THE BANQUET

The banquet this year will be served buffet-style, with Yankee Pot Roast of Beef and Sphaghetti with Meat Balls as the entrees. The price for a ticket to the banquet is \$5.95, and you may come back for seconds or even more helpings if you wish. The banquet will be held the evening of Saturday 18 June.

THE ART-SHOW

First off, the show will be held in the same area as the hucksters' area. Any type of art — painting, drawing, prints or sculptures — showing some relationship to science fiction or fantasy may be submitted.

If you are sending art to the convention, it is your responsibility to cover postage and insurance both here and back. If you include the work in the auction, we'll return your return envelope and insurance certificate to you with the check from the auction. Next, you should include 50¢ to cover the entry fee for each piece submitted. Then, with your material, please include a note declaring yourself either a professional or a fan artist. If you forget to declare yourself, you must forfeit your entry fees, and your work will be returned without having been displayed. Sorry — but this is the way we have to run the thing. You'll see why.

We've decided to have three prizes for this year's show — one for best professional, one for best amateur art, and one for best of show. All work will be juried by the judges.

Send all queries and art to the Art-show director, Jim Schumeister (1600 Bohland Ave., St. Paul, Mn. 55116).

The prize in each category is, by the by, \$5.00.

BOOKSELLER'S ARRANGEMENTS

Charge per table is \$5.00 for all or part of the convention. We'll provide covers for the tables, and keep the room as secure as possible. THE AUCTION

Whether you plan to attend or not, you can participate in the auction. Auction times are listed in the schedule above.

We extend the following option to anyone interested in auctioning off material at the convention. Send a minimum price, x; if the object (art, rare book, or magazine) brings the minimum price x, you recieve x dollars. The convention takes no cut from your minimum fee. If the object brings in over x, but less than 2/3rds of your minimum (x + 2/3x), then you get your minimum fee and the convention keeps the rest. If the object brings in more than (x + 2/3x), then we split the fee with you, 60%/40% — the 60% going to you.

If you are sending anything to be auctioned, you must pay the postage and insurance on it both ways. Send material or requests for information to the convention chairman at the above address.

And of course, we're always glad to recieve contributions.

This year's auction offers quite a lot in the way for the rare and old magazine collector. On the auction block at this Minicon are such things as the first issue of Unknown (March, 1939); a complete run of Astounding/Analog (1946 to date); another run of Fantasy and Science Fiction (1949 to date, with some issues missing in the 1960s); and a run of Galaxy (1950-1963). And there are also all sorts of strange things like an issue of Strange Tales (1932), British SF magazines, some films, and paintings by Morris Dollens, George Barr, and others.
