
Weapons: Prop weapons or costume pieces must be secured and pose no danger to others. We reserve the right to prohibit any such items from our function rooms.

Badges: Everyone attending Minicon must register and must wear a badge for admission into convention functions.

Smoking: FYI for out-of-towners, Minnesota is smoke free in all public places. The hotel offers private smoking rooms and there are designated smoking areas out-of-doors. Please direct further questions to the hotel.

Help and Information: Ask at the registration/volunteers desk while they're open, or after hours at the consuite or bar. Also look for department heads or wandering concom members

Emergencies: In case of emergency threatening life or limb, don't look for us; call 911!



Volunteering



Minicon is entirely volunteer-run. No one is paid for helping; even the convention chairs and all the department heads pay full price for their memberships. This keeps our membership rates down, but also means that we need your help. Think of Minicon like a big party: some of us are hosting the party, but we're all in it together.

How to help out? Well, we're a pretty informal bunch. If you see something that needs doing --- perhaps a bowl of chips is empty, or a programming room doesn't have enough chairs --- see if you can get it done. If you're not sure how, ask the department head or nearest person who seems to know what's going on. If everyone pitches in just a little bit like this, the convention will run very smoothly.

We also have some more formalized volunteering with scheduled shifts for art show, checking badges at the consuite, and possibly a few other areas. There will be a sign-up sheet at the registration desk.

Would you like to get more involved in Minicon? Minicon is organized by the Minicon concom (convention committee) over the course of the year.

How do you get to be on the concom? Well, if you start showing up to meetings, you're a concom member. Or, to put it another way, we don't really know who's on the concom, but when forced to make a list, we write down whoever we remember being at concom meetings. Check the Minicon website, progress reports and/or http://mnstf.org/einblatt for meeting announcements.

WHAT IS MNSTF?

It's the Minnesota Science Fiction Society, variously abbreviated MnStf, Minn-STF, MN-STF, and other variants. It's the non-profit group that brings you Minicon. Each year, the MNStF board of directors approves the next Minicon chairperson and looks after the continuing needs of the convention.

Minstf does more than just Minicon. It also runs a small convention each year in the fall, mainly for the purpose of having something like Minicon, but without all that pesky programming and stress. This sort of convention is known in fannish circles as a relaxioon or a fallcon. Ours changes names frequently. This year it will be known as **Conjecture 2** and will be held October 14-16 at the Holiday Inn Hotel & Suites in Bloomington. See mnstf.org/conjecture or the Einblatt (see below) for more information, probably appearing later in the year.

Besides running conventions, Minnstf's major activity is holding two parties (officially known as "meetings") a month, generally at members' homes. It's possible that you find the idea of showing up at a new person's home uninvited a little intimidating, but guess what? ... You're invited. These meetings involve copious conversation, food, dinner expeditions, games, music, knitting, or all of the above. Meeting locations are published in MnstF's monthly newsletter, the **Einblatt**, available at mnstf.org/einblatt. You can also sign up for our events and discussion **mailing lists at mnstf.org**.

We usually also have a couple of special meetings: the picnic and the pool party. The picnic is in July; see below. The pool party is held in the winter, usually at the Sheraton; check the Einblatt for details.





John Scalzi

AUTHOR GUEST OF HONOR



Some authors just naturally provoke from others a primal, undistilled envy. John Scalzi is one of those. The official biography on his website, Whatever.scalzi.com, is a list of 'very positive experiences', with nary a cloud to cast a shadow over his charmed life.

Jumping into the nascent blogging scene in the late 1990s, John become one of the internet's first blogging celebrities, with enough fame to generate internet memes from acts as simple as taping bacon to a cat. Despite already having a horde of followers, he didn't submit his first science fiction novel for publishing; he posted it for free on his blog, until a publisher came to him and offered to buy it. Not only was that story -- Old Man's War -- nominated for the Hugo in 2006, it is now being made into a motion picture by Paramount.


Since then John has been an entertaining enough blogger that he not only was able to publish his website articles as a book -- *Your Hate Mail Will Be Graded: A Decade of Whatever 1998 - 2008 --* that book went on to win a Hugo. He's won another Hugo for best fan writer, and had two more of his novels nominated for a Hugo, and somewhere found time to also win the Campbell award for best new writer in 2006.

All of this would be an insufferable string of good luck if John Scalzi were not one of the nicest and most talented guys on the internet.

He often directs the energies of his fans to help charities, including a recent event where he created a chapbook for charity -- *Clash of the Geeks* -- that features a picture of himself as a green-skinned orc. (Wil Wheaton riding a winged unicorn kitten features also, but he isn't at this con.) He's become an irreplacable part of the science fiction community, penning books about writing and sci-fi movies, and culminating in his election to president of the Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America in 2010.

And yet nothing he has accomplished is yet as popular as that picture of bacon taped to his cat.

So we're the lucky ones, in that we have this rising star of science fiction visiting us. Let's all greet him warmly, tell him our favorite bacon-related anecdotes, and welcome John Scalzi to Minicon!



CHAS SOMDAHL

Musician guest of honor

He told Chas not to touch it so of course when he wasn't around, Chas sneaked into his brother's room and covertly learned to play guitar. Once he found his feet with the guitar, he began hanging around West Bank coffee houses and immersing himself in the folk tradition. In his busy life of working, raising three children, and sustaining a number what he refers to as "physical hardships", music took a back seat for a while. Then, in the year 2000 Chas and his wife, Bonnie, attended Minicon and got caught up in the whirlwind of music. Not long after this, a long break from playing was halted. He bought a new guitar and the two of them fell in love at once. Since then, Chas and his guitar have been inseparable. Not that he is




exclusive. Once he bought one guitar, he couldn't get enough. He now has a collection of acoustic guitars that rivals the Gibson warehouse. While he is playing one, there are many other guitars hiding in closets, under beds and behind curtains, each awaiting a turn to be chorded, picked and strummed.

Ever since music regained its place as a big part of Chas's life, he has pursued it with an unbridled passion. Go to the campground at any folk or bluegrass festival. When the main stage concerts are done, Chas will be first to park himself by the campfire, guitar in hand, looking around wondering what's keeping everyone else. Chas has some remarkable gifts where approaching music is concerned. One is his distinct style. He can take any song from any genre, arrange it with one guitar and one voice and make it his own. The term "Chasified" has often been used to describe this phenomenon. Chas is also a great calming force and sets a good example of how to play well with others. He can often be found at jam sessions adding his own touch while encouraging others to join in and try new things. He also travels for miles and miles in his car to play house concerts and conventions all over the Midwest with his band "Riverfolk". Like his fiddle-playing father before him, Chas is now passing on the torch teaching a few of his thirteen grandchildren to play guitar. This will certainly assure him of more than one life time of jamming partners.

He has been head of Minicon music for a few years, now and he is honored to be this year's music guest. It was this convention where new life was breathed into his music. Now, MUSIC MAN is eager to give back to the community that which was given him many years ago: Lots of music.



Korzybski's term "timebinding" became a signature for First Fandom, and for such writers as Heinlein, Van Vogt, and Hubbard. In 1982 Thomas A Seobok delivered the Korzybski Memorial Lecture to the International Society of Semantics entitled "Pandora's Box: Why and How to Communicate 10,000 Years into the Future." Seobok's reuse of "timebinding" in this lecture shows his awareness of a deep fannish connection to General Semantics. His technical report contains playful tweakings of fandom, along with sercon suggestions for actually implementing a "Bridge to Ten Millennia in the Future." The end of Seobok's report calls for an "Atomic Priesthood" reminiscent of Korzybski's scientist senate. Two years after Seobok's lecture, in 1984, the Office of Energy and Office of Nuclear Waste Isolation published a report entitled Communication Measures to Embrace Ten Millennia-. Coincidence?




MEDALLION HUNT



Producer/Director IRWIN ALLEN'S first foray into science-fiction television, based on his 1961 feature film. 1964's Season 1 adventures of the submarine SEAVIEW had a tight mix of science fiction and cold war intrigue that eventually gave way in later seasons to crazy sci-fi monster stories until its 1968 cancellation, a trend that repeated itself on Allen's next series, LOST IN SPACE.

Deciding that color was too costly, despite Color TV making huge inroads into American homes, ABC-TV ordered Season 1 in black & white and broadcast this color pilot thusly. Season 2 (in color) introduced THE FLYING SUB and a re-designed Seaview (although Allen would intercut footage of the old Seaview, valuing economy over consistency).

COURAGE THE COWARDLY DOG

Nowhere, Kansas seems to attract a lot of scary stuff and this petrified pooch sucks up his courage in order to rescue his owner, sweet old Muriel & her cranky husband Eustis from "The Chicken from Outer Space", screaming in terror all the way, in this rarely seen 1995 animated pilot!

EERIE, INDIANA

12-year-old Marshall Teller's family moves to this odd midwestern town where almost everyone who lives there is oblivious as to how strange it really is: Except for Marshall and his new friend Simon. As your "everykid", Marshall's sense of wonder is never diminished, despite weirdness being thrust upon him on a regular basis in this 1991 series.

LAND OF THE GIANTS


IRWIN ALLEN's final weekly televised science fiction effort from 1968 before later earning his reputation as "The Master of Disaster" for directing such blockbusters as "The Towering Inferno" and "The Poseidon Adventure". Sub-orbital airliner SPINDRIFT encounters a space warp that crash lands the crew and passengers on a world similar to our own, but of enormous proportions. Think you have problems crossing the street against traffic? Imagine doing so when you're the equivalent of six inches high!

From FILMATION's 1967 animated SUPERMAN/AQUAMAN HOUR OF ADVENTURE:

The Atom was voiced by PAT HARRINGTON, Jr., who was Schneider on the sitcom ONE DAY AT A TIME. GREEN LANTERN

GERALD MOHR ("Angry Red Planet", 1960) not only voiced Green Lantern, but also Mr. Fantastic for Hanna-Barbera's FANTASTIC FOUR cartoon in 1967.

H.G. WELLS' THE INVISBLE MAN

Following a laboratory accident that turned him permanently invisible, Dr. Peter Brady is soon recruited by British Intelligence and the adventure begins in this 1958 UK series (not the 1975 NBC series).

Producer RALPH SMART later created DANGER MAN (aka SECRET AGENT in the U.S.) starring Patrick McGoohan, who (as is widely believed) spun off THE PRISONER from it.

Friday 7:00 pm A GREAT SERIES WASN'T THE ONLY THING RESURRECTED

THE OUTER LIMITS - SANDKINGS

A scientist (JEFF BRIDGES) revives an extinct species of Martian insect on Earth. His experiments to evolve their intelligence lead to unforeseen results. A brilliant opening for the 1995-2002 revival of the 1964-6 classic anthology series. Based on the story by GEORGE R. R. MARTIN.

Friday 8:30 pm A GREAT IDEA GONE HORRIBLY, HORRIBLY WRONG!

VAMPIRELLA

Nobody did horror better in the 1960s than WARREN PUBLISHING (Creepy, Eerie) or HAMMER FILMS. But, audiences for both horror comics magazines & movies were changing by 1974; Negotiations for a Vampirella movie had broken down between Hammer and Warren. Had they not, imagine the Vampirella movie that might have been!

It's likely NOT what director JIM WYNORSKI ("The Return of Swamp Thing", "Not of this Earth") delivered in this 1995 made-for-cable ROGER CORMAN production run on SHOWTIME. With ROGER DALTREY of THE WHO portraying a vampire with ambitions for rock stardom and world domination!

Friday 10:00 pm SF&F is NO LAUGHING MATTER. OH, YES IT IS!


KROD MANDOON AND THE FLAMING SWORD OF FIRE

Set in an ancient fantasy realm, barbarians, sorcery & raw humor were the result in this short-lived partnership between COMEDY CENTRAL & BBC (say what?) in 2009, as Krod and his inept band of "freedom fighters" struggle against the evil ruler Dongalor. Who is Krod? Spell his name backward for your first clue.

QUARK

GET SMART co-creator BUCK HENRY's 1978 sci-fi spoof has RICHARD BENJAMIN and crew (including the "Double Mint Twins") on a United Galaxy Sanitation Patrol Cruiser in 2222 longing for real adventure. When they actually find it, the results are hilarious.

During its eight episode run, Quark managed to directly satirize STAR TREK on three separate episodes, while successfully skewering STAR WARS, FLASH GORDON and 2001, A SPACE ODYSSEY on others!

Saturday 10:00 am WHEN SATURDAY MORNING WAS NOT ONE LONG TOY COMMERCIAL

FIREBALL XL-5

The second of GERRY ANDERSON's science fiction series about a futuristic vehicle and the puppets who control it. While the adventures of the prior year's SUPERCAR were rooted in the earthbound present of 1961, XL-5 patrolled Sector25 of our galaxy in 2062. Future Oscar winner DEREK MEDDINGS' special effects and BARRY GRAY's dramatic orchestral soundtrack once again elevated an Anderson production beyond mere kiddie fare.

Using an artificial larynx made for post-operative throat cancer victims, XL-5 co-pilot Robert the Robot was voiced by an uncredited Gerry Anderson, the only character he did this for in any of his series! XL-5 was named after Castrol XL motor oil because Anderson just liked the sound of it! "Product Placement" wouldn't exist for another few decades.

Saturday 10:20 am

PLANET PATROL (originally titled "Space Patrol")

To not be confused with the adventures of Rocky Jones from the 1950s American show with the same name, "Space Patrol" was re-christened "Planet Patrol" for U.S. audiences.

1950s British children's author ROBERTA LEIGH gave GERRY ANDERSON's fledgling A.P. Films their big break to turn her ADVENTURES OF TWIZZLE and TORCHY THE BATTERY BOY stories into puppet films for British television.

When Anderson declined Leigh's offer to produce a second season of Torchy, his partner ARTHUR PROVIS amicably split from AP to produce it with Leigh. Leigh and Provis later started on "Space Patrol" when Anderson began production on Fireball. Draw your own conclusions as to the timing.

General similarities aside, "Space Patrol" is unique, employing science fiction concepts such as cryogenics for the long journeys between planets in our solar system, alien crew members working with humans (it is rumoured that GENE RODDENBERRY's inspiration for Vulcans and Klingons came from S.P.'s Venusians and Martians, respectively), non-rocket propulsion, aliens that are truly alien, the effects of micro-gravity and more: All in a 1963 kids' show! With a much lower budget than Anderson's, "Space Patrol's" production values lagged behind Fireball's, but its originality made up for it, making the show one of BABYLON 5 creator J. MICHAEL STRACZYNSKI's childhood favorites.

Saturday 10:45 am

HERCULOIDS

This 1967 Hanna-Barbera adventure cartoon's opening narration says it all:

"Somewhere out in space live The Herculoids...Zok the laser-ray dragon! Igoo the giant rock ape! Tundro the tremendous! Gloop and Gleep, the formless fearless wonders! With Zandor their leader, and his wife, Tarra, and son, Dorno, they team up to protect their planet from sinister invaders! All-strong! All-brave! All-heroes!! They are The Herculoids!!!"

Zandor, Zok, Igoo & Tundro were voiced by Hanna-Barbera's ubiquitous MIKE ROAD, best remembered as the voice of RACE BANNON from H-B's JONNY QUEST (1964). He bears no physical resemblance to Zandor nor Bannon as evidenced by his appearance as "Tony Millionaire" in the I DREAM OF JEANNIE episode "How do you beat Superman?" Fortunately, Road also bears no resemblance to UGH, THE CAVEMAN whom he also voiced for H-B's DINO BOY IN THE LOST VALLEY cartoons from 1966's SPACE GHOST!

Saturday 11:05 am

THUNDARR the Barbarian

Created and initially written by STEVE GERBER (whose HOWARD THE DUCK fared better as a Marvel comic book than as a feature film) & designed by comics legends ALEX TOTH and JACK KIRBY, this 1980 Ruby-Spears animated adventure's narrated introduction summed it up:

"The year: 1994. From out of space comes a runaway planet, hurtling between the Earth and the Moon, unleashing cosmic destruction! Man's civilization is cast in ruin!

Two thousand years later, Earth is reborn...

A strange new world rises from the old: a world of savagery, super science, and sorcery. But one man bursts his bonds to fight for justice! With his companions Ookla the Mok and Princess Ariel, he pits his strength, his courage, and his fabulous Sunsword against the forces of evil.

He is Thundarr, the Barbarian!"


THE AMAZING SPIDER-MAN (1977 Live-Action)

Not aware of this show? Don't judge it too harshly: It was the late 70s, after all. In interviews at the time, MARVEL COMICS icon STAN LEE criticized the series as "too juvenile", while being credited as Script Consultant on each episode!

Saturday 12:15 pm

SPIDER-MAN (1967 Animated)

The original cartoon with the catchy theme song! "The Power of Dr. Octopus" & "Sands of Crime" pre-date when SF&F scribe LIN CARTER demonstrated his "hack" credentials on Season 2 with stories that go beyond the pale for ol' Web-Head. Animation was on par with the writing and production by RALPH BAKSHI operated with no budget. Still, it WAS popular...



Saturday 12:40 pm

SPIDER-MAN (2003 CGI)

Unaware of this as well? Set between the events of the first two blockbuster movies, this series ran once on MTV, expanding character development and Spidey's rogues gallery for satisfying results. With NEIL PATRICK HARRIS (Starship Troopers, DR HORRIBLE'S SING-ALONG BLOG) as Peter Parker/Spider-Man and heavy-metal singer/film director ROB ZOMBIE as Dr. Curt Connors/The Lizard.

Saturday 1:00 pm IS IT REAL OR JUST TELEVISION?

MAX HEADROOM

TV journalist Edison Carter (MATT FREWER) discovers the truth behind a deadly TV technology called "Blipverts". To find out what he knows, the bad guys scan his mind and upload it to a computer program, inadvertantly creating Max, his alter-ego who exists solely in the digital realm.

This pilot episode from the 1987 British-produced series for ABC-TV was re-shot from the 1985 cyberpunk television movie, "MAX HEADROOM: 20 MINUTES INTO THE FUTURE" produced for Britain's Channel 4. These should not be confused with THE MAX HEADROOM SHOW, which was a music video and interview program that ran on CINEMAX around this same time when Max was a major pitchman for Coca-Cola in the mid-1980s.

Saturday 1:45 pm

STAR TREK: THE ANIMATED SERIES

"The Slaver Weapon" by LARRY NIVEN is for all you SF literati out there and "More Tribbles, More Troubles" by DAVID GERROLD, featuring the return of Cyrano Jones and a new breed of tribble, is for everyone else! This FILMATION series was the only Star Trek show to ever win an EMMY (Outstanding Entertainment - Children's Series in 1975).


Besides Cyrano Jones, actor STANLEY ADAMS also portrayed TYBO, THE CARROT MAN in the worst LOST IN SPACE episode ever made: "The Great Vegetable Rebellion"! Believe it or not, a Tybo action figure actually exists!

Saturday 2:30 pm ANIME FOR SF&F FANS WHO OTHERWISE HATE ANIME!

Think of it this way: All Single Malt Whisky from Scotland is Scotch. Not all Scotch is a Single Malt. Some are blends. All Scotch is Whisky. But, not all Whisky is Scotch. If you enjoy Single Malt Scotch, you might not enjoy Bourbon, Rye, Canadian or blended Scotch whiskies.

Therefore, while all animated science fiction from Japan is anime, not all anime is science fiction, nor is all science-fiction anime for all science-fiction fans. Consider our anime selections as Single Malt Scotch selected for mature Single Malt Scotch drinkers.

Chosen with great care for their writing and beautiful, somewhat realistic animation styles, these episodes can be enjoyed independently from the rest in their respective series.

NOWHERE MAN



During its run, the concept & mood of this series drew many comparisons to THE PRISONER.

PATRICK McGOOHAN is NATO secret agent JOHN DRAKE in this first episode ever aired of the half-hour British spy series. Later seasons of one-hour episodes saw Drake working for the enigmatic British agency M9, with no explanation for the change.

Some exteriors for this episode set in Italy were actually filmed on the grounds of the Hotel Portmerion in Wales, which would later serve as "The Village" for McGoohan's later series, THE PRISONER. As THE PRISONER is classed as science-fiction, if you conclude that NUMBER 6 is Drake, you have DANGER MAN's SF connection!

THE MIDDLEMAN

Smart, plucky, struggling artist Wendy Watson keeps her head and her wits when a giant tentacled monster invades her temp job, only to find herself recruited to apprentice "The Middleman", a freelance fixer of "exotic problems". Mad scientists, monsters and mayhem! Snappy dialogue with more fannish media references than you can keep up with! The only thing missing is BIFF! BAM! POW! on the screen!

Based on VIPER COMICS' comic book, it didn't find a wide audience on ABC-FAMILY Channel in 2008, but has survived on DVD.

THE TICK

After FOX-TVs Saturday morning success with three seasons of animated adventures (1994-7) based on the hilarious comic book, a live-action series was greenlit in 2001, produced by BARRY SONNENFELD that starred PATRICK WARBURTON (the voice of VENTURE BROS. bodyguard Brock Samson), with NESTOR CARBONELL (LOST's Richard Alpert) as BAT-MANUEL. Unlike "The Tick" himself, it would not prove to be "nigh invulnerable", as a change in FOX executives kept 7 of these 9 very funny episodes of comical superheroics on the shelf for two years.

Bowing to fans' pressure, FOX eventually aired them and did what programming executives do when they want to kill a show: Shift it around so fans could not find it, forcing poor ratings to justify cancellation. Even if it had been successful, it would have been nigh impossible to reunite the cast and crew after two years. Thankfully, the complete 9 episode series is on DVD.


THE INVADERS

How does one convince an unsuspecting world that a nightmare has already begun? 1950s McCarthyist creeping paranoia ala "Invasion of the Body Snatchers" was back in style in this 1967 series! ROY THINNES awakens in his car to witness a saucer landing, complete with aliens that look, sound & act just like us, leave no trace when they die and apparently have infiltrated all levels of society. Tense drama as you'd expect from A QUINN MARTIN PRODUCTION.

HORROR, INCORPORATED featuring TALES OF FRANKENSTEIN

In a world of 500+ cable channels, HDTV and DVRs, it is hard to imagine that Twin Cities homes once had only three broadcast networks & a local independent station available to them and nothing even resembling a VCR! In those days, Twin Cities television stations did not broadcast between midnight and 6 a.m. But, in 1969, one began to push that boundary past 2 a.m., but only on weekends. That pioneer was KSTP.



And what could be more fitting for that new [experimental] late-nite audience, than creepy old horror movies? With a little imagination, KSTP devised a simple, but brilliant one-minute framing device that set the mood before the movie began and reminded you to tune in again next week when it was over. It was called...HORROR. INCORPORATED.

While a bit shorter than the films that ran on HORROR, INCORPORATED back in the early 1970s, TALES OF FRANKENSTEIN is perfectly suited to showcase that framing device which we present as a bit of retro fun & a rare treat for those who remember it!

TALES OF FRANKENSTEIN

HAMMER FILMS, in association with Columbia Pictures, shot this pilot in 1958 for a proposed TVseries that was scrapped because the two studios could not agree on the basic thrust of the series.

Directed by CURT SIODMAK (who wrote "The Wolf Man" (1941) and "Earth vs The Flying Saucers" (1956) for the screen), its visual style is more Classic Universal Horror than Hammer Gothic from the latter's then-recent resurrection of Universal's Frankenstein and Dracula feature film franchises. The floating head narrator that opens this pilot is directly lifted from Universal's 1940s INNER SANCTUM horror movie series.







Minicon 46 marks Riverfolk's 9th consecutive appearance at Minicon. They must know somebody.



"I think of myself as an ambassador for Canadian folk and filk music" and those who have heard him in concert agree. "Music is for sharing, I love to jam with folks and get everyone singing" and this he has been doing for the past twenty five years at conventions throughout North America. Dave has been a GOH at many cons including the British and German filk conventions, has won two Pegasus "best performer" awards and is an inductee of the "Filk Hall of Fame". Even so, Dave considers Keycon in Winnipeg and Minicon in Minneapolis his home conventions and attends whenever his rambles allow. And why "Decadent"? For that tale, ask Karen Cooper.




"We're all bozos on this bus!"


