
I asked him for anecdotes about his last visit to Minneapolis, but all he

I feel very proud that Minicon has seen fit to honor one of Science Fictions's truly unique voices, a voice which is all too often silent here in the United States.

John Sladek has been writing humorous science fiction, with a sly black twist, for over 20 years. 


