Things are starting to gather pace now. We've got 200 members! Very encouraging for this time of year and could indicate a big turnout for the con. I'm sure most people are coming to see our Guest of Honour, Jaine Fenn, but I suspect that the number of this Novacon could encourage the appearance of certain fans clutching towels.

The Programme is looking good: we are continuing to emphasise the importance of Science with two guest speakers on Saturday and Sunday morning, so drag yourself out of bed at a reasonable time and get your minds expanded. On Friday evening we are throwing a party for the official launch of Jaine's short story collection *Downside Girls* with free wine and nibbles, so come and buy a copy. There will be at least one other book launch on Saturday in the downstairs bar. Watch the notice board for details. The rest of the Programme is the usual mix of panels, talks and not-so-serious stuff.

For those of you new to Novacon there is a Dealers' Room where you can buy all SF and Fantasy related merchandise, an Art Show downstairs where you can exhibit work and then on Sunday the art auction where if you're an artist you make lots of money, or if you're a punter you lose lots of money. Also downstairs is Dave Lally's programme of strange and rare entertainment (that should have sparked your interest!) and another function room for what we call off-piste programme items. There will be the usual book auction, but NOT on the main programme. After consulting with the auctioneers it has been decided to move the auction to Saturday night in the downstairs bar, which was done last year as a second auction and attracted more people than the main one! If you wish to auction books, please drop them off at Registration with your name clearly visible, otherwise they will be sold and the proceeds go to the convention. For both Art and Book auctions, Novacon takes 10 percent of sales.

Sunday evening sees the usual Beer-Tasting and Hot Food. To get the beer free you need to contribute at least THREE bottles of British or Worldwide beer (the more unusual the better) which you give to Registration and receive a beer badge in return. Or you can just buy a badge for £5.00. The hot food is served at the same time and to get this you MUST buy a ticket in advance from Registration. Soft drinks will also be available and these are free to everyone.

Novacon is run by volunteers and we always need help on the day. If you want to be a gopher report to Registration and tell us what you are willing to do. In return for helping out you will receive Groats, which are gopher reward vouchers that can be spent over the bar.

DIRE WARNINGS. Both the hotel and Novacon committee take a dim view of people crashing in rooms or bringing in their own food and drink, so please don't do it. If Novacon 42 is going to be your first ever Novacon, then let me assure you that a programme chock full of informative, intellectual and witty people has been meticulously planned months in advance. If Novacon 42 *isn't* your first Novacon, if you know me, or Yvonne Rowse, with whom this year I'm sharing the crisis management and emotional blackmail that is a typical convention programmer's life, then we can dispense with such lies.

As usual people join or drop out at the last minute, thwarting schemes or inspiring new thoughts in the remaining functional brain cells Yvonne and I can muster between us, and ideas that sounded good over pizza last January are discarded in favour of stuff that will actually work. Let me give you an example: about ten years ago I turned up on the Thursday night before the con to see an elderly gentleman sat in a corner of the hotel bar who looked vaguely familiar. No, not at the same time – but extensive research has shown that the two things a typical Novacon member is most fascinated by are science and beer, so it was perfectly logical to find a speaker who can combine these.

As we mentioned, the book auction's been moved 'off piste' (insert your own jokes) to the downstairs bar late Saturday night and we're hoping to have a few interesting events down there over the weekend – announcements will be made and notices posted.

Generally you can expect science and literature to dominate the daylight hours while Saturday night will be about fandom, culminating in a traditional no-holds-barred, undignified Novacon game show

Don't forget you don't have to be an artist to be in the art show We are actively encouraging owners of artwork to bring it along for display and, if you wish to sell it, put it in the art auction.

OFF PISTE POETRY

Chris Morgan is planning an item about poetry in the downstairs Off Piste Programme room. It will take place on Saturday afternoon. Anybody who is interested can bring some of their own poetry to be read out and discussed.

TAFF BEGINS

The historical origin of the fan fund lies with Walt Willis' trip to America in 1952, before Novacon was even a glint in the Birmingham Science Fiction Group's eye. Worldcon is fading from memory, Eastercon is safely in the spring of the next year, and so the TAFF administrator has a chance to catch his breath, write a newsletter and get this show, as they say, on the road. Novacon's position in the year makes it the perfect time to launch the next westbound TAFF race to a crowd of eager British and European fans.

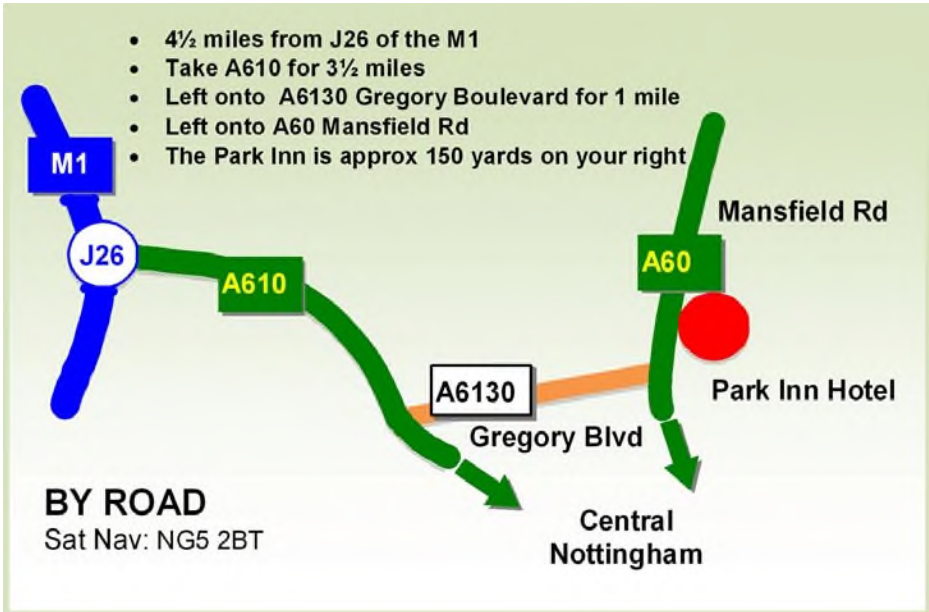

I spent a month in North America, staying with fans in Toronto, Kent, Seattle, Lake Tahoe, Reno and Santa Clara (in the San Francisco Bay Area). I got to present a Hugo Award, I got a girlfriend, I got amazing food, great beer, amazing experiences, the generosity of a hundred fans and a great many new friends.

HOW TO GET THERE

A CAT COAST GUIDE



(Even if coming from the South, it's easier to use J26 of the M1)

BY PUBLIC TRANSPORT

NOTE: This is all offered in good faith – bus info checked very recently but feel free to check latest info at www.nctx.co.uk.

You'll arrive at Nottingham Railway Station or next door Broadmarsh Bus Station.

If there's two or more of you, a taxi costs about £6 or so.

Cheapest option from the Railway station or Broadmarsh Bus depot is to walk up through the town (see below) until you get to the bus stops on Lower Parliament Street. The walk is 15 – 20 minutes and up hill most of way so if this is a problem consider a taxi.

Walking through the town: the main railway station has two exits. If you go out of the side exit you arrive onto Station Street turn left and then

right onto Carrington Street. If you go out of the main entrance you are on Carrington Street where you turn right. Go over the canal; walk past the entrance to Broadmarsh Bus Station (travellers from Broadmarsh should pick up directions at this point); walk up to Collin Street and cross at pelican and go into the entrance of the Broadmarsh Shopping Centre to the left. Walk straight through the Shopping Centre and emerge into a shopping precinct: Lister Gate. Keep walking up the hill and you should emerge into the huge Old Market Square characterised by fountains, town hall etc. Keep walking up, go up either Market Street or Queen Street and you will find yourself on Upper Parliament Street. Turn right for Lower Parliament Street. Watch out for trams!

At Lower Parliament Street you can catch a bus from a number of stops. There's six buses going up the Mansfield Road and the journey takes about 7 minutes. The bus stands are in the "P" zone; purple routes: numbers **87**, **88** and **89** and the lime green routes: **56,58** and **59**, found near to Age UK and Spa. Buses are frequent. Single fare £1.70- exact change please.

After about 2 miles, look out on the left and you'll see a cemetery while going down a hill: the bus will cross a large roundabout with flowerbeds. This is the junction with Gregory Boulevard. The stop immediately after is Clarendon College and you should get off here.

There's a Pelican crossing 20 yards up, cross here and the Park Inn is 80 yards further up the road. If you go past a pub called the Grosvenor, you've gone too far and need to get off bus sharpish and walk back.

Adventurous fans may wish to take the tram to the bus stops. These can be easily accessed via the railway station – simply follow the signs. From Broadmarsh, exit left to Carrington Street, cross the canal bridge and turn left into Station Street. The lifts to the Tram terminus are about 50 yards down on the left. Get on a tram and a conductor will take your fare – you can get a combined tram and bus day ticket and your conductor will give change, but will not accept £20 or £50 notes. Get off at the Royal Centre and cross the road to walk past the Theatre Royal towards Lower Parliament Street.

Yes YOU and to encourage you to vote the Novacon website contains a list of eligible fanzines as compiled by Nova Award administrator, Steve Green. Plus, for the first time ever, you can now vote on-line. You can find a voting form at www.novacon.org.uk/nova_award_ballot.php.

So there's no excuse that you didn't have time at the convention or you mislaid the ballot form or your pencil broke or the dog ate all your fanzines. Go do it before the convention.

Now here's more encouragement for you to vote.

OH, THEM GOLDEN SLIPSHEETS...

Those of you who have been paying proper attention to your Novacon progress reports will be aware that The Management have made several important changes to the terms and conditions of the Nova award. These changes cover who can vote, what they can vote for and how they can do it. This is in response to the continuing decline in the Nova's fortunes, the aim being to make it once again a thing of beauty and a joy for the foreseeable future.

The decline is a fact, but the reasons for it are open to debate. A simple, perhaps even trivial explanation is that fanzines have not, in essence, changed all that much over the decades, whereas fandom has broadened, diversified and become ever more complex; thus there is today proportionally less interest in fanzines among fandom in general than there was in 1973 when the Novas were inaugurated. What do *you* think?

I imagine that the fanzine fans of today would not be averse to (the return of) a great Golden Age, though perhaps they would argue about when exactly the *last* Golden Age was, and if indeed there ever was one at all. When I discovered fandom in the early 1970s, I considered,

perhaps naively, that it consisted of just three parts: conventions, fanzines - and the fan groups (plus the odd group) whose members often organised the former and produced many of the latter. In those days there were not many cons, but plenty of fanzines, including, I thought, some pretty good ones, though my own first efforts were not in that category. But that was forty years ago, and I was aware even then that many legendary fanzine titles had been dormant or dead for years. If the Golden Age of fanzines was therefore considerably pre-1970, then the fortunes of fanzines have been declining and falling for fifty years or more, and the barbarians – insert your personal choice of unfavoured fringe fan activity here – must surely be at the gates, and perhaps have already appropriated choice bits for steampunk outfits and melted the rest down for scrap.

There are still fanzines around, including, I think, some pretty good ones, but they are fewer in number than I would wish, and some of their editors are Old and Tired. I know I am. What can be done? Here's a simple three-step plan:

Firstly, if you know any fanzine fans who aren't members of Novacon but who are otherwise eligible to vote under the revised rules, please make the rule change known to them, as they may not have picked up on it yet. Secondly, you (and of course, they) can familiarise yourselves with who and what you'd like to vote for; sadly, this is not as onerous a task as it might be – all that declining and falling, remember.

And finally, you (and of course, they) can actually vote. No point in all the other stuff if you don't do that. Not at the con itself, though, I'd suggest. You may not have time to do it properly. Novacon is for doing not-quite-all the things that can only be done at Novacon. You will all have your own ideas about what those things are – one of them might be, for instance, discussing the decline of the Nova – but voting in the Novas need not be one of them. Instead, do this in advance, online, on the website, with all the necessary information to hand. I know I have.

All this costs nothing but time. It will make The Management happy, and that can only be good. It will also make some old (and not so old) faneds, and their contributors, very happy (and some others less happy, but awards do that). But the more of you that vote, the happier they'll *all* be, I expect. I know I will.
