A PHENOMENALLY GOOD WRITER

JOHN JARROLD

Jaine Fenn is a phenomenally good writer. The worlds and characters she creates live in the mind, long after one has finished reading her novels.

Jaine is also a true fan. She studied Linguistics and Astronomy at the University of Hertfordshire, where she became the president of PSiFA (the local student Science Fiction society) from 1984-1985. She also helped organised Shoestringcons and edited their newsletter/fanzine, Hypo-Space. Like other authors including Robert Holdstock and Charles Stross, she hung out at cons (as she still does, obviously!) for years before getting her first story published in 1999. It was followed by several more through the first decade of the century, appearing in places ranging from SF anthologies to Alfred Hitchcock's Mystery Magazine.

Her first SF novel, PRINCIPLES OF ANGELS, appeared from Gollancz in 2008. It was highly praised and compared to genre classics including lain M Banks, though her voice is totally her own.

Four more books in her Hidden Empire series have followed – the latest, QUEEN OF NOWHERE, comes out in November 2012.

Hugely enthusiastic, interested in everything and a good egg. Welcome Jaine to Novacon, as one of the best British SF writers of the twenty-first century and a great convention panellist and talker. And read her novels – you won't regret it.

What's Happening at Novacon 42

A PROGRAMME FOR AUSTERITY FANDOM

Well, what were you expecting anyway when the rating agencies have words like 'poor' and 'moody' in their names?

With the Groat downgraded to a triple z rating, none of us getting a pay rise if we've still got a job and 97% of con budgets going on publications since the rise in postal charges, fandom faces a crisis.

Costs must be controlled. Words like 'rationalise' and 'lean' begin to appear in committee discussions as "PA system" is deleted and replaced with 'talk louder'; 'multimedia extravaganza' with 'scratchy Betamax copy of Plan 9 for Outer Space' and 'sparkling programme' with 'lan Sorensen's pop quiz about No 1s at Novacon through the ages'. [We're actually doing that one! ED]

Yet in the midst of this our nation (and Boris Johnson) wants to bring a fabulously expensive international extravaganza to London. Yes, indeed, we may remark on the soon to be all-consuming LONDON 2014. No, they haven't *officially* won at the time of writing but by November we'll know and may wish to remark on it.

We'll be looking at short stories on account of how no-one can afford to buy entire novels any more, or perhaps because SF is the place where the short form continues to thrive and delight.

Since such transactions for money that still occur in our shattered, soon-to-return-to-shiny-bead-based-bartering economy we'll be moving the book auction underground to the downstairs bar where sod's law dictates it'll be the best supported one we've had in years.

Science Fiction and even fandom themselves are probably some sort of tax dodge. For who? We don't know, but with the recent revelations about tax avoidance and allowance schemes, such as the fact that a hundred grand invested in, say, LESBIAN VAMPIRE KILLERS, could have yielded a tax break *six times* larger surely Explains Things, and confirms the need to discuss conspiracies and paranoia.

Does all this have a real effect on SF and fandom? Money still circulates as Joss Whedon, Ridley Scott or Jeff Bezos might comment but we'll consider whether there's real 'austerity' in our community now, and what it might mean for fandom in the next few years.

This stuff isn't just thrown together you know [Honestly? ED]. I have about nine web sites and docs open at once. I encounter the phrases: 'self-delusion, secrets and betrayal'; 'primitive theocracy' and 'lonely and unstable genius' and realise that I'm not reading the committee minutes but about the plots of novels by our fine Guest of Honour, Jaine Fenn.

We'll have Jaine on stage at least once a day, and as key attraction on Saturday afternoon. We're not the kind of convention that puts authors on three panels in four hours (I've seen it done – I'll never forget the wasted look in XXX's eyes afterwards) but we are the kind of convention where you can talk to them at the bar.

Jaine's latest novel QUEEN OF NOWHERE is due for release later this year. [Be good if it was around Novacon time, eh? ED], the fifth in a cylce of linked but self contained novels that began with PRINCIPLES OF ANGELS. Jaine has blogged that she's looking forward to Novacon, as are we all.

SHORT STORIES FOR FREE!

I know that this is controversial but I'm going to suggest those of you who are interested do a bit of prep before Novacon. Don't worry. You've plenty of time.

I have been whining for quite some time now about not having enough time to read anything other than deeply depressing blogs and work related journals. I just don't have either the time or the emotional commitment to give to a novel. I read Game of Thrones before, during and after Eastercon. It seemed like a huge commitment and left me exhausted. Unfortunately, that brief foray into a proper book led me into an extended engagement with novels by Gail Carriger, Tanya Huff, Theresa Thomlinson, Helen Flint and Michaela Roessner and that left me with reports to write and presentations to develop and no work time

available. I had to buckle down and get some actual real work done but I'd redeveloped a need for fiction so I did what I usually do in these circumstances and diverted into kid's books and short stories.

This is not to imply that short stories (or kids books) are any less worthy than novels. In many ways they are much better. At their best they are quick to read and leave you breathless and unready to leave that world behind. This is excellent from a work point of view as I am then immune to the lure of other stories for a short time and end up writing the hideously overdue report.

My problem with short stories over the years has had much to do with a reluctance to buy magazines. Magazines (not fanzines – that's very different!) are untidy and full of other stuff that I'm not interested in. This attitude is rather unfortunate as the majority of short stories are, at least initially, published in magazines. The thing is, even if I bought a magazine containing a marvellous story it would probably get thrown out sooner or later. I like my reading matter in book format.

This prejudice has led me to buying a fair number of anthologies over the years, tracking down elusive stories by favourite authors. Some of my new favourite authors have been introduced to me in this manner; as a cheapskate I am not going to spend all that money for a book and not read the rest of the stories.

I've also developed something of a fondness for linked short stories. The Bordertown shared universe has amused me and one of my favourite surprise buys was a book called 'The Touch', a collection of powerful stories about people whose touch, often inadvertently, disables. The 'Mountains of Mourning' is a book that I never leave out when obsessively ploughing through the Miles Vorkosigan universe although I do read the stories in strict date order. The biggest block of books on my expensive hardback books shelves is the complete short stories of Theodore Sturgeon. The thing in common with all these acceptable instances of short stories is that they have something in common. The author, the characters, the universe, whatever.

You can imagine ... I never go looking for anthologies of short stories. When I buy them it is because I have to or on the very occasional whim. I don't want to have lots of short stories by different authors jostling with

one another, I want each perfectly polished gem to be served up to me separately, except not in a tiny little chapbook that'll get lost on the shelves.

So lately there has been a new source. Sometime in 2008 Tor.com started making short stories available. For free. You have to register with them but given who else knows my online details this doesn't seem to be a major issue. They send me a regular email which occasionally has a link to a new short story. I rarely read them straight away. Usually I squirrel them away on my computer and pick one or two up when I'm on a train or similarly bored.

I had imagined that the purpose of this amazing generosity was to act as a sort of loss leader – that having read Six Months and Three Days I would go looking for whole novels by Charlie Jane Anders and I might well. I begin to suspect it might also be the thin edge of the wedge where reading books electronically became acceptable. I'm not sure, but having read so many short stories on my computer I recently downloaded and read Cryoburn, my first full length novel. I will, of course, now dutifully buy the book because I still prefer the paper, but I probably would never have considered it in the past.

But this suspicion is beside the point. What this gives us, for the first time, is access to a pool of short fiction that any of us with computers can read.

What I am going to suggest is that those of us who are interested should have a look at the websites below and pick out a story that you really like to give us a common pool of stories to discuss at Novacon. I am giving you the link to the Tor website where, as I said, you can sign up to receive access to free short stories, a series of links to each of the Hogo nominated short stories and links to three of my favourite short stories on the Tor site. If anyone wants to tweet a link to any story feel free. We will collate all suggestions before the next PR.

2012 Nova Awards

There's been a great deal of discussion in recent years – not least in the pages of past Novacon progress reports – about the current state of fanzines and its effect upon that venerable institution, the Nova Awards.

We've pretty much reached a make-or-break moment here. Eligibility has been extended to Irish fanzines and e-zines, voting is now open to any UK or Irish fan who's read at least six individual titles (relatively easy now so many are available online, particularly at *eFanzines.com*) and an electronic version of the ballot form will be launched at the Novacon website on 1 October. If the number of fans taking part this year doesn't show a significant increase, there's really little point in the awards continuing.

In the meantime, might I suggest we take a leaf from the internationally popular 'contest' NaNoWriMo (National Novel Writing Month) and consider September as its fanzine equivalent? Any UK or Irish fanzine distributed by 30 September qualifies, so this is an ideal opportunity for any of you who've always longed to get into print - or used to produce a fanzine, or haven't quite got around to getting the latest issue out - to get into the publishing groove.
