paragraphs upon paragraphs of text. There are no word balloons which gives her work an unique look, but what struck me as truly unusual is that Clemens is a serious painter, not a cartoonist.

Another intriguing sight was of artist Frank Kecske using his art show panel as a means to actively pursue work. A prominent notice on his display offers to do free cover art for "the first three authors whose story ideas are most mutually compatible with my abilities vs. your creative standards and requirements." Why? In hopes this will get him a foot in the door of the professional art market. In addition, Frank is also using his art to promote a story that his brother Alex wrote. (Frank's notice doesn't say whether Alex's work has been published.)

The matter of the magically-appearing swords was mentioned. For readers unfamiliar with the series, whenever two immortals do battle they always seem to bring a sword out of nowhere. Jackie theorized that when not in use the sword becomes part of the immortal's anatomy. But this idea was voted down because everyone felt it would cause too much of a hitch in his getalong.

Prospects for both the series and the third movie are good. However it's feared the series may fall victim to the proliferating syndication market.

Hour 25 — The Undead Show

On Friday evening, from 6:00 to 8:00 pm, Loscon 21 was host to "Mike Hodel's Hour 25." This venerable radio show has kept an ear on the Science Fiction & Fantasy community for over 20 years. Originating from the studios of KPFK (FM 90.7), the show has had over the years such notable hosts as Mike Hodel and Mitchell Harding (the founders of Hour 25), Harlan Ellison, J. Michael Straczinsky and Steven Barnes. The current list of on-air personalities includes Warren James, Terry Hodel, Suzanne Gibson, Jeff Laube, Sandy Rymer, Nick Smith and engineer Burt Handlesman.

The Vine Room was the site of this special edition of Hour 25 taped for broadcast that same Friday night during its usual 10 pm to midnight time slot. Warren James, the show's producer and main host dubbed this taped-for-later-broadcast-edition the "Undead Show." To this special Undead Show came a bevy of interesting guests.

Shaun Lyon, co-chairman of this year's Loscon, spoke about LASFS and Loscon's past, present and future. He also gave a heartfelt speech about fandom and its open acceptance of all people, regardless of physical ability, lifestyle or cultural background.

Robbie Cantor, Loscon 21's fan guest of honor spoke of her 20 years in fandom, this year's Worldcon in Winnipeg, Canada and of fandom coming together through electronic means such as fax machines and email.

Renowned author Lois McMaster Bujold spoke about her beginnings in writing, her book series about Miles Vorkosygian and her other works. There was also a discussion about the obsolescence of bioengineered technology, which was the theme for her novel "Falling Free."

Kristine Kathryn Rusch, editor of the Magazine Of Fantasy & Science Piction and noted author discussed editing, bringing in writers who are new to magazines and the lack of science-based science fiction stories. She also spoke of F&SF is desire to read and publish new writers and of her experimental writings in her novel "The White Mists of Power."

The (in her own words) very private Alicia Austin found the resolve to spend several minutes in front of a packed room to talk about fantasy art, her "other" job, the works of other fantasy artists and her own upcoming works. Her talk covered all ends of the spectrum and included advice to wanna-be artists and discussions of artwork for children's books, Southwestern/American Indian art and erotic art.

The two hour show/broadcast closed with several minutes of animated remembrances by julius Schwartz of DC Comics. Mr. Schwartz spoke about his previous appearances on Hour 25, the early 50's revival of Batman under his supervision, the creation of Batman in the late 20's and the Superman comics and films.

An open microphone was available for the audience to ask questions of the guests.

Hour 25 has existed for over 20 years through the support of listener contributions.
