

One would think after 7 years that it would be easy to do an eighth convention. But, like the eighth climb of Mount Everest, or the eighth trip to the moon (someday), each convention has its own unique challenges and opportunities. This year Judy and I had to take over as co-chairmen in July when the previous chairman had to resign for personal reasons. We are also in a newer, more upscale hotel this year. Guest of Honor Lynn Abbey



Where can you find Russian translations, computer networks, municipal finance, medieval history and a thief named Hanse? These are all part of the life of Lynn Abbey, TROPICON VIII's Guest of Honor.

Writing fantasy for over a decade, Lynn Abbey spent years working as a computer systems analyst in the financial districts of New York City. According to Starlog Magazine, she even worked on budget proposals to help save the city from bankruptcy during its financial crisis. This seems like an unusual occupation for a woman with a college degree in History who now spends her time creating fictional characters with swords and spells.

In 1979, her first novel, Daughter of the Bright Moon, was published by Ace. This fantasy featured a strong female protagonist, Rifkind, whose clan has been massacred, leaving her to survive and thrive on her own. A sequel, The Black Flame, appeared in 1980. Rifkind is the first of Lynn Abbey's strong female protagonists, a hallmark of her work. Rifkind has proved so popular that Tor has issued a Crossroads Adventure Book based on the saga, Warhorn.

Lynn's heroines are often warriors or sorceresses (or both!). They are strong, believable characters that readers can identify with. Her characters are movers and shakers, fiercely independent women. Lynn writes "fantasy in the classic tradition", with a feminist twist.

In the decade since the publication of her first book, she has written five

more fantasy novels, and co-edited 12 volumes of Thieves' World stories with her husband, author Robert Asprin. The first Thieves' World book appeared in 1979. This series is the prototype for the multitude of shared universe series which abound in science fiction and fantasy today. The latest in the ongoing Thieves' World anthology sees publication this month from Ace. The title to watch for is Stealers' Sky.

The Thieves' World shared universe is a unique cooperative effort. The recipe for success is thus. Proceeding along a chronology predetermined by Lynn Abbey, each author works within the framework of the themes for that volume, developing new characters and tales. Geography and some characters are shared, and each story must fit within the guidelines. ("No, you cannot kill 200 people. No, you cannot silt up the harbor.")

The creative talents of ten and more authors are then turned loose. As any fan of Thieves' World will tell you, this has led to lively and interesting stories, creating an engaging tapestry of history and myth.

While Bob Asprin tends to the business and contract aspects of the anthology, Lynn Abbey is the continuity editor for Thieves' World. In addition to writing the comic book adaptation (as well as her own books), she juggles the requirements of the Thieves' World authors and ensures that this joint creation presents a consistent alternate reality to its' large public. And not only the reading public, as Thieves' World has also been adapted to board game, and fantasy role-playing game formats.

Lynn often writes in a pseudo-medieval setting. She explains, "I write fantasy literature primarily because anachronistic settings allow a less cluttered approach to the human condition....The temptation to wallow in the neurosis of modern-day humanity is considerably lessened." Her background in history lends an air of realism and solidity to what are clearly tales not of the world we know.

Lynn's fantasy, Unicorn & Dragon, is set in the time of the Norman conquest. The book focuses on two sisters, one a witch. In this novel and others, Lynn has developed the art of magic as it should have been. She mixes history, myth, and symbolism to make a combination that feels right to her. She doesn't stick to all the "rules".

A departure from her historical fantasies, Lynn's novel, The Guardians, is full of magic, but magic with its' own logic. Manhattan is the background for a tale full of malevolent spirits whose depredations are contained only by witchy ritual. Heroine Lise Brown is thrust unsuspecting into a very different New York City, one where she makes all the difference in the world.

Her stories have appeared in the anthology Alien Encounters; and the Merovingen Nights, and Heroes in Hell series. Works in progress include more in the Unicorn & Dragon series, projected to be six volumes, and the last book of the Daughter of the Bright Moon saga, The Dawn Wolves.

TROPICON is an opportunity to meet the author behind the works. Join us in welcoming Tropicon VIII's Guest of Honor, Lynn Abbey.



One thing about writing about Leslie Turek is that it's sure to embarrass her. Well, heck, that's what makes this so much fun. It's not that I like embarrassing people. It's just that there's something in Leslie that makes her shrug off praise or compliments. And there's a lot to compliment. So knowing that she has to just sit there while I say neat stuff about her makes it that much more fun.

Let's see now, what do I want to tell you about Leslie Turek?

- 1. Leslie Turek chaired a Worldcon AND LIVED! Leslie is one of the main reasons that Noreascon II, the 1980 Worldcon, was a good convention. A lot of people remembered liking N2, and because of that, I think, they trusted Boston to do well at N3. The fact that Leslie has remained actively involved in fandom, in NESFA, at Boskones, and at Noreascon 3, is a tribute to her sanity. This explains why you will see Joe Siclari trying to drag her into a corner during TROPICON so that he can find out her secret. ("C'mon, Leslie, how'd you do it? Drugs? Meditation? C'mon!")
- 2. Leslie Turek is one of the most tolerant, forgiving and reasonable people I know. This does not mean that Leslie is a wimp. She has many strong opinions. It's just that she's far more willing than most opinionated fan-type people to try and see the other side of the story. In fact, in situations where I think she should be angry, or upset, or at least annoyed, she ends up giving me good reasons not to be pissed off.


Actually, we have an agreement. She stays calm, and I get to be pissed off and say nasty things.

- 3. Leslie is a project manager for XAIT. XAIT used to be CCA. What does it do? Sorry, I don't know. ("What does a project manager do, Leslie?" "Well, she manages projects." "Gee, thanks, Les.") Actually, Leslie never said that, but I don't understand enough of that type of work. Leslie tends to keep everyone calm, pitch in where needed and still has good things to say about people. Again, she's no wimp. But, I suspect that many people at her company, who often face heavy deadlines and inadequate support would have quit long ago, if it weren't for her.
- 4. If Leslie could live in a small house in the country with a very big yard, she'd leave in a minute. Well, as long as there were really good restaurants nearby, and a lot of friends. Leslie is an outdoor freak. Unlike many of us, who have to be pushed out the door during nice days, Leslie spends as many hours as humanly possible tramping around in the mud, getting cold and dirty.

Leslie likes to ride horses, likes to go orienteering (ask her - it's generally the art of getting lost and finding your way out. Fun, huh?), driving out in the country and spending every waking moment in her garden. She lives for the nice weather and everything about the country-side. She is currently studying landscape design for fun. Leslie is one of those fans with real interests and a multidimensional life. She also can't imagine anyone being interested in it beside her. She's wrong - it's really very interesting.

- 6. The way Bostonians know it's really cold is if Leslie Turek says it's too cold to eat ice cream. If it's too cold for her, we all go inside, wrap up in every piece of clothing we own and fire up the teapot. Forget going outside it's absolutely too cold to do anything else. This is also very helpful when you're trying to determine if it's spring yet.
- 7. Leslie is invaluable in planning things. For the 3+ years in which we all ran around trying to plan a Worldcon, any time there was an impasse, or we all felt frazzled or stuck, Leslie would look up from her notes and say "well, how about if we~" and come up with the solution. Had she but known what we meant when we said "gee, Leslie, we could just use your advice on occasion" and how much she would end up doing for the '89 Worldcon, she would have moved to Paducah.

Leslie is very good company, and delights in good conversation. She has a wide range of interests and is knowledgeable without ever being boring. So go up to her this weekend, and say something like "Hi, want some chocolate chip ice cream? What's landscape design? That sounds neat." and watch her get all embarrassed. It'll be worth it. You'll make a good friend.



TROPICON VIII's Toastmaster is Caroline Janice Cherryh. If you follow the Campbell and Hugo awards, then you are already familiar with C. J. Cherryh. The John Campbell Award is given to the best new writer of the year. C. J. earned this award in 1977. The Hugo is given to the best fiction of the year. C.J.'s most recent Hugo was awarded in 1989 for best novel.

C. J. Cherryh excells in both the fantasy and science fiction genres. Her keen sense of what shapes a culture shows in her work – the civilizations and aliens she portrays are complex, and believable. Her Hugo nominated novel, Cuckoo's Egg (1985), takes place entirely within the culture of the alien Shonunin. It is gripping, and thoroughly convincing.

The universe of Union and the Alliance has been the setting for half a dozen of her books, including both of her Hugo winning novels, Downbelow Station (1981) and Cyteen (1988). With a richness of detail added by the many tales set on this background, this future history is intricate and fascinating. Rimrunners (1989) is the latest book in this universe.

In addition to being a fine science fiction writer, C. J.'s fantasy works have enthralled many readers. Her latest fantasy, Rusalka (1989), is based on Russian myth. C. J. is currently co-authoring fantasy novels, the Sword of Knowledge series, each with a different co-author. The first in the series, A Dirge for Sabis, was written with TROPICON VI Filk Guest, Leslie Fish.

Special Filk Guest - Julia Ecklar



Julia Ecklar could probably sing the Ft. Lauderdale phone book and make it come out gorgeous.

This, of course is highly unfair. Equally unfair is the fact that she has a vocal range somewhere up in the stratosphere, and can reach the kind of notes ordinary mortals can only reach with the aid of pins stuck in the posterior at the appropriate moment.

As if this weren't bad enough, she is the writer of a totally unreasonable number of wonderful songs, with melodies that stay with you an continue to haunt you for days after you've heard them.

And the songs! Bad enough she can write songs that make your hair stand on end – but she also writes songs that can make you cry, make you laugh, make you want to go out an kill something – even songs that make you glad you are a closet Trekkie. She's done any number of memorable pieces on subjects most of us would never associate with filk – like Helen Keller's "Teacher", or mainstream fiction ("A Rose for Emily"). She's written the song this is probably, next to "Mary O'Meara", the single most performed piece in filk – "Daddy's Little Girl" – which is the theme song Firestarter should have had. She's done some amazingly beautiful media pieces that should make those who look upon media fen as something less than human go hide their heads in shame – like "Crane Dance", inspired by Karate Kid.

Most of us would hate her if we didn't like her so much – because she's also a genuinely <u>fun</u> person to have/be around.

Because Julia is the madwoman who brought you "Rest Stop" – the world's first country'n'western, space truckin' song. She is the person who instigated Threadfall at a con at which Anne MacCaffrey was GoH (with Christmas tinsel). At the same con she organized the ritual burning of firelizards. She is – unlike any number of people I can think of – perfectly capable of making hilarious fun of the things she takes most seriously. To see what I mean, see if you can't catch her doing "I hate little fire lizards" – or "He's Dead, Jim" – or "Catatonia County Rag". One thing I can tell you, being around Julia is never dull. You may wake up in the state pen, but it's never dull.

There's no reason she should need any other talents besides exercising those talented vocal cords and writing those wonderful songs, but, sigh, she's also an aspiring writer of sf and fantasy, with a copious amount of work published in several fanzines. And all this before the age of twenty-five. I won't tell you how old she really is; actually I suspect she's really one of Lazarus Long's relatives — around 200 or so, but eternally youthful. After all, nobody normal could do all the things she does — could they?

Whatever else you do at TROPICON, make certain you catch Julia at the concert; it will be an experience you'll remember for a long time. And do your best to come by the open filks as well; no matter what she sings, it's always a treat to listen to her.

And while you're at it – keep your eyes peeled for that name on the bookstands, because you will soon see it there, maybe even as you read this. Check out the dealers' room and see if one of our enterprising dealers has her newest!

Gail Bennett

Gail Bennett is a commercial artist who discovered fandom in 1981. Since then she has exhibited in art shows around the country and in England, and has illustrated 7 books, including The Doctor Who Cookbook and the Doctor Who "Fix Your Fate" series. She has also written and illustrated for many fanzines. Gail illustrated "Once More" for the MagiCon Bookmark anthology.

Sarah Clemens

Sarah Clemens is a professional artist as well as an author, having appeared in RIPPER!, a collection of Jack the Ripper stories edited by Gardner Dozois and Susan Casper. She has also written scholarly articles, and is working on another novel. Sarah illustrated "Florida" for the MagiCon Bookmark anthology.

Hal Clement

Harry Clement Stubbs has been writing SF since 1942. His logical scientific extrapolations have gained him recognition as one of the field's foremost writers of "hard-science" stories. His more famous works include the novels NEEDLE (1950), MISSION OF GRAVITY (1955), CLOSE TO CRITICAL (1964), and THROUGH THE EYE OF A NEEDLE (1978). His most recent novel is STILL RIVER (1987). He is also quite a good artist.

Will Eisner

Will Eisner is the creator of The Spirit and many other well known comics characters. He has been involved with graphic art since the 1940's, and has influenced many other major comics artists.

Charles Fontenay

Charles Fontenay wrote S-F between 1954 and 1964. Many of his stories are adventures "built around a scientific gimmick", unlike his later philosophical writing, such as "The Keyen of Fu Tze" (1977). His novels include TWICE UPON A TIME (1958) and THE DAY THE OCEANS OVERFLOWED (1964).

Joseph Green

Joseph Green has been writing thoughtful, philosophical science fiction since the early 1960's. His GOLD THE MAN (1971) is a classic novel of the loneliness of the superman. CONSCIENCE INTERPLANETARY (1973) examines the question of defining (and detecting) intelligence. Mr Green is public affairs science writer for NASA, and is involved in all aspects of the space program. He wrote "The Ultimate Prejudice" for the MagiCon Bookmark anthology.

Jack Haldeman II

Much of Jack Haldeman's S-F is in a humorous vein. He has also written a number of short stories on sports themes, a rare sub-genre. His scientific background is evident in his writing. His novels include VECTOR ANALYSIS (1978), THERE IS NO DARKNESS (1983 - with Joe Haldeman), and THE FALL OF WINTER (1985). He wrote "Blue Story" for the MagiCon bookmark anthology.

Lee Hoffman

Long time fan, Lee Hoffman edited the most important fanzine of the early 1950's, QUANDRY. Lee is the author of over 25 novels, including science fiction, westerns, and historical romances, Her S-F includes THE CAVES OF KARST, ALWAYS THE BLACK NIGHT, CHANGE SONG, and TELEPOWER. She was GoH at TROPICON I, and wrote "Once More" for the MagiCon Bookmark Anthology.

Carl Lundgren

Carl Lundgren has been a very well known artist in the Science Fiction field for more than a decade. He has been the recipient of numerous honors, including Hugo nominations. He was the cover artist for a series of reprints of Robert Heinlein novels. He has recently relocated to Florida with his wife Michelle and daughter. Help give them welcome.

Vincent Miranda

Vincent Miranda is a science fiction historian and critic. He was science fiction editor for the Saturday Evening Post and Curtis Books. He has made several commercials and educational films, and the horror film Truth or Dare.

Gary Alan Ruse

Gary Alan Ruse writes science fiction, mystery, and fantasy. His story "The Phantom Chamber" appeared in the NEW ADVENTURES OF SHERLOCK HOLMES. His novels include THE GODS OF CERES MAJOR, MORLAC: The Quest of the Green Magician, and DEATH HUNT ON A DYING PLANET.

Tropicon VIII Weapons Policy

We don't care what Florida's weapons law says: No weapons are allowed at TROPICON! The current state of mind of the South Florida public regarding such things makes the potential risk too great. If it even looks like a weapon, leave it home. The only exception is from 1 hr before to 1 hr after the Masquerade, and then you must be a Masquerade competitor, it must be peace bonded, and you must have a special weapons pass. Should purchases of weapons-type items be made in the Dealer's Room, those items must be suitably wrapped and carted off immediately for storage in your room or vehicle. We're sorry that current events have made such measures necessary, but we're confident that everyone understands the reasons and we do appreciate your cooperation.


Art Auction Rules:




