


On Completeness & Accuracy

The program book staff has made every practical effort to provide a full and accurate description of all Convention events, guests and personnel, and to create a document of lasting historical interest. Subsequent changes may be found on the website (2014.philcon.org) and in the at-con twice-daily newsletter, the *Philcon Rocket*. We're still working on that online PDF notion.

COLOPHON

This book is typeset chiefly in 10-point Garamond, a proportional serif font which evolved from the 15th century and was named for Claude Garamond (c. 1480-1561), a Parisian publisher and leading type designer of the era, credited with introduction to French of the apostrophe, accent and cedilla; the font is known for its parsimonious ink usage (but its italic majuscules are a tad wonky). Section headers are Constantia 12pt, and the script used for signatures is Lucida Calligraphy. The cover uses Constantia and MV Boli.

Design was in Microsoft Publisher 2013 (memory leak for pictures and all), with image management in Cerious ThumbsPlus 9 (2013), graphic elements (page headers and map) created in Visio 5.0c (1998), QR codes via the Google Chart API, and file transfer using Dropbox. Publisher requires Adobe Acrobat Reader to process PDFs, but the designer prefers SumatraPDF.

The book is printed on 32 pages, 8.5 by 11 inches, on 60-pound stock; the cover is four-color process on 80-pound gloss stock, unbled, with 0.25-inch margins; and has saddle stitch bindery.

Print services were by Affordable Offset Printing Inc. of Pennsauken, New Jersey.

In Memoriam

IN MEMORY OF CAROL KABAKJIAN

hiladelphia science fiction fandom lost a beloved figure recently and I have been asked to write a few words about her and about what she meant to our fandom and our community.

I met Carol when she joined the Philadelphia Science fiction society and became a regular at my weekly Dungeons and Dragons campaign, an adventure that lasted 20 years. She was brought to the first walk-through for the Philcon convention committee at the Adams Mark Hotel in 1986 by Richard Kabakjian. They were married on March 28, 1987 and I had the honor of hosting a fannish reception for them at a room party at Balticon that month. Their marriage was a happy one which endured and they were always seen together at every event they attended.

We talked during the run-through as I was chairing my first Philcon at the time and we had a need for a person to run the Committee Den Before they left that day, Carol was the head of the Committee Den and became a fixture on the Philcon Committee thereafter. According to Rich, this pretty much "sealed her fate" as a Committee member and con organizer. She served many chairs well as time went by as she did me that first year. Over the years, she variously ran Con Suite, Registration and Committee Den and gave her time freely to make the conventions she was involved in a success. She also served with Rich, her husband, as part of the celebrated Two-Headed Secretary of the Philadelphia Science Fiction Society. Since the bylaws of the PSFS only allowed one person to hold an office for two consecutive terms, Carol would be secretary for two years and then Rich for two years and then they would switch again. Newsletters for the Society were quite a lot of pages in those days and it was a hard job to get it out every month but the two of them always got it done.

Also in 1986, Phrolicon was born, a small relaxacon held in southern New Jersey. Carol and Rich were both founding members of the convention committee and were on the con committee for its entire 12-year existence, Carol running the con suite for the entire duration of Phrolicon.

But as important as they all are, I think Carol's most important contribution to fandom was the founding and chairing of the first East Coast Filk Convention, Concerto. In remembering those days, Rich says that Phrolicon was the "birth mother" of Concerto. It gave Carol plenty

of experience with a small 100-person size con and when she realized that there were no filk conventions east of Ohio, the concept of a east coast Fik con was born. I had the honor of negotiating a contract for them and serving as the hotel liaison for the first Concerto.

Carol went to ConChord 4 in Los Angeles, took notes on what filk con should be, came back and set up a small committee, made 100 t-shirts and the con was officially born.

I will let Rich pick up the story from there: "There was never a Concerto 2 as we know it; a few months before con, the Cherry Hill Holiday Inn went out of business, and it was practically impossible to find a suitable replacement in time. So we somehow got in touch with Spencer Love, who threw together a committee up in Boston, bought the dealers and the sold memberships we had so far, and ran with it ... Concertino was born. This proved to be the beginning of the unique east coast tradition of the rotating filk convention (NEFilk), later to include Washington and New York, still thriving 24 years later."

There are so many stories of those days that no brief summary could include them all. Suffice it to say that Carol was a good person and will be missed by her husband, her friends and all of us fortunate to know her. I do not know if there is an afterlife but imagine that if there is, Carol is there, organizing the Angels to attend the first ever divine filk convention. I know it will be a success.

IN MEMORY OF SUE KAHN

arlier this year, we lost Sue Kahn to pancreatic cancer. Sue was a long-time member of the Philadelphia Science Fiction Society who puts on Philocon, and one of those who help put on Philcon and similar cons.

I first met Sue a couple of decades ago, when Sue was helping out on Boskone, a convention similar to Philcon that takes place in February in Boston. Dennis met her later, when Sue was involved as head of Registration for Lunacon, a convention similar to Philcon that takes place in March in New York, and Dennis was also a member of the Lunacon Committee. I worked for Sue as a registrar when she did Lunacon, and helped her out running Staff

Den as Philcon's long time Staff Den Goddess, as well as lending a hand when she ran Staff Den for MilPhil, the World Science Fiction Convention in Philadelphia in 2001. Sue's husband Rich Ferree is also a fan, and ran Registration for Philcon for years. We've known the family since their children Tyler and Ruth were toddlers, and attended the New Years Day brunches they held at their home for years.

One of Sue's most endearing virtues was patience. When she wasn't being a fan, Sue was a pediatrician, with a practice in Pelham, New York. Patience came in handy when dealing with the children she treated as a pediatrician (and dealing with concerned parents.) It arguably came in handier in SF fandom, as being a con runner has been aptly described as an exercise in cat herding. Sue blithely took all in stride, and we seldom saw her really ruffled or upset, regardless of how annoying what she had to deal with might have been.

This was not Sue's first bout with cancer. She had been diagnosed with lymphoma several years ago, and underwent chemo-therapy in an ultimately successful treatment, returning to her professional practice and her family responsibilities and fan activities. Chemo is unpleasant at best, but Sue took it in stride as she did everything else. When we heard she had been diagnosed with pancreatic cancer, we were dismayed. It's not the kind that can be successfully treated. Sue's was caught early, as a by product of examination and treatment for an unrelated ailment, and treatment was begun. We had cautious hopes that perhaps catching it as early as it was might make successful treatment possible, but it was not to be. Sue lasted longer than most pancreatic cancer sufferers do, but eventually she had to be moved into a hospice and expired there.

We'll miss the good friend of many years. Her husband will miss his wife, and her teenaged children will miss their mother. Philcon will miss the dedicated staffer who was an integral part of making Philcon happen for longer than we've been involved with it.

I've taken over Sue's role as Staff Den Goddess, and I'll do my best to run it as well as she did. I'll certainly have a fine example to follow, and I'd like to think she'll be there in spirit.

Good bye, Sue. We'll do our best to pick up and carry on for you what you did well for many years. ###

THE PHILIP K. DICK AWARD

resented annually with the support of the Philip K. Dick Trust, The Philip K. Dick Award recognizes distinguished science fiction published in paperback original form in the United States. The award is sponsored by the Philadelphia Science Fiction Society and the Philip K. Dick Trust and the ceremony by the NorthWest Science Fiction Society.

The 2014 award (for work published in 2013) was announced on Friday, April 18, at Norwescon 37, in SeaTac, Washington. The winner was *Countdown City*, by Ben H. Winters, published by Quirk Books. A special citation was given to *Self-Reference Engine*, by Toh EnJoe and translated by Terry Gallager (Haikasoru).

The other nominees were A Calculated Life (Anne Charnock, 47North), The Mad Scientist's Daughter (Cassandra Rose Clarke, Angry Robot), Ancillary Justice (Ann Leckie, Orbit), Life on the Preservation (Jack Skillingstead, Solaris), and Solaris Rising 2: The New Solaris Book of Science Fiction (ed. Ian Whates, Solaris).

The judges were Elizabeth Bear (chair), Siobhan Carroll, Michael Kandel, Jamil Nasir, and Timothy Sullivan.

The upcoming judges are Jon Armstrong, Ritch Calvin, Ellen Klages, Laura J. Mixon (M.J. Locke), and Michaela Roessner-Herman.

PSFS Young Writers' Contest

d ince circa 1990, a short story contest has been RULES conducted by the Philadelphia Science Fiction Society, open to students in Philadelphia and to child members of the convention. The winners of the 2014 contest will be announced at Philcon.

Entrants in public and private schools grades 5-8 (middle school division) and 9-12 (high school) submit a story of up to 1,000 words in the genres of science fiction or fantasy. Winners (up to two per division per year) are honored at and receive free membership to Philcon, plus a cash or gift certificate prize, with a matching donation to their schools.

The contest was co-founded by, and has been coordinated since 1995 by, Lew Wolkoff.

WHY ISN'T PHILCON IN "PHIL" ADELPHIA?

Like all SF/F conventions, Philcon requires a particular mix of large and small event spaces quite unlike that of "mundane" conferences, plus reasonable lodging rates; among fannish cons our attendance is mid-range, and we try to avoid schedule collisions with other cons in the region that share a pool of program participants and members. Very few Philadephia-area hotels satisfy all of these constraints.

For similar reasons the Zenkaikon anime convention, with whom we share staff, has moved to the Lancaster County Convention Center (opened 2009) after the aging Valley Forge Scanticon was converted to a casino.

WHERE HAS PSFS MET?

For many years the PSFS met in the upper room of the historic Franklin Inn Club (The Franklin Inn. com), founded in 1902 as a gathering place for the area's literary activities, and located since 1907 at 205 South Camac Street (then known as "The Alley of the Arts," a few blocks southeast of City Hall).

In 2004 meetings relocated to the Rotunda (TheRotunda.org), a former house of worship built in 1911 and purchased by the University of Pennsylvania in 1996, and by 2011 to International House (ihousephilly.org) in University City.

DEEP HISTORY!

Philcon has been held almost annually since 1936, but hard documentary evidence prior to 1999 (see page 6) is hard to come by. While we search it out, two past chairs (Gary Feldbaum and Joann Lawler) have provided these insights:

The 1981 event was chaired by Frank Richards, 1982-83 by Gary Feldbaum, and 1984-85 by Joann Lawler. The 1982 program book is erroneous, due to an error peculiar to the pre-DTP era: the staff list was edited by covering the prior year's entries, and the tape dropped off.

The 1982 Philcon was known as "82.1" because it was held in January 1983, rather than the traditional November.

In 1982, the principal speaker and AGoH were C.J. Cherryh and Carl Lundgren, respectively.

The 1983 headliners were James P. Hogan and Real Musgrave. 1984 saw Larry Niven and Sean Spacher.

1985 welcomed L. Sprague deCamp.



For reasons of space, not all tracks have a dedicated room. Consider it an incentive to move around and discover something new.

PROGRAMMING TRACKS

Anime

SF/F in animated form, from Japan.

Art

Technique and business, demos, guided art show tour.

Costuming

For the novice to the master, for re-enactors, cosplayers and LARPers. See also: hall costumes, the masquerade.

CUTTING EDGE

Computer games, blogs, webcomics and more.

FAMILY

Interactive, hands-on games, crafts and workshops (also LEGO bricks). Intended for persons 7 to 12 (younger with parental supervision, older if there's room). Sometimes known as "Children's Programming."

FANDOM

Tales of fanac past and topics of current interest, such as health and dating.

Filk

The folk music of SF fandom; concerts, sing-alongs for newcomers, and late-night performances of the standards.

GAMING

The design and business of games.

LITERARY

Philcon's principal focus is written works of the imagination, be they short stories or sagas, in the genres of science fiction, fantasy and horror; also the business of same.

MEDIA

Comics, TV, movies and web. See also: Anime.

SCIENCE

... and engineering and technology.

WRITING FUNCTIONS

STUDENT WRITING CONTEST

Each year, PSFS conducts a contest for students in grades 5 through 8, and the winners are announced at Philcon. See elsewhere in this book for full details.

WRITING WORKSHOP

Submit your short work pre-con for review, then discuss in a group. Generally refereed by Darrell Schweitzer.

EXHIBITS

ART SHOW

Buy, sell, exhibit and vote. Print shop and ASFA charity auction, plus the special exhibit of LEGO models.

CONCERTS

Philcon will often have a special musical guest, either a solo performer or an ensemble.

HALL COSTUMES

Be a roving demonstration of your fannish ideals and/or sewing skills, be the topic Martian militia or post-apoc princess. (Please stay family-friendly and bystander-safe.)

MASQUERADE

Show off your costume on-stage, before an audience and judges; held Saturday evening. See full rules elsewhere.

OTHER FIXED FUNCTIONS

CON SUITE

Snacks and socializing. At the Crowne Plaza Cherry Hill, is located above the program rooms, on a lodging level, adjoining the elevator lobby.

DEALERS ROOM

The unusual, the hard-to-locate, and the wonderful: used and rare books, costumes, T-shirts, swords, models, etc.

FAN TABLES

Chat with representatives of fan groups and other SF/F conventions. In the pre-function area, near Registration.

GAMING PROMENADE & SUITE

In addition to open gaming, tournaments and demos in the area just outside the dealer's room, you can enjoy relaxing and gaming with others in the Philcon Gaming Suite. Tap our board and card game bank or bring your own favorite. Beverages and snacks are available. ###

PHILCON RULES, POLICIES & INFORMATION

"We demand rigidly defined areas of doubt and uncertainty!" (Douglas Adams, 1979) Well, no uncertainty here.

o help ensure an enjoyable experience for yourself and your fellow members of Philcon, please review and comply with the rules described here. We reserve the right to take any appropriate action, up to and including revoking the membership, without refund, of anyone who refuses or fails to comply with any Philcon policy, hotel policy, or the law.

GENERAL RULES, CODE OF CONDUCT & APPROPRIATE BEHAVIOR

If you have any problems, please come to Crystal Ballroom I (Convention Operations) on the Main Floor opposite Registration.

First, and most importantly, you must comply with the laws and regulations of the State of New Jersey, the county of Camden, the township of Cherry Hill, the Crowne Plaza Hotel, and the policies of Philcon.

Be respectful towards others at all times. This includes the membership, participants, volunteers, staff and committee of Philcon, the staff of the hotel and everyone else you may encounter.

If someone does not want to engage in a personal conversation with you, do not try to start or continue such a conversation. If someone does not want to pursue a personal relationship with you, do not try to start or continue such a relationship. Such behavior may be considered harassment, and will be considered inappropriate and dealt with as such. Be polite and ask permission before moving forward with a relationship. Stop if someone says no.

Philcon is a venue dedicated to the expression and free exchange of ideas for the purposes of critical examination, discussion, and consideration. The personal views of Philcon's individual staff, program participants, or members are not necessarily those of the Philcon conference committee, and our dedication to the free expression of those ideas should not be considered endorsement. Please be accepting of the fact that other people are also free to disagree with you.

Damage to the hotel or its property, to the property of Philcon, or the person or property of anyone else is the financial responsibility of the perpetrator or, if the perpetrator is a minor, their parent and/or Guardian.

Except for service animals, Hotel policy prohibits pets in any area of the hotel, including guest rooms.

No interference with the personnel of either the hotel or Philcon will be tolerated.

All parties must be held in designated areas (i.e., the "hospitality floors" of the hotel). Any others will be shut down.

Alcohol may not be served in open parties. All parties are considered open parties unless they are by invitation only.

No presentation on stage shall be permitted unless approved by the Committee. Please refer to the weapons policy which is set forth later on in this document.

Food at catered events such as Meet the Pros party, the Con Suite, or room parties is meant to serve as snacks and light refreshments, not as meals. Do not expect (or attempt) to use such fare as breakfast, lunch or dinner. Please visit the hotel's restaurant, consult the Restaurant Guide for local eateries or bring food for your meals.

Do not drop or throw items over lobby railings or down staircases.

We ask that you please be courteous and ask for permission from people before you take their photograph or record them in any way. This includes people wearing costumes.

All costumes (Masquerade, hall costumes, or cosplay) and other outfits must cover the customary body parts (i.e., genitals, buttocks, female breasts). Remember, Philcon is a family-friendly event. You must comply with all applicable laws regarding dress and exposure.

Disruptive behavior is grounds for ejection from Philcon without a refund.

VIOLATIONS OF RULES

Philcon reserves the right to take any action in response to misconduct or violations of the Philcon Rules, Hotel Rules, or violations of law that Philcon deems appropriate under the facts and circumstances. This includes, but is not limited to, talking with the parties involved, attempting to mediate a solution, issuing verbal warnings, revoking memberships and directing persons to leave the conference areas, involving Hotel staff or security, contacting law enforcement, or choosing not to take action. Philcon will not require anyone making a complaint to mediate.

Memberships may be revoked without refund and any person may be expelled, or other action may be

taken, for reasons which include the following:

- Violations of ANY of the Philcon Rules, including the Code of Conduct, Weapons Policy, and Alcohol Policy.
- Disruptive behavior in the Conference Areas.
- Violation of any law or of the policies of the hotel.

REPORTING MISCONDUCT

If you feel that someone is engaging in misconduct or a violation of these rules, we suggest the following:

If you feel comfortable doing so, point out the inappropriate behavior to the person(s) involved. Often this will resolve the problem immediately.

If you do not feel comfortable talking to the person(s) or if talking with them does not resolve the problem, please report the situation immediately to the Operations office which is located in Crystal Ballroom I. Please try to provide a name, badge name/number and/or a physical description of the person(s) involved. We need to know about any incident as soon as possible during Philcon in order to take appropriate action. Philcon will not require anyone making a complaint to mediate. Any complaint of misconduct will be promptly investigated.

If you need help locating the Operations office, please ask any Philcon committee or staff member.

IDENTIFICATION

Student and Military memberships require appropriate government- or school-issued ID.

Members must wear their badges in a visible location when within the Conference Areas. If you lose a badge once, it may be replaced with a \$10 fee and proper identification. If you lose a badge more than once, you will have to pay the full membership fee to obtain a replacement.

CHILDREN

No child under the age of 16 will be admitted to Philcon except in the company of a Parent and/or Guardian. We require a signed waiver of the conference's responsibility. Proper ID of the Parent and/or Guardian (government-issued) is required.

Children aged 0-6 years, "babies and very young children," must be accompanied by an adult at all times.

Children aged 7-12 years, "children," must be supervised by an adult at all times.

Children aged 13 and older, "teens," may be present at the conference without direct adult supervision.

Damage caused by children is the financial responsibility of their Parents and Guardians.

WEAPONS POLICY (INCL. COSTUME WEAPONS)

Weapons and weapon-shaped objects are prohibit-

ed: guns, gun replicas, knives, lasers, model lasers, paint ball or splatter guns, as well as anything that could be perceived as a weapon by the public and law enforcement authorities.

Laser target designators and laser pointers are prohibited in the Conference Areas (with the exception of laser pointers used by guest speakers as part of a presentation).

The sole and partial exception to the Weapons Policy applies to registered participants in the Masquerade. With the permission of the Masquerade Director, participants in the Masquerade may wear a weapon (excepting operational guns and functional lasers) from 30 minutes before to 30 minutes after the Masquerade, outside the Masquerade area, but only if affixed to the costume. Participants may manipulate weapons (draw, brandish, gesticulate, but not discharge) as part of their onstage performance, but at no other time.

The Committee shall have the final say on what constitutes a weapon or improper conduct.

ALCOHOL & SMOKING

The drinking age in the State of New Jersey is 21. We expect you to obey the law.

Alcoholic beverages are prohibited in all Conference Areas at all times, with the sole exception of the Meet the Pros party on Friday night or any other time the hotel offers a hotel bar. If a hotel bar is located in a Conference Area, you may consume the beverages purchased from that hotel bar in the vicinity of the bar.

As stated above, alcohol may not be served in open parties. All parties are considered open parties unless they are by invitation only.

Smoking is permitted only in those rooms and areas, if any, designated by the Crowne Plaza Hotel. The Conference Area is non-smoking.

ART SHOW

The full rules and regulations pertaining to the Art Show and bidding are set forth separately.

Photography and videography in the Art Show is prohibited, as it may infringe on the copyrights of individual artists, unless cleared by the Art Show staff in advance. The exception is any exhibit of original LEGO models.

The Art Show staff and the Philcon Committee have final say over any conflicts.

ADMINISTRATION

CON SUITE

Philcon has a hospitality suite, where food and beverage refreshments are served and a friendly, social atmosphere is maintained. Please stop by to relax and enjoy yourself.



Located in one of the suites on a lodging floor of the hotel. (In 2013, in room 1023.)

PROGRAM OPS/GREEN ROOM

Where program participants get their badges, schedules, and other information. Generally located, like the con suite, on a lodging floor.

OPERATIONS

Regular members should only need us if something goes wrong, or to report misconduct or violations of Philcon's policies (see "Reporting Misconduct"). It is located in Crystal Ballroom I, across the hallway from Registration and the Information Desk. Please ask any Philcon staff member for directions.

VOLUNTEERS

Dozens of people plan Philcon beforehand, but we need additional bodies during—for load-in/break-down, room monitoring, and more. Visit the table near Registration to learn of assignments and rewards.

And by "bodies" we mean living, breathing persons. (Insert extended and belabored zombie joke here.)

THE POCKET PROGRAM GUIDE

A booklet containing the what-when-where-who of the conference, with descriptions of each program item and their respective participants. Usually includes a small map and a quick-to-scan schedule grid. Available from the registration desk.

THE PHILCON ROCKET

This single-sheet supplement, printed in daily morning and evening editions, apprises you of program changes, games, parties, and awards in the art show and masquerade. Available at various locations around the con, including Registration, Information, and the Con Suite.

DEFINITIONS

"We" means the Philcon Conference Committee ("the Committee"), staff, and volunteers of Philcon and the Philadelphia Science Fiction Society.

"You" refers to any person present at, participating in, or who is a member of the Philcon conference.

"The Hotel" means the Crowne Plaza Hotel of Cherry Hill, New Jersey.

The "conference area" includes the Art Show, Dealer's Room, Masquerade, Gaming, Con Suite, function rooms, and the hallways and lobby levels around them, as well as any area where any activities of Philcon are taking place. Some of these policies also apply to the hotel's sleeping rooms, hallways and facilities.

"Guardian" means "parent or legal guardian."

"Minor" means a person less than 18 years of age.

"Student" means any person enrolled as a student in a formal educational institution who possesses an active school -issued ID. ###

ART SHOW RULES

Art Show Director: Joni Brill Dashoff

he Philcon Art Show is an exhibit and market of original science fiction, fantasy, and fannish art in two- and three-dimensional forms (sketches, paintings, sculpture, jewelry, and more) executed by professional and amateur artists. Use your Philcon badge to can enter the Art Hall (Grand Ballroom B), view the artworks, and vote for your favorite by popular ballot. You can also meet artists at the Friday night reception and at art technique demonstrations.

All artworks (other than those marked "NFS," Not for Sale) are for sale by competitive bid, written and voiced. If that's too much stress, we offer a **Print Shop** for direct sales of photoprints, lithographs, and other items.

How do I bid?

Are you a registered member of Philcon, as evidenced by your badge? First step: go to the Art Hall and register at the Art Show Control Desk to receive your bidder number.

Each piece of artwork is tagged with an ID/bid sheet listing the title, artist, and medium. It includes one or more bid lines, where you legibly write your name, bidder number and dollar amount of the bid. The color of the bid sheet (blue, yellow, white) indicates the sale status of the artwork:

Blue bid sheet: For display only, not for sale ("NFS"). Yellow bid sheet: Limited edition photoprint or multi-

ple-copy artwork for sale at preset price only. A print with a yellow bid sheet will have one line for a written bid. The first written bid, which must match the sale price, buys the print. Usually there will be multiple copies of the print for direct sale in the Print Shop at the same preset price.

White bid sheet: Original artwork for sale to the highest bidder, beginning at a minimum bid specified by the



artist. Each bid must be at least as high as the minimum and higher than any preceding bid.

If you change your mind, do not scratch out any written bids. Instead, ask the staff for assistance.

WHEN BIDDING, REMEMBER:

Keep track of all your bids. When placing a written bid on multiple items, assume you will be the winning bidder on all of them. This way, you can avoid buying more art than you can afford.

Pace your bids. If you have reached your limit, wait until you have lost an item to a higher bidder before bidding on an additional item.

Check your bid sheets. Return to the Art Hall shortly before it closes (Sunday at noon) to check the bid sheets and see which items you have won by written bid and which will go to voice auction.

HOW LONG CAN I BID?

Written bidding closes Sunday at 12:00 p.m. (noon). At that time the Art Hall will be cleared of all members. Any artwork with TWO or fewer bids will sell to the bidder with the highest written bid (see "When do I pay?"). Artworks with THREE bids or more will proceed to the voice auction (ee below).

VOICE AUCTION?

Written bidding closes at 12:00 p.m. (noon) on Sunday. Any artwork with TWO or fewer bids goes to the highest bidder, but an artwork with at least THREE bids proceeds to the voice auction. The auction is held Sunday 1:00 p.m. to 2:00 p.m., in or near the Art Hall. Please consult your pocket program for the exact location.

At the voice auction, the artworks are open to further bids by additional bidders. Therefore, you should attend to make further bids on pieces you wish to buy. The bidder making the highest bid by voice will buy the art at that price. If there are no voice bids, the artwork will be sold to the bidder with the highest written bid.

WHEN DO I PAY?

Art Show Sales operate Sunday 1:30 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. in the Art Hall. At this time, you are required to pick up and pay for all items of art you have won by written bid or voice auction.

We accept MasterCard, Visa, cash, travelers' checks, and personal check with ID (in accordance with rules set by the Philcon Treasurer). We require proof of ID (at least one photo and proof of address) for all buyers at time of payment.

You must pick up and pay for your own purchases, i.e., we will not accept proxies.


ALTERNATIVES TO BIDDING?

Philcon offers QUICK SALES. If and only if there are NO WRITTEN BIDS on a piece, that piece may be immediately purchased at the Quick Sale price with the caveat that the physical piece may not be removed from the Art Hall before Saturday 6:00 p.m.

The Print Shop is a separate display area of photoprints (reproductions of original art), lithographs, and other multiple-copy artwork for direct sale at a preset price. All copies of each item are displayed on a single extended hanger. Bring your selected items to the Print Shop sales desk and our staff will complete the sale immediately.

MEET THE ARTISTS?

Philcon offers several opportunities to meet exhibiting artists and learn about artistic technique and the business. The Friday night Meet the Pros reception is held partially within the Art Hall. Some artists operate a table in Artist Alley in the Dealers Room (see p.16). Scheduled program items include panel discussions and slide shows (in the program rooms) and art technique demonstrations (in the Art Hall).

MASQUERADE & HALL COSTUME RULES

Director: Aurora Celeste

he name "masquerade" implies a masked ball, and for the first few decades of fandom it was; but at your typical modern SF/F convention, it's a fashion show before an audience. (Many conshold a costumed dance separately.) Each entry walks on stage, performs a brief skit or simply spins to fully display the costume, and walks off. Entries may be individuals or groups.

What manner of costumes is Philcon looking for? They may be Re-Creation (duplicating a specific, documented image) or Original (your own design). Science fiction, fantasy, steampunk, medieval, anime cosplay, Furry, Renaissance, Regency—if it relates to the any of the convention's many topics, we'd love to see it. But keep it "PG-13," please—no flagrant nudity, and mind the adage that "no costume is no costume."

Take your turn in the spotlight and let the crowd go wild!

How to register

Masquerade registration will take place at Philcon on Friday and Saturday, through Saturday afternoon. It is located in the ballroom foyer.

Please write legibly on the entry form. With the form, submit any (1) instructions or text for the emcee, (2) music and instructions for the tech crew, and (3) Re-Creation costume documentation for the judges, consisting of printed copies, but not books or videotapes. If a group entry, every member must sign the release form.

BEFORE AND AFTER YOU'RE ON STAGE

Be kind to yourself: Get adequate sleep, and remember to eat. You'll be on stage for only 60 seconds, but may be in the Green Room for up to (but probably less than) four hours.

Rehearse! Although this is a costume competition, not a talent show, you don't want to bore the audience. Attend the tech rehearsal on Saturday afternoon and let the staff know what you'll need for a smooth presentation.

When the Green Room opens, a few hours before the masquerade, check in there and let the den mom take care of you and any excess accessories (glasses, bags, cell phones, etc.)

After you present, stick around in the Green Room for the awards—you might be a winner. There will also be a photo opportunity outside.

Smoking is prohibited in all Masquerade areas.

WHEN YOU'RE ON STAGE

Surprise the audience. Never surprise the Crew!

Each entry is limited to 60 seconds. Each contestant may appear only once on stage, but you may enter multiple costumes—so long as each appears on a different body. Because there are no live mics on stage, use prerecorded music and dialog, or text read by the emcee.

SAFETY ON STAGE

We prohibit anything that might endanger entrants, audience, judges or crew, either in the Green Room or on stage. Any exceptions must be cleared in advance by, and only by, the Masquerade Director.

All **special effects** must be clearly outlined, and receive **prior** approval by the masquerade staff, for legality and safety. When in doubt, ask the staff.

No fire, flame, or smoking.

No messy substances (wet, dry, oily or otherwise) that might damage another contestant's costume.

No laser pointers.

Onstage display of **weapons** requires **prior** approval of the Masquerade Director, and entrants without clearance will be disqualified. Philcon permits the display of weapons for 30 minutes before and after the masquerade, but at no other times.

Live animals may be used on stage as part of a costume or presentation only with the Directors' permission. Please keep animals question under control at all times and please "potty" them appropriately before going on stage. Your pets' safety is our paramount concern.

MUSIC AND VOICE

There are no mikes on stage, and even if you have opera training, don't try to project. Instead, all dialog must be read by the emcee or prerecorded. We can handle these audio formats:

Audio CD, preferably with the desired soundtrack as the first and only track on the disk.

Data CD with .wav or .mp3 files.

USB drives with .wav or .mp3 files.

Otherwise our tech director, Syd Weinstein, has a library.

How you will be judged

COMPETITION SKILL DIVISIONS

The Philcon masquerade uses the following skill divisions so that entrants compete against peers with comparable experience, but you may elect to enter in a higher skill division.

Young Fan (youth): Any contestant 13 years of age or younger, and not part of an adult group.

Novice (beginner): Has not won a masquerade award at a major regional con (Philcon or similar).

Journeyman (intermediate): Has won three (3) or fewer awards for different costumes at major regional cons.

Craftsman/Master (advanced): Has won more than three (3) awards for different costumes at major regional cons, Worldcons, or Costume-Cons; or who has won Best in Show at a Worldcon or Costume-Con. Professional costumers must enter in this division.

Not in competition: If you want to display your ingenuity on stage without competing.

COMPETITION CATEGORIES

Original costume: Design is the contestant's creation, either completely novel or inspired by an SF, fantasy, mythological, or other source.

Re-Creation costume: Design is copied from a film, TV show, theatrical presentation, comic, or other medium

with at least one good view. As a duplicate or adaptation of another's published design work, it is highly recommended that you provide documentation for the judges, which may be as simple as a picture.

WORKMANSHIP JUDGING

This is optional, and is conducted in the Green Room before the show. The workmanship judge will consider accomplishment in crafting the costume, including detail not visible on stage. Let your den mom know if you want your costume or a part of it judged for workmanship.

If you'd rather avoid the stage, you can also undergo workmanship judging in isolation.

FOR THE AUDIENCE

Please, no flash photography while contestants are on stage; wait for the photo op afterward. Safety is our paramount concern.

HALL COSTUMES

Philcon encourages the wearing and display of hall costumes (street-legal and conforming to weapons policy, please! See page 9) and will have several roaming judges handing out award ribbons in the public areas of the conference. Or, stop by Masquerade Registration in the ballroom foyer and show us your inventiveness! ###

PHILCON'S FORMER HAUNT

The 1990 through 2000 editions of Philcon were held at the Adams Mark Hotel (400 Monument Road at East City Avenue, a.k.a. City Line Avenue), and many long-time attendees were annoyed when the convention moved (first to Center City, then across the Delaware River to New Jersey). They may not be aware of the history of the venue which, "by the 1990s ... was scrambling for business, hosting Starving Artist art sales, sci-fi conventions, and Pickle Packers International meetings" [emphasis mine], according to Forgotten Philadelphia: Lost Architecture of the Quaker City (Thomas H. Keels, 2007).

Designed by architect Aaron Colish, it opened in 1965 as the **Philadelphia Holiday Inn Motor Court,** when City Line Avenue was a hopping place and the chain was attempting to penetrate the lucrative Philadelphia market. It had 515 rooms in a 23-story rectangular tower topped with a rotating restaurant, the Top of the Line, and an ad-

joining 24-room conference center with 12,144-square foot Grand Ballroom with imported crystal chandeliers.

The property was sold in 1982 to HBE Corporation and, after a \$32 million renovation (including a replacement restaurant on the ground floor, the Marker), reopened in April 1983 under the new Adam's Mark brand—unfortunately, just as City Line Avenue was losing its luster and travel focus returned to Center City (*).

The building was sold to Target Corporation in November 2004, closed in January 2005, and demolished in 2006 (by which time Philcon was using the Sheraton Philadelphia City Center at Race and 17th Streets; see page 6.)

(*) Particularly the vicinity of the Pennsylvania Convention Center which opened in 1993, replacing the Philadelphia Civic Center (1931-2005) near the University of Pennsylvania, repurposing the trainshed of the former Reading Railroad terminal, and annexing parts of Chinatown.

PRINCIPAL SPEAKERS: SHARON LEE & STEVE MILLER

Appreciation by Lawrence M. Schoen

hen you encounter Sharon Lee and Steve Miller this weekend, you'll see an incredibly talented pair of authors of extraordinary power, beloved by legions of fans, and enjoying the security that a multi-book contract can bestow. But it wasn't always so. Rather, it's a fine illustration of the authors' own *melant'i* and the restoration of balance, or maybe just their talents for both innovation and survival in the all too fickle world of publishing.

The adventures and obstacles their Liaden universe has endured — from the original mass-market Del Rey titles, through their undying popularity in the early days of the internet, beyond the rocky years with Meisha Merlin, to the current era of success with Baen Books — are stranger than the fiction it contains. Other authors would have taken the hint at any of several points along the journey and found another way to make a living. Instead, Philcon's Principal Speakers persevered, remained optimistic, and convinced the people around them they had the right of it.

Some of my earliest memories of this business involve Sharon and Steve, including round table discussions on self-promotion, my first significant fiction sale appearing in the same issue of *Absolute Magnitude* as a Liaden story, and being envious at the adoration and quiet intelligence of their fans who organized parties (hosted in the Liaden Lounge) at major conventions.

As far as I know, Steve pioneered the idea of keeping readers content between novel releases by publishing chapbooks with short stories involving the same characters. Some stories were reprints but others were original. These chapbooks fed the hunger for things Liaden while the couple labored away on novels, maintaining the cohesion of their fans and fleshing out characters and subplots. When I had a few stories of my own and wanted advice on how I might publish a chapbook, I queried Steve and Sharon, hoping their experience might keep me from losing too much money on the deal. Instead, I was told they'd been thinking about expanding their publishing venture to include other authors, and how did I feel about being the first? I vividly remember Steve apologizing that he wouldn't be able to pay me much of an advance. An advance? I'd been worried about how much money I would lose, and instead I was being paid! We did three chapbooks together before we both moved

I'm not the only author to benefit from their generosity. Before the end of Meisha Merlin, Sharon and Steve edited an anthology about ports of call — not the fancy, high ports like Solcintra where the shiny ships put in, but the low ports where darker deals were made. I've had stories in twenty anthologies, but that one is still the best book of them all, because of the editors running the project.

So, no wonder then that when Philcon asked me to say a few words about my friends, past publishers, and editors, I stepped

right up to show my appreciation. But, I need to tell you something else about them, something you need to know.

There's two of them, and it's just not fair.

I swear, one of them is always working, even when the other is asleep. One of them is writing dialogue for this character while the other is outlining the plot points of another. How are the rest of us supposed to compete?

You may know of the common bit of writing advice that anything in a story should serve more than one purpose. Maybe because there are two of them, they've taken this to new heights. Their books are typically not just about one person but about the bond that ties two together, such as the closer-thanbrothers Daav and Er Thom, life-mates Shan and Priscilla, and Val Con and Miri, the complex connection between Miri and Beautiful, or my personal favorite Daav and his deceased lifemate Aelliana. Other two-sided relationships permeate the books on broader levels, such as the reciprocal connection between Pilots and Traders, the symbiotic link found with Korval and their tree, and don't even get me started on the Clutch Turtles! Similarly, these authors are not content to just write Space Opera; the Liaden Universe can be seen as Science Fiction with romantic themes, or as Romance with science fiction themes, basically doubling their audience and their popularity. Like I said above, innovation and survival.

Like the legions of readers that define the Liaden Lounge, I too am a fan of these works. In writing these words I find myself thinking back to cliff-hangers from the last book and I'm chomping at the bit to find out what's going on with Daav and Uncle and two pods from the Tree. I'm sure I'm not the only one hoping for a scene where Jen Sar Kiladi introduces Kamele Waitley to Daav's lifemate, Aelliana.

I'll raise a glass of *blusharie* to my friends if I'm right, and seek balance if I'm not. But before any of that can happen, it's Philcon. Take the time to visit with the convention's Principal Speakers, and prepare to fall in love with the generations of characters they've created.

ARTIST GUEST OF HONOR: BOB EGGLETON

Appreciation by Ryk Spoor

For me, that was true for many years. I first encountered his artwork through his cover for *Flight of the Dragonfly* by Robert Forward (an awesome bit of hard SF, by the way), and through the years I'd keep seeing that name, usually on books whose covers grabbed me and made me at least look at the book. I heard him mentioned at conventions, and then, later, as a man who won Hugo after Hugo after Hugo for his work that spanned horror, fantasy, space opera, and the hardest of hard SF effortlessly. A listing of his cover art is intimidatingly immense – I checked it out on the Internet Science Fiction Database and it is startling how many pages down you have to go before you even reach this millennium—which started fourteen years ago.

And then the legend's name was spoken in relation to one of my books.

Baen Books chose Bob to paint the cover of *Threshold*, and put me in touch with him. As I wanted to make sure I was "up" on his work, I Googled... and discovered Bob was also one of the greatest Godzilla fans alive, and had applied his incomparable talents to capturing the Daikaiju in all his glory. I had to restrain myself from squeeing uncontrollably. And then I did squee uncontrollably anyway,

Forward (1932-2002) was an aerospace engineer who published numerous scientific papers on antimatter and speculative gravitational technology; many of these ideas appeared in his hard-SF novels, including the five-book *Rocheworld* series (1981-1995), of which *Flight of the Dragonfly* (1984) is one version of the first book.

Demonstrating that SF/F fandom is a small world, program book designer Phillip Thorne met Ryk Spoor at Genericon, the on-campus SF/anime convention of Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, in the mid-'90s.

when I saw the cover that he produced, a wonderful cover such as the Golden Age might have aspired to, and probably fallen short of.

Bob is a master of color, lighting, and mood that few artists rival and, in my opinion, none surpass. He can evoke terror and awe, wonder and joy, tension and triumph, in static pictures that nonetheless seem almost alive. Even his sketches, of which I have seen a few, have a power and focus that a lot of published book covers by other artists will never achieve.

I have yet to actually, physically, meet Bob, even though we've had quite a few conversations, electronic and telephone, over the years. I've been extraordinarily fortunate in that he has done, or is doing, more covers for my books—*Portal*, *Castaway Planet*, and my forthcoming *Polychrome*, and we've had conversations on each – and the fact that he enjoys my work was also a wonderful surprise. But while I've come to know that he's not some demigod, but just a regular guy like the rest of us... I still look at his paintings and I don't see that.

I see a legend.

Look at his art, and you will too.

KYLE CASSIDY: CROSS-DIMENSIONAL CAPERER

Appreciation by Stephen H. Segal

he first time I saw Kyle Cassidy, he was in motion, flitting with purpose around a sunny expanse of floor as he set up photographic equipment in the middle of the Palais des Congrès de Montréal, preparing to spend the day making portraits of science fiction fans attending the 2009 Worldcon. Most of the people walking by on their way from one panel discussion to another ambled along with the mellow vibe of the spectator; Kyle, meanwhile, moved with the kinetic energy of the doer, taking light-meter readings and positioning his test subjects just right.

Since then, I've come to understand how emblematic that impression was. More than anything else, perhaps, Kyle Cassidy's fundamental state of being is to always be getting the next thing accomplished. Warren Zevon may have sung "I'll Sleep When I'm Dead"—but Kyle lives by it as a truism.

He keeps moving as a photographer. In the five years since the publication of Who Killed Amanda Palmer? — the art book whose creation launched the collaborative friendship between Kyle, the eponymous singer-songwriter and her not-yet-husband Neil Gaiman—he's pursued documentary-style projects as diverse as his 2012 book War Paint, chronicling the stories of how military veterans acquired their tattoos; "Where I Write," his effort to capture fantasy and science fiction authors amid the self-crafted environments of their creative spaces; "Roller Derby Portraits," his series examining the unique human beauty of these quirky, wheel-footed athletes; and "Alexandria Still Burns," an exhibit and forthcoming documentary film depicting the glorious diversity of America's librarians.

His endless fount of imaginative ideas, though, is not limited to his photography. We were sitting in a bar on Sansom Street last year when he said: "Did you know Isaac Asimov lived in West Philly and worked at the Navy Yard during World War II?"

"I did," I said.

"I'm pretty sure that's the time period when he wrote a bunch of the most famous robot and 'Foundation' stories," Kyle said. "So how come the place where he lived while he did that isn't a Pennsylvania historic landmark?"

I had no answer. Kyle had one, though: Let's start a petition going and make that happen. Thus, several months later, did I find myself standing amid a group of some fifty Philly SF fans—including Michael Swanwick, Gregory Frost, Victoria McManus, Tom Purdom and Gardner Dozois—at the corner of 50th and Spruce, across the street from Asimov's old apartment building, where Kyle photographed us rallying for the state historical commission to sanction a commemorative marker. Thousands of fans across the country have now signed our online petition; we're hoping the application will be approved this year.

That day, we both happened to show up wearing Tom Baker scarves. (Thank the gods that Kyle was rocking the original while I was in the season 18 version, so we were spared any prom-night-faux-pas embarrassment.) But here's the thing about Kyle: He doesn't need to wear a quirky Doctor Who garment to channel his inner cool. He slips smoothly between subcultures as if he were the superhero Harbinger sliding across parallel universes. Thus it is that, one week, he might be found in a tux delivering a speech at the Philly Geek Awards; another, he might be accompanying NPR's Peter Sagal as he prepares to run a marathon, or shooting a portrait of legendary filmmaker Melvin Van Peebles for the cover of the Philadelphia Weekly, or crafting a promotional poster for a lesbian Romeo and Juliet that ends up getting him interviewed by the New York. Times.

I never know what Kyle will do next. Here's what I can always be certain of: It will be new, and it will be awesome.



CAN'T THINK OF A QUESTION FOR BOB?

The first movie seen by Bob Eggleton (born 1960 in Concord, Massachusetts, to an American father, an engineer, and an English mother) was *Mary Poppins* (1964). He works in brush, palette knife, less often airbrush, and pencil, which he believes is underappreciated; he avoided going to art school and feels his art is the better for it.

His subjects include landscapes, alien landscapes, spacescapes, dinosaurs, dragons, kaiju, aliens, and spacecraft; his artbooks are Alien Horizons: The Fantastic Art of Bob Eggleton (1995), Greetings from Earth (2000), Primal Darkness: The Gothic & Horror Art of Bob Eggleton (2003), and Dragon's Domain (2010), a how-to book showing development of his dragon paintings. He created card art

for Magic: The Gathering (c.2000) and a series of Godzilla trading cards (Comic Images 2006); he conceptualized for *Star Trek: The Experience* in Las Vegas, and for the movies *Sphere* (1998), *Jimmy Neutron: Boy Genius* (2001), and *The Ant Bully* (2006).


Eggleton won the ASFA Chesley Award in various categories in 12 years (1986, 1988, 1990, 1993-1999, 2003), the WSFS Hugo Award for Best Professional Artist in eight years (1994, 1996-1999, 2001, 2003, 2004) and once for Best Related Book (2001), the 1988 Jack Gaughn Award for Best Emerging Artist, and has repeatedly been top of readers polls for cover artist in *Analog, Asimov's*, and *Locus*.

He is an elected fellow of the IAAA, the International Association of Astronomical Artists (<u>iaaa.org</u>), which was founded in 1982 and has 130 members in 20 countries.




