## What is a NorthAmericon and why are we holding one?

A number of fans have asked us one or both of the above questions since we began bidding for the continental convention. It's not surprising that many fans are curious about these two points, for the concept of a continental science fiction convention is relatively new on this side of the globe. After all, the world convention is older than most of us who attend it, but the first official North American SF con was not held until 1975. NorthAmericon '79 will be the second.

All of the early worldcons were hosted by North American sites, making a separate contintental convention both unnecessary and inappropriate. As fandom became more cosmopolitan, the worldcon began to rotate to other parts of the planet with increasing regularity. Today, mere oceans constitute no barrier to the movement of the worldcon, and it has become truly a world convention. But because many fans are unable to travel halfway around the globe to attend a con so far from their homes, there arose a desire to have a contintental convention in those years when the worldcon was overseas. The World Science Fiction Society eventually decided to sanction such a convention, which came to be known as the NASFIC (short for North American Science Fiction Interim Convention). The term NASFIC has been the source of some confusion, so we have chosen to use the more self-explanatory name NorthAmericon.

As mentioned above, the first occasion for an official NorthAmericon came in 1975, when the worldcon was held in Australia. Two weeks after AussieCon, the NASFIC took place in Los Angeles. With the advent of a strong British bid for the 1979 worldcon, it became apparent that that year might offer the next opportunity for a North American convention. A bidding committee of fans from Louisville, Nashville, and Columbus was formed to promote the idea of holding a NorthAmericon in Louisville. As expected, the site selection session of the 35th World Science Fiction Convention (SunCon) awarded the '79 worldcon to Brighton, England and a continental convention to Louisville.

Hosting a major convention with such a short history has special advantages and special problems. Among the advantages is the freedom from rigidly established traditions, required events, and general fannish inertia. Ironically, this is also one of the problems. Fandom doesn't know quite what to expect from us, and is therefor entitled to ask questions about our policies and plans. And those questions deserve answers.

As we stated in our bidding material, our purpose is to complement, not compete with the worldcon. The worldcon is the most important event on the science fiction calendar and takes priority over all other conventions. If you cannot attend both the worldcon and the NorthAmericon, we want you to give preference to the worldcon. For many fans on this side of the Atlantic, however, the trip to Brighton is not feasible; in this case NorthAmericon is a realistic alternative. But we are more than just an alternative. Since the two conventions are held over separate weekends, energetic fans will find it possible to attend We hope that many will do just that. Toward this end, we are considering plans to arrange a charter flight from England directly to Louisville during the three-day interval between the conventions. Check future progress reports for detailed developments.

NorthAmericon may be something less than the worldcon, but is far more than a regional. Our central location is accessible to all parts of the continent, so we can expect to have representatives from every fannish region. Our program will feature items which have proved popular at previous major conventions—masquerade, banquet, elaborate art show, a bewildering array of huckster tables, extensive film program—all the usual Good Stuff, plus some special events, such as the riverboat cruise.

To say that a major convention is the work of its committee alone is a foolish statement, and we certainly don't plan to fall into that trap. Although we have a lot of ideas of our own, we solicit yours as well. We're always open to suggestions, constructive criticism, and general discussion of what a NorthAmericon should be.

During the next year or so, the committee members listed inside the front cover will be attending conventions over as wide an area as possible. Stop any one of us at any time. We'll be glad to talk to you about NorthAmericon—and even more glad to hear you talk about it.

#### *Masquei*ade

What would a major convention be without a masquerade? We're planning on devoting considerable attention to the needs of both participants and spectators. Rules, registration procedures, etc. will be forthcoming in a later progress report; in the meantime, any ideas about masquerade arrangements are most welcome.

#### Banquet

A banquet, with all the inevitable speeches and presentations, is scheduled for Sunday afternoon, but of course it's too early for any details to be available.

#### Program

Formal programming will begin on Thursday afternoon and continue through Monday afternoon; into this four-day period, we plan to pack a full range of entertaining and enlightening events. In case you haven't gotten the idea from previous paragraphs, we are very receptive to any suggestions you may have concerning program features. Naturally we have some definite (and very special) ideas of our own that are now being developed, but we want to make sure that the desires and preferences of you the convention member are fully included.

#### River boat Cruise

Since the Galt House overlooks the majestic Ohio River, and since the authentic old-time riverboat, the Belle of Louisville, docks right at the base of the hotel, it only makes sense to take advantage of the situation. We have booked the Belle for a Sunday night cruise up the Ohio and will be presenting fannish entertainment in her Grand Ballroom as she steams along her way. Watch for more details as they develop!

#### Art Show

The NorthAmericon Art Show and Auction will be run by Ken and Lou Moore, who are also handling the show for Iguanacon this year. Artists desiring information on exhibiting at NorthAmericon can write to Ken and Lou at 647 Devon Drive, Nashville, TN 37220, or telephone non-collect 615-832-8402.

#### **Volunteers**

3. "Take a Pro Out": Any pro—writer, artist, or editor—for whatever meal the pro chooses. Write in who you want and a limited group will get to take a willing pro out.


