Many of the authors in the program schedule and listed above will be reading from their own work during the Author's Forum, which will run throughout the convention and is being organized by Gale Burnick. Also, many will participate in Waldenbooks' autographing sessions. Schedules for both these ongoing events will be available at the con.

The NorthAmericon film program will begin each evening following the final program item in the Archibald Room and will continue until near dawn. At the present time, our plans call for showing a number of older films in 16mm and quite a few recent movies in 35mm. Titles and times will be published and posted at the convention. In addition, we have arranged for a special North American premiere of a brand new fantasy adventure film. There is a possibility that this premiere will be shown in a downtown theatre a few blocks from the hotel.

A lot of fans don't realize how many dedicated volunteer workers it takes to operate a large convention smoothly and efficiently. We have signed up people to cover the important responsibilities of North-Americon, but there are a number of jobs in almost every department where extra hands are wanted. This is where you come in. You can volunteer to spend as many or as few hours per day as you are willing to contribute. If you have any special skills or talents (e.g., can you run a projector, repair a costume, or administer first aid?) or just have general experience in helping out at other conventions, we'd like to hear from you. On the other hand, if you've never done this sort of thing before, but are willing to pitch in wherever needed, your services will also be greatly appreciated.

To volunteer, send us a note with the following information: 1. Your name, address, and phone number; 2. Any experience or skills which will help us find the best position for you; 3. What areas of the convention are you most interested in working on (headquarters, operations, films, art show, masquerade, blood drive, program coordinating, etc.) If you are willing to be a general helper in any area, just write "general" for this item; 4. How many hours and what times of day you will be available.

Feel free to add any further information you think will aid us in placing you. Remember, however, that enthusiasm and dependability are the most important qualifications for most of these jobs. We hope to be hearing from you.

### Masquerade

The Masquerade at NorthAmericon promises to be a grand pageant of Masquers, Monsters, and Magic to begin an evening of Make-Believe. There have been a few revisions in scheduling since the last progress report, so please note carefully the changes in times.

The Masquerade will be held in the Archibald Room of the Galt House on Saturday evening, September 1, at 7:30. All Masquers must assemble in the Water Poet Room for pre-judging by 6:00 P. M. Cool drinks and cool air will be available, but remember, you're going to be in costume for at least three hours; how uncomfortable you want to be is up to you. We will try to have a repair service available for last minute rips and tears, and we'll do our best to accomodate you if you need a chair to sit on, a bed to lie on, or a tether to anchor you down.

Any member of NorthAmericon who has registered for the Masquerade in advance is eligible. You must turn in a completed entry form before 1:30 P. M., Saturday. Sorry, but <u>NO</u> late registrations will be entered. Information sheets and entry forms will be available at the convention registration desk at all hours. Advance copies of the forms, as well as information about the layout of the Archibald Room, etc. can be obtained by writing to the Masquerade Manager.

If you require special lighting, special music or other effects, PLEASE let us know in advance. If you are bringing your own effects (smoke, flash pots, etc.), they must be checked with the Stage Manager by 3:00 P. M. Saturday so that they can be installed on stage before the masquerade begins. All music or sound must be on standard-sized casettes pre-taped to include 5 seconds of silent lead-in before the sound begins. ALL SPECIAL PRESENTATIONS WILL BE LIMITED TO ONE (1) MINUTE IN DURATION. PERIOD!

We are going to try to make this Masquerade as much fun for the Masquers as for the audience, which means smoothing out as many glitches as possible in advance. Any questions will be promptly answered by writing to the Masquerade Manager.

Since there is room for only 750 aboard the steamer, be sure not to miss the boat--buy your ticket early.



### Our Worldcon Philosophy

We are not Ringling Brothers, Barnum & Bailey. With a massive ad campaign and a StarWars-type promotion, we probably <u>could</u> deliver an extravaganza that would fill the site of the 1962 Seattle World's Fair. But avoiding such megalomaniacal by schemes, avoiding local advertising, and using escalating membership rates, we can host the kind of WorldCon you want -- a reasonably-sized fannish convention with emphasis on literary science fiction.

In order to provide a great Worldcon, we have been meeting regularly since 1976 to plan operations, programming, publications, and all of the other aspects for which we are resonsible. We want the attendees at the Seattle Worldcon to be free to enjoy their convention. It is a big job, to be sure, but we wouldn't be willing to take it on unless we were absolutely certain that we could handle it. We are confident that we can.

We see the WorldCon as an organized meeting place for old friends and new, with activities catering to the needs of the attendees. We want the warm friendly atmosphere of a fan orientated literary convention. We feel that this is what the fan who attends a Worldcon should expect to receive from his hosts... and we intend to provide exactly that!



### Our Worldcon Facilities

The Seattle WorldCon Committee has reserved the beautiful Red Lion Inn for the site of the 1981 convention. The Red Lion's 35,000 square feet of function space will easily accomodate the fannish WorldCon we are planning, and it is all indoors! The 14,000 square foot Universe Ballroom and the 7,000 sq. ft. Galaxie Ballroom are complemented by a host of Saturn, Mercury and Apollo rooms with capacities of 25 to 400 fans. There are 72,000 square feet of meeting space in the Red Lion and adjacent hotels, of which 51,680 are currently committed to the Seattle WorldCon.

The Red Lion has more than 700 guest rooms, and an additional 1400 rooms are available in nearby hotels and still more are under construction.

The Red Lion's new tower makes it the largest hotel in the Northwest. The guest rooms are large and luxurious, and the architecture (glasswalled elevators, large terraced pool) is both contemporary and elegant. With three restaurants and two lounges, the Red Lion is everything a WorldCon Hotel should be!

But that is not all! The location is so convenient to Seattle-Tacoma International Airport that you can walk between them if you wish, though free shuttle service is provided. For drivers, there are acres of FREE PARKING available. The pool courtyard and the rustic newn-timber passageways offer dozens of furnished alcoves ideal for those ubiquitous fangatherings.



### America's Most Livable City

The best time to visit Seattle is late August and early September, with mild and sunny weather. Think about planning your vacation here, since it might be hard to go home without seeing everything, and we've got everything.


It's a twenty minute drive to downtown Seattle. Park in back of the Pike Market, local Place our farmer's and fantabulous market craftsplace. Find real foods and fresh crumpets. Then follow the signs to the Seattle aquarium. Farther down the waterfront is the Washington State Ferry Terminal, including one that goes Bremerton, home of the p Missouri. Uphill from the out to battleship Missouri. Ferry Terminal is Pioneer Square, the original center of Seattle, and Pioneer Square is the underneath Underground Seattle Tour, from when Seattleites rebuilt on the ruins after the great fire of 1890.

Seattle Center, site of the '62 World's Fair, can be reached by monorail (the Golden Age lives!) Aside from the open air concerts, there's the Pacific Science Center, with hands-on type exhibits. The Seattle Art Museum in Volunteer Park is known for the Asian collection. The University of Washington arboretum is as beautiful as it is educational. Or, tour the Boeing 747 final assembly plant. And there are so many restaurants, cafes and expresso shops....

Seattle is between Lake Washington and Puget Sound, for great sailing, boating and fishing. Set between the Cascades and the Olympic Mountains, there are trails for hiking and mountaineering. And Olympic National Park has the only temperate rain forest in this world.

We think you'll enjoy your stay in the Pacific Northwest.



As we've said before, we expect NorthAmericon members to fill the Galt House's 700-plus rooms, so we've arranged with the hotel for a flat \$35 per night for either single or double occupancy. (There's an additional \$5.00 per night charge for each person over two in the room.) We urge you to reserve your room right away if you have not yet done so, because the convention's block of rooms will not be held after August 9, at which time reservations will be accepted from the general public if any rooms remain unbooked. Please use the hotel reservation cards sent to each pre-registered member, or you may phone the hotel direct at 502-589-5200. One night's deposit is required by the hotel for confirmation of your reservation. (Credit card numbers will not be accepted for <u>deposit</u>, although they will of course be accepted for payment at the convention when registering for your room.

Unfortunately, the Galt House has recently begun installing coinoperated ice machines, so those persons requiring large quanities of ice are advised to contact the hotel staff. We will also have available the address of a 24-hour icehouse that will probably be cheaper.

The floor plan at right will show you where most of the major convention activities will be located. A more detailed version of this map will be published in the program book.



## **GETTING HERE**

For anyone driving into Louisville, the directions below and the map at right should direct you painlessly to the Galt House.

#### From I-65 Southbound:

Take St. Louis-3rd St. Exit just after crossing bridge. Move quickly to right lane and exit at 3rd St. Follow ramp to River Rd. Cross River Rd. on 3rd St. and continue to Main St. Turn right on Main, go one block, turn right again on 4th St. Enter right hand ramp, then bear left to parking garage.

#### From I-65 Northbound:

Take St. Louis-3rd St. Exit before crossing bridge. Exit at 3rd St. and follow directions above for I-65 Southbound.

From I-64 Westbound:

Remain on I-64 (St. Louis). Exit at 3rd St. and follow directions above.

#### From I-64 Eastbound:

Exit at 9th St. Turn left on Market St. at foot of ramp. Take Market St. 5 blocks to 4th St. Turn left on 4th St. and continue 1 1/2 blocks to hotel.

#### From I-71 Westbound:


Take I-64-St. Louis Exit. Follow I-64 to 3rd St. Exit. Exit at 3rd St. and follow directions as in "I-65 Southbound" above.

If you are flying in and arriving at Standiford Field, limosine service is available to the Galt House for \$2.50 per person. (Due to the gasoline situation, however, we could get no guarantee that the price will stay the same for the next two months.) This service is <u>not</u> available on weekends. Regular cab fare from the airport to the hotel (and viceversa) is approximately \$7.50.

The Greyhound Bus Station is at 7th St. and Muhammed Ali Blvd., and is about six blocks from the hotel.



## **Short Notes**

During NorthAmericon, the city of Louisville will be holding the International Heritage Festival on the Belvedere (the park next to the Galt House). Jointly sponsored by ten ethnic groups, the Festival promises to be great fun. If you would like to hear a mariachi band, dance a polka, sample exotic food and drink, or just escape from the convention for a little while, just step outside the hotel door. Admission to the festival is free and will be held from noon until dusk Friday through Monday.

Drinking age in Kentucky and Indiana is 21. This includes beer and wine, as well as the "hard stuff." Keep this in mind if you venture out of the hotel. On the subject of vices, if you're a smoker of tobacco and are from out of state, you can buy cigarettes in Kentucky for about \$4,00 a carton.

The main program areas will be divided into smoking and nonsmoking areas. Please observe the signs. Smoking of course will not be permitted at any time in either the Art Show or the Huckster Room. We also ask that no one smoke while food is being served at the banquet.
