THE ENDEAVOUR AWARD

The Endeavour Award for a distinguished Science Fiction or Fantasy novel written by a Pacific Northwest author(s) will be presented for the first time this November, for a book published during 1998. The award will include a statue and a cash grant of at least \$500, and will be announced at OryCon in Portland, Oregon.

Final judges for this year's award: John Barnes – Ed Bryant – Esther Friesner

Deadline for books published during 1999: February 15, 2000

If you are a SF/F writer living in the Pacific Northwest [Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Alaska, and British Columbia], or know of a novel published by a Pacific Northwest writer, help us ensure that it is nominated for the Endeavour Award.

ELIGIBILITY: To be eligible for the award, a work must be an original science fiction or fantasy novel published—either as a hardcover or paperback—for the first time in the United States or Canada during the calendar year preceding the giving of the award. The publication date shall be the official date of publication, and not the date the book first appears on the stands.

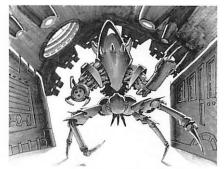
Eligible novels must be at least 40,000 words long, and must be generally available to the public in print. Comic books or graphic novels are not eligible.

Harry Turtledove

S.M. Stirling

Harry Turtledove is a member of an endangered minority group—he was born and raised in Southern California. In the land people go *to*, he is a *from*. This streak of stubborn nonconformity has stayed with him all his life.

Originally he wanted to be an engineer, but reading Sprague de Camp's classic time-travel novel *Lest Darkness Fall* hooked him on... Byzantine history!

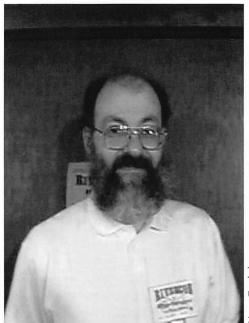
So Harry went on to a Ph.D in Byzantine history, aquiring along the way the Classical languages and a beard. This degree qualified him for a decade's service as a civil servant in Los Angeles, but none of his friends really hold his bureaucratic past against him. Much. Although some of us have been known to absentmindedly ask him for an easement permit.

Harry's first stories were fantasies set in a quasi-Roman-Mycenaean world, and published under the name "Eric Ivarson"... because the publisher thought that "Harry Turtledove" wouldn't be credible. This shows you how much *publishers* know. Selah.

It was with the "Videssos Cycle," set in an alternate Byzantium, that Harry first made his mark on the field under his own name. They involved dumping part of a Roman legion from Caesar's time into the world of Videssos, where an ancient crumbling empire, its sorcerous enemies and innumerable factions contend in... well, I have to say it, a mass of *Byzantine* complexity. In it, amid magic, mayhem, intrigue, love, death and adventure, Romans show that they can cope with (or evolve into) creditable Byzantines themselves.

Since then Harry has gone on to show himself a master of every aspect

of our field, winning implausible numhers of awards and rave reviews. He writes everything from space operahe managed to write a believable story about Earth being invaded by teddy bears with flintlocks, and if that isn't mastery, what is?-to high fantasy. Most recently, his alternate histories have helped propell that subgenre to new heights; or, where puns are concerned, new depths. Guns of the South and the Great War: American Front series have shown what can be done with meticulous research, intensely human characters, and worlds that feel much bigger than a book can rightly contain. They also set new records in terms of audacity; using Lincoln and Twain as characters, and managing to speak convincingly in their voices, is a tour de force any writer would envy.



Along the way, Harry met and married Laura Turtledove, also a scholar and writer (of some fine mysteries), and together they have produced three terrifyingly intelligent daughters, who have already produced some awardwinning writing of their own. Geneticists could study them with profit.

Harry is instantly recognizable; an immensely tall, immensely charming man with a dark beard and a gracious manner. He does, however, have one major fault for which forgiveness is nearly impossible; although prolific, he can't write nearly as fast as I can read, leaving long gaps in which the only possible acitivity is compulsive rereading of his work."

Richard Hescox ^{by} Paul Chadwick

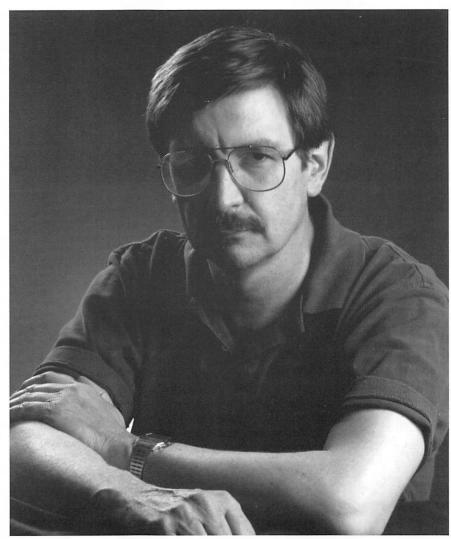
From his wistfully romantic paintings, you wouldn't expect Richard Hescox's wicked wit and curmudgeonly take on people, politics and the art world. But maybe it makes sense. What but a deep dissatisfaction with the world as it is could move a man to paint what he does, images evoking a never-was time of beauty, magic, and sensuality?

I shared a studio with Richard in the mid-80s. Rocketeer creator Dave Stevens had just moved out; William Stout, famous for his underground comix, dinosaur art and, in recent years, Antarctic paintings, had the big room in back. I wound up being present at the first of Richard's two great leaps forward.

Richard had been painting paperback covers since soon after getting his degree from Art Center College of Design in the '70s. The ones I remember most were Burroughsesque swordsmen and monsters, oil paintings with a lot of spirit but occasionally too much made-up draughtsmanship.

But the art show at the 1984 Worldcon in Anaheim, CA deeply impressed him. The art reflected the trend of tight photorealism which, alas, came to dominate the field overmuch in later years. But the degree of finish, and the obviously well-referenced figures and faces moved Richard to rededicate himself to pushing his paintings further.

The results were a blossoming of his cover painting career. He never worked again without shooting welllit reference photos, often with elaborate costumes and props. I myself was an Amazon of Darkover for one cover (as it was a winter scene, Richard was able to feminize my physique with heavy garments). He switched to acrylic paint, in which the painting of

machinery, architecture and spacecraft is much easier. And generally he took more pains

It paid off. One memorable *Locus* column suggested Michael Whelan's "crown" might well be passed to Richard Hescox. These were happy years, creatively, for Richard. Hunt down his trading card set and you'll see 90 fabulous images of masterful SF and fantasy illustration.

But the free-lance life is precarious, and with a family to support, Richard made the sober choice of finding salaried work, first on the sf animated series Spiral Zone, then in the computergaming industry. Several recent years were spent on the Arthur C. Clarke/ Gentry Lee computer game: RAMA. He now works at Sierra Games as a designer and art director.

Richard's second great leap forward in his painting has occurred in this present period. It stems from the fact, I believe, that he paints after hours now, just for himself, without clients (or cover typography) to accommodate. It's the best work of his career.

For lack of a better term, Richard calls them his "Academic" paintings. In many ways they are reminiscent of the rigorous approach to history and Orientalist paintings of the 19th century Academys of Europe. Softly painted oils of maidens, sometimes fantastical (sirens, tree nymphs, mermaids) in usually quiet scenes of antiquity, they obviously come out a deep place in his psyche that yearns for rest, beauty, and mystery.

Richard's now mining a vein that the English romantic realists of the late 1800s–J.W. Waterhouse, Arthur Hacker, Frank Dicksee, Herbert Draper, and others–first worked. Other favorites of his are the nonpareil American illustrator J.C. Leyendecker and Australian sensualist Norman Lindsay.

Richard has a clipping collection of these and other brilliant but often obscure artists that is the envy of his circle of illustrator friends. Years of combing bookstores, ephemera shows and now the Internet have produced a treasure trove of images which inspire and inform his own work.

Richard looks forward to the day when he can live solely off gallery sales and limited-edition prints of his paintings. These latter can be ordered through his web site at http:// premierl.net/~amch/

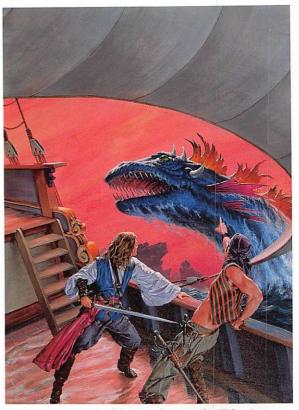

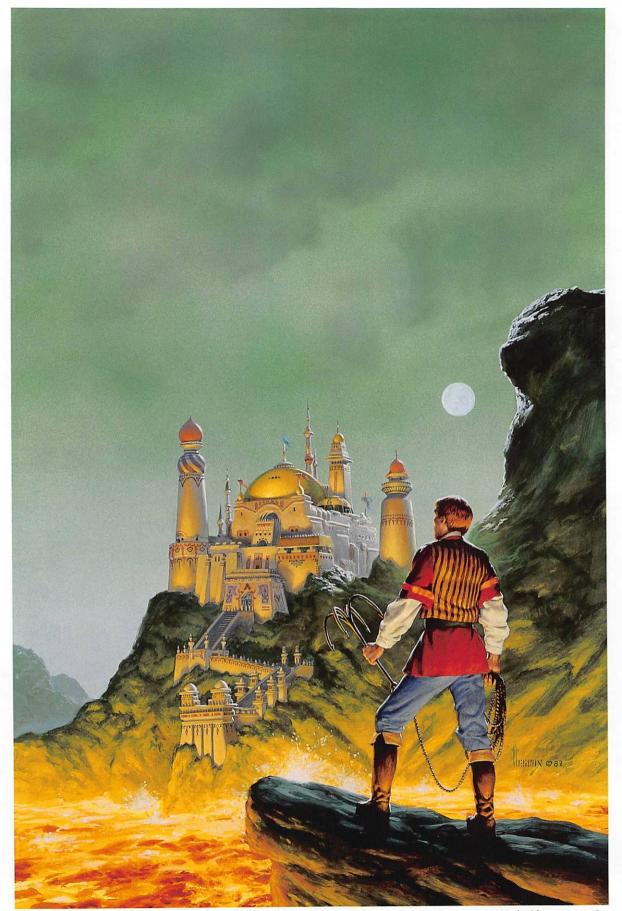

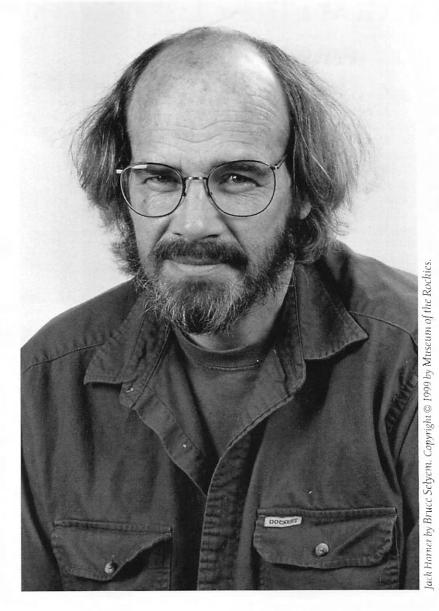

John "Jack" Horner A Short Biography

John "Jack" Horner was born June 15, 1946, raised in Shelby Montana, and attended the University of Montana where he majored in geology and zoology. In 1975, he was hired as a research assistant in the Museum of Natural History at Princeton University, where he worked until 1982. From 1982 until the present he has worked at the Museum of the Rockies in Bozeman, Montana, where he is Curator of Paleontology. Dr. Horner discovered the first dinosaur eggs in the Western Hemisphere, the first evidence of dinosaur colonial nesting, the first evidence of parental care among dinosaurs, and the lirst dinosaur embryos. Dr. Horner's research covers a wide range of topics about dinosaurs, including their behavior, physiology, ecology and evolution. Dr. Horner does not hold a formal college degree but was awarded an Honorary Doctorate of Science from the University of Montana in 1986. Also in 1986 he was awarded a MacArthur Fellowship. He has written 40 professional papers, 25 popular articles, co-authored five popular books, and coedited one technical book. His work has been featured in numerous magazines and television specials. He was the technical advisor to Steven Spielberg for the movies Jurassic Park and it's sequel, The Lost World.

I grew up a few blocks from a legendary fanzine fan (Linda Bushyager) but didn't meet her until college. I got into fandom via my old boyfriend, Tom Marcinko (best known as the author of "Star Trek, Deep Space Sein"). I didn't actually attend cons until after graduating from Penn State in 1977.

(Although I certainly tried to attend cons. Being snowed in was a perpetual winter hazard in Happy Valley, and for some reason many of the cons in the mid-Atlantic and Northeast are in the winter: Lunacon, Boskone, Philcon, and, once, memorably, Balticon, which becomes more important later in this narrative.)

But finally I had my degree, and armed with graduation present money I was in a car full of fans I had never met before, driving non-stop to Suncon in Miami Beach. I had no idea I was at a terrible con. I had a blast. Tom and I even went to the beach and nudged and ogled Robert Silverberg on a nearby beach towel. Robert Silverberg! Tom had done a paper on him for the class on science fiction we took from Phil Klass and now here he was, on the same beach, in a Speedo! Cons were truly wondrous.

(Although I did mourn slightly, heading home, that I had blown off several panels that looked interesting in favor of going to parties and talking until late at night. Obviously, I didn't know how to do cons. Surely all rightminded fans went to all these panels and blew off the parties. But I had a blast at those parties, even singing a parody of That Old Time Religion with verses I had never heard of before.)

I still didn't have a post college job (and didn't get one for another 20 years) but took some classes, found temp jobs, collected some Social Security and VA money thanks to my dad. I went to cons and crashed on floors.

One January during this period I took a Greyhound bus from State College, Pennsylvania to Ann Arbor, Michigan during a snowstorm (it took about 14 hours) to go to ConFusion. I was seeing one guy, who decided to impress me by introducing me to his writer friend, Jack Chalker. It worked. I was impressed

Over that winter a friend and I decided to run a con. (Ah, to be as naive as youth!) After being turned down by Phil Klass, I called Linda Bushyager for advice. She suggested lack Chalker. who had just sold 3 books for \$10,000. "He's so excited about being published he might pay you!" she laughed. Hmm. Well, that would certainly fit our budget.

lack Chalker, Jack Chalker, Wasn't he the writer Paul introduced me to at ConFusion? Seemed like a nice guy. What the hey. If he turns us down, maybe George Ewing will say yes.

So off I went to Lunacon (fortunately, it didn't snow that weekend) and got re-introduced to lack Chalker. And we started talking. And talking. And I ended up the second night crashing in his room instead of the puppy pile in Linda's room.

And I went back and waited for Jack to call. And waited. And finally I called him. He had lost my number. We spent the month calling back and forth, and made plans to get together a month after Lunacon, at Balticon.

Balticon was wonderful. By the time it ended, we decided I should move to Baltimore after the winter. Jack offered to drive me to Harrisburg, Pennsylvania (about an hour away) which would cut the price of my bus ticket in half. When we got to Harrisburg lack said "How much further is it?" and I told him it was about two hours more. He shrugged, said why not, and drove me the rest of the way.

As we drove through the mountains of central Pennsylvania the snow started, and kept falling ... and falling ... and falling.

Jack, of course, had to spend the night rather than drive home in the snow, and he proposed.

We had our con, which was fairly successful, and went on to have several more. I went on to do a terrible fanzine (Conventional Fanzine, great title, awful design), and run two Disclaves, one with Jack, one without. I've run more baby-sitting rooms and kid's program-

ming tracks than 1 care to think of. Even more fun was running a Hugo Awards Crab Feast for 1100 folks and running a Hugo Nominees Reception. I made mistakes doing all these things, of course, but they've always been *new* mistakes.

I'm only fertile in years ending in '01 (hmm, better have that operation next year!) so our kids are widely spaced. Dave is 17 now (and not here at Norwescon: he's a department head at Balticon, and wasn't about to blow that off just because his parents are GoHs) and Steve (who is here) is 7. (Steve shows no interest in things fannish– heck, he didn't even like dinosaurs!– but maybe it will develop.)

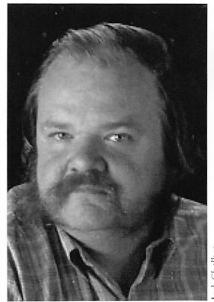

Born: 12/17/44, Baltimore, MD (although all bios and even Who's Who say Norfolk so who am I to argue with Who's Who?). It's a self-perpetuating error that has grown too large to be worth correcting. I really don't mind since I have roots and tons of family in Norfolk, anyway.

Education: Baltimore City public schools, B.S. Towson State College (now Towson University), graduate degrees from Johns Hopkins University. Although I have a strong science background, my degrees are in history and English. My graduate specialty is the "History of Ideas," which is to say I'm a certified expert on isms and ologies. I have taught history on the



high school and college levels, and am or have been a lecturer at the Smithsonian, The National Institutes of Health, and numerous colleges and universities, mostly on science fiction and technology subjects.

Occupations: Aside from the usual kid occupations, I've been a professional typesetter, a sound engineer for outdoor rock concerts, an audio and computer reviewer, free-lance editor, a publisher (founder and now sole owner of The Mirage Press, Ltd.), a book packager, an Air National Guard Information Director, new and used book dealer, and teacher as mentioned above. I was a special forces Air Commando during the Vietnam war period but never served west of Amarillo (note, however, that no Viet Cong penetrated east of Albuquerque while I was there). Two time John W. Campbell Award nominee, no wins. Hugo nominee four times, zero wins (but, hey, Spielberg finally got an Oscar and Hitchcock never did so who knows?).

Continuing Interests and Avocations: Ferryboats, travel, national arks and monuments, consumer electronics, politics, history, space program, printing and publishing, book collecting, auctioneering, old time radio and classic TV, computers. This one is a Chalker-built P2/450 BX system running, yes, Windows 98 if you care, and also around is a Toshiba 405CS notebook computer that I take with me when I travel. Yes, I know how to program but consider it in the same thrilling vein as being asked to inventory sand grains in Libya. I am frequently on Compuserve

in the Corelapp and Adobe sections (not in the sf section there—too huge), but if you have a specific question for me the best way (if you have a computer and modem) is to ask it on Delphi's sf SiG, where I tend to hang out regularly. Many sf writers hang out Wednesday nights around 10 PM Eastern in Delphi's sf conference, occasionally including me. You can email me: jchalker@miragepress.com.

For those wondering, that is me in Faces of Science Fiction, and my satellite dish, and my oldest son (who's 17 now), and my dog, but it's not my house. The photo was taken with my old house at the photographer's back. She wanted the dish more than the house in the picture; it seems I'm the only U.S. sf author she photographed who owned one. Now you'll never see that house; I moved to a much larger one further into the mountains. I still have a dish, though, whose input I can watch from the indoor Jacuzzi. Decadence is wonderful Incidentally, not only is that not my house, but my son's now far older and my beloved little puppy dog in the photo, Hoy, died Nolacon weekend, 1988. He could not be replaced, but his successor is Mavra Chang, a sable Pekinese who is giving a good imitation of a canine airheaded valley girl, and is David's dog in the same way Hoy was mine. Steve has tried to appropriate her, but really demands a dog of his own. I tell him that this will happen sooner or later, but Not That Soon...

Spotlighted Publisher

Jeff VanderMeer of Ministry of Whimsy by Jeff VanderMeer

Jeff VanderMeer was born in Pennsylvania in 1968, but spent much of his childhood in the Fiji Islands, where his parents worked for the Peace Corps. This experience, and the resulting trip back to the U.S. through Asia, Africa, and Europe, deeply influenced him.

Although primarily a fiction writer, VanderMeer has also pursued careers in editing and publishing for the past 15 years. He founded the Ministry of Whimsy in 1984, its name derived from the ironically-named ministries in Orwell's novel 1984. Since then, the Ministry of Whimsy has striven to publish challenging but entertaining fiction, usually with a science fiction, fantasy, or horror flavor. In the past, the Ministry has published magazines, chapbooks, and newsletters while also sponsoring writer's workshops, readings, lectures, and poetry contests. Currently, the Ministry publishes the highly-acclaimed Leviathan anthology, the No Frills Chapbook series, and a number of trade paperback novels and collections. It also maintains an award-winning website at www. mindspring.com/~toones/ ministry.html. In 1998, the Ministry's Troika, by Stepan Chapman, became the first independent press book to win the Philip K. Dick Award. VanderMeer, along with partner Tom Winstead, was also a recent finalist for the World Fantasy Award. Ministry of Whimsy books frequently make Locus' recommended reading list and have achieved a reputation for unique content and beautifully-designed covers. Among the authors published by the Ministry over the years are National



Book Award Winner Richard Eberhart, Pulitzer Prize Winner Donald Justice, Kathe Koja, Richard Calder, L. Timmel Duchamp, Mark Rich, Karl Edward Wagner, Steve Rasnic Tem, Bruce Taylor, and Mark McLaughlin.

In addition to his publishing activities, VanderMeer writes fiction and nonfiction. His work has appeared in eight languages in 12 countries, including magazines such as Asimov's SF Magazine, Amazing Stories, Weird Tales, Interzone, Pulphouse, Ikarie B (Czech), 2001 (India), The Silver Web, Magic Realism, The Third Alternative (UK), and anthologies such as Nebula Awards 30, Best New Horror 7, The Year's Best Fantastic Fiction, Dark Voices 5 (UK), Dark Terrors (UK), Fantasy (Germany), The White of the Moon (UK) and Palace Corbie. Honors include winning the 1994 Rhysling Award, Fear Magazine's Best Short Story Award, and a \$5,000 Florida Individual Artist Fellowship for Excellence in Fiction, in addition to being a finalist for the ReaderCon Best Short Work Award and the Theodore Sturgeon Award. Recent books include The Book of Lost Places (Dark Regions Press), Dradin, In Love (Buzzcity Press), and Dradin, In Love & Other Stories (Oxy Publishing, Greece). The Early History of Ambergris,

a novella, is forthcoming this summer from Necropolitan Press.

VanderMeer's nonfiction has appeared in Novel & Short Story Writer's Markets, SF Eye, The St. James Guide to Horror & Gothic Writers, The New York Review of SF, Magill's Guide to SF & Fantasy Literature, and publications from Gale Research. He teaches creative writing via the nationally-distributed student magazine Merlin's Pen and was a founding member of the University of Rhode Island's Council for Literature of the Fantastic. By day, he works as a technical writer/project administrator for Infinity Software Development in Tallahassee, Florida. He enjoys playing racquetball and soccer. A fine collection of Angela Carter and Frederic Prokosch first editions rests somewhere among the hundreds of books that make his home look disheveled and disorganized.



STEVE ADAMS is an artist/illustrator/cartoonist and all around art whore—he'll draw anything for money! While his most recent pro contract has been providing graphics for CBT's (Computer Based Training Programs) in the airline industry (Boeing and Airbus), he is still found doing everything from comic books, to sf/f painting, computer art, and is the current art director for Westwind. He has been published by several comic publishers, has several art awards to his credit, and a recent degree in computer graphics and animation.



DAVE R. ADDLEMAN has sold over 89 short stories. Two mystery novels were published on audio tape in late 1998: *Irrevocable Trust* and *A Contract on Stone*. A third mystery, *Shy Guy*, will be out in early 1999. Two additional novels: *The Osmian Search*, (sf) and *Witch Hunter*, (fantasy) are also out. Dave is a charter member of the Fairwood Writers Group in Kent, Washington, and teaches fiction writing at Renton Technical College. 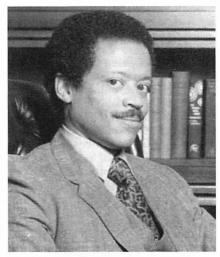

Patrick attended prep school in New England, going on to receive his B.S. from Clarkson College in 1984 and his M.B.A./M.P.A. from Southeastern University in 1991. Patrick worked in the computer industry for many years and is now working to create cheap access to space.



Born in 1952 in Los Angeles, **Steven Barnes** was described in *The Portland Oregonian* as "The only black, male, heterosexual science fiction writer in the world."

Among his works are the best-selling Dream Park series, Beowulf's Children, Firedance, and Blood Brothers.

For four years one of the rotating hosts of KPFK's Hour 25 radio show, Steven was also a monthly columnist for Black Belt magazine, and, much to his embarrassment, appeared on television's The Dating Game twice, winning both times.

His television credits include The Real Ghostbusters, The Twilight Zone, and Baywatch.

Since 1997, her work has been published by her own company, A Fine Line Press. She has been called "charming and witty," and is always glad to see her many readers. She has taught, lectured, and spoken from Paris to San Diego, and appeared on radio and television.

Donna lives in Bremerton, WA, with her husband, Dan, a gang of spoiled cats, and Kitsap County's largest Deodar Fir.

JOE BETHINCOURT was raised mostly in the Southern Appalacians, in North Carolina, and absorbed the music almost from the time he could walk.

He began learning banjo at age 9, after he heard his grandfather, C.H. Burnett, playing fiddle. His first banjo was given to him by his grandfather. When his family moved to Phoenix in 1961, Joe began learning guitar, hanging around coffeehouses, mariachi bands, bluegrass groups, and a place called "J.D.'s," where he would sneak in to listen to a local guy called Waylon Jennings. An Internet geek by trade, Lauri "relaxes" by playing with molten glass.

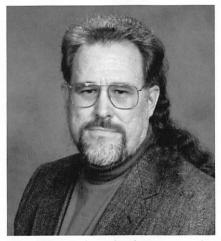

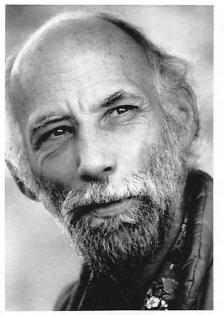
If you have seen any of his costumes on stage at a con, you know that he doesn't take things too seriously. "We're here to have fun," he says.

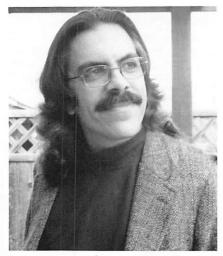

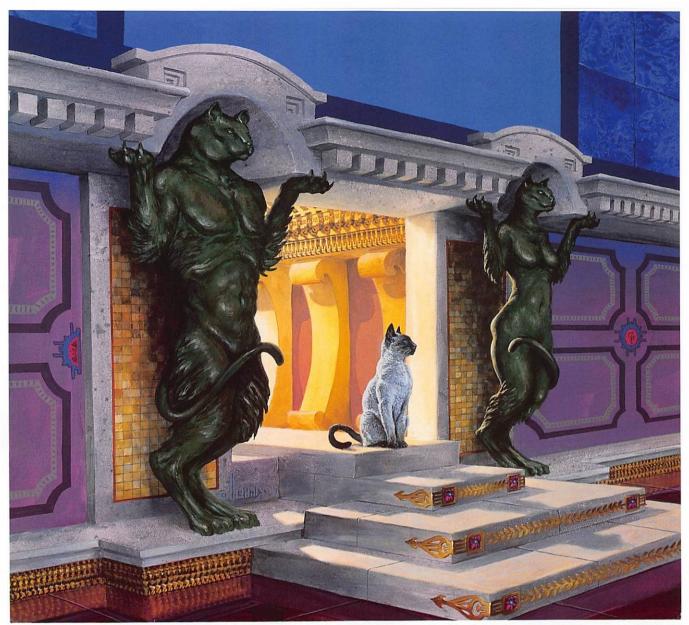

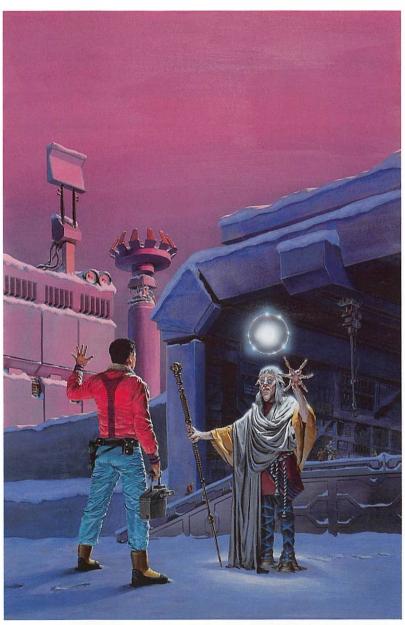

In Memorium

Richard Austin Wright

Judy Suryan

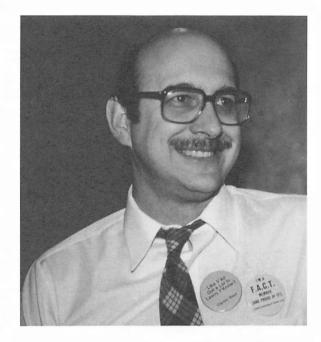
Age 55. Long time resident of Seattle, died in his sleep of natural causes, December 26, 1998. Richard was a computing system professional at Boeing and had retired last year.

For the past 25 years, one of Richard's great passions and his almost full time hobby were science fiction and fantasy and the fans that belonged to the various groups and organizations of the genre. He loved the literature, the art, the gaming and the costuming that are part of the fun and adventure of science fiction. Conventions, which are most often held on the weekends, were looked upon as mini vacations from the day to day real world. Back in the mid 1970s, he was one of the founders of Science Fiction Northwest that includes the Northwest Science Fiction Society (NWSFS) and it's annual convention, Norwescon, and was, again, the current chairman of NWSFS. His activities on the local, national and international levels within the science fiction and fantasy community ranged from department head, to Chairman, to being a Guest of Honor. His many conventions included Norwescon, Rustycon, Westercon, and the World Science Fiction convention. Richard also wrote for, worked on, or edited many fan magazines and convention program books.

He was born May 26, 1943, in El Paso, Texas and grew up in New Mexico where he graduated from New Mexico Military Academy before moving to Seattle. He had wanted to go onto Officers Training school but a problem with his feet kept him on the side lines. He went on to college where he obtained a bachelor's degree and did his graduate work. After moving to the Northwest, Richard taught computer science at the University of Washington before going to work at Boeing. He also ran for state representative back in those early years. About 12 years ago, Boeing sent

Richard back to the Southwest to open a computer services/sales department at Infomart in Dallas, Texas. After not quite two years, Richard returned to the Northwest saying he was never so glad to come back "home" to Seattle. He said the webs between his fingers and toes he had grown up here almost completely dried out in Texas.

Another of Richard's loves was the theater and musicals. For many seasons he worked with various Seattle repertory theaters and even did some directing. He loved relaxing with a group of friends and a glass of wine listing to and singing along with songs from his favorite musicals. The next best thing was watching



musicals. If they were live on stage, it was even better. For many years a group of friends from work and he held season tickets to the 5th Avenue Theater. It would have had to been a catastrophe for him to miss those evenings as much as it would have been for him to miss the conventions and club events that were so much a part of his life.

Richard is survived by his mother, Loretta Wright, of New Mexico, his sisters, Patricia Wright and Cynthia Wasser of Texas and his Seattle family Bob and Judy Suryan and their children Angela, Peter and Richard's godchild, Alexander. And of course he will always be remembered and missed by his many, many friends.
