Kaleidoscope II had 296 entries from 44 entrants. Of these entries, 236 were for sale, and 107 were sold, for a sale percentage of 45.3%. This is a better percentage than either Kaleidoscope I or ISFAE 9, the 1968 art shows. Gross receipts on art sales were \$1,838.75.
