Philcon '88 Weapons Policy

No weapons will be permitted, even as part of a costume. A "weapon" is a gun, gun replica, a sword, knife, raygun, or anything that a member of the public would perceive as a weapon. All lasers and models of lasers are also banned, even if they are not operational. Philcon members agree to accept the decision of the Committee as to what is a weapon. Members who do not comply with an instruction not to wear or carry a weapon, or any object that the Committee decides would be perceived as a weapon or laser, will have their membership revoked without refund and will be expelled from the premises of the Hotel.

The only exception is that registered participants in the Masquerade may wear a weapon as part of their costume during the period beginning one-half hour before the Masquerade and ending one-half hour after the Masquerade. No guns or operational lasers are permitted at all. Any other weapon must be affixed in some manner to the costume. This same rule applies to participants in the Costumer's Workshop.
