TIM POWERS: ECLECTIC LITERARY TASTES Writer Co-Guest of Honor, Bubonicon 45

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Although Tim Powers was born in Buffalo, NY, in 1952, he grew up in the southern California suburb of La Mirada. He was educated, at least partly, in Catholic schools, but a good deal of his literary education came at an early age, reading Lovecraft, Leiber and Heinlein as a fairly steady diet. His mother's journal reveals that he was reading Robert Louis Stevenson's "The Bottle Imp" at eight years old. When Tim was reading Stevenson, I was 10 years old, living across town in Anaheim, reading Burroughs, Verne and Wells. When we ran into each other for the first time in college during the early 1970s (I was a hippy surfer at the time), we shared a slightly offbeat understanding of the world that destined us for friendship and for the literary life. We were both writing immense plotless novels in those days, without much purpose beyond spectacle and easy laughs, and by then our writing was informed by what had become wide and eclectic literary tastes. The literature that we were reading at the university had gotten forever entangled with the literature of the Hollow Earth and the Lurking Fear, and neither of us has made much effort to disentangle it since.

Tim rode an old motorcycle back then held together, literally, with pipe cleaners and duct tape. By the time it was stolen, about 10 years later, it was a museum piece, and rumor has it that a mutual friend, concerned that the motorcycle had finally become a threat to Tim's life, *hired* someone to steal it. One of my clearest memories from 35 years ago is of Tim's motorcycle throttling down as he rounded the corner from Main Street onto 16th on a rainy night, lit by streetlamps, the old Trailways bus station as a backdrop, a half dozen of us already up in his apartment drinking Tim's beer and scotch, and Tim, home from work late, pushing in through the door soaking wet but with a half dozen Canary Island eigars safe under his coat. But I'm getting ahead of myself....

In college and in the years right afterward, Tim worked in different pizza places, finally quitting to live as a writer when he sold *The Skies Discrowned* to Laser Books for 1,200 dollars – good money in those days, you'll say. In fact it was not. Tim ate a lot of Swanson's pies, and the curtains on his windows were big, roll-down maps that he'd salvaged from a university classroom. His furniture was as various as the thousands of books on the tilting shelves.

By then he was living in the Santa Ana apartment where he lived until some 14 years ago, in an old neighborhood adjacent to the French Street historic district. The neighborhood back then was decayed but cheerfully eccentric; Tim's end of it was known as "Alville," so named for Tim's (and very shortly Tim and Serena's) landlord, who owned much of the surrounding couple of blocks. For years, K.W. Jeter lived right down the street, and so did Phil Dick. I lived a couple of miles away in downtown Orange. As for Tim's apartment, in the winter there'd be rain through the perpetually leaking roof, caught in strategically placed pots, pans and Styrofoam ice chests. In the fall and spring, the Santa Ana winds would blow in through the perpetually open, unscreened windows. Other things came through those windows, too; it wasn't rare for a possum or yellow jacket or enormous fig beetle to come in. On summer nights we'd sit out on the garage roof and watch rats as big as footballs run past on telephone wires.

In 1980, Tim and Serena were married, and Serena turned the Santa Ana apartment into a cheerful clutter of wonderful things, restoring the wooden floor moldings and door casings, installing ceramic tile, building book cases, putting up hundreds of ceramic salt and

pepper shakers and comical heads and pictures of dancing toads. Thev turned the yard into a carefully laid out jungle of ginger, moon cactus. herbs and grapevine, Tim painted a sign of a grinning moon, and



they hung it over the garage roof. All of this magical stuff lent the apartment an aura of strange juju, a doorin-the-back-of-the-wardrobe quality in a neighborhood where much of the existing magic was dwindling. Tim and Serena piloted Alville through increasingly dangerous shoal water for years, keeping that whole end of 16th Street afloat. But urban renewal, among other things, hastened decay in the neighborhood, and by the time they moved to San Bernardino in the late 90s, the area was more ominous than eccentric: gunfire at night, gangs, a fairly continual parade of prostitutes and street lunatics up and down Main Street while businessmen in suits occupied nearby high-rise banks and the crackmobile did a land-office business in the alley.

Even in its deteriorated state, though, the neighborhood provided much of the stuff of Tim's novels. When they moved out I was happy about it, since it had become more likely that the thing crawling in through the window at night was considerably more dangerous than a possum.

The rural neighborhood out in Muscoy, where Tim and Serena have lived since is no less eccentric. There are grizzled Hells Angels driving up and down the main drag, and all of the homes have acre-sized lots. There aren't many sidewalks, and backyards are an acre big, with fruit trees and windbreaks of cottonwood and eucalyptus. Goats and chickens sneak over from next door to eat Serena's flowers and vegetables. There's a rumor in the neighborhood that a dead cow is buried somewhere on the property, standing up in its grave for some reason. No one knows why.

What happened with Tim's writing career is this: The Skies Discrowned and Epitaph in Rust were published by Laser Books in 1976. The Drawing of the Dark was published in 1979. The Anubis Gates, published in 1983, was the winner of the Philip K. Dick Memorial Award, and, of course, is one of the early, seminal Steampunk novels. Dinner at Deviant's Palace, published in 1985, also won the Phil Dick award and was a Nebula Award finalist. On Stranger Tides appeared in 1987 (and was later turned into the Disney Pirates of the Caribbean film of the same title) and The Stress of Her Regard in 1989. 1992's Last Call won the World Fantasy Award. Expiration Date, a sequel to Last Call, was published in 1996, followed by Earthquake Weather in 1997. Declare, published in 2001, won a World Fantasy Award. Three Days to Never came out in 2006, and Hide Me Among the Graves in 2012. His short story collection, The Bible Repairman and Other Stories, won the 2011 World Fantasy Award.

What's Tim writing now? I have no idea. One thing for certain, though: whatever it is will be something that only Tim Powers could write.

BRENT WEEKS: WHO ARE WE TO KNOW HIM Writer Co-Guest of Honor, Bubonicon 45

Who is Brent Weeks?

The question cannot be answered by measure of time, but by measure of humanity. For to ask "who is Brent Weeks," we must first ask, "Who are we to know Brent Weeks?"


Is he the author of bestselling books such as *The Night Angel* trilogy and *The Lightbringer* series? Of course. Are his books produced in countless countries and languages? Absolutely. Has he been nominated for many awards and earned the devotion of millions of readers who speak his name in whispers, as a dying man mutters to his children? This is known.

But it is what is unknown about Brent Weeks that makes him who he is.

Born in the rugged mountains of Montana, Brent

Weeks bent the bars on his first crib and wandered out into the snow. There, he was adopted by a clan of grizzly bears. He grew large by suckling at the teats of a two-ton Kodiak and feasting on the chewed-up carcasses of deer she emptied into his craw. When he came of age, he challenged his bear father, Ursoc the Moon-Eye, to a duel and ate his liver, thus earning the right to be called a man.

Much of Brent's skill as an author comes from stalking and devouring smaller, weaker writers. He is much-lauded for his prowess at the hunt, having accumulated a throne of the bleached bones of those who have challenged. Great magazines such as *American Emu, Mucho Mucho Mali!* and *Ta-Da: The Magazine By and For Aspiring Magicians* have been forgotten after Brent Weeks feasts upon their writers.



But a man is much more than his birth, and the legend of Brent Weeks does not end in bestseller lists and awards. It ends in fire. It ends in darkness. It ends in disaster.

Brent Weeks was the first man to land on the moon, and later, the first man to fake the moon landing so that humanity might have hope.

Brent Weeks was the founder of the East India Company and for a time was known as the "Naked Tiger" in the Raj's court. Upon heavy reflections of his sins, Brent later disbanded the Company and penned, in penance, an account of exactly how many elephants he fired out of cannons at protestors.

Brent Weeks discovered the cure for Black Plague and, wishing something to use it on, invented the Black Plague and unleashed it upon Europe, killing millions.

The Inuit tribes of Northern Alaska have twentysix different words for "Brent Weeks." Twelve of them are curses. Five are noises a woman in labor or a grandmother slipping on an ice patch makes. Exactly two are words one utters to an elder to show respect, but in a grudging sort of way, like when they break

wind at the dinner table and oh god it smells like onions but you can't say boo because he's your grandpa so you just sort of hum and say "Brent Weeks."

To know Brent Weeks is to know more than simply excellent books and a brilliant imagination. To know Brent Weeks is to know (dramatic pause) ourselves

DIANA ROWLAND: WRITE WHAT YOU KNOW Toastmistress, Bubonicon 45

There we were, a dozen of us secluded in a high in a mountain lodge, watching a slideshow presentation made up of photographs of dead and decayed bodies. By all rights this ought to be the set up for a Stephen King novel. Is this a gathering of serial killers admiring each other's work? A group of hapless co-eds being tortured by visions of the lodge's previous guests?

No, we were writers, getting the kind of detailed insider information most writers are desperate for, thanks to the one and only Diana Rowland. The photographs were her own, taken during her time working in a morgue, and she was showing us what really happens when someone gets strangled, when a body lies in a swamp for a week, and what "post-mortem lividity" really looks like. Because the last thing any writer wants when she's writing about murder is for it to be obvious she got all her info about it from *Castle*.

Diana doesn't have that problem. That would be enough to make her awesome. But she's also generous with her time and knowledge, teaching us things we'd have no other way of learning. Watching her slide show, I thought less about how I could use this information in stories and more about how very grateful I am for people like Diana who can do these terribly difficult jobs so the rest of us can live in a safer world.

Diana is the Hemingway kind of writer who has actually done a bunch of the things she writes about. And since she writes science fiction and fantasy, you really do have to wonder -- what hasn't she done? It all sounds so...plausible. When I first read about her de-

mon-summoning heroine Kara Gillian (*Mark of the Demon*), I had to wonder about what Diana was really getting up to in her basement. I've heard her describe in truly loving detail the procedure for removing brains from bodies during an autopsy -writing a series of zombie novels just seemed like a natural fit for her (*My Life as a White Trash Zombie*). "Write what you know"



Diana's got so many cool ideas, projects and things she's working on, I can't wait to see where she goes next. She's already been to so many cool places, and we're all very lucky that she's willing to share, both her real-world lives and her imaginary ones.

Diana's got stories. You'll find that out for yourself this weekend.

ALAN F. BECK: MAKING HIS OWN RULES Artist Guest of Honor, Bubonicon 45

Alan F. Beck is the kind of artist that doesn't need your rules. He makes his own. How do we know this? Let's look at that set of rules most of us refer to as "physics." Alan has no time for these flimsy concepts. That's the only explanation for his ability to seemingly be in multiple places at once at any given time. It's the only explanation for how he can seem so prolific.

For any veteran of a genre con art show of the last 10 years or more, Alan's work is a staple. As I travel from con to con doing my own circuit, it seems that Alan's work is always prominent and in demand. His stuff is everywhere because he mails his work across the country, displaying in their Art Shows, even when he can't be physically present. That's his magic trick. That's how he manages to be everywhere at once.

This blue-collar work ethic has built a steady and successful career, but it's the art itself that has built a steady and devoted audience. Look around any genre Art Show and you'll see plenty of easy visual tropes

that artists embrace in order to garner attention and sales – unicorns, dragons, cats, hot babes – and sometimes, and often regrettably, all of the above at once!

Much more rare is the artist that develops their own vocabulary and themes and consistently builds upon them while constantly experimenting beyond that scope at the same time.. Have a look at Alan's body of work billed as his "Mouseopolitan Museum of Art." It's an amazing set of work that's just begging to be collected into a single art book by a smart publisher. Alan creates homages to classic paintings, films, TV shows, books, or pop culture phenomena, replacing the humans with mice. The results are funny, charming, thoughtful, and always engaging.

Alan is the kind of fan artist who acts like such a pro that he either has outgrown the tag or has expanded it irrevocably. I'm not sure which it is, but he received a well-deserved 2009 Hugo nomination for Best Fan Artist, and his name recurs on my Hugo nomination ballots every single year for the last several.

He doesn't get caught up in being a "look at me" guy but instead let's his art and its evolution do the talking. That's an increasingly rare thing in this social media-obsessed day and age. Less "rah-rah" and more art? I wish more would follow Alan's example. It's a winning game plan, and I think that virtue will carry the day in the long run.




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
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OUR OTHER BUBONICON 45 PARTICIPANTS

DANIEL ABRAHAM has had three books published this summer – *The Tyrant's Law* as himself, *Graveyard Child* as M.L.N. Hanover, and *Abaddon's Gate* as one-half of James S.A. Corey. The second *Expanse* novel, *Caliban's War* was nominated for a Locus Award this year. He continues to live in Albuquerque with his wonderful wife, Kat, and his super-genius daughter, Scarlet.

MARIO ACEVEDO won't tell you that he's a national bestselling author. He's far too modest. When he's not in his mountain retreat finishing another pulse-pounding supernatural thriller, he's usually at an exotic locale researching details for his next story. To be sure, Mario has his superstitions. Among them: never use hexadecimal math to solve heuristic multivariable geometry, never mix-n-match white gold with platinum, and never wear antlers during deer-hunting season.

Mario's latest work is Good Money Gone, a financial thriller about the largest offshore Ponzi scheme in history: glitz, greed, high crimes and sex. Be on the lookout for his forthcoming Felix Gomez detective-vampire novel, Rescue from Planet Pleasure. He also is working on a YA novel, University of Doom.

DR. DOUG BEASON is the author of 14 books – eight with collaborator Kevin J. Anderson, including *Ignition* (bought by Universal Studios' Joe Singer, producer of *Mercury Rising*), *Ill Wind* and *The Trinity Paradox* – as well as two non-fiction books, including his most recent, *The E-Bomb*.

A Nebula Award finalist, Doug has published over 100 short stories and works in publications as diverse as Analog and Amazing Stories, to The Wall Street Journal, Physical Review Letters and Physics of Fluids. A Fellow of the American Physical Society and Ph.D. physicist, Doug retired as the Associate Laboratory Director for Threat Reduction at LANL, where he was responsible for the people and programs that reduce the global threat of weapons of mass destruction. Doug has worked on the White House staff for the President's Science Advisor under both the Clinton and Bush Administrations as the key White House staffer for space, and has served on a Vice Presidential commission to generate plans for the nation to return to the Moon and go on to Mars. He was the Principal US Representative for the US/United Kingdom/Canada Small Satellite Research and Development Program, and was recently the Chief Scientist of Air Force Space Command.

CAROL BERG grew up in neighboring Texas, but wised up and moved to Colorado when settling down time came. Though a devoted reader, she majored in mathematics at Rice University and computer science at the University of Colorado, so she wouldn't have to write papers. Somewhere in the middle of a software engineering career, she started writing for fun, and the habit ate her life.

Carol's 13 epic fantasy novels have won multiple Colorado Book Awards, the Prism Award, the Geffen Award, and the Mythopoeic Fantasy Award for Adult Literature. They've been read, so readers tell her, on five continents, on a submarine under the Mediterranean, in the war zone of Iraq, and on the slopes of Denali. *Publishers Weekly* and *Kirkus Reviews* called her Novels of the Collegia Magica things like compelling, intelligent, complex, and superbly realized. The latest is *The Daemon Prism.* Next up is a new fantasy/mystery duology about a sorcerer who draws portraits of the dead. First volume, *Dust and Light*, will be out from Roc Books in August 2014. ADAM JARMON BROWN lives in Santa Fe with his wife and daughter. They spend their free time playing with their dogs and watching *Doctor Who*.

CRAIG A. BUTLER currently is overseeing postproduction on *Rotgut*, a locally shot horror movie; just finished coordinating the 3rd Albuquerque Comic Expo; and is developing scripts for future movic projects.

AARON CAMPBELL is a guy. He's a guy that draws comics. He draws comics for a livin'. He's drawin' Uncanny right now. Once upon a time, he was drawin' The Green Hornet: Year One, Sherlock Holmes, Dark Shadows and The Shadow. But that was a while ago. They say he's the greatest thing in the history of forever, but then fellers do like to talk. He, for one, don't put no stock in it. He lives in Albuquerque.

PERI CHARLIFU was born in 1962 in Alamosa, CO, where his father was an art teacher and his mother was a social worker. He attended Metropolitan State Collage and studied art and psychology, and combined his studies using art as therapy. He now does art full time. Charlifu has been selling his work for 32 years, almost exclusively in the SF convention market for almost eight years. He teaches workshops and seminars in pottery, sculpture and theory on a regular basis. He is highly skilled in both wheel-thrown and hand-built work.

SUZY M. CHARNAS, author of The Vampire Tapestry, reports, "Life goes on, and mostly I am not complaining. A couple of months from birthday #75 and first published in 1974 (a symmetry with no meaning but pleasing to contemplate nonetheless), I am dealing (like many of my age cohort) with sleeping more, writing less, and spending more time on medical matters than ever in my life before. I'm looking for an e-home for a story about Judas and reincarnation, which I hope to read at Bubonicon. I'm also very happy to learn that, once again, coffee is more good for us than it is bad."

DORANNA DURGIN is actively publishing with the Nocturne paranormal line and plunging even further into backlist and independent work – still running Backlist eBooks, and newly immersed in Book view Cafe. This spring she indiereleased the entire fantasy *Changespell Saga* (including *Dun Lady's Jess*); this year also sees the start of a new Nocturne series (*Demon Blade*), and she's got original indie titles in the works. Over in the Canyon life, she's kept busy by amusing the horse (Lipizzan gelding) and dogs (Beagle packlet). Between participating in obedience, rally, agility, and tracking and writing new words, life is hard-put to get a word in edgewise. She has superstitions, but telling you would be a jinx.

At the convention you may see Doranna with a service dog: this is D'Artagnan Beagle aka Dart. Dart assists Doranna in managing the neurological effects of long-term Lyme disease, and he is a working dog.

CLAIRE EDDY is a senior editor at Tor/Forge Books and has been with the company for 28 years. She began editing science fiction and fantasy early in her career and has worked with such authors as Orson Scott Card, Gordon R. Dickson, Fred Saberhagen and Jack Vance. She also has brought out such newcomers to the fantasy scene as Jacqueline Carey, Sara Douglass and Juliet Marillier. While she still edits these genres, she has broadened her projects to include historicals, thrillers and mysteries. On the mystery side, she has worked with Stuart Kaminksy, Carole Nelson Douglas and Sharan Newman. She's spent the better part of her adult life working with authors to make their stories and dreams be the best they can be, becoming that "third eye" and nudge to accomplish this feat.

TY FRANCK is one-half of the writing team of James S.A. Corey, which had *Abaddon's Gate* released this summer. He also has contributed to the *Wild Cards* universe. He lives in Albuquerque, and serves as an assistant to a well-known author in Santa Fc.

DIANA GABALDON is the author of the Outlander

series: Nobody seems able to describe it, but luckily they seem to read it anyway. Contents include: History, warfare, medicine, Sex, Violence, spirituality, Honor, betrayal, vengeance, hope and despair, relationships, the building and destruction of families and societies, time travel, moral ambiguity, swords, herbs, horses, gambling (with cards, dice and lives), Voyages of Daring, journeys of both body and soul... you know, the usual stuff of literature. 


DEBBIE LYNN SMITH has spent most of her career writing and producing such television shows as *Touched By an*


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BUBONICON 45 ART SHOW: ESCAPE TO OTHER TIMES & PLACES

Our <u>SILENT ART AUCTION</u> runs from 5:00 pm Friday thru Noon Sunday. To open bidding on an item, write a bid & your bidder number on the attached bidsheet. The listed minimum bid must be matched or exceeded. Only whole dollar amounts are accepted. All written bids are considered to be in earnest. Check your bid often – you may need to enter a higher bid to keep in the running. Pre -emptive bids are encouraged...and more fun! The highest bid on a piece at 12 Noon Sunday is the winning bid. After we close at Sunday, we will collate the "sold" items. Beginning at 3:00 pm Sunday, we will release "sold" art. We'll be assisting one patron at a time during this final reckoning, so we appreciate your patience.

QUICK SALES: A piece of art may be purchased using the Quick Sale option <u>if no other bid has been entered</u> on an item. Quick Sale options vanish once any bid is made. Quick Sales are encouraged for items you really want. To make a Quick Sale purchase, ask one of us to assist you. ALL art stays up until Sunday. Hang onto your receipts and we will see you 3:00-5:00 pm Sunday, when we release sold artwork. This year marks the second time the Art Show will take credit card payments for purchases. Ask us about that payment option.

<u>BIDDER NUMBERS:</u> Following their success the past few years, we are using bidder numbers again for identification. By updating your contact information, you can keep your old bidder number. New Art Show patrons can easily sign up for a bidder number. We will have a Self-Serve Bidder Number station to help make this process quicker and smoother. All contact information will remain confidential. Use of bidder numbers will allow bids to be confidential (especially when shopping for presents), and should end confusion that arises from illegible or varying names being used by patrons. The only times the contact information will be used is on the occasion we need to contact a patron.

PRINT SHOP: Need instant gratification? Check out the goods in our Print Shop. You will find unframed printed works by various artists. Prints from the Print

Shop may be taken immediately after purchase.




