**Welcome to the 1998 Edition
of the Minicon Pocket Guide.**

This is your handy, easy-to-use, "Granddaughter- of the Mother-Of-All-Pocket-Programs" Pocket Program.

This Pocket Guide is based on the Wiscon Pocket Program design created by Meg Hamel. So many people fell in love with it that we asked Wiscon if we could also use the design. They of course were delighted to hear that we love it, and gave us the freedom to use it.

This book has been separated into two sections:

The first section, and the largest, is entirely for Programming and related items. It is designated for programming by the black bar running on the right outside edge. Inside you will find the convention programming listed in four (4) different ways. Each form uses a unique tracking number assigned to each programming item. All times are listed in military (24-hour) time.

1. Room/Time Grids (listed on the fold-out covers)
2. Programs listed in order of tracking number.
3. Themes (i.e. Costuming, Fandom, LitCrit, etc...)
4. Participants (John Dodo.....001, 002, 003)

Krushenko's programming descriptions are listed in a separate section before the Themes section. The Krushenko's information is still in the grids, themes and participant lists.

Children's programming is listed in a separate section after the participants lists. Children's is not listed in any other section of Programming.

This Guide's program listing is current as of 4/1/98. A list of changes after this date has been compiled by the Programming Department, who will print this list and provide it to you. Any changes that happen at the convention will be posted in Programming Ops, Atrium 3, and printed in the Bozo Bus Tribune, the convention zine. If you need to make any changes to the schedule, go to Programming Ops and they will do what they can.

The second section you will find Volunteers, Registration, Minicon Library, Fan Funds, Parties, Life Support, Minneapolis '73, Fan Faire, Dealers' Room, Art Show, Childcare, Minicon Post Office and Bozo Bus Tribune. You can find the Hotel and Operations information in the Souvenir book.

And of course, it wouldn't be a Pocket Guide without hotel maps. You will find the Radisson Hotel maps near the back of the book.

8. In order that **we may contact parents** and guardians in case of the above emergencies, we must have names, badge numbers and places to reach you. We will have a short registration form available both at the main registration desk and at children's programming for you to fill out if your child will be attending children's programming without you.
9. We assume that **children who arrive** on their own can leave on their own.
10. **We reserve the right** to ban any disruptive children from all further programming.

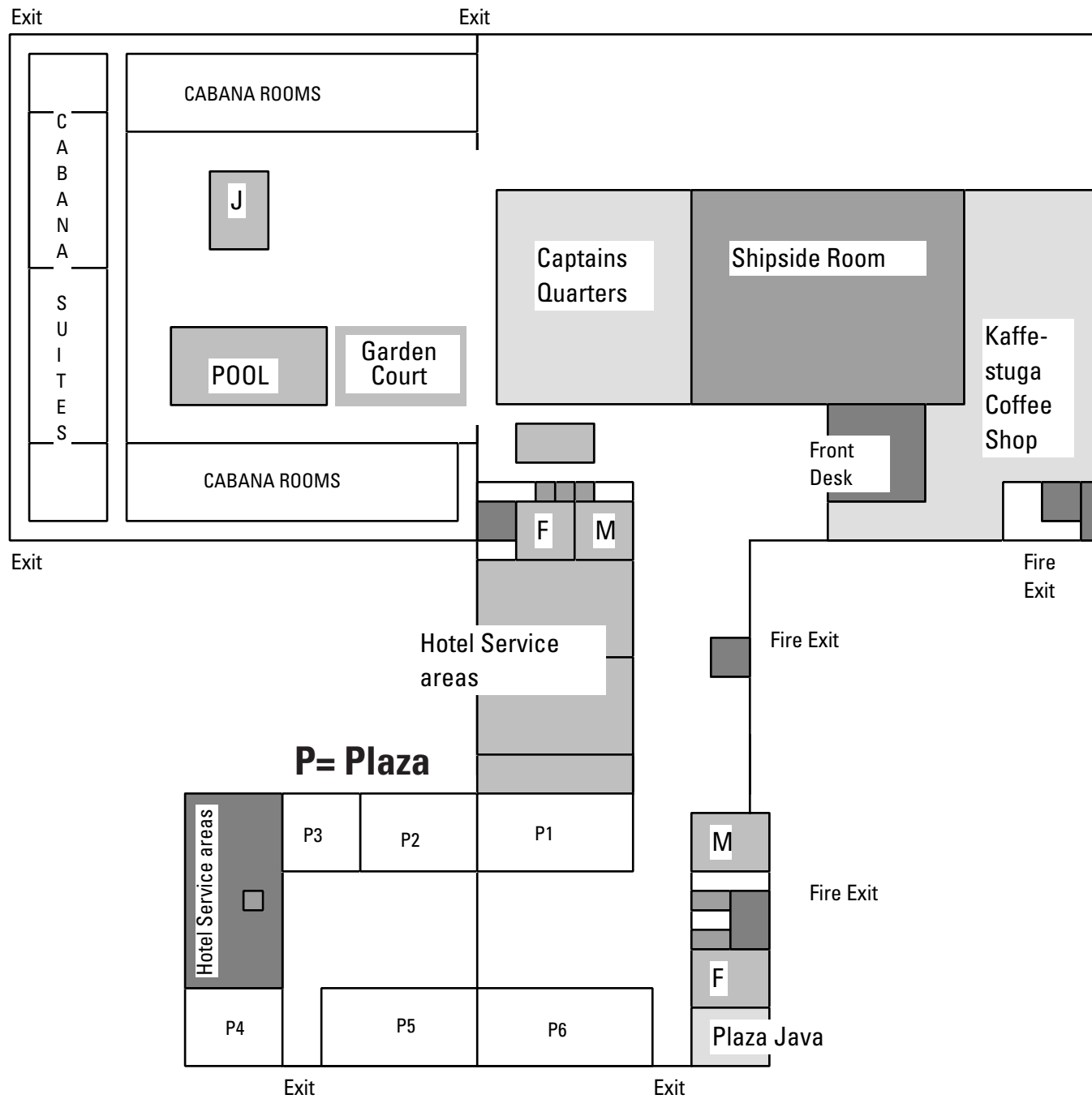

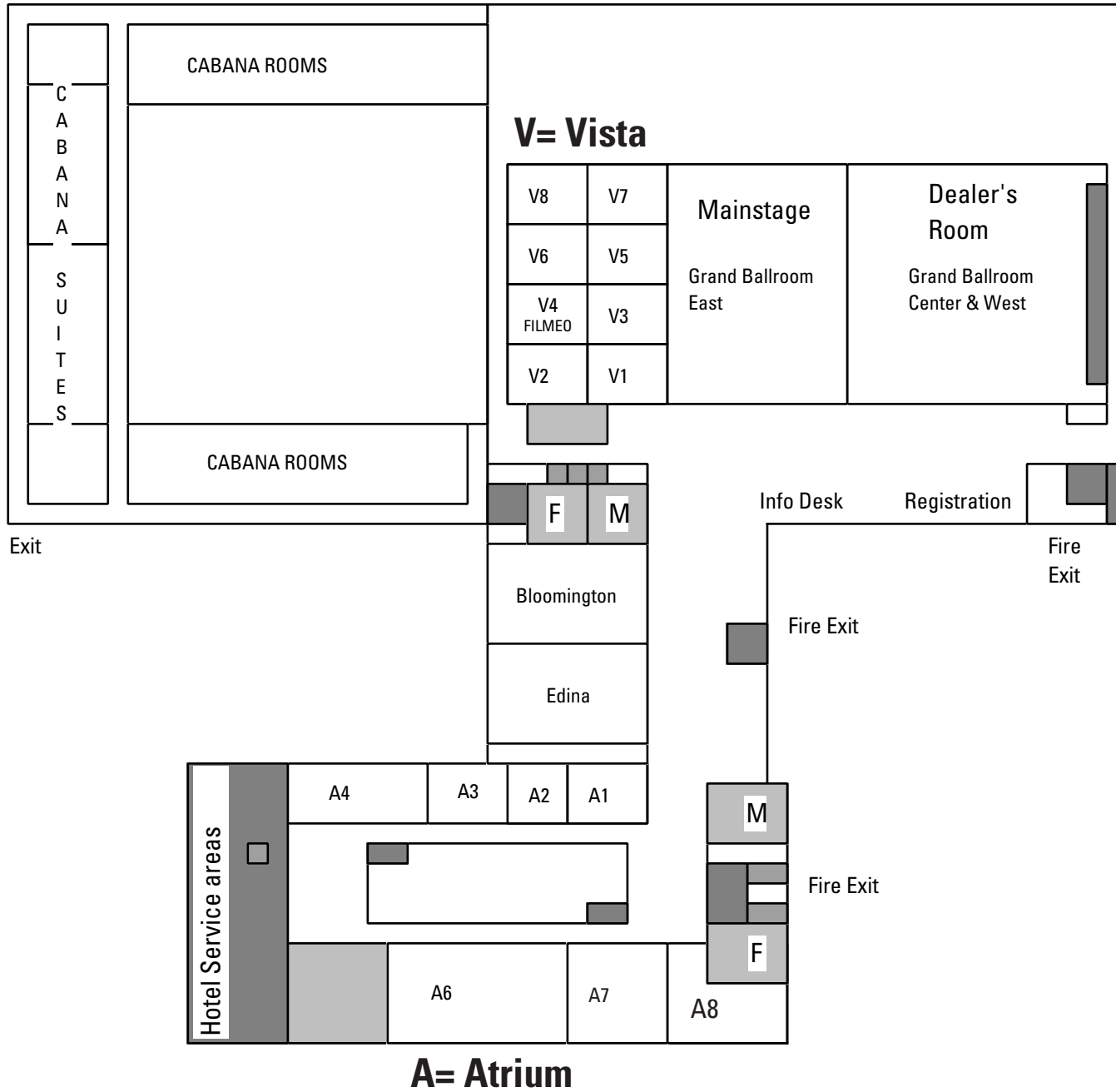

Volunteers

Minicon needs volunteers! From Thursday morning through Sunday afternoon, all over the Radisson and in the Sofitel; Minicon does not happen without volunteers. The more Con-goers volunteer, the better Minicon is for everyone. Volunteer! The more you volunteer at Minicon, the more you will feel like a Minicon participant, and not just a spectator. Volunteering is a great way to get to know people at Minicon. Furthermore, Minicon volunteers get things no one else can get, like Volunteer's T-shirts, Minicon mugs and cool (yet functional) special badges that identify you as a volunteer, and make great souvenirs.

What has to get done?

Many important volunteers positions require no special skills, although more responsible positions require advance training before Minicon. Some positions, like Teamsters, require you to physically exert yourself-lift safely, please! The largest category of positions open to people agreeing to volunteer at Con include "badging" and "hospitality." Any responsible youth or adult may "badge"; making sure that only people registered for Minicon 33 participate in Minicon events. "Hospitality" volunteers work in the Con Suite, refilling food plates, bringing out more snack food, or doing light preparation work behind the scenes. Con Suite volunteer positions are not open to congoers under 21. Perhaps the most important position is being a member of what is affectionately known as the "Press Gang"-going around Con asking people to volunteer to take care of urgent needs. Check the Volunteer Department table (see below) or the Information desk for more information about all volunteer opportunities.

How do I get in on the action?

You can also get answers to any questions you might have about volunteering. When you sign up to volunteer, pick up a volunteer record stamp card. The Minicon Registration tables are located on the second floor of the Radisson Hotel South, at the far end of the Great Hall foyer ("that's just above the hotel's front desk"). Identification is required to receive your membership badge and convention publications.

Your Minicon membership badge is required to enter all convention events. If you have lost your badge see a registration volunteer (Great Hall foyer) during the hours listed above. If registration is closed, go to the Bridge. There will be a five dollar replacement charge for lost membership badges.

When signing the registration book, to pick up your membership—or during a free moment at the convention when registration is open—take a moment to check that we have our correct mailing address listed (help us keep the OTML up-to-date and make sure you'll be receiving the Progress Reports for Minicon 34—the con is only a year away!). If your address is incorrect, ask the registration volunteer for a change of address card, which can be filled out on the spot. Change of address cards will also be available at the InfoDesk.

Minicon Library

Fan Funds

There are funds which are supported by fan donations and gifts. The three explained here are among many created and active in the world of sf fandom.

The James Tiptree, Jr. Award is given yearly to the work of science fiction or fantasy published which best explores or expands gender roles. It was started by visionaries, supported by nourishment and selected with passion, patience and respect for difference. Alice Sheldon (who wrote in the pen name of James Tiptree, Jr.) would have a lot to proud of. (quasi-quoted from Debbie Notkin.)

TAFF (the TransAtlantic Fan Fund) was created in 1953 for the purpose of providing funds to bring well-known and popular fans familiar to those on both sides of the ocean across the Atlantic. It is supported through voting fees, donations and fundraising efforts.

DUFF (the Down Under Fan Fund) is a similar effort to bring fans between Australia/New Zealand and North America.

During Minicon 33 there will be several hours of the fan funds hosting a segment of the Minneapolis in 73 party. (During which time direct sales for funds will be done.) Sometime following this segment will be a fan fund auction where items shown during the party will be available for voice bidding. Please attend either or both of these events to discover more about these and other funds.

Minneapolis in '73

Back in the late 1960s, there was a "real" Minneapolis in '73 Worldcon bid, chaired by Jim Young and supported by fans near and far. Minicon itself started as a result of that Worldcon bid. But the bid was dropped before voting occurred, and the group gave its support to the Toronto fans who eventually hosted Torcon.

Minneapolis fans decided they didn't want to run a Worldcon, but throwing bid parties has been a lot of fun. Bev Swanson Elmshauser and Chuck Holst are widely credited with the continuation of the Minneapolis in '73 bid, post-supporting variety. They led the first such party at Torcon, and Minn-stf fans have been holding Minneapolis in '73 parties around the world ever since.

In 1990, Minicon began sponsoring a Minneapolis in '73 hospitality suite as one of the "conventions within a convention" you can find at Minicon. The suite provides a place for oldpharts to hang out, while also serving as an entry point for newer fans who sometimes find the consuite just a tad loud or overwhelming.

The year, the Minneapolis in '73 suite remains in the Plaza Tower (that's the short one). Come on up to room 882 for a taste of Minneapolis in '73 hospitality. Minicon Post Office

This year Minicon's U.S. Post Office will feature a Minicon 33 Pictorial cancellation with artwork by Jim Odbert with additional thanks to Scott Imes, Margie Lessinger and Cat Ocel.

At Minicon 33 the Post Office encourages you to put first class postage (32 cents) on "anything" (c'mon, you know what they mean!) and the clerks will happily cancel the stamp(s) with the Minicon 33 pictorial cancellation and sell you more stamps. If one wishes to send regular mail rather than keep the commemorative cancellation, the Post Office will deliver the mail with the nifty cancellation in its usual efficient manner.

The cancellation is also available after Minicon by mail. The Minicon 33 cancellation for U. S. postage will be available for 30 days subsequent to each date of cancellation: requests for the April 10 cancellation must be postmarked by May 9, for the April 11 cancellation by May 10 and for the April 12 cancellation by May 11. As with other philatelic cancellations, the Post Office requires sufficient postage on articles to be cancelled to return them by mail. (That is, if you want a post card cancelled, put a first class stamp on it. If you want a three-ounce envelope with cardboard cancelled, put three ounces worth of postage on it. And so on.) Enclose the material to be cancelled inside another envelope, addressed as above, and include a cover letter requesting a philatelic cancellation using the Minicon 33 pictorial cancellation. The mail will then be delivered as addressed and will carry Minicon's cancellation. NOTE: Requests must be postmarked by the above schedule. If one wishes to protect an individual item or avoid multiple returns of items addressed to the same locale, include a self-addressed stamped envelope with sufficient postage, correctly addressed to the intended recipient of the item(s).
