His poetry and fiction have appeared in *Rolling Stone, Vertex, Northwest Review*, and *Prairie Schooner*, and such anthologies as BEST SF: 74, FUTURE PASTIMES, 100 GREAT SCIENCE FICTION SHORT STORIES, ALTERNATIVES, SCIENCE FICTION POETRY, IMPERIAL MESSAGES and the upcoming BURNING WITH A VISION.

LOU ARONICA is the editor of Bantam Books.

CLAIRE BELL's novel RATHA'S CREATURE (Atheneum Argo 1983) recently won the prestigious International Reading Association's Children's Book Award for 1983. Now in its second printing, the book previously won the Young People's Literary award given by P.E.N./Los Angeles. A sequel, CLAN GROUND, will be published by Atheneum in the fall of 1984. When not writing, Clare works as a manufacturing test engineer for a major computer company.

TRACY BLACKSTONE is a literary agent in the Bay Area of California.

CHARLES N. BROWN has been the editor and publisher of *Locus*, the newspaper of the science fiction field, for over sixteen years. He has won seven Hugo awards. Charles has traveled to the Soviet Union and to China recently to learn about science fiction publishing and to meet foreign sf writers. He was for a time the regular reviewer for *Asimov's* and still writes their annual book summary. He also contributes a reprise of the year's events for Terry Carr's "Best of the Year" anthologies.

MILDRED DOWNEY BROXON has had short fiction in *Chrysalis*, *Stellar 3*, *Universe 5*, *Isaac Asimov's* and *Vertex*. She has written two novels, THE DEMON OF SCATTERY (with Poul Anderson) and TOO LONG A SACRIFICE.

JOHN BRUNNER is a Hugo Award winner and the author of over 80 books. He was the first non-American author to be voted the Hugo for best novel (STAND ON ZANZIBAR, 1968).

TERRY CARR'S writing includes the novel CIRQUE and a collection of short stories, THE LIGHT AT THE END OF THE UNIVERSE. He is currently editing a new series of Science Fiction Specials as well as the anthology UNIVERSE, and THE BEST SCIENCE FICTION OF THE YEAR.

SUZY McKEE CHARNAS' first novel WALK TO THE END OF THE WORLD (1974), had a sequel, MOTHERLINES. Her stories have appeared in *OMNI* and *Algol*. Her third novel VAMPIRE TAPESTRY has been out for some time.

JOHN DE CLES' first story was published in F&SF in 1963, he was with the Renaissance Pleasure Faire as an actor and director for lifteen years, and has portrayed many characters, including Mark Twain (once for eight hours a day, seven days a week for three months), and Edgar Allen Poe. He continues to work on a new thingumology, THE PISWYCK PAPERS, for which there will be a meeting during Wester-

JOHN DE CAMP, alias the Wizard of Beans Hill, is a onetime Portland, Oregon poet and is now writing science fiction. He has had a story accepted by Cyn Mason for her WET VISIONS anthology, a poem accepted by Asimov's and published a book, IN THE SHADOW OF ATLANTIS. The latter is a poetic fantasy. He is, as usual, working on another book.

FRANK DENTON is one of Seattle's fans and a fanzine publisher. He is now retired from 30 years in education and is trying to learn to write. He has sold to Alfred Hitchcock and Ellery Queen magazines.

M. COLEMAN EASTON has published a number of short stories under the name Coleman Brax, and at least one story under his own name. His fantasy novel, MASTERS OF GLASS, will be published by Warner Books in 1985. this book deals with a world in which the working of magic requires talismans of colored glass, but in which materials for glassmaking are scarce and the talented artisans are scarcer still. In his spare time, Easton is a creative chef and an underground gourmet.

ED EDMO is a local native Indian storyteller.

TARA FELLNER is the mysterious blonde sylph seen in the company of our Guest of Honor. Ms. Fellner, who acts under the name Tara St. Andrew, has been seen in such motion pictures as GREEN ICE (with Ryan O'Neal and Omar Sharif) and KING OF THE MOUNTAIN (with Harry Hamlin and Dennis Hopper), and has been featured on television in KNOT'S LANDING, T.J. HOOKER, McCLAIN'S LAW with James Arness. and recently completed filming of the forthcoming Paramount pilot film for COMMAND FIVE. JAN HOWARD FINDER (aka ''Wombat'') is a transplanted Australian whose legacies from his country of origin include bank robbing expertise and a fondness for marsupials. He has sold a short story, written and edited FINDER'S GUIDE TO AUSTRALTERRESTRIALS, and edited the anthology ALIEN ENCOUNTERS.

JAMES FRENKEL is the publisher of Bluejay Books, a recently-established science fiction and fantasy imprint.

JAMES FUNARO is a founder of CONTACT, and teaches anthropology at Cabrillo College in Aptos, California. He has done field work among Amerinds at an Ojibway settlement in Ontario, and a Chippewa-Cree reservation in Montana. He serves as the director of the Agean School of Anthropology.

MAUREEN GARRETT is Director of the Star Wars Fan Club and Fan Relations for Lucasfilms Ltd. She has also done illustrations for fanzines and Amateur Press Associations. In 1979 she painted her interpretation of the "Nine of Wands" for Bruce Pelz's Fantasy Showcase Tarot Deck.

WILLIAM GIBSON has had stories published in *Omni, Shadows*, UNIVERSE and NEBULA AWARD STORIES. His first novel, NECROMANCER, will appear from Ace Books in Summer, 1984. He is currently at work on a second novel, COUNT ZERO.

ALEXIS GILLILAND is a well-known fan artist whose work has been in such magazines as *The Alien Critic, Science Fiction Review, Locus* and *Algol.* A collection of satirical cartoons has been published in THE IRON LAW OF BUREAUCRACY. His novels include THE REVOLUTION FROM ROSINATE.

FAX GOODLIFE attended Clarion in 1977. She has been published in a small science fiction anthology and has written an introduction for a Philip K. Dick book. She is currently working on a science fiction book.

JON GUSTAFSON has authored a column for the fanzine Science Fiction Review and contributed to Brian Ash's VISUAL ENCYCLOPEDIA OF SCIENCE FICTION, Nicholl's ENCYCLOPEDIA OF SCIENCE FICTION and the Starlog Science Fiction Yearbook.

GEORGE GUTHRIDGE lives in an isolated Yupic Eskimo village on an island 36 miles from Siberia. A 1982 Hugo and Nebuia finalist, he has published over 50 stories with sales to *Analog, Asimov's, F&SF, Galileo, Pulpsmith, Alien Encounters, Aliens and Outworlders,* and *Year's Best.*

GEORGE HARPER is a science writer by trade and author of the SF novel GYPSY EARTH (Doubleday). His three-act SF play "Final Exam" will be opening this year.

NORMAN HARTMAN was part of a group of Northwest interests that attempted to purchase and revive Amazing several years ago. He is also a writer of short stories and a novel.

McNEVIN HAYES is a writer of science fiction and mainstream short stories and a fantasy artist. He attended the 1977 Clarion workshop, and is working on a novel.

JORDIN T. KARE is best known for his fannish filksinging and being a partner in Off Centaur Publications. Jordin is also a practicing astrophysicist at University of California.

DONALD KELLER is a Seattle area fan and has been a member of the Fantasy Association and helped publish the fanzine Fantasiae.

TATIANA KELLER is a Seattle area fan and has been a member of the Fantasy Association and has helped published the fanzine Fantasiae.

KELSON is well known in costume circles as a designer and costumer who will tackle anything. He has won a number of convention masquerades and his costumes have been featured in productions of the Lamplighters, the Oakland Opera Company. For several years he worked as a costumer and actor at the Renaissance Pleasure and Dickens Faires.

TIM KYGER is a member of the Board of Directors of the L-5 Society, is a past chairman of a WorldCon (IguanaCon) in 1978. Tim works for SPRINT and would love to sell you telephone service.

GIL LAMONT has appeared in *Galaxy*, NEW DIMENSIONS, *Science Fiction Review* and other print journals outside the genre; he is the author of six novels, three under his own name, the others as Thomas Hardy, Octave Mirbeau and Colette. CYN MASON has been published in *Isaac Asimov's* and *SF Chronicle*. She is editor of WET VISIONS, a forthcoming anthology of Pacific Northwest SF.

BLAKE MITCHELL is one of the West Coast editors of *Fantastic Films* magazine. She has made several award-winning Super 8 SF films. SHe has been an award-winning costumer for the past 10 years and is working on her 3rd novel.

KEN MITCHELL is a local writer who lives in Lake Oswego. He has had a story published in Asimov's recently. He promises more will be forthcoming.

RAY FARADAY NELSON entered the SF world in the 1950's as an illustrator. He has written many short stories, over thirty books, and two movie scripts. LARRY NIVEN is the winner of one Nebula and five Hugo awards. He is the author of the "Known Space" series. He has coauthored four books with Jerry Pournelle, two books with Steven Barnes. His most recent novel is INTEGRAL TREES. He is perhaps the best practitioner of "hard" science fiction today.

DEBBIE NOTKIN is part owner and manager of The Other Change of Hobbit in Berkeley. She has been active in fandom for the past ten years, and does book reviews for *Locus*.

DIANA L. PAXSON has sold over a dozen short stories, mostly fantasy, to magazines and anthologies. her first novel of Westria, LADY OF LIGHT, was followed by its sequel LADY OF DARKNESS due this September. A third book in this series is in the works. A contemporary fantasy, BRISINGAMEN, will be out from Berkley Books this year.

BRUCE PELZ has been active in fandom since 1958. He has been involved in almost every aspect of fannish activity, including publishing, collecting Tolkieniana, SF books, magazines, fantasy art and costuming. He is a high member of LASFS (the Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society), and is a multiple

award winner from Worldcon and Westercon masquerades. **ELAYNE PELZ** has been into Regency Dancing since it was introduced into LA fandom and has remained one of the leaders of the activity. She has also been LASFS treasurer and has helped run LA cons of all

sizes

JONATHAN V. POST has worked with Theodor Nelson's XanaduTM and HypertextTM projects. In four years at Boeing Aerospace Company in Seattle, he applied his expertise to space and missile projects with the Army, Navy, Air Force and NASA. Now on loan to Jet Propulsion Laboratories, he is designing software to aim the cameras on GALILEO - an unmanned spacecraft due for launch in May, 1986. Jonathan's interactive book COMPUTER FUTURES will be published by Jim Baen Inc. in 1985 and distributed by Simon and Schuster. He has over 230 publications to his name

FRANK ROBINSON is the author of THE POWER and A DAY IN THE LIFE OF ... In collaboration with

Thomas N. Scortia he has authored THE PROMETHEUS CRISIS and THE GOLD CREW.

MARGO SKINNER is a poet, writer, film critic and world traveler. Last year she won the Bay Area Poets Coalition prize, and she has sold a short story, "Space Trip," to Whispers magazine, and had a story accepted by Owlswick. She writes film review columns for Appeal to Reason, Asian Week and The Berkeley Voice. A fan since way back when, she was one of the original organizers of the Golden Gate Futurians. She has also had some broadcast experience.

NORMAN SPINRAD made his early reputation with such radical works as BUG JACK BARRON and THE MEN IN THE JUNGLE. His book THE IRON DREAM (an alternative history in which Hitler bacomes a science fiction writer) was banned in Germany. Other novels include THE SOLARIANS, A WORLD BETWEEN, AGENTS OF CHAOS, and SONGS FROM THE STARS.

PAUL STEELE is a filmmaker, director, general manager of Portland Cable Access and was a mayor of

Wheeler, Oregon.

JOYCE THOMPSON is the author of four novels, THE BLUE CHAIR, WILLIE & PHIL, HOTHOUSE and MERRY-GO-ROUND and a book of short stories, 35¢ THRILL, two of which justly can be called sf/fantasy. Her fifth book, CONSCIENCE PLACE, is just out. She has just completed her first screenplay, a comedy/mystery/fantasy set at WorldCon for Columbia Pictures.

GENE VAN TROYER has been involved in writing sf since the 1972 Clarion West workshop at the University of Washington. His short stories have appeared in numerous magazines, and he is the associate editor of Star★Line, the Newsletter of the Science Fiction Poetry Association. Gene is also the SFWA representative to Westercon 37.

JOAN D. VINGE is the author of THE OUTCASTS OF HEAVEN BELT, EYES OF AMBER, FIRESHIP, THE SNOW QUEEN, PSION, and novelizations for young readers of *Tarzan* and *Return of the Jedi*. Her most recent novel is WORLD'S END. Forthcoming books include the movie tie-in to DUNE and a collection of short stories, PHOENIX IN THE ASHES.

CARL J. WALUCONIS (aka Wally Coins) is the author of WHISPERS OF HEAVENLY DEATH and is currently working on an alternate universe novel.

TOM WHITMORE is a part owner of the Other Change of Hobbit in Berkeley. He has been active in fandom for years.

M.K. WREN is the author of mysteries featuring Oregon locales and heroes in the form of Conan Flagg. She also wrote the PHOENIX LEGACY: SWORD OF THE LAMB, SHADOW OF THE SWAN and HOUSE OF THE WOLF.



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
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
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
