Professional Guest of Honor: Gardner Dozois

Gardner Dozois is the co-author (with George Alex Effinger) of the novel Nightmare Blue (1977), and the author of the novel Strangers (1978), the short-story collections The Visible Man (1977), The Peacemaker (1991) and Geodesic Dreams (1992), and the nonfiction book The Fiction of James Tiptree Jr. He was a co-founder of Asimov's Science Fiction Magazine in 1976, and has served as its editor since 1984. He is also the longtime editor of the annual Year's Best Science Fiction (St. Martin's), as well as many other anthologies. He has twice received the Nebula Award for his own fiction and is a multiple Hugo Award recipient for his magazine and anthology editing. He is widely considered the most important SF magazine editor of the '80s and '90s. In person, he is approachable, warm, and funny.

Schimel & Greenberg (DAW). Look for more Langford writing in magazines such as *Interzone* 126, *SF Eye*, and the February '98 *Asimov's*.



OPERATIONS

Want to help out "behind the scenes"? Operations is the department that helps the other ones run smoothly. If you have a question, comment, complaint, or emergency, we are the people to bring it to. The Bridge, located in Verandas 1–2, is the place to find us.

In order to help us accomplish these noble goals we are looking for help with the following positions:

Info Officer: Greeter, sage, and first contact expert.

Dispatcher: Left hand of the head on duty and speaker to radios.

Comm Officer: Chronicler of events, tracker of things, listener on the Bridge.

Ranger: Wandering host of the convention, and eyes and ears of Operations.

Runner: Runner of things and bearer of news, those who will likely go everywhere.

Badger: Those who attend events or functions of the convention and look for badges.

Convention Policies

Federal, State, Municipal Laws

That which applies outside, applies inside the hotels and the convention.

Animal Policy

Pets and other animals are not permitted in any of the hotels. Please do not bring them to Minicon. If you ignore this policy you will be asked to leave without refund from the hotels or convention. Working animals (such as guide dogs) are the exceptions.

Adhesive Posts

Please do not post adhesive-backed signs or stickers; this is considered vandalism of the hotel, and cannot be tolerated. Please only post signs using low-tack tape, on surfaces that will not be damaged, when they are removed; such as tile or metal—definitely not on wallpaper.

Smoking

Please be considerate of other attendees and smoke only in those areas posted. It is not acceptable to smoke between posted areas or in hallways and elevators. We'd like to accommodate everyone, but infractions could cost you your badge for the weekend.

Weapons Policy

We want everyone to have a safe and enjoyable time at Minicon. We therefore have established the following policy on weapons at the convention.

- Use good judgment. Even if it complies with the remaining rules, if it is unsafe or would reduce the enjoyment of other attendees, please don't do it.
- 2. No projectile weapons.
- 3. No stun guns.
- Only Class II or lower lasers are considered safe and acceptable.
- All weapons must be carried sheathed and peacebonded at all times.

Definitions

- Weapons include actual weapons, facsimile weapons, anything actually used as a weapon (please don't), and anything an otherwise ignorant observer would have reasonable grounds to think is a weapon.
- Projectile weapons include tasers and any devices that fire or throw particles or substances, or are thrown themselves.

Note: Squirt guns with liquid are projectile weapons, but bubble-makers are not.

Note: Peace-bonding is required on all weapons; if you don't have it, we will.

About Your Address Sticker

Some Minicon mailings (including this one) have a line of codes on the label before the name and address. Below is an explanation of what the codes mean.

B: Badge number, except they haven't been assigned yet. Ignore any numbers you currently see on your label,

Reg: Registration type. If your registration type is "0" Minicon doesn't think you're registered. The other categories are 1 (registration at \$25 rate), 2 (registration at \$30 rate), 3 (registration at \$35 rate), G (guest of honor), C (Comp), S (supporting), L (child), and D (at the door).

Per: Would be person type, except that we're not making much use of that field this year. You may see occasional codes in there; you can ignore them.

NDR or DR: These are the codes that show drinking (DR) or non-drinking (NDR) status. For people who aren't registered yet, this defaults to NDR, so if you haven't registered yet, don't worry about this code. Anyone who indicates he or she will be over 21 as of Minicon 33 is marked as DR, unless requested otherwise.

Act: Action flags. If there's a "P" in the field, you've volunteered to be on programming; if there's an "F" in the field, you've volunteered to help at the convention.

If you think you've registered, and your registration type doesn't indicate this, feel free to query at <registration@minicon33. mnstf.org>. If you're sure you've registered and your registration type doesn't indicate this, please send a copy of the cancelled check to the Minicon address, attention Beth Friedman, and we'll follow up. If the label indicates you're not registered and you sent in a registration but the check was never cashed, you can query Treasury at <treasury@minicon33.mnstf.org> or send mail to the Minicon address, attention Mike Pins.

Some Thoughts on Badge Names

Minicon name badges serve several functions. The primary one, of course, is to identify to Minicon personnel that you are indeed a member of the convention in question. An equally important function, in my opinion, is to provide an identifier for new people you meet at Minicon.

I've noticed what I see as a distressing trend in the past few years—the tendency to use badges as bumper stickers. I see more and more badges with slogans or clever comments. There's nothing wrong with slogans or clever comments, but when I've spent a few minutes in fascinating conversation with someone I've never met before, it's a bit disconcerting to have to say, "By the way, it's nice to meet you, uh, Death to Vermin."

If you only talk to people you know, it doesn't matter what's on your name badge, because they already know you. I don't know if the bumper sticker issue is a cause or an effect, but I'd like to see people being more sociable (in a small way) by putting names on name badges. It can be your full name (my personal preference), a first name, a nickname that you use all the time, or a nickname you only use at conventions. Just something you'd like to be addressed by, instead of, say, "Names will be truncated at 25."

I like bumper stickers, too—just not on name badges. Buttons, after all, are fine places for bumper stickers, and there are plenty of them available in the Dealer's Room. With luck, there might even be someone making custom buttons this year.

And if a name badge says "Moonfaced Assassin of Joy," I'm going to assume that's what the person behind the badge wants to be called.


