Dear friends of Minicon, (including, as always, friends we haven't met yet)

Happy New Year 1999! Wow. This is like watching the odometer as it approaches 100,000 miles. All those nines start lining up and you just know something's going to happen.

Speaking of things about to happen, Minicon is almost here. At last! Just 11 weeks from now, a few thousand science fiction fans will gather at the Minneapolis Hilton and Towers to make a weekend of Minicon magic. In doing so, we'll put to rest 18 months of fascinating (and sometimes worrisome) rumors, even as our actual activities generate fresh gossip-fodder for years to come.

There have been too many rumors about Minicon 34 for me to pick a favorite, though I was particularly taken by one I heard from a huckster at OryCon. He'd heard that Minicon 34 would have only 200 members. We're scaling back on size and activities, but just to a manageable level for a *regional* sf convention, and a large regional at that.

To date, Minicon 34 has 765 members. We're expecting 1,800–2,200 members, though we're also preparing for more or fewer than that.

Then there was the rumor about how only books could be sold in the Hucksters Room. Don't get us wrong; we love books. We're delighted that a third of Minicons huckster tables will be loaded down with books for sale. But we also love all sorts of other cool stuff; and, as you'll see in the Hucksters List on page 12, Minicon will have lots of that, too.

The rumors will get stranger as the excitement surrounding Minicon cranks up a few notches, as it does every January. There's an urgency, an energy buzz, and even a sense of panic that comes as everyone working on and/or coming to the convention faces the final deadline that is Minicon itself. (With luck, the panic pops up only occasionally to keep life exciting — and, even then, there's laughter, too.)

Here are a few of the things you can do to join in the Minicon buzz and to avoid some of the usual last-minute crises:

Pre-register now rather than buying your membership at the door! You'll save \$30 and we'll be able to order the right quantities of everything. If you've already registered, *remind friends of the February 14*th *pre-reg deadline*.

Reserve your hotel room (if you haven't yet). As of mid-December, our room block at the Hilton was 49% full for Friday and Saturday, and our smaller room blocks on Thursday, Sunday, and other nights were 56-90% full. Several suites are still available, both for room parties and on quiet floors. (Our new hotel has lots of suites.)

Volunteer! Tell us if you want to be on programming, work in the consuite, or lend a helping hand processing registrations right now. At Minicon, we'll especially need lots of help setting up Thursday evening, and with tear-down at the end of the convention

I'll close with a loud cheer for the 185 people who have volunteered so far (see page 9) and for everyone who is hosting a party, working on the convention, and/or coming to Minicon 34. We're looking forward to seeing you soon!

Spotlight on Mark and Priscilla Olson

Mark and Priscilla Olson are The Compleat Fans — or at any rate, in this imperfect world, as close to compleat as we're going to get.

They're print-SF fans. Both of them have been involved with NESFA Press's admirable efforts to put neglected great SF writers back into print. Mark edited their James Schmitz volume, and co-edited volumes of work by Diana Wynne Jones, Hal Clement, and James White. Mark and Priscilla together did the Zenna Henderson volume. And Priscilla, on her own, edited the Charles Harness collection.

They're club fans, pillars of the New England Science Fiction Association. Mark has served as President and Treasurer of that group; Priscilla has been Vice-President. Mark ran Boskone, NESFA's Bostonarea con, in 1986; Priscilla was chair in 1992, and has run Programming any number of times — so much so that Boskone regulars tend to go to her with programming questions even when she's not running it!

Their resume as con fans and conrunners is far too long to detail. Mark is a member of that small group of fans who have survived chairing the World Science Fiction Convention — in his case, in 1989. Priscilla co-ran Programming at the 1989 Worldcon and was an assistant division head for Programming in 1992 in Orlando. They jointly ran the newsletter for the 1996 Worldcon in Los Angeles.

And Priscilla is a media fan: she's been a Trek fan since the beginning, and (according to Mark) financed her move to Boston by selling her collection of "filthy Trek zines." ("In what sense do you say 'filthy'?" this reporter asked Mark. "Yes," he replied.) Priscilla is also, notoriously, an unabashed Legion of Super-Heroes fan, and the standard condition for her running programming for any con is that she be allowed to organize a Legion panel! Needless to say, in her honor we'll be organizing a Legion panel at Minicon 34.

What not so many people know about Mark is that he grew up in Red Wing, Minnesota and attended the University of Minnesota as an undergraduate, and that his first convention was, yes, Minicon 1. He also attended the second Minicon. Aside from his well-known fannish pursuits, he's interested in history and the physical sciences, particularly astronomy. Inaccurately, but in a way that can only be described as Minnesotan, he calls himself "mostly Norwegian and dull and proud of it."

Priscilla was born in Queens and grew up on Long Island, and met Mark when he was a TA at SUNY/Binghamton and she was taking his courses. She once worked at the Bronx Zoo. Today, while Mark works in computers ("like everyone else in the world"), Priscilla teaches sixth grade at a Jewish parochial school, collects community cookbooks, and runs The Secret Garden, a fannish APA devoted to horticultural pursuits.

They're approachable, easygoing, smart people with a sense of humor about themselves, who routinely do tons of the kind of work that holds fandom together. We're honored to have them coming to Minicon 34 and we hope you'll take the time to meet them.



Minicon Polícies

Minicon, like fandom in general, takes a somewhat broader view of what is acceptable behavior than the mundane world subscribes to. Still, all social gatherings have boundaries. Some of our more important boundaries are described below and on pages 8 & 14.

Weapons Policy

1. Use common sense.

2. Actual firearms, class 3 or 4 lasers, and projectile-throwing toys are not permitted at Minicon.

3. For everything else, real or prop, have a sheath, sling, or other container for it, and keep it secured when you're in a public space.

4. The above notwithstanding, Minicon reserves the right to prohibit any prop or weapon at the sole discretion of Minicon.

5. "You kill it, you eat it."

Reality Policy

1. Minicon complies with all Federal, state, and local laws.

2. Minicon encourages our members to do the same.



Programming

Comps & Programming

In past years, we've given complimentary memberships to some program participants. We haven't had a coherent policy, and what we've had, we've implemented inconsistently. After a great deal of discussion, the following is Minicon's new comp policy as it applies to programming participation:

1. Members of the community who are attending Minicon and participating on the program will not receive a comp for that participation.

 It's possible there may be program participants who are only there to do their item, not for the whole con; we intend to handle these circumstances with good manners and common sense.

3. Minicon is offering its former guests of honor complimentary memberships at Minicon 34 and subsequent Minicons. This policy is unrelated to participation in the program, but the odds are darn good that if we asked you to be a guest of honor in the past, we'd like to see you on the program now.

Join the Army and See the Navy

We said last time that we want to know "what kind of intense and interesting and weird programming ideas you want to see," or be on. Of course, that's kind of ambiguous: what sort of programming is interesting?

Our working theory is that, first, programming at Minicon should be enjoyed by the people who attend. We're not doing panels for the good of the panelists' souls. Second, programming should be about things that interest the people who come to Minicon — first and foremost science fiction, fantasy, the SF community, and the works of our Guests of Honor. And related subjects. Which covers a lot of ground.

Your programming department is acquainted with a long list of Minicon regulars — easily enough to fill the program slots. But we suspect we're overlooking folks we don't know so well, people with fascinating specialized knowledge, heartfelt opinions, unusual points of view, new things to say, and jokes we haven't heard yet. We want to hear from those people. Yes, you.

A Few Notes on Good Programming

We want to avoid the kind of panel that simply asks a flat question, like "Can you write good fantasy outside of the Western mythic model?" The answer is yes, the discussion runs short, and the panelists spend the rest of the hour vamping. That's a wasted opportunity.

Any panel that starts off with any of the panelists saying "I have no idea why they put me on this panel" is probably the result of suboptimal program planning. So is any panel with a title so cutesy and convoluted that the panelists can't tell what the subject is supposed to be.

We're fond of the kind of simple panel idea (for instance, "Most Important Books Of Last Year") that serves as an opportunity for opinionated and entertaining people to hold forth. But we're also fond of the kind where the initial proposition strongly constrains the discussion, something like "Has the rising popularity of media SF changed the kind of SF that gets written?" These are very different kinds of panels: one is driven by its participants, the other by its subject.

We want to try some unusual formats, such as dialogues. Everything doesn't have to be a panel.

And we're also interested in dragging people outside their usual ghettos of interest and having them discuss something else. How about putting some hard-SI⁺ types on a panel on mythic fantasy? (Plenty of hard-SI⁺ types know a fair bit about myth.) How about putting some fantasy writers on items about space development? (Lots of fantasy writers know plenty about technology.) And so forth. How many people only know about one thing?

Our Hotel

As you've probably read or heard by now, the upcoming Minicon 34 will be in downtown Minneapolis at the Hilton Minneapolis & Towers. (This is now the official name of the hotel! Recent corporate changes have included a new logo and hotel names that all start with "Hilton" instead of the city name.) At 1001 Marquette Ave South, the hotel occupies the full block between 10th Ave S., 11th Ave S., Marquette Ave S., and 2nd Ave S., just a few blocks north of the city's convention center. They have 821 rooms, of which we have 600 rooms blocked for Minicon. As of mid-December we have our block half-filled. So there are still "rooms at the inn," but be sure to get your reservations in soon-we could fill the remaining block by mid-February. In any case, you must make your room reservation before March 10th in order to be assured of getting Minicon's room rates.

This year, Minicon is handling reservations only for suites. All reservations for non-suite sleeping rooms, and any special requests associated with them, must be handled through the hotel reservations folks. (See box on the next page for reservation details and phone numbers.) The Hilton is no longer accepting non-guaranteed reservations, so you must guarantee your reservation one of two ways: **1**. *Guarantee it with a credit card number*.

By the terms of our contract, use of this method requires no further deposit. Your room will be held until 3AM the first night of your reservation, at which point the card will be charged for that night. Some computer-printed confirmations sent from the national corporate reservations system have claimed that an early deposit is required. This is not true, but it keeps creeping back into the national system because corporate Hilton has been trying to make this hotel a "depositrequired" hotel starting in 1999. Fortunately, our contract explicitly covers the terms of credit-card guarantees.


2. Guarantee it with a cash deposit. This deposit is due at the local hotel within ten days

of making your reservation. (Deposits are always handled by the local hotel.)

In either case, if you need to cancel a reservation, you must do so at least a full day before your scheduled arrival. Check directly with the local hotel (612-376-1000) if you have doubts about the status of your reservation.

To request and reserve a suite, whether a traditional two-bedroom Deluxe Parlor suite or an Executive King suite with connecting bedrooms, request what you want through Minicon by February 14th. You can indicate your request with your Minicon registration form, or if you have email access, you can contact us at <hotel@minicon34.mnstf.org>. We still have suites available, so let us know if you want one. Contrary to rumor, we have not been rejecting suite requests based on party content. Everyone who requested a suite by mid-December will get one. This includes folks from Convergence. Concussion, GT/PFRC, SF Minnesota, SFWA, TOR Books, the United Kingdom, and others. At least three other suite requesters said they intend to run music parties. There will be a variety of parties at Minicon this year, and we still have room for more. We also still have some Executive King suites on the quiet floors available for quiet party or non-party use. Contact us now!

Speaking of room parties, signs for parties are turning out to be a problem this year. Please check in with Minicon Convention Services to find out the final rules for posting signs in the Hilton. We will probably have kiosks set up as party boards.





Many people have asked about parking. There will be a good deal of parking available, but it won't be free. We're hoping to arrange a special deal with nearby garages (connected by skyway) and surface lots for Minicon members, but we haven't been able to do so yet. The surface lots are normally \$3/day on weekends. The worst-cost case is the city-run garage under the hotel with 1200 spaces. Its night rate, from 4PM to 4AM, is \$4. The day rate increases hourly to a maximum of \$11.50

per 24 hours. Nearby garages are slightly less expensive. We will announce any special Minicon parking rates on our web page <http://www.mnstf.org/minicon34>, and, we hope, on a corner of the registration confirmation cards.

Directions to Minicon

Traveling to Minicon by car:

From the south, follow I-35W into Minneapolis. Once past MN-62, move to the second lane from the left, and follow the signs for MN-65. Exit on 11th St., follow 11th to Marquette Ave., and turn right on Marquette. The Hilton is on Marquette, on your immediate right, between 10th and 11th Sts.

From the east, follow I-94 to Minneapolis, exit on 11th St., and proceed as above.

From the north, follow I-35W into Minneapolis, and follow I-94 westbound. Exit on 11th St.

From the west, you have several choices. If you follow I-94 to down-town Minneapolis, exit at Hennepin and Lyndale, and turn left onto Hennepin at the first light. (Yes, we know the sign at Hennepin says "Dunwoody Blvd".) Turn right on 12th St., then left on Marquette Ave. Or you can take I-494 south from I-94 to I-394, and follow I-394 east to Minneapolis.

After MN-100, stay in the second lane from the left, exit onto 12th St., follow 12th St. to Marquette, and turn left onto Marquette.

To Minicon by rail:

From the Midway Amtrak depot,

either take a cab to the *Downtown* Minneapolis Hilton, or take a westbound #16 MCTO bus to Minneapolis. Transfer at Marquette Ave. to any bus headed southwest on Marquette (against the normal flow of car traffic) and get off at 10th St. The Hilton is on the other side of the street, between 10th and 11th Sts.

Please note that as of this writing, rail service is every other day in each direction (east from Seattle, west from Chicago).

To Minicon by air, excepting airships:

From Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport, take a cab to the Downtown Minneapolis Hilton, an Airport Limousine (actually a van), or a northbound #7 MCTO bus downtown and transfer at Marquette as above. (For airship travel, see our PR #2.)
