Progress Report

Hugo Winner Vernor Vinge to be Guest of Honor at Tropicon 19, November 10 through 12, 2000 Clarion Hotel in Hollywood Beach, Florida!

If you haven't read Vernor Vinge's (1) work, what the heck are you waiting for? His first publication was "Apartness" in the June, 1965 edition of *New Worlds*. His latest novel, *A Deepness in the Sky* just received the Hugo Award for Best Novel at this year's World Science Fiction Convention in Chicago.

His last novel, A Fire Upon the Deep (1993) won the Hugo, and his two previous novels, Marooned in Realtime (1987) and The Peace War (1985) were both finalists for this award. He earned the Prometheus Award for Marooned in Realtime and the Hamilton Memorial Award for The Peace War.

Vernor Vinge has a doctorate in Mathematics, and teaches Computer Science at University of California in San Diego. Sometimes, it shows in his writing. *True Names* has been cited as one of the seminal works in the prediction of cyberspace. Unusual and advanced ideas in distributed computing, nanotechnology and communication are are among the many SF devices in his work.

Vinge's work is not only fun, but incredibly stimulating. Read his books! There are more ideas per page than any reader can expect, as well as action, adventure, striking characters, well tuned plots and an insight into the effects of technology that is scary bright. Even the little comments are fascinating (e.g. when everyone has a pocket computer, and there's one big screen in the room, what does it show?). He hasn't been to a Florida convention, so this is a rare and most welcome opportunity to meet and speak with one of the great SF writers in the field. Tropicon 19 will have all the great things that you expect from the convention. But the effort is only worthwhile if you come to the con. Read through this progress report, discover some of what will be happening, and send in your membership. I'm looking forward to seeing you this November.

David A. Cherry Artist Guest of Honor

Tropicon is proud to have David A. Cherry join us as this year's Artist Guest of Honor. In addition to being the recipient of several Chesley Awards (voted on by ASFA, the Association of Science Fiction Artists) and numerous Hugo Award nominations, rumor has it Mr. Cherry has a sister who seems to have had several books published <wink, wink>

But seriously, David A. Cherry has been honing his craft for the last twenty years, after the siren's call of the artist's palette seduced him away from the honorable profession of providing legal counsel. A compilation of his early works can be found in Imagination: The Art and Technique of David A. Cherry. He has also had short fiction published in an anthology. Mr. Cherry has served as President for ASFA.

For this writer, I know it will be a visual treat to view whatever is displayed in the Art Show from this Guest of Honor's portfolio. As he hails from Oklahoma, it would be a shame for you all to miss this opportunity to see his work in person and meet the artist who has provided you with many stunning visual images during his first twenty years in the business. I can hardly wait to see what he'll dream up in the next twenty years!

Dave Langford Special Fan Guest (or, "who is this guy Langford and why is he coming all the way from England to talk about fans?!?!")

Aside from having won a dozen and half Hugo Awards (give or take a half dozen) as Best Fan Writer of the Year or as the publisher of the Best Fanzine of the Year, Dave Langford actively searches out great writing for a Thog Masterclass mention. He publishes (seemingly forever, the most widely read monthly fannish newzine, Ansible, and has created an excellent website which includes more than anyone would like to know about a guy named Langford (see http://www.ansible.demon.co.uk/raq.html). His alternate life includes writing science fiction, writing about science fiction, writing about fandom, writing funny stuff, writing about computers and writing other stuff. Dave has organized an effort to promote and support the Trans Atlantic Fan Fund (http://www.dcs.gla.ac.uk/SF-Archives/Taff/) one of the topics we will be covering as part of FanHistoricon 10. Help us welcome him to South Florida.

Heather Alexander Special Filk Guest

Heather Alexander was raised with the customs of the Isles firmly bred into her by her mother and grandmother, both natives of Britain. Her father, a prominent jazz vocalist/guitarist, began Heather's musical education at the age of six when he started teaching her guitar. By age nine, she was teaching herself to play the violin. She later began composing songs and honed her skills with several years of private study in music, voice and drama. In 1985, she joined a country and western band as vocalist and lead fiddler, while at the same time finding her niche in Celtic music by playing fiddle for the Irish and Scots dancers at the Renaissance Pleasure Faire. Since that time, her original music has been heavily influenced by the traditions of her roots.

Currently, Heather performs solo at pubs, coffee houses and festivals from L.A. to Seattle, and with other groups throughout California and Nevada. She has worked with and opened for many notables, including the Bay Area's Tempest, Tommy Makem, the Clancy Brothers, Ed Miller, and Alex Beeton. With publisher Firebird Arts & Music she created albums based on fantasy stories. In 1994, Heather produced her first solo CD, Wanderlust, with backup from Rob Wullenjohn and Lief Sorbye of Tempest, and concert harpist Jenny Lindner. She has released two more albums, Midsummer and Life's Flame.

Once again Tropicon will be held at the beautiful Clarion Hotel on Hollywood Beach. Located on the Intercostal Waterway between Fort Lauderdale and Miami, the Clarion has two types of guest rooms:
