Catherine Asaro was born in Oakland, California and grew up in El Cerrito, California. She has a PhD in chemical physics and an A.M. in physics, both from Harvard University, and a B.S. with highest honors in chemistry from UCLA. She attended Kennedy High School in Richmond, California as part of the Richmond Voluntary Integration Plan.

When not writing and making appearances at conventions and signings, Asaro teaches math, physics, and chemistry. She has coached various nationally ranked teams with home, private, and public school students, in particular the Howard Area Homeschoolers and the Chesapeake team for national tournaments such as the American Regions Mathematics League (ARML). Her students have placed at the top levels in numerous national competitions, including the United States of America Mathematical Olympiad (USAMO) and the United States of America Mathematical Talent Search (USAMTS).

Asaro is a member of SIGMA, a think tank of speculative writers that advises the government as to future trends affecting national security. She is also a visiting professor in the Physics Department at the University of Maryland, Baltimore County.

A former ballet and jazz dancer, Catherine Asaro has performed with dance companies and in musicals on both coasts and in Ohio. She founded and served as artistic director and a principal dancer for two dance groups at Harvard: The Mainly Jazz Dance Company and the Harvard University Ballet. After she graduated, her undergraduate students took over Mainly

Jazz and made it into a club at the college. She has completed two terms as president of Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America (SFWA) (2003–2005) and during her tenure established the Andre Norton Award for Young Adult Science Fiction and Fantasy.

Her husband is John Kendall Cannizzo, an astrophysicist at NASA. They have one daughter, a ballet dancer who studied maths at the University of Cambridge.

Catherine Asaro is the daughter of Frank Asaro, the nuclear chemist who discovered the iridium anomaly that led the team of Luis Alvarez, Walter Alvarez, Frank Asaro, and Helen Michel to postulate that an asteroid collided with the Earth 65 million years ago and caused mass extinctions, including the demise of the dinosaurs.

Catherine Asaro on a project that means a lot to ber:

When I was in graduate school at Harvard earning my doctorate, I chose the field of theoretical atomic and molecular physics, specializing in quantum scattering theory. I entered the multidisciplinary program in Chemical Physics. What it meant was that I had to show facility in physics, chemistry, and applied mathematics. In my courses, I was always one of the only women in the class. In fact, sometimes I was the only person with two X chromosomes in the room. Although I had great classmates and profs, and I enjoyed my studies in many ways, the fact that there were so few women could be an isolating experience.

During that time, I had several excellent mentors, including Alex Dalgarno (my thesis advisor at the Harvard-Smithsonian Center for Astrophysics), Eric Heller (my undergraduate advisor at UCLA, who later accepted a position at Harvard), and Kate Kirby. Kate is now the Executive Officer of the American Physical Society, but when I was in graduate school, she was a scientist in theoretical atomic and molecular physics at the CfA, a senior member of the Dalgarno group. For all the years I was working on my doctorate, I watched her balance her work as an internationally respected scientist with her family and motherhood. That all happened during an era when very few women went into our field. Submerged in such a male-dominated field, it meant more than I knew how to say to have such an amazing role model.

The world has changed a great deal since my graduate school days; girls and women are present in physics and math in larger numbers than ever before, both as students and as faculty. But those areas still remain predominantly a male world. My involvement as a mathematician, physicist, and teacher in projects that encourage girls and women to enter such fields mean the world to me. It's my chance to pay forward to the new generations coming up, offering them a role model and encouragement in these fields that I so love.





What is your own favorite project and why?

The 2013 Check These Out Literary Pin-Up Calendar beats its countless older rivals for my affections. I love it because it was a collaboration with 12 wonderful authors and a chance to show my respect for their work.

Did it turn out the way you'd intended?

Of course I meant it to turn out well, and worked hard to that end, but it became something much more interesting and complex. It turned out to be a sort of portfolio - big enough to showcase a variety of styles and sensibilities, but small enough not to overwhelm. The idea of making the page of dates as unique as the pin-ups they accompanied was something that happened as I went.

I got to create homages to many artists, writers and designers I admire, while working with the fickle and curious Gregorian calendar. I hadn't set out to make an American Gods comic strip, but the month of June (assigned alphabetically to Neil Gaiman and, by my request, Amanda Palmer) sort of insisted. Ray Bradbury was my literary hero growing up, and to have him give his blessing to my Fahrenheit 451 pin-up was beyond any hope I'd had. The surprises were constant: working closely with NK Jemisin, and incorporating nods to her own father's paintings; making Terry Pratchett's calendar page a double helical periodic table that could include Octday without having it throw off the dates; getting half of Team Unicorn to model for Pat Rothfuss and Terry Pratchett; working with Jim Butcher's wonderful assistant Priscilla to give life to Harry Dresden's own assistant; working with 3 great photographers; and even, out of last minute desperation, posing for Sookie Stackhouse's paramour Quinn. It was a constant surprise and delight!

Lee Moyer began his initial painting training using the mediums of watercolor and oils. In 1989, he expanded into the digital art realm, which has become his premiere medium as a painter and illustrator. While building his freelance career and expanding his skill set, he worked for ten years as a Docent & Naturalist Illustrator at the Smithsonian Museum of Natural History.

Moyer considers his primary influences to be Art Nouveau, Art Deco, Arts & Crafts, propaganda art, and the Pre-Raphaelites.

What artist/writer/famous historical figure's talent would you steal in a heartheat, and what is your favorite work?

While Winsor McCay, Heinrich Kley, NC Wyeth, Jon R. Neill, Ernst Haeckel, JC Leyendecker, MC Escher and John William Waterhouse would all be immensely tempting – and with the firm understanding that "talent" is an inexact and largely misunderstood shorthand for observation, technique, good work habits and diligence – I'd absolutely steal from the deathbed of Alfons Maria Mucha (since, by dying, he wouldn't be using it anymore).

Mucha's grasp of design and illustration was a brilliant synthesis of the past and a remains the hallmark of Art Nouveau. His late, and sadly little-seen, work on the 20 giant canvases that comprise The Slav Epic is as remarkable in its way as his earlier posters for Sarah Bernhardt. But of the pieces I've seen (and whose reproductions hang on my walls), his poster for Bernhardt's Lorenzaccio may be my favorite.

Wonderful living illustrators and designers whose work is influenced by Mucha include MW Kaluta, Adam Hughes, Aly Fell, and Megan Lara.

WORTH

EDWARD TENNER

Edward Tenner is an independent writer, speaker, and consultant on technology and culture. His book Why Things Bite Back: Technology and the Revenge of Unintended Consequences has been an international bestseller. His most recent book is Our Own Devices: The Past and Future of Body Technology.

After receiving a B.A. from Princeton, a Junior Fellowship of the Harvard Society of Fellows, and the Ph.D. from the University of Chicago, Edward Tenner held teaching and research positions in Chicago and became science editor of Princeton University Press, publishing general interest books and launching competitive series in astrophysics, animal behavior, and earth sciences. Among the works he sponsored were Richard Feynman's last scientific book, QED: The Strange Theory of Light and Matter and The History and Geography of Human Genes by L. Luca Cavalli-Sforza, Paolo Menozzi, and Alberto Piazza, which received the 1994 R.R. Hawkins Award of the Professional and Scientific Division of the Association of American Publishers as the best scientific or professional book of the year and began a new era of human genetics.

Developing programs in the the history of science and technology, Edward Tenner became engaged with these fields and resumed a writing career that began when he was an undergraduate and contributor to the Daily Princetonian, the Tiger Magazine, and the Princeton Alumni Weekly. His essay on the differences among Harvard, Yale, and Princeton was published simultaneously by all three alumni magazines.

In 1991 Edward Tenner received a Guggenheim Fellowship and was appointed a visitor at the Institute for Advanced Study, where he began a project on unintended consequences of technology that was published as Why Things Bite Back. As a fellow of the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars in 1995-96, he turned to the history of human interactions with everyday objects, which has led to Our Own Devices.

Edward Tenner is a visiting scholar in the Center for Mobile Communication Studies at Rutgers University and a senior research associate of the Jerome and Dorothy Lemelson Center for the Study of Invention and Innovation, National Museum of American History. He is also affiliated with the Center for Arts and Cultural Policy Studies of the Woodrow Wilson School, Princeton University. He has taught a course in the history of information as a visiting lecturer in the Princeton University Council of the Humanities and has also held visiting positions in the Princeton Departments of Geosciences and English.

Edward Tenner has contributed essays and reviews to many of the leading newspapers and magazines of the U.S. and the U.K., including U.S. News, the Wilson Quarterly, Technology Review, Raritan Quarterly Review, American Heritage of Invention and Technology, Metropolis, the former Industry Standard, and Designer/Builder. He has also contributed to the Web publications Microsoft Slate, and Forbes.com.

He is a member of the editorial board of *Raritan Quarterly Review* and a contributing editor of the *Wilson Quarterly*.



What artist/writer/famous historical figure's talent would you steal in a heartheat, and what is your favorite work?

I don't trust any historian who isn't in awe of Edward Gibbon and his *Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire* for his combination of erudition, literary style, and passion for his subject. It's also one of the very few early modern scholarly books that is still read with admiration, and is still selling. It's been rediscovered decade after decade for centuries.

My favorite projects are those I haven't finished, sometimes those I've just begun, like studies of the history of the top hat and of the German Shepherd Dog. The published one that meant most to me was the essay comparing Harvard, Yale, and Princeton that I wrote in 1984, and that's available on my homepage. I'd been writing for years, but that was the first essay in which I finally established my own style and began the process of moving from editing to writing. In some ways things have turned out as I intended; I always wanted to be a Knopf author. But my new book for Knopf will be on positive unintended consequences, so I see the longterm results of that essay as still a work in progress.

GARDNER

Gardner Dozois (born July 23, 1947) is an American science fiction author and editor. He was editor of Isaac Asimov's Science Fiction Magazine for almost 20 years. He has won multiple Hugo and Nebula awards, both as an editor and a writer of short fiction. In 2011, he was inducted into the Science Fiction Hall of Fame.

Dozois was born in Salem, Massachusetts. He graduated from Salem High School with the Class of 1965. From 1966 to '69 he served in the Army as a journalist, after which he moved to New York City to work as an editor in the science fiction field.

Dozois worked in the 1970s with magazines such as Galaxy Science Fiction, If, Worlds of Fantasy, and Worlds of Tomorrow. In 1976, he was cofounder and associate editor of Isaac Asimov's Science Fiction Magazine. He left in 1978, but returned as editor in 1984, and retired from it in 2004. During that time, Dozois won a record 15 Hugo Awards for Best Professional Editor.

Dozois is a well-known short fiction anthologist. After resigning from his Asimov's position, he remained the editor of the anthology series The Year's Best Science Fiction, published annually since 1984. The series, which is now up to its Twenty-Ninth Annual Collection, has won the Locus Award for Best Anthology seventeen times, more than any other anthology series in history. In addition to his 15 Hugos, Dozois has also won the Locus Award thirty-five times, including an unprecedented sixteen times in a row as Best Editor. Dozois also edited volumes six through ten of the Best Science Fiction Stories of the Year series after Lester del Rey edited the first five volumes. That series ended in 1981.

Dozois has also edited a long series of

themed anthologies with Jack Dann, each with a self-explanatory title such 🔼 as Cats, Dinosaurs, Seaserpents, or Hackers. He has also co-edited several anthologies with George R.R. Martin, including Songs of the Dying Earth, Warriors, Songs of Love and Death, Down These Strange Streets, Danger-

Down These Strange Streets, 2008 Women, and Old Mars.

As a writer, Dozois has mainly worked in shorter forms. He won the Nebula Award for best short story twice: once for *The Peacemaker* in 1983, and again for *Morning Child* in 1984. He also won the 2006 Sideways Short-Form Award for Alternate History Counterfactual. tory with his short, Counterfactual. His short fiction has been collected in several books, most recently in 2011's When the Great Days Come. He has also recently collaborated on the novel Hunter's Run with George R.R. Martin and Daniel Abrahan. Many of his books are now available in ebook editions at Baen.com.

> As of February 2013, Dozois has joined Clarkesworld Magazine, a leading science fiction and fantasy magazine, as their reprint editor. Each month, he will select two science fiction stories published during the last three decades.

> Dozois currently resides in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Terence Dean "Terry" Brooks (born January 8, 1944) is an American writer of fantasy fiction. He writes mainly epic fantasy, and has also written two movic novelizations. He has written 23 New York Times bestsellers during his writing career, and has over 21 million copies of

his books in print. He is one of the biggestselling living fantasy writers.

Brooks was born in the rural midwestern town of Sterling, Illinois, and spent a large part of his life living there. He is an alumnus of Hamilton College, earning his B.A. in English literature in 1966. He later obtained a J.D. from Washington and Lee University. He was a practicing attorney before becoming a full-time author and now resides in Seattle, Washington, with his wife, Judine. Brooks' thorough familiarity with and love for the city of Seattle are clearly expressed in "A Knight of the Word," whose plot is set in that city.

Brooks had been a writer since high school, writing mainly in the genres of science fiction, western, fiction, and nonfiction. One day, in his early college life, he was given a copy of The Lord of the Rings by J. R. R. Tolkien, which inspired him to write in one genre. While Tolkien inspired the genre, Brooks stated at the Charlotte Literary Festival that he credits the inspi-



ration of his style of writing to William Faulkner's works. With this inspiration, he then made his debut in 1977 with his first novel, The Sword of Shannara. This novel became the first fantasy book ever to appear on the New York Times bestseller list, where it stayed for five months.

After finishing two sequels to The Sword of Shannara, Brooks moved on to the series which would become known as the Landover novels. Brooks then wrote a fourbook series titled The Heritage of Shannara. For the next fourteen years, he wrote more Landover books, then went on to write The Word and Void trilogy. Continuing the Shannara series, Brooks wrote the prequel to The Sword of Shannara, titled First King of Shannara. He then wrote two series, The Voyage of the Jerle Shannara and High Druid of Shannara and recently finished a third, Genesis of Shannara, a trilogy bridging his Word and Void and Shannara series. His latest project, A Princess of Landover, was released in August 2009. Legends of Shannara, a duology taking place after the events of Genesis of Shannara, was recently completed. The first installment, entitled Bearers of the Black Staff, was released in August 2010. The second installment, The Measure of the Magic, was released in August 2011.

What artist/writer/famous historical figure's talent would you steal in a heartheat, and what is your favorite work?

Wow! I already steal from everywhere, so that's a tough one. Writers live on the backs of writers who have gone before. We are in a constant redefining, re-imagining mode. I guess it would be William Faulkner. I already owe much of what I do to Faulkner's books, strange as that may seem. I did my senior English thesis on Faulkner while at Hamilton College and combined his take on the human condition with that of Tolkien. My favorite of all his works is a short story, "The Bear."

What is your own favorite project and why? Did it turn out the way you'd intended?

Everything I do is my favorite when I am doing it. Every book is my best when I am creating it. I need to think that way. I suppose Running With The Demon is my favorite. It was a departure from Shannara, and one that I was very committed to doing and fought hard to find a way to make it happen. It is probably one of the two or three best books I have written. It was about my childhood growing up in Illinois. It was about coming of age and letting go of childhood, sometimes out of necessity. It was about what I perceive to be a constant war between good and evil, and the way in which those two form two sides of the same coin. Really, I put everything into that book.

Hugo finalist Tony Daniel is the author of Guardian of Night and other SF novels and short stories, including Baen.com free fiction "CHECKSUM Checkmate," which is set in the world of Guardian of Night. He is an editor at Baen Books and maintains an active Facebook author page.

When did you first become aware of science fiction and fantasy? What were the first F & SF books that you read?

I grew up for the most part in Anniston, Alabama, in the U.S., and started reading science fiction young. I voraciously consumed the Golden Spring Elementary School library when I was there, then found Gateway Books in the local mall. SF was a part of reading like everything else, but I was particularly struck by A Wrinkle in Time and The Dark is Rising back then. I was also reading mysteries, all the mainstream children's books, and whatever else I could get my hands on.

There's a half remembered series of kid's mystery novels I've been trying to find again for decades now. Of course it exists, is probably known by many, and there are plenty of copies around, but I can't remember their titles or authors. That's often what I do when I go into a used book shop: go in for a chance encounter with half remembered stuff that I've read before and bring back memories of the book. You can't really do that on-line at the moment, not in the visceral way a book shop allows with all the smells and such. If we get full on virtual reality in my lifetime, my first app download would be Old Book Store.

Gateway Books also had the benighted, editorially mangled Laser line of paperbacks. I read a bunch of those. Loved the covers (all done by Kelly Freas) with

the big heads of the characters on them. Probably that was my first encounter with writers I later came to like, although I didn't care much who the authors were with what I read as a kid (and still don't, for the most part).

I also read, in about fourth or fifth grade, the Asimov collection of short stories, Tomorrow's Children, and almost every story in that book had a huge effect on me. My favorite of all was Fritz Lieber's "A Pail of Air," which is part of my imaginative life to this day.

Then around sixth or seventh grade, something clicked in me, and reading became my default mode of existence. I fit high school, and adolescence in general, around my reading schedule. I devoured Tolkien, Asimov's Foundation series, vast quantities of mysteries and spy novels, mainstream novels, classics, everything. I did not think of anything in term of genre. I didn't like science fiction better than anything else. I loved science fiction and everything else, so long as it spoke to me. Historicals. Johnny Tremaine I loved, for instance. Nature and adventure. I ran across Annie Dillard's essays in high school and was greatly influenced by her way of looking at the world.

Then in college I found my triumvirate of most influential novels: Moby-Dick, The Moviegoer, and The Sun Also Rises. I'd probably still pick those as all-time personal favorites.

The one thing I never got into much was sociological critique novels and satire. I was not that guy in your class who loved Catcher in the Rye, and temporarily transformed into a low-rent Holden. In the SF genre, I never much liked The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy for the same reason. Felt like I was being preached to a bit in

I also began to write, myself, at this point, and to put together zines and comic books with work by me and my friends. I worked on the high school newspaper and the year book (where I learned lessons on layout I use to this day) and was the editor of my high school literary magazine.

Who are your favorite fantasy and sf authors and why?

My favorite current science fiction author is Lucius Shepard. He and I are politically poles apart, but I think he is a hell of a storyteller and, when you cut through his, for me, generally nonsensical leftist politics (Lucius, who is a friend, knows what I think of his politics), his philosophical view of the world—a dark, dangerous, and beautiful place on the knife edge between determinism and free will, appeals to me greatly.

I generally like darker fare where the characters are worldly, knowledgeable, highly competent, and yet acutely aware that they are specks floating on a universe which is frequently overpowering, inhuman, and incomprehensible. I love Tom Kratman's Carerra books, for instance. I also find this quality in the work of Michael Z. Williamson and often in John Ringo.

I like big ideas when they are well-handled by competent storytellers. I hate half-baked science in a science fiction story, and yet I generally do not like fiction written by scientists (although a very few are also good writers). I like Greg Bear's work, for instance, where big ideas abound, and I was a huge fan of physicist Gregory Benford's Galactic Center series.

For me, good writing (all that character, plot, and setting stuff) is a neces-

sary foundation before I can truly enjoy a book. This is also why I am generally wary of experimental viewpoints and metafiction—unless they are being attempted by a writer who I know is fully capable of telling a story in a straightforward manner. Then I figure there is a reason for their use and my attempt to figure out what is going on will be rewarded. A writer whom I trust in this regard is Gene Wolfe. He was a big influence on me in high school and college.

As I said, I generally don't make genre distinctions in my personal tastes, although I have to do so all the time at my job. I've worked for Baen for over ten years in various capacities, and I have read almost everything that Baen Books put out in that time, which has been a great pleasure.

Did you always aspire to be a published author?

I never thought about being published, per se. From a fairly early age (eleven or so), I wrote and wrote, and I suppose it is analogous to the way someone who practices piano three hours a day for many years assumes they will perform at some point, and that their performances will be pretty good and worth paying to see.

You have many different hats: author, editor, professor. Is it hard to switch gears from one to the other and back again?

Does your editor-brain ever interfere when you're writing, or are you able to just write, and then just edit?

I developed good critical ability early on and am generally able to cut to the heart of any piece of writing that I am reading. This allows me to enjoy reading a work that is not quite there, and at the same time see what needs to be fixed or modified from a general reader's point of view. This is an ability that a writer, editor, and literature teacher must possess.

I'm not a multi-tasker. I do one thing, then another. I need a stretch of time to do a first draft on a book, a story, or a piece of advertising copy, for that matter. Then I need an equal stretch of time to revise it.

Teaching is a little different, because it involves a good deal of performing. But you have the same kind of first draft/revision thing going on. I have to rehearse if I'm going to make it seem effortless and entertaining (and thus get a student to actually pay attention to what I'm saying). But you can never let your students know you practice beforehand. That ruins the magic.

What do you like best about being an author? Being an editor? Being a professor?

I love it when readers or students suddenly realize that somebody else shares and finds cool all the amazing stuff they have been thinking about. I enjoy that moment when you feel like that by doing your job you're also doing somebody else a favor, giving them something useful and entertaining.

Which of your novels are you most proud of, and why?

My latest book, *Guardian of Night*, is perhaps the most complete and well-formed book I've written. Some of my other stuff is exploding with so many ideas that this maybe gets in the way of the story telling. I think I found a pretty good balance of cool ideas and story with *Guardian of Night*.

Say I'm a student in one of your classes. What three core pieces of knowledge do you want me to take away from your class?

Science fiction is a doorway into all fiction. Fiction is the way we humans structure our long-term memory as a species and as individuals. History fades into a general miasma, scientific knowledge gets turned

into rules of thumb. Fiction lets us put history and science into something humans can deal with, given the way our brains are constructed.

How do you do fiction? Get yourself a hero. Give your hero a problem (the problem is usually also the big idea in a science fiction story). Have your hero attempt to solve the problem. Hey, your hero makes the problem worse! Have your hero solve the worsened problem, or have the problem solve your hero. Either way, establish a new status quo in your world. Within that simple structure is the secret to what makes us people, and not animals or robots.

So how did you make your way from New York to Texas to North Carolina? Do you see yourself settling down in one place?

Alabama through college at Birmingham-Southern ... then to graduate school in philosophy and English at Washington University in St. Louis ... to an internship at the American Spectator in Washington, D.C. ... to film school at USC in Los Angeles ... to my early writing career creating lots of short fiction for Asimov's and other venues, and writing my first book, Warpath, in Seattle ... to Prague to write for a year and live cheaply (this is where I wrote my best known short story "A Dry, Quiet War" among others) ... to New York City to get into publishing and drama, with useful gigs writing reams of reviews for Publishers Weekly and elsewhere, book reports for The Science Fiction Book Club, as well as the job of creating the abridgements of numerous audio books ... and my first job with Baen as the slush reader ... back to Alabama for a spell to write my book Earthling ... back to New York City where I took on the writing of Baen advertising copy and became a Baen consulting editor ... to Sant Llorenc near Barcelona (and my motherin-law's wonderful place in a national park)

where I wrote my novel Metaplanetary ... back to New York City to work at scifi.com, where I wrote, produced, and/or directed a bunch of audio dramas starring well-known actors ... to Dallas, where I taught the literature of science fiction and graduate writing courses for several years ... to North Carolina, where I'm now a full-time editor with Baen.

I want to remain settled for a while now. I had a pretty stable childhood living in mostly the same place, and I think that will be good for my kids, as well.

You're also a runner. Why do you run? Are you running toward, or running away?

I'm a runner because I'm a backpacker and mountain climber and running keeps me in shape for hiking and gets me outside. It also has its own peculiar rewards. I wrote a science fiction story once about running that appeared in Asimov's in 1996, "The Joys of the Sidereal Long Distance Runner." In it, I have a guy who figures out how to twist himself partially out of time so he can run basically forever. That's about what the last six miles of a marathon felt like to me a couple of years ago.

What sf-nal prediction do you hope to he alive to see? (e.g., manned missions to Mars, commercially-available flying cars, etc.)

I would like to meet a true artificial intelligence, one that passed my Turing test. That would answer a lot of philosophical questions I have that can't otherwise be dealt with.

What's in the box?

Another box that's bigger than the box it's in, of course. And inside that one is a cup of coffee, a two-foot-long piece of rebar, and a scuffed up but still functional Glock with

an extra clip. This is your settlement kit for Planet Life. Welcome to the Big Time, kids!

What artist/writer/famous historical figure's talent would you steal in a heartheat, and what is your favorite work?

Herman Melville. To write one Moby Dick -- which, by the way, is the perfect science fiction novel -- would be most excellent. To be a good editor for one Moby Dick, however, might be the most difficult and amazing task of all.

What is your own favorite project and why? Did it turn out the way you'd intended?

As a writer, my favorite project is usually my latest. At the moment, I'm working on a high fantasy project that I've spent years thinking about. Vikings in North America a thousand years after the Newfoundland landings. 'Nuff said. As an editor, I have to say I like working on well-written books that I know will shock the hell out of a good segment of the politically correct masses. I get to do that a lot at Baen.



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
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

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Norwescon would like to acknowledge the loss of the following individuals from the worlds of science and imagination. You will be missed.

Gerry Anderson 04/14/1929-12/26/2012

Gerry Anderson was an English publisher, producer, director, and writer, famous for his fantasic futuristic television programs, particularly those working with modified marionettes. Though he working on several productions, he is best known for: "Fireball XL5", "Thunderbirds" (mid 1960s), "Stingray" and "Captain Scarlet and the Mysterons". His live action work includes "Space: 1999" and "UFO".

Neil Armstrong 08/05/1930-08/25/2012

Neil Armstrong was the first man to walk on the moon. Commanded Apollo 11 landing on the moon on July 20, 1969. He and Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin spent a little less than three hours walking on the moon, collecting samples, conducting experiments and taking photographs. Armstrong also left a patch to commemorate NASA astronauts and Soviet cosmonauts who had died in action. An estimated fifth of the world's population (600 million people, at that time), watched and listened to the landing. This was the largest audience for any single event in history.

Born on a farm in western Ohio, he took his first airplane ride at age 6 and built model airplanes and conducted experiments in a homemade wind tunnel. He was licensed to fly at 16, before he got his driver's license.

He had been a Navy fighter pilot, (flew 78 combat missions in Korea), studied aeronautical engineering at Purdue University and earned a master's degree in aerospace engineering from the University of Southern California. He became a test pilot with what evolved into NASA, flying more than 200 kinds of aircraft

from gliders to jets. Armstrong was accepted into NASA's second astronaut class in 1962 and commanded the Gemini 8 mission in 1966. After the first space docking, he brought the capsule back in an emergency landing in the Pacific Ocean when a wildly firing thruster kicked it out of orbit.

In the years afterward walking on the move, he was the deputy associate administrator for aeronautics at NASA, for a year, then taught aerospace engineering at the University of Cincinnati until 1979. During this time he bought a 310-acre farm where he raised cartle and corn. From 1982 to 1992, Armstrong was chairman of Charlottesville, Va.-based Computing Technologies for Aviation Inc., a company that supplies computer information management systems for business aircraft.

Armstrong never got caught up in the celebrity and glamor of the space program. In February 2000 he said "I am, and ever will be, a white socks, pocket protector, nerdy engineer"

At the time of the flight's 40th anniversary, Armstrong again was low-key, telling a gathering that the space race was "the ultimate peaceful competition: USA versus U.S.S.R. It did allow both sides to take the high road with the objectives of science and learning and exploration."

Dennis Avner, 'Stalking Cat' 08/27/1958-11/05/2012

Dennis Avner was the body-modification enthusiast known to many as the "Catman", though he preferred his Native American name, Stalking Cat. He has been a panelist at the Seattle NASFIC, Rustycon, and first GoH Rainfurrest.

Avner, was famous for having changed his appearance with tattoos, implants, and surgeries and other accessories that included contact lenses, custom-made teeth, and false whiskers. He also was known to wear a large prosthetic tail. He told the Seattle Times in 2005. "I'm Huron and Lakota. I'm just taking a very old tradition, that to my knowledge is not practiced anymore.", Avner identified strongly with his feline totem animals. Avner's formal totem-derived name was "Stalking Cat," although his friends called him Cat or Tiger. Avner served in the

U.S. Navy and worked as a computer programmer and technician. A few years ago, he lived on Whidbey Island. A few years ago, Avner gained worldwide fame after he clinched the title of the "most permanent transformations to look like an animal" in the Guinness Book of World Records. Stalking Cat has been featured on "Ripley's Believe It or Not!," "Larry King Live," VH1's "Totally Obsessed" and other television shows.

Ray Bradbury 8/22/1920-6/5/2012

Ray Bradbury was a science fiction author whose imagination yielded classic books such as Fahrenheit 451, The Martian Chronicles, and Something Wicked This Way Comes. He wrote the screenplay for John Huston's classic film adaptation of Moby Dick. He adapted 65 of his stories for television's The Ray Bradbury Theater and won an Emmy for his teleplay of "The Halloween Tree."

In a career spanning more than seventy years, Bradbury was a prolific author of hundreds of short stories and close to fifty books, as well as numerous poems, essays, operas, plays, teleplays, and screenplays, generations of readers to dream, think and create

"I'm not a science fiction writer. I've written only one book of science fiction [Fahrenheit 451]. All the others are fantasy. Fantasies are things that can't happen, and science fiction is about things that can happen," he is often quoted as saying.

Kitty Canterbury 06/22/1937-09/09/2012

Kitty founded the local Star Trek fan group called the Puget Sound Star Trekkers (PSST) and served as the Commodore of the group from the mid 1970s through the early 1980s. She was honored as Fan Guest of Honor at Norwescon 19. Many local fans consider Kitty the mother of organized northwest fandom, but she said no, that if anything, she was the mid-wife. Kitty most defiantly was the poster child for the "Childlike wonder of the universe." She ran childcare and the masquerades in the early days of Norwescon.

Michael Clarke Duncan 12/10/1957-09/03/2012

Michael Clarke Duncan, was the hulking, character actor whose films included an Oscar-nominated performance as a death inmate in *The Green Mile*. His other films include: "Armageddon, Planet of the Apes, Kung Fu Panda, and Daredevil.

Jonathan Frid 12/02/1924-04/14/2012

Jonathan Frid was best known for playing Barnabas Collins in the 1960s original vampire soap opera *Dark Shadows*. Frid played a vulnerable vampire in one of the first sympathetic portrayal of the immortal creatures. He passed shortly before the movie version of Dark Shadows was released. Frid has a cameo role in the new movie.

Dark Shadows began in 1966 as a conventional soap opera (with Gothic overtones), Barnabas didn't appear until episode 200. He was added as a short-term addition to the cast and he saved the show. This vampire was multidimensional setting the trend with vampires over the last 50 years.

Dana Marshall 07/13/1964-10/28/2012

Dana Marshall was an active science fiction fan and convention volunteer for many years in the northwest. You could often find in at a convention chatting about Star Trek and about ADA.

Ralph McQuarrie 6/14/1929-3/3/2012

Ralph McQuarrie was the artist who developed the look of the first Star Wars trilogy's look of Darth Vader, C-3PO, R2-D2, the Stormtroopers and the lightsaber, as well as sets and spaceships. His artwork helped persuade 20th Century Fox to green-light the film. Some of his other credits are the *Battlestar* Galactica TV series, *Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home, Close Encounters of the Third Kind, E.T.: The Extra-Terrestrial*, and *Cocoon.* As a technical artist, McQuarrie worked for Boeing and other companies. He also worked for a company that provided animation for CBS News coverage of the Apollo space program and created artwork for movie posters.

Alan Poindexter 11/05/1961-07/01/2012

U.S. Navy Capt. Alan Poindexter, was a retired NASA astronaut. Poindexter flew two space shuttle missions, one aboard Atlantis as pilot and one on Discovery as commander, logging more than 669 hours in space before retiring from NASA in December 2010 to return to the Naval Postgraduate School in California.

Sally Ride 05/26/1951-07/23/2012

Sally Ride was the first American woman to fly in space. Dr. Ride, a physicist who was accepted into the space program in 1978 after she answered a newspaper ad for

astronauts, flew on the shuttle Challenger on June 18, 1983, and on a second mission in 1984. At 32, she was also the youngest American in space.

Dr. Ride trained in parachute jumping, water survival, weightlessness and the huge G-forces of a rocket launch. She learned to fly a jet plane. She also helped in the development of a robotic arm for the space shuttle. On the Challenger she used the arm to deploy and retrieve a satellite. At the launch many in the crowd wore T-shirts that said, "Ride, Sally Ride" from the lyrics of the song "Mustang Sally."

She developed a passion for trying to interest young people, especially girls, in science, math and technology. She wrote six science books for children. In 2001 she started a company, Sally Ride Science, to "make science and engineering cool again," as she put it, by providing science-oriented school programs, materials and teacher training.

Maurice Sendak 06/10/1928-05/08/2012

Maurice Sendak was the author of the classic children's book "Where the Wild Things Are." Sendak illustrated nearly 100 books during a 65-year career, winning dozens of accolades as he endeared himself to generations of children reared on his fanciful stories.

Sendak took a few night classes but largely taught himself as an artist.

He is best known for Where the Wild Things Are. It tells the story of a boy named Max who dresses in a white wolf costume and escapes his life at home by sailing to a remote land, where he discovers wild things who roar their terrible roars and gnash their terrible teeth. The book stirred controversy when it was first published in 1963. Many librarians initially feared it would disturb children. Sendak also wrote In the Night Kitchen, Chicken Soup with Rice, and Alligators All Around, among many others. Sendak said he didn't set out to be known as a writer for children. "I don't know how to do a children's book. I don't even know what a children's book is. I always know that my work is deemed suitable -- more suitable -- for children. I don't believe that, but who cares? Who cares?" he said.

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

Wooden bridges fluttered with laundry, some of it sporting faded, rusty stains. Bandages.

The closest building was an inn with a pattern of pale streaks marking the walls. Scars from dismantled scaffolding, I realized when I noticed there were iron grids installed across the upper windows as well.

A man with a crossbow lazed on a balcony on the second floor. He wasn't rude enough to aim yet, but his eyes were on me. I was an unusual sight, a woman traveling alone.

I waved. He pulled a cord. Perhaps it meant I was friendly; perhaps it was a warning. I thought it best to wait for a greeting.

I unbuckled my cloak and withdrew my line of prizes. I coiled the thin linen rope on the table, letting the trinkets form a clinking spiral of teeth and bones and one withered, resinencapsulated eye.

Even thinking about it warmed my guts with a familiar anger. I quickly renewed Floating-Among-Lilies to quell the feeling. When my heart was cool again, I excused myself to tend to my horse. Once done, I exited the stable and headed back to the inn, toward the kitchen entry. The lines I had thought were scars from scaffolding continued up the walls to the doorjamb, but here they skewed and overlapped, the cross-hatching of a mad artist with a knife. Now I could see them for what they were--claw marks.

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
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
