The Octopus Orates



The Waterfront Plaza Hotel

We continue to be delighted with our hotel accommodations at the Waterfront Plaza Hotel, Jack London Square. The Waterfront Plaza is a relatively small privately-owned hotel in the heart of Oakland's waterfront tourist district. They've been very cooperative and easy to deal with, and they're looking forward to having a bevy of readers and writers descending upon them.

The con suite will be in the hotel's largest function room, the Spinnaker, during the evenings, and in one of the smaller function rooms during the day. (Our dauntless con suite staff, led by Patty Peters and Donya White, are putting out a great deal of effort and energy to make this logistically complex situation workable; once you've tasted the wonders of the con suite, be sure and let them know that you appreciate their efforts). Programming and the auction will also be in the Spinnaker Room; other convention events will make use of the Chart and Compass Rooms off the main lobby, and the writers' workshop will take place in one of the waterfront parlor suites.

The hotel is literally "on the waterfront," as well as being surrounded by trendy shoppes (and a giant Barnes & Noble), and the Ferry docks right in front. See the Native Guy for pmore details.

The Waterfront Plaza is pleasant, pretty, comfortable, and convenient - everything we wanted in a convention hotel. Single or double rooms are \$89 for Plaza view, and \$99 for Bay view. The deadline for registering at the conference rate is January 21, 1995. If you are not already registered, call the Waterfront Plaza Hotel at (800) 729-3638. The Awards Banquet

The banquet will be an 10:30 a.m. brunch buffet leading into the Tiptree Awards ceremony and the Clarion West auction. Brunch tickets will be \$18 for a yummy all-you-can-eat assortment of eggs, bagels, fresh fruit, and other assorted special treats. Banquet entertainment will be from a special gathering of Loud Women, ranging from Ellen Klages (star of stage, screen, and the Readercon Auction) through Eileen Gunn (noted for the famous panel "Eileen Talks About Whatever She Wants To") to Jeannie Bowman, the woman with the most infectious laugh ever heard.

The James Tiptree Jr. Award will be given for the fourth year land the first time on the West Coast). It goes to the story or book which does the most to expand gender roles in science fiction and fantasy. This year's panel of judges is chaired by Susanna Sturgis, noted witic and anthologist, who will be attending Potlatch along with judges Ellen Kushner and Pat Murphy (and perhaps more), plus, probably, the winner of this year's award. The Tiptree Award is one of the few science fiction awards to come with a cash prize (thanks to all those bake sales and other fundraisers) as well as a chocolate typewriter. If you didn't see the feature on the Tiptree Award, and women in science fiction, in the December issue of Ms. Magazine, you have a treat in store for you.

After the award ceremony, we'll hold the Clarion West Auction, which has in the past featured everything from laser printers to electric guitars, plus the usual array of books, artwork, and special services.

It's the best show in town (and the only show at Potlatch, 'cause the con suite and programming will all be shut down). See you all there!

Writers' Workshops


The Potlatch 4 Writers' Workshops will be held at the Waterfront Plaza Hotel on Saturday and Sunday, February 12 and 13. Based on the successful Potlatch II Writers' Workshops, they reflect the convention theme: Readers and Writers Meet on Common Ground. Our philosophy is to discuss the strengths and weaknesses of each manuscript and the craft of storytelling and writing in a friendly and helpful atmosphere, writer to writer. Your participation in the workshop will require two hours of your time, allowing you to enjoy the rest of the convention.

All workshop participants must be members of Potlatch, and there is no extra charge for participation in the workshop. Writers who are fairly new to the writing/critiquing experience will want to apply for a beginning level workshop. Writers who have made professional fiction sales or have a great deal of short fiction workshop experience should apply for an advanced level workshop.

The deadline for submitting a manuscript is Friday, January 13. Manuscripts must be complete short works of science fiction or fantasy, not longer than 7,000 words. Send six clear photocopies of your manuscript, collated and paper-clipped, to the address below. Be sure to include your name, address and telephone number on the manuscript and to indicate whether you want to be in a beginning or advanced level workshop session. You will be notified at least two weeks in advance of the day and time of your workshop session.

If the number of manuscripts we receive exceeds the number we can accommodate in two days of workshops, we will return any additional manuscripts at our expense.

Clarion West is a non-profit literary and educational organization based in Seattles whose main project is to put on the Clarion West Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers Workshop every summer. The Workshop is taught by six successful writers and editors, each of whom is in residence for a different week. These professionals work closely with about twenty students, who intensively write and critique each other's writing for all six weeks. The Workshop costs about \$2,000 (aside from lost wages), and Clarion West scholarships help needy students defray the cost. Clarion West also sponsors a writers-in-the-schools program, readings, lectures and other special events.

Bocconcini

2 pounds fresh mozzarella 6 large garlic cloves 1/2 cup good olive oil 2 tablespoons dried oregano

1/2 teaspoon crushed dried hot red pepper

If the mozzarella does not come in bite-size pieces, cut it into one inch cubes. Coarsely chop the garlic and combine with olive oil in a large bowl. Stir in the oregano and hot pepper.

Add the mozzarella cubes and toss gently until they are well coated with the oil and seasonings. Let marinate for a minimum of several hours. Serve with toothpicks.
