

PROGRESS REPORT · 2 A word of caution to the men: Ties will be required to be worn in the Hotel Dining Rooms (but not in the coffee shop or bar).

A BAR will be set up in the dining room for a casual meet-the-author SOCIAL HOUR preceding the BANQUET.

CABARET MASQUERADE will be held Friday night, and is an innovation for Westercons. This will be a full-scale costume affair, but without dancing, and we hope to see a good turnout of costume geniuses for this event. This will in no way conflict with the Worldcon Costume Ball; in fact, it can be used as a trial run by those intending to compete in Washington. Three individual awards will be given as well as one group award-there will be no subdivided categories. Group contestants cannot compete as individuals. We will have a spotlighted stage set up for the contestant's promenade, a separate area set aside and lighted for picture taking, and a bar set up for everyone. This should be a ball--even without dancing.

A SWIMMING PARTY will be held on the afternoon of the first day to get things off to a cool start. The Hotel has offered to provide some professional aquatic entertainment (diving clowns, etc.) for our benefit, and also to set up a bar poolside to make this a real swimming party.

The FILM PROGRAM will take place the evening of the first day under the direction of Paul Healy, film critic of Rhodomagnetic Digest. The details are not fully formulated yet, but we hope to present the Convention a real filmic event.

The FORMAL PROGRAMS will be varied, with something to interest everyone.

ED CLINTON will moderate a panel on: WHO CARES WHAT HAPPENS TOMORROW.

BUZ BUSBY asks his panel: DOES FANDOM INFLUENCE SCIENCE FICTION?

TONY BOUCHER will explore, with Stuart Palmer, Miriam Allen Deford, and Poul Anderson, THE DETECTIVE STORY AND SCIENCE FICTION: A STUDY IN CONTRAST.

There will also be a panel with a Big Name Fan chairing it on: DO TODAY'S SCIENCE FICTION MAGAZINES INTEREST THE FAN?, one or two talks, a debate or two, and auctions with WALTER J. DAUGHERTY and BRUCE PELZ teaming up again this year as co-auctioneers. And of course there will be parties, and parties, and parties.....

THE HYATT HOUSE is going all out in helping us to put on an interesting and enjoyable Westercon, and their facilities are admirably suited for our kind of convention. The rooms are all good sized and luxuriously appointed...any one of them is an ideal party pad; the coffee shop is large and open twenty-four hours a day, with good food, good coffee, and service from the bar; the bar is dark and comfortably designed for relaxed conviviality; and the dining rooms are famous dining spots in the Bay Area. For the more athletic fan there is a putting green and tennis courts.... and all of us will enjoy cooling off in the large and beautiful swimming pool.


Attention! DEVOTEES of the RING!!!
