



Welcome to Philcon 84, the 48th annual Philadelphia Area Science Fiction Conference. Philcon is sponsored by the Philadelphia Science Fiction Society (the PSFS, as opposed to the Other PSFS). You are welcome to anchor your spaceship to our sign across from City Hall.

Next year, the Society will begin a two year celebration of the Fiftieth Anniverseries of the PSFS (1985) and Philcon (1986). We are starting to plan for the '86 Philcon now. Any suggestions would be appreciated: Send them to our P.O. Box.

The Society holds its regular meetings on the second Friday of the month (almost always) at 8 p.m. The location for the last few years has been the YWCA at 2037 Chestnut St., from we which do not have any immediate plans to move. Each meeting (except January's annual meeting) consists of a one-hour or less (I pray) business meeting, and a program at 9 p.m. Featured gust for December is Jack Chalker, who will speak on World Building and Destroying. Avoid January, it's all business. The in February, Christopher Stasheff will lead a story improvisation. Program events in the past few years have included visits by authors, artists, and editors, panel discussions, slide shows, and science speakers.

Attendance at meetings is free for the first two, then you can be elected to Society membership and trade \$15 a year for voting rights. We also have an active recreation committee (movies, museum tours, etc.), and, of course, the glorious Philcon Committee.

Born April 30, 1938, in Los Angeles, California, USA.

Father: Waldemar Van Cott Niven.

Mother: Lucy Estelle Doheny Niven Washington.

Raised mostly in Beverly Hills, California. Spent a year and a half in Washington, D.C., age 6-7. My father was a Navy desk ensign during World War II.

Attended Hawthorne Public School (Beverly Hills), followed by the Carpinteria School for Boys (Cate School, near Santa Barbara).

Entered California Institue of Technology, September 1956. Flunked out Febuary, 1958, due to having discovered a



book store jammed with used science fiction magazines.

Graduated Washburn University, Kansas, June 1962: BA in Mathematics with Minor in Psychology. Half the unversity was scattered to the winds by a tornado a month after I left. One year graduate work in mathematics at UCLA before I dropped out to write.

First story publication: THE COLDEST PLACE, Worlds of If, December 1964.

Married Marilyn Joyce Wisowaty, September 6, 1969. We me at the NYcon, 1967. No children. We reside in Tarzana, California. I have written at every length from 700 words to 250,000 words. Most of my work is fiction, but there have been speculative articles, speeches for high schools and colleges, television scripts, political aciton in support of the space program, and 17 weeks of a newpaper comic strip.

I've collaborated with a variety of writers. In two cases, it was <u>eight</u> writers building a solar system from beginning to end.

INTERESTS: Hiking. Science Fiction conventions. Computerized games. AAAS meetings and other gatherings of people at the cutting edge of the sciences. The L5 Society. Bowling.

Saving civilization and making a little money. Moving humankind into space by any means, but particularly by making space endeavors attractive to commercial interests. The Citizens Advisory Council for a National Space Policy is my house, with Marilyn to hold local civilization together, and collaborator Jerry Pournelle to do the organizing.

E. Smith Memorial Award), both for service to the science fiction field. Japanese awards for RINGWORLD and INCONSTANT MOON, both awarded 1979. <u>Inkpot</u>, 1979, form San Diego Comic Convention. Various Guest-of-Honor plaques.

Doctorate of Letters, honorary, from Washburn University, May 1984.

I grew up with dogs: Keeshonds, the show dogs my mother has raised for nearly fifty years. I live with cats. I have passing acquaintance with racoons and ferrets. Associating with nonhumans has surely given me some insight into the problem of dealing with alien intelligences.

THE LEGACY OF HEOROT, with Jerry Pournelle and Steven Barnes. Novel.

THE WORLD BUILDERS PROJECT, involving eight collborators, has not yet been sold as a book. Largely illustrations. I'll be writing continuity.

Art Show Rules

The following information is to help you find your way around the art show.

The art show cannot take responsibility for checking your belongings. We also cannot allow obviously large bags, briefcases, backpacks, portfolios or extraneous artwork into the show, and we reserve the right to look into any bag as it is leaving the show. These rules are to protect the artwork, and we request your co-operation.

The art show will not allow photographs to be taken in the art show room except with the permission of the artist and the show director. If you carry a camera into the show, we will request you to put it into a stapled paper bag.

Before you can bid on any art work, you must register at the art show desk. You will be assigned a special bidder's number, which you will use each time you bid. We will take your name, address and phone number. Bids may not be withdrawn once made. Once you have registered, you may bid on any item that is for sale before Sunday at 11:30 am., simply by writing your name, number, and amount bid on the bid sheet. Bids must be in even dollar amounts, and may be more than the minimum bid.

Art work with two or more bids by Sunday at 11 am. will go up in the auction.

You must pick up all artwork by 4 pm. on Sunday. If you do not, you will be liable for the amount of the bid and all costs in shipping and tracking you down.

You can pay for your artwork by MasterCharge, Visa, cash, or by check with two or more forms of identification.



We've tried to integrate the programming with the Con Suite to a gerater degree than usual in the belief that the Con Suite should be more than just another room party. We hope to have our professional guests available for informal discussion there at various times during the con. We've also increased the number of readings/discussions with individual pros.

Finally, there are several program items we'd like to draw your attention to. These are ones that we particularly like and ones that may require a little explanation to be fully appreciated. Major events include our Principal Speaker and Artist Guest of Honor speeches, along with a special autographing session with Larry Niven so that you don't have to carry books around for the entire convention hoping to run into him. Also, our formal Masquerade will be held Saturday night. Since Balticon was the only other large East Coast regional to hold one this year, we're hoping for some very good costumes.

Other events include presentations about upcoming films and the Beaumont, Texas plan to become a science fiction oriented city. We also have two improv panels where a topic is given to writers or artists and they have to tell a story or do a drawing about it on the spot. The drawings will be auctioned off after the panel. We also have a Roll Your Own Films panel, where our panelists will discuss what works they'd like to see made into a movie, and who would play the characters.
