The Northwest Science Fiction Society (NWSFS) is pleased to sponsor a scavenger hunt at Westercon 56. We have developed a challenging, fun, and occasionally silly list of items to find. You may compete as part of a team or as an individual. The list of items to find will be available when you register at the NWSFS club table and we will have a get together on Sunday of the convention to tally up the points and award prizes to team and individual winners. Although we won't tell you what's on the list until you register, we believe we have an interesting approach to this event. Items may include people (living or fictitious), as well as technical, literary and fannish artifacts. The rules are as follows


You must sign up for the Scavenger Hunt, as an individual or with your team, at the NWSFS table in the lobby after 3pm on Friday of the convention. The NWSFS table will not be manned at all times after 3pm, but look there for additional posted hours when you can sign in for the Scavenger Hunt. As you sign in, you must designate an Entry Name for you or your team, and designate all team members. Team size may be as small as two. Single-person teams will be judged as individuals. Maximum allowed team size is 6 persons.

At sign-in, you or your team will be given the list of items to search for. All entrants will get the same list. Each item on the list will get equal value. Collect as many items as you can in the time allowed. Beware that there may only be a limited number of some items on the

list. The items you collect may belong to another person, if loaned with permission. For items of significant value, we may require written permission. Items may be created onsite by a team member, but may not be created onsite by a non-team member, unless otherwise specified, such as the signature of the chair of the convention. We prefer that no items be collected from offsite.

All items must be brought, by one of your team members, to the NWSFS Table or the check-in place before the contest closes. The owners of the items may accompany them, but a team member must present the items for them to count for your team. No single item may be claimed by more than one team, or can count under more than one category. The Scavenger Hunt will close at 2pm Sunday. The NWSFS Officers will be available from 1 to 2pm Sunday in the Salon on the top floor of the hotel to document your scavenged items. If you can find them before that you can ask them to document your findings, but if they are working on the convention, don't count on it.

There will be prizes awarded for at least the top individual entry and the top team entry. If there are many entries, there will be more prizes. Be aware that the contest coordinators, the Officers of NWSFS, will be the sole judges of what items fit a category, and may not accept all your items in the spirit you intended. Unfortunately, being a member of NWSFS will not get you more leeway on this judgement.

Lisa thinks things up and makes them appear in three dimensions. She is a sculptor and, whether she uses clay or paper or glass or metal, everything she makes is a part of herself. Her work is greatly influenced by music, from Hindemith to Tool, Chopin to Swans. Some of her sculptures are disturbing, some are sad, some funny. Each tells a story. Acclaimed for the dark undertones that imbue her works. Lisa charms viewers with the expressiveness of her art. Author Michael Bishop describes it as "whimsical melancholy; provocative, sad, scary and sweet." Lisa is best known for her body of large kinetic sculptures, the Dark Caravan series begun in 1993. The collection, commissioned by Howard and Jane Frank, includes a working roller coaster, carousel, Ferris wheel, "girly" show and others. She will complete the ninth (of ten) such "rides" this year and is working on plans for touring the carnival. The Ferris wheel, entitled Crowded after Hours, inspired Strange Attraction, published in 2000, an anthology of horror stories by some of the finest in the genre including Gene Wolfe, Jack Dann, Charles De Lint and John Shirley.

Her work attracted the attention of author Neil Gaiman in 1994 and they became fast friends. To date, Neil has writ-

ten seven stories inspired by Lisa's sculptures and has plans for more. He calls her work "frozen stories" and says they plan to "create the most disturbing coffee table book of the century."

Given the odd themes of her pieces, Lisa is often asked where her inspiration comes from. Of this, she says:

"I'd have to say my influences are a true Southern gothic childhood, tons of reading, the art of Rene Magritte, my own nightmares, textures and shapes in nature and insects, old fabric and wood. Throw in a deep love for toys and a very eclectic collection of music and the pieces somehow keep coming out. I explain the origin of the kinetic carnival in "Something October" which is my story in the Strange Attraction anthology." I'm including a short excerpt here, in hopes that you might enjoy it more than my ramblings, which you'll likely get plenty of at the convention:

My head felt like granite. I thought of Magritte and his giant stone pears. I looked at the board. Twenty-seven tiny, hollow-eyed faces stared up at me. The corner of my mind that wasn't screaming saw a safe move. I could castle to free the rook, the only piece with no eyes to stare at me. Horror numbed me. I slowly lifted one hand. It was wrapped in a jester puppet. Thumb and pinky in the arms, three fingers for the head. My puppet. The other was identically encumbered. Even before I heard the snickering and

shuffling, I knew how comical I must look; staring slack-jawed from one hand to the other. I looked to where shadows moved before, spotting familiar faces: Sweet Pete, Jack, Bones, Lady Lamia, characters I'd sculpted in wood and clay. The fat lady, Vamp, Sister Night were uncanny in flesh, uncarthly, evil.

And this is what I knew then: That sometimes we trade dreams for memories, memories for dreams. I raised my head.

A papier-maché mask with painted cheeks and a blood-red grin.

Bendyman, Bendyman, bend the moment, bend the space, turn the key, unlock the gate.

"I have very little spare time, between work, a toddler in diapers and two girls at home. (I have a son serving in South Korea). But I seem to manage to read somehow. It's important to me. It feeds my work and my soul. I go through phases of fiction and non-fiction. I grew up reading science fiction and horror on the screened-in porch of my parent's home in South Carolina. I read War of the Worlds sitting on the bank of the Savannah. I love clever, subtle horror best, and new and classic science fiction. But I also like books on spiders, religions, mythology, the number zero, microbes and sociology. It helps that my husband shares many of my interests. I overheard




my daughter on the phone once, 'She's watching Star Trek in one room and he in another and — get this — they're yelling back and forth about it. How freaking nerdy is that?!' Still, they all love to read—can't have everything."

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Right now Lisa is finishing up a limited edition carousel and Ferris wheel series and preparing to exhibit the carnival midway. She's illustrating a very strange and sort of sweet children's book with author Hy Bender and creating a very cool un-book project with Neil Gaiman.

Dr. Michio Kaku

Dr. Michio Kaku is an internationally recognized authority in theoretical physics and also the environment. He holds the Henry Semat Professorship in Theoretical Physics at the City College and the Graduate Center of the City University of New York. His goal is to help complete Einstein's dream of a "theory of everything," a single equation, perhaps no more than one inch long, which will unify all the fundamental forces in the universe. He has lectured around the world and his Ph.D. level textbooks are required reading at many of the top physics laboratories. He has written nine books; his last two books, Hyperspace and Visions, became international bestsellers, and have been widely translated into different languages. He hosts a weekly hour-long radio program on science on several stations around the country, and his commentaries on science can be heard on 60 radio stations nationwide.

Dr. Kaku graduated from Harvard in 1968, summa cum laude, and number one in his physics class. He received a Ph.D. from the University of California at Berkeley Radiation Laboratory in 1972. He held a lectureship at Princeton University in 1973. He then joined the faculty at the City University of New York, where he has been a professor of theoretical physics for 25 years. He has

been a visiting professor at the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton, and also New York University.

He has published over 70 physics articles in physics journals which include superstring theory, super gravity, supersymmetry, and hadronic physics. He is the cofounder of string field theory. He also wrote the first paper on conformal supergravity and the breakdown of supersymmetry at high temperatures.

Interviews and Appearances

He has appeared on Larry King Show (radio as well as CNN-TV), Nightline, PBS's Nova and Innovation, 60 Minutes, Good Morning America and CNN-News. He was featured on the PBS documentaries: Einstein Revealed, Stephen Hawking's Universe, and Science Odyssey, the Learning Channel's Future Fantastic, as well as the Science Fiction Channel. He will appear on the Discovery Channel's Science of the Impossible. On radio, he has appeared on NPR's Science Friday and also BBC-International. He has appeared on over 600 radio programs around the country.

He has been quoted in the New York Times, Los Angeles Times, U.S. News and World Report, BBC, Sunday London Times, London Daily Telegraph. Boston Globe, Seattle Times, S.F. Chronicle, San Diego Union, Washington Post, Chicago Tribune, the Oregonian.

His book, Hyperspace, was reviewed on the cover of the New York Times, Philadelphia Inquirer, and S.F. Chronide Book Review sections, and was profiled in a four-page spread in U.S. News and World Report. It was voted one of the best science books of 1994 by both the Washington Post and the New York Times. Referring to Visions, Kirkus Review wrote that Dr. Kaku "is a worthy successor to the late Carl Sagan." For two weeks, the Sunday London Times excerpted chapters from Visions in its book section.

He hosts a weekly hour-long program, called *Explorations*, on WBAI-FM radio in New York (99.5 fm) which can also be heard on KPFA-FM (93.1 fm) in the Bay Area, WWUH-FM (91.3 fm) in West Hartford, and also Portland, Ore, on KKGT-AM (1150 am). His show is carried nationally by the KU national satellite band. He also does semi-weekly science commentaries on *Pacifica National Radio*, which is carried by 60 radio stations around the country.

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Confessions of a Secret Fan

There's a memory I have. I cherish it partly out of sadness, but mostly out of joy.

I was in my early twenties, in 1980, at Noreascon Two. It was my third Worldcon; as a teenager I'd convinced my parents to allow me to go with a friend and her mother to Torcon II in 1973, and then the following year the same friend and I went to Discon II all by ourselves. Life intervened, and then College did too, so I missed a few Worldcons in between, although I never stopped reading science fiction and fantasy.

But I made the time to go to this particular convention, because I had finally convinced the person who turned me onto science fiction to come along. My mom

It was her who seduced me into all this, you see. Handed me my first Heinlein juvenile, fed me Clarke and Asimov, L'Engle and Le Guin (but not in the same year), Verne and Lovecraft, and all those wonderfully creepy Bob Bloch stories that robbed me of sleep. She was the one who let me stay up late to watch "The Twilight Zone" and talked to me about very adult matters at an early age because "how else will you

ever learn about the world if I don't expose it to you?"

It was she who instilled in me the idea that we were living on the edge of The Future and that the people who gave serious thought about how technology might change our lives for good (or ill) were the ones to pay attention to. And she listened too; with some trepidation she read the things that I started to bring home to her: stronger stuff by Ellison, Moorcock, Brunner. She didn't like some of SF's new directions, but it led to more discussions. More shared brain candy.

But by 1980 this strong, funny, brilliant woman had been fighting cancer for some four years, and I didn't know how much time I might have with her. I wanted her to see the kind of person she had raised and maybe give her back a bit of fun.

Mom was tired but seemed to enjoy the panels, the costumes, and the sheer joy the fans seemed to take in simply being with other people who shared their enthusiasms. She would go back to the room when I went off to the parties in the evenings but would always wake up whenever I crept in because she wanted to "hear about all the fun".

It was something she said several days into the con that hit me the hardest. She commented on just how much fun everyone seemed to be having. She said that if she had realized just how enjoyable these events were she might have come with me sooner. She then asked just how long these "Worldcon things" had been going on. I told her that the

first Worldcon took place in New York in 1939 and she got very quiet. "You mean I could have been coming to these things all these years? That there were people in New York like me who liked this stuff? I scrounged most of my books out of thrift stores and libraries. I never knew that there were this many people who liked science fiction as much as I did."

I flashed back on the sheer joy on her face the first time I took her to see "Star Wars" and how that middle-aged woman whooped along with the rest of the audience as the Death Star blew up. And suddenly my heart broke thinking that this person didn't know it but she'd been a fan all these years. She could as easily have been one of First Fandom, had she only known.

What a damned waste.

But she had a great time and I was glad to have brought her.

She never did make it to another con. She fought the good fight for another year and died late in 1981. But she never stopped reading. If I have any legacy from her, it's the thirst for new ideas, for seeing "what happens next".

I tell this story because in many ways it's due to her that I wound up in this field. And after almost 20 years in the business I have to say that I have been very very lucky. I've been able to work with some of the best authors in the world at a publishing house that is dedicated to publishing the sorts of things I love to read. I get to develop new authors and know that some of what I do makes a difference to people who love reading.



There are times I feel like a fraud. Like I've somehow gotten the job of a lifetime and don't dare tell anyone. There is a small voice in me that says, "You're getting paid for this? Doing the thing you love and getting paid for it?"

I have to believe that somewhere my mother is laughing her head off.

It's like I've hit the lottery.

But there are some essential truths too. That the biggest part of my real job happens after I leave the office. That while we might have glamour, we editors exist on a pay scale that would make a teacher weep.

That we don't edit in the office. We do it on our own time. Or rather we do it all the time.

(Speaking of time, ask an editor for the time of day. You will very often get a blank look. We usually don't know what day it is, much less the year, because we have to schedule books that aren't even written to go into production two years from now, do audio scripts and presentation materials for books coming out nine months from now, and edit manu-

scripts that were due into production last week.)

We read on the way home. On the way to work. Vacations? We take stuff on vacation to read.

We make Xeroxes of manuscripts to mark up on the run (yes, a lot of us live in New York but you will find editors doing the same thing everywhere). We never stop. We look at other publisher's books when we are at the airport, the train station, the grocery store. We see which of our books are there. We put our writers' books faceout (pulling a book and rearranging several books on the shelf to make that book cover front) wherever we go. We talk to editors at other houses to find out what they are doing. They tell us stuff. We tell them stuff - because we really are on the same page. Competitors, yes. But there's something on which, even though we may be vying for the same readers, we're in agreement: that this business of publishing books isn't about selling widgets. We aren't manufacturing lawn furniture. That in spite of the lousy pay and long hours, what we do makes a difference. How many people can say that?

I was told once that if I had lived a hundred years ago I would have made a wonderful impresario. I took that as a compliment, because I understood it to mean that there's a need for editors in the world. That we have the power to help shape dreams and to use our "third eye" to coddle, encourage, and push writers to hone their craft and create better books.

And to do one more thing. To be the ultimate salesperson for the work. The champion who fights at every step of the way to convince every single person involved in the process of publishing, pro-

moting, and selling this book that this work is the greatest thing since sliced bread.

Or at least more of that brain candy that my mom taught me to cherish.

After all this time, I still love what I do. That while there may be days when I think about how I am fooling others, I really do know how to do my job. And that what I do for a living still fills me with joy simply because I get to go to work every day and make books. And that the best thing about my career is that I never know what the next day will bring. That I have the potential every day to bring new words and new ideas to people. That I might find something in the slush. That the next manuscript might bring me something that I can work on that will stir people's minds, make them happy, make them yearn, make them laugh, make them puzzle out their de-

And maybe make them think.

I had the pleasure of getting to know Ian Ballantine as a young editor and my first encounter with this mad genius was late one night as I was working on repairing a mangled copyedit. It had been a terrible day. I was tired. I suddenly heard a gleeful laugh and looked up to what for all the world appeared to be a demented elf, complete with bushy eyebrows and wild hair. He winked at me and said, "Want to know a secret?" I nodded my assent and he crooked a finger for me to lean in closer. He then pointed at the manuscript and the flurry of red marks that covered the text and said, "This is the best part. Don't let them take this away from you!" He chuckled and walked away. At that point my boss came out of her office and as I quickly found out, that was the man who invented

what we know today as the modern paperback. A man who did amazing things for the publishing industry and who inspired editors and publishers for generations.

He was right, you know. It still is the best part. I have had the great good fortune not to have to give it up.

And I suspect as long as my eyes and brain hold out I'm not likely to give it up either.

She has edited memoirs, nonfiction books, tie-ins, and Conan novels. She has an eye for new talent, buying and editing several first novels over the years; two of them have won the Locus Award for Best First Novel. She is the in-house editor for my own Starlight anthology series, and her patience and good advice have been major factors in its success.

There are a lot of different ways to be a book editor. Some of the best editors around don't do a lot of "manuscript work"; their talents lie in making deals, spotting unexploited opportunities, and delegating the hands-on-the-text work to someone else. Claire isn't one of those editors. For Claire, getting engaged with the book and helping it be a better version of itself is what it's all about: it's the ice cream in the cone. She's an old-fashioned editor, a generalist, patient with quirky people and fascinated by the stories they have to tell. If Claire Eddy is your editor, you can be sure she'll wage corporate war for your book if necessary, but her actual notion of a good time is sitting in her deliberately dark office (Claire's idea of "bright" is Scotland in September) with a pile of manuscript pages, reading and making notes.

She's approachable, funny, charming, and one of the best editors we have. She's way overdue to be an Editorial Guest of Honor. Excellent choice, Westercon. You're going to have a good time.

For more than 17 years (actually October 1983 — January 2001) I was known online, and in fandom, as the Moderator of SF-Lovers Digest. Much of my fannish activity was connected to the Digest. I probably would never have become as involved in convention running as I have been if it weren't for SF-Lovers Digest. It is only fitting therefore that my biography for the Westercon Program Book be in the form of a special issue of SF-Lovers Digest.

How did this all start? Well, I suppose it started when I was a child. Whenever I picked up something to read that wasn't schoolwork, it was something related to the SF/fantasy genre. Whether it was comic books, _Classics Illustrated_ adaptations of books, or stories in magazines like _Weird Tales_, or _Amazing_, my reading tastes always gravitated toward sf and fantasy.

It was cheaper in those days to feed my addiction - anything I wanted to read was free. I had the good fortune to be born to parents who owned a store where books, comic books, and magazines were sold. So, anytime I saw something I wanted to read sitting on the store shelf, I simply helped myself.

My parents knew of my addiction, and willingly fed it. I recall receiving huge envelopes at summer camp containing the week's supply of comic books. And, I recall huddling under the cover with a flashlight every night reading the further adventures

of Superman, Batman, Thor, Spiderman, and all the other superheroes. Of course, I had to pay eventually in the form of hard labor in the store, but that was a very small price to pay for the convenient and cheap access.

It wasn't just books though. I've always been an avid TV watcher. Because of physical limitations, I was never the type to enjoy sports and other outside activities. And, in high school, I had surgery that had me flat on my back for 6 months. I spent a lot of time watching TV, and reading books (or doing homework) during the commercials.

When I was in college, I somehow managed to find friends with similar interests. And, I began to hear about these things called "conventions" where similarly-minded people gathered at a hotel somewhere to meet, talk, and feed their addiction. I was told these things were fun to attend. I had gone to a couple of Creation Cons in New York and, for the most part, I was bored at these over-hyped events. To me, there was nothing to do - I hated standing on a long line to get a fake smile, a perfunctory handshake, and an unreadable autograph. And there was nothing in the Dealers Room that I wanted that I didn't already have, or couldn't get cheaper. So, when a close friend of mine tried to get me to go to something called "Noreascon Two", I declined to go thinking I would be bored. (I have since come to regret that decision).

In the summer of 1979, I became familiar with a bulletin board system on the ARPAnet called 'SF-Lovers'. ('Bulletin boards' were early forerunners, in a sense, of newsgroups, and message forums). Although I did not have an account that could post to the board, I could receive messages. The friend who introduced me to the board, occasionally posted messages for me though. I watched as the individual messages started getting distributed once or twice a day, in a combined message format called a 'digest'. And the SF-Lovers Digest mailing list was born. It was quite possibly the first mailing list on the net.

The same summer as Noreascon Two (1980), I was working for Rutgers University in the computer center while I took some fun classes just for the credits. As a student employee, I was given an account on the only machine at the school that was connected to the ARPAnet. I now had full access to SF-Lovers, read it daily, and enjoyed talking with other fans.

It was that summer that I was inspired to write the _Twilight Zone Episode Guide_. This was the second episode guide of a TV show published on the ARPAnet - the first being a guide for _The Outer Limits_, also done for SF-Lovers. That seemed to have started a trend. Today, episode guides are available on the Internet for nearly every TV show.

In 1983, I started working for Rutgers University as a full-time employee. At that time, a friend of mine was the Moderator of SF-Lovers. The head of the computer center decided that the University's policies didn't allow a non-staff member to use the machine for these purposes and asked if anyone on his staff would be interested in taking over. I volunteered. And, for over 17 years, I was the Moderator of SF-Lovers Digest. During that time, SF-Lovers was distributed to readers on the ARPAnet, BITNET, USEnet, FIDOnet, and printed and mailed to people without online access. These nets eventually merged and morphed into what we now call the Internet, and more and more people gained online access. As the Internet grew, so did readership of SF-Lovers. No one could accurately count the number of readers due to the amount of redistribution, but at one point, someone estimated that the readership was over 250,000. Not bad for a mailing list that started in 1979 with a handful of SF fans at a university.

It was because of what SF-Lovers did for online fandom that MCFI decided to present a Special Committee award at the Hugo Ceremony at Noreascon Three (1989). Receiving that award was, perhaps, the highlight of my tenure as Moderator of SF-Lovers Digest. Of course, the award belongs to everyone who participated in the Digest over the years since, like an APA, it heavily depended on the contributions of the readers.

But, my online fannish efforts have not been limited to the Digest. I also maintain and support several mailing lists including TIMEBINDERS and SMOFS. The SF-Lovers web site (http://www.sflovers.org) has WSFS information including Business Meeting minutes, the Worldcon Runners' Guide and more. And, with a great deal of assistance from Sharon Sbarsky, SF-Lovers publishes the largest online list of sf conventions.

In 1984, the folks running Boskone invited me to be on a panel at their convention in Boston. I had been to a couple of conventions besides Creation Cons by then, one Worldcon, a couple of Lunacons, and even a couple of Boskones. I was still mostly bored. I decided to go and see what it was like being a program participant instead of just attending the convention. In the process, I met a number of wonderful people, and truly enjoyed a SF convention for the first time. And thus, in one swell foop, I was taken from behind the computer, and thrust into convention fandom.

It wasn't long before I started volunteering "to help" at Boskone. And Lunacon. And Worldcons. And... well, you get the picture. I have an addictive personality, what more can I say?

Usually I start these Connie Willis Guest of Honor appreciations by fulminating. I suppose you're wondering what I mean by usually. See, that's it exactly! Do you know how many of these I have written? Five! This is the sixth time I have had to type sentences like "Connie Willis will break your heart in Doomsday Book and make you fall out of your chair laughing in To Say Nothing of the Dog" or "Connic Willis is one of the funniest and most charming pros ever to give panel" or "Connie Willis is the best short story writer of my generation." When I won a Hugo last year, I actually thanked Connic Willis in my acceptance speech for not publishing in my category. What I want to know is, when did I get appointed Connie's personal John the Baptist? Okay, okay, we've been pals for almost twenty years. When we started out together, we were the dewiest of Neopros, standing on our tiptoes at the very edge of the crowd, trying to see what the Really Big Names were doing. Since then we've gone to writers' workshops together and read each other's novels in manuscript. We went to Gatorland and the Abbey Room at the Boston Public Library and the Tupperware Museum and the British Museum together. I've seen the video of her back operation. We've applauded for each other and offered each other shoulders to cry on. What, you think it's easy being Connie Willis? Well, it isn't—she just makes it look easy.

But as much as I love Connie Willis, I just can't keep writing these damned appreciations. I've told all the funny stories and offered all the encomiums I can bear. I'm tired, I tell you. I just can't think of any more new ways to say she's the greatest. You've got to (choke) leave me. alone. please (sob). it's not my fault. I. just. can't..

For those of you who don't know Sheila, she has been Connie's friend almost as long as Jim and, more important, has never before written a Connie Willis appreciation.

More Hugos

I could write an essay about meeting Connie for the first time in 1982, the night she won her first two Nebula awards-for "Fire Watch" and "A Letter from the Clearys," I could mention the exhibaration I felt the first time I read Doomsday Book in manuscript and knew that I was holding a future Hugoaward winning novel. I could even drop in a plug for the anthology we've edited together-A Woman's Liberationpublished by Aspect. Instead of revealing my great admiration for Connic as a short story writer or my deep appreciation of her stunning skills as a novelist, though, I thought I'd dwell on another of her skills, one that is also dear to my heart.

Connic is a magical seamstress. I knew that she had some talent for sewing before I found out the truth. I remember envying Connic's daughter, Cordelia, when I learned that she would be receiving a claret colored dress from her mother for Christmas. It would be a per-

fect replica of the dress that Harriet Vane wore in *Have His Carcass*. I knew that she could whip up a Lady MacBeth outfit (including blood) for a party. She'd even helped me shop for a wedding dress, and given me tips on alterations.

I could go on about Connie's well-deserved Hugo, in September 1993, for Doomsday Book. Instead, I thought I'd mention, that my daughter, Irene, was born two days later. Over the years, my daughter has developed her own special relationship with Connie. Connie has always paid attention to their conversations. She knows what her favorite movies are, who her favorite characters are, and what her favorite books are. Because Irene's birthday is so close to Worldcon, she has been lucky enough to get presents from Connie at that convention.

At 4, she received her first costume from Connie—Cinderella's ball gown, com-

plete with glass slippers and a magic wand. She was the star of New York as we made our way up and down Broadway trick or treating in the stores and restaurants. At 5, she received Dorothy's gingham dress, Toto in his basket, ruby slippers, and a beautifully illustrated copy of The Wizard of Oz. Connie took her to the ladies room of the restaurant we were in to change her. It looked as if Dorothy had landed in San Antonio as

We returned to Oz a couple of years later when Irene requested Glinda's dress. This time her sparking pink gown was matched by glittering pink shoes and a pink magic wand. The dress withstood both trick or treating on Broadway and trick or treating on every floor of the Natural History Museum.

she made her way down the Riverwalk.

She looked so lovely that no one was

particularly surprised when she won a

hall prize for her costume later that night.

In 2000, with Connie hard at work on revisions to her new novel, Passage, I thought I'd avoid all reference to the subject of a new dress. I knew that her deadlines were tight. I didn't want to add to her workload or risk the wrath of her editor and agent. Connie, however, was listening. She knew my daughter had been devouring books all spring and summer. With some advice from Cordelia, she came up with the perfect gift. It was a Laura Ingalls dress very similar to one she'd made for Cordelia when she was in grade school. Of course, the dress was red, because, as Irene pointed out, "Mary's dress is blue." Somehow, Connie managed to make the perfect bonnet to match as well.

My daughter is reading all the time now. In the past year, she's passed through Alice, Mary Lennox, the Little Princess, Strawberry Girl, Mrs. Frankweiler's files, and Narnia. Her imagination has been fired up by these books and she goes to sleep pretending that she inhabits their worlds. I don't know who she'll be this year, but I know it will be someone she'll love. I'd love to see the dresses continuethrough Juliet, Elizabeth Bennet, Kivrin? I suppose they'll have to end. Connie needs some time to write, and my daughter may grow out of play clothes. She'll always know she had a very special childhood, though, and a truly magical godmother.

Gardner Dozois never fails to remind me that we could easily have had several award-winning novellas in the time it takes to make a Belle dress (the gold one, of course, not the blue). Perhaps my daughter is solely responsible, and not the novels, for the drop off we've seen in recent years in the number of short pieces from Connie. Sometimes I wonder, should I feel guilty for depriving the world of a wonderful Connie Willis story? Should I regret the lost opportunity for the magazine, for one more Hugo or Nebula award? But then I remember the glowing look on the face of my child as she opened the box that held her ruby slippers or removed the tissue from around Laura's bonnet, and I know that it's all worthwhile.

Octavia Butler is a graduate of the Clarion SF Writers' Workshop. Encouraged by master science fiction author Harlan Ellison, she began her writing career in 1970 and made her genre debut with "Crossover" (1971), the first of many works in which she weaves together African-American history, future societies and a highly intellectual exploration of the alien perspective.

The first of her novels, Patternmaster (1976), was the beginning of her five-volume Patternist series about an elite group of mentally linked telepaths ruled by Doro, a 4,000-year-old immortal African. Other novels in the series are Mind of My Mind, Survivor, Wild Seed (which won the James Tiptree Award), and Clay's Ark. Another Butler collection is her Xenogenesis trilogy, Dawn: Xenogenesis, Adulthood Rites, and Imago.

In Kindred a contemporary black woman is sent back in time to a pre-Civil War plantation, becomes a slave, and rescues her white, slave-owning ancestor. Butler's short story "Bloodchild", about human male slaves who incubate their alien masters' eggs, won several awards including the Hugo and the Nebula. Her novel, The Parable of the Sower, was a finalist for the Nebula Award and a New York Times Notable Book of the Year.

In 1995 Butler was awarded a MacArthur Foundation fellowship for her unique synthesis of science fiction, mysticism, mythology, and African-American spiritualism.

Ted Butler is a retired computer consultant with considerable experience with computer anti-virus work. He has had three short stories published, and two completed (though unpublished) novels. He has co-authored a NASA-published research report.

Jack Cady has won the Nebula, the Bram Stoker, the World Fantasy, the Phillip K. Dick, and the Homer Awards. His latest book is titled *Ghosts of Yesterday* from NightShade Press. He is currently working on a book titled *American Fantastic*.

Frank Catalano is a veteran tech industry analyst, marketing consultant and media commentator. Frank's perhaps best known for his media work, having recently spent several years as tech analyst for Q13 Fox Scattle and as a columnist for Seattle Weekly and the Puget Sound Business Journal.

As of Close of 2002 Westercon

The following document is the current text of the Westercon Bylaws and Standing Rules, as of the close of Westercon 55 (Los Angeles, 2002). Amendments to the Westercon Bylaws were adopted at Westercon 55, and the amendments are noted in the text. Material added is indicated by <u>underline type</u>. Material removed is indicated by <u>strikethru type</u>. The text was prepared by Ben Yalow based on the results of the Westercon 55 Business Meeting minutes. No business is passed on to Westercon 56. New rulings from the Chair are noted within the document, and interpretations of the Constitution should conform to these rulings.

1 General Provisions

1.1 Name and Date

It is traditional, but not obligatory, that the West Coast Science Fantasy Conference (Westercon) shall take place over the July 4th weekend.

1.2 Guests of Honor

It is traditional, but not obligatory, that Westercon Guests of Honor and other notables be selected from among SF personalities residing within the Westercon geographical area.

1.3 Membership Classes

There shall be at least two classes of membership in Westercon: supporting and attending. The committee shall notify the members of their membership class in a timely fashion.

1.3.1 Supporting Members

Supporting members shall receive any progress reports or any other generally mailed publications published after the member joins the Westercon, including the Program Book, and may exercise any voting rights permitted by any other part of these bylaws, except attending the Business Meeting. All Westercons shall be required to offer supporting memberships until at least thirty (30) days prior to the opening of the Westercon, and such supporting memberships shall not cost more than one hundred and fifty percent (150%) of the voting fee charged when the site of the Westercon was selected. Any class of membership offered by a Westercon costing at least as much as a supporting membership shall include a supporting membership.

1.3.2 Attending Members

Attending members shall have all of the rights of supporting members, plus the right to attend the Westercon and the business meeting(s) held there, subject to the restrictions established by the other parts of these bylaws.

1.3.3 Restriction of Memberships

Each Westercon committee shall have the right to limit the activities of its attendees, either individually or in groups, insofar as such activities endanger, physically or legally, other persons or property. Such limitations may include, but are not limited to, closing down parties, ejecting persons from the Westercon, or turning offenders over to other authorities. No refund of membership need be given in such circumstances. Each member, in purchasing his/her membership, agrees to abide by these bylaws.

1.4 Name Badges and Membership Numbers

All committees shall issue name badges for all attending members. Name badges for pre-registered members shall display the member's name in no less than 24-point bold type. All committees shall assign a unique membership number upon processing of a membership. This number shall be printed on the label of all progress reports, shall be printed on membership name badges, and shall be used for site-selection purposes. In the event a membership is transferred, the old membership number, if applicable, shall be noted, both on the badge and on registration information used for site-selection voting administration. Membership badges or other proof of membership remain the property of the Westercon committee for the duration of the conference and may be confiscated for cause; no refund of membership fees need be given in such circumstances.

1.5 Archive of Bylaws

The Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society, Inc. (LASFS) shall act as an archive to the Westercon bylaws and the minutes of business meetings. Each committee shall reimburse LASFS for the costs of copying and forwarding copies of the Bylaws and Minutes to those who request them. A copy of the minutes, including the text of motions passed by the business meeting, shall be sent to LASFS within two (2) months of the close of each Westercon by the administering Westercon. LASFS shall maintain the Westercon bylaws and shall forward one copy of the current bylaws, including the text of any amendment to the bylaws awaiting secondary ratification, to the current Westercon committee within four (4) months of the close of the previous Westercon. The current Westercon shall provide copies of the Bylaws to the committees of all Westercon bids for the year which that Westercon is administering the site-selection.

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1.6 Distribution of Bylaws to Members

The Westercon Bylaws, as well as the complete text of any amendment awaiting secondary ratification, shall be published in at least one (1) progress report and in the program book of the current Westercon each year. Failure to publish this information shall not affect the procedure to amend the bylaws as stated in Article 4.

1.7 Westercon Service Mark

All Westercons shall publish, in all publications such as promotional flyers, progress reports, and program book, the following notice: "'Westercon' is a registered service mark of the Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society, Inc."

1.8 Responsibilities of Administering Westercon

It is a responsibility of each Westercon to enforce the provisions of these bylaws.

2 Westercon Business Meeting

2.1 Scheduling of Sessions

At least one (1) regular session of the Westercon business meeting must be scheduled at each Westercon. No regular session of the Westercon business meeting shall be scheduled to start prior to 11 AM, nor later than 2 PM, nor on the last day of the Westercon. A special session, at which site-selection business shall be the sole order of business, may be scheduled on the last day of the convention, provided that said special meeting is scheduled to begin no earlier than 11 AM nor later than 2 PM. All sessions occurring during the same Westercon, be they regular, adjourned, or special, shall be considered, for procedural purposes, as the same parliamentary session.

2.2 Site-Selection Business

Site-selection business shall be in order at any session of the business meeting. Site-selection business shall include, but need not be limited to, the announcement of the results of the balloting and of a winner if one is produced by the balloting, or of a site-selection resolution, as hereafter defined, if one is necessary [see Section 3.17]. The winner of the site-selection may be announced prior to the site-selection business meeting, if one is held.

2.3 Quorum

For business other than site-selection business, a quorum of fifteen (15) attending members of the current Westercon shall be required. For site-selection business, the quorum shall be those attending members of the current Westercon who attend the meeting. All those persons voting at any meeting must be attending members of the current Westercon. Except as noted in these bylaws or in such rules of order as may be adopted, all business requires a simple majority to pass.

2.4 Parliamentary Authority

The current edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall be the parliamentary authority of the Westercon business meeting except where it conflicts with these bylaws or with any special rules of order which may be adopted by the business meeting.

3 Westercon Site-Selection

3.1 Eligibility of Sites

Any site on the North American continent west of the 104th west meridian, or in the state of Hawaii, shall be eligible to be the site of a Westercon, except as restricted by the provisions of these bylaws.

Provided that, upon the annexation of Australia by the United States of America or the annexation of the United States of America by Australia, Section 3.1 shall be amended to read:

Any site in Australia, or on the North American continent west of the 104th west meridian, or in the state of Hawaii, shall be eligible to be the site of a Westercon, except as restricted by the provisions of these bylaws."

[Note: On a parliamentary inquiry based on a question of when the annexation must take place for a site to be eligible, the 2002 Business Meeting decided that a bid for an Australian site is eligible, even if the annexation has not yet taken place, provided that the annexation has taken place by the filing deadline for the intervening Westercon (the April 15th following the Westercon at which the Australian Westercon is selected), and that if the Australian site has been selected, and the annexation has not taken place by that date, then this shall constitute committee failure, as covered by Section 3.20.]

3.2 North-South Rotation

Only sites north of the 37th north parallel shall be eligible in odd-numbered years, and only sites south of that parallel shall be eligible in even-numbered years. If no eligible bids are filed by the January 1st of the year of the site-selection balloting, then all sites defined in section 3.1 shall be eligible.

3.3 Exclusion Zone

No site within seventy-five (75) miles of the site of the Westercon administering the site-selection shall be eligible to bid, except as provided in section 3.6

3.4 Filing Requirements

A Westercon bid committee must provide written evidence of the following: At least two (2) separate people declaring themselves Chairman and Treasurer; an organizing instrument such as bylaws, articles of incorporation or association, or a partner-ship agreement; and a letter of intent or option from a hotel or other facility declaring specific dates on which the Westercon shall be held; and, for a sponsoring organization from within the United States of America, evidence that the sponsoring organization is a non-profit association or corporation within the applicable state law of the sponsoring organization.

[Note: On response to a parliamentary inquiry as to whether this requirement is binding on a Westercon bid that files between the time of adoption of this amendment, and the time it takes effect at the end of this Westercon, the Chair ruled that all filings must comply with the rules as of the time of the filing deadline, so a filing between the end of the Business Meeting and the close of this Westercon does not remove the requirement that the evidence of compliance be provided by the filing deadline. The ruling was appealed, and the Chair's ruling was sustained.]

3.5 Deadline for Filing Bids

Only those bids whose filing paperwork required by section 3.4 is in the possession of the administering Westercon by the April 15th preceding the balloting shall be listed on the ballot.

[Note: On a parliamentary inquiry at the time of ratification of the current text of the above section, it was ruled that "If the filing paperwork can be verified to be at the address of the administering convention, it is in the committee's possession."]

3.6 Provisions When No Valid Bids are Received

If no valid bids are received by the deadline in section 3.5, then all sites defined in section 3.1 shall be eligible and the other site restrictions in this article shall be suspended.

3.7 Eligibility of Voters

Site-selection voting shall be limited to those persons who are attending or supporting members of the administering Westercon and who have paid a voting fee toward their membership in the Westercon being selected. Other classes of membership may vote only upon the unanimous agreement of all qualified bidding committees. One person equals one membership equals one vote. Corporations, Associations, and other non-human entities may vote only for "No Preference." "Guest of" memberships must be transferred to an individual before voting for anything other than "No Preference."

3.8 Voting Fee

The voting fee shall be twenty US dollars (US\$20.00) or the local equivalent unless the committees listed on the ballot and the administering Westercon agree unanimously to charge a different amount.

3.9 Minimum Rights of Voters

The payment of the voting fee shall make the voter at least a full supporting member of the Westercon being selected, and may make the voter an attending member at the discretion of the winning bid.

3.10 Prototype Ballot

The Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society, Inc. (LASFS) shall prepare a prototype site-selection ballot, including instructions for preparation of the ballot, and shall provide the prototype to each administering Westercon at the same time the bylaws are provided to the administering Westercon as provided for in section 1.5. Upon

reccipt of the prototype, the administering Westercon shall complete the ballot by filing in the information about the eligible bid committees, including the dates of the proposed Westercons, the voting fee, minimum membership requirements, including the cost of a supporting membership in the administering Westercon, and the address to which site-selection ballots should be sent. The administering Westercon shall be responsible for the publication and the distribution of the ballots to the membership of the administering Westercon. All eligible bids received in accordance with sections 3.4 and 3.5 shall be included on the ballot. The ballot shall also include entries for "No Preference" and "None of the Above," and shall provide space for at least one (1) write-in bid. The ballot shall be a secret ballot, specially marked for preferential voting with an explanation of the method of counting preferential votes.

3.11 Distribution of Ballot

The site-selection ballot and full rules for site-selection voting, including the deadlines for voting by mail, shall be mailed on or before the May 10th preceding the voting to all members of the administering Westercon as of one week before the mailing. The ballot and full rules for site-selection, including the hours during which site-selection will take place and the location of the site-selection, shall be given to all attending members upon registration at the Westercon, or such information shall be prominently displayed at the registration area throughout the Westercon.

3.12 Deadline for Voting by Mail

All ballots received by the administering Westercon prior to June 20 shall be counted.

3.13 Bid Presentations

Each eligible bid committee shall have at least fifteen (15) minutes of scheduled program time on the first full day of the administering Westercon for the purpose of making a bidding presentation.

3.14 At-Conference Voting

Site-selection shall be open for at least six (6) hours between the hours of 11 AM and Midnight on the day before the business meeting at which site-selection business is scheduled. All on-site balloting shall be from one central location, under the supervision of the administering Westercon. If no site-selection business meeting is scheduled, then site-selection shall be open for at least six (6) hours between the hours of 11 AM and Midnight on the next-to-last day of the administering Westercon.

3.15 Verification of Ballots

Properly completed ballots shall contain: the member's printed name; the member's membership number as assigned by the administering Westercon; the member's dated signature; the member's address of record with the current Westercon; the member's current address if different; and the member's vote(s) as defined elsewhere in this article. Verification of the ballots shall consist of matching the name and number of the member with the records of the administering Westercon. Ballots received by the committee prior to June 20, and any others received by mail which may be counted, shall be held by the administering Westercon until the opening of the Westercon, at which time they shall be verified by the administering Westercon and the bidders.

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3.16 Counting of Ballots

The administering Westercon shall arrange for the counting of ballots, and each cligible bid committee shall be allowed to send at least two (2) observers to such ballot-counting. The count shall be by preferential ballot. The winner shall be that bid which gains a majority of those votes expressing preference for a bid. For the purpose of vote counting, "None of the Above" shall be treated as if it were a bid. "None of the Above" and votes for ineligible bids shall count toward the total number of votes cast. Blank ballots, illegal or illegible ballots, and votes for "No Preference" shall not count toward the total number of votes cast. All vote totals of final results and of all intermediate counts shall be made available at or before the closing ceremony.

3.17 Procedures When No Bid Wins or is Eligible

Should no eligible bid gain the needed majority, or should there be no qualified bidding committee, or should "None of the Above" win, a three-fourths (3/4) majority of the site-selection business meeting of the administering Westercon may award the Westercon to any bid, or a simple majority of the meeting may decide that they are unable to decide. If the business meeting does not choose a site, the Board of Directors of the Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society, Inc. shall choose a site within six (6) weeks of the close of the administering Westercon. If "None of the Above" wins, none of the bids which were on the ballot may be selected. A site chosen under the provisions of this section shall not be restricted by any portion of this article except this section and section 3.1.

3.18 Availability of Results

The results of the balloting shall be reported to the site-selection business meeting of the administering Westercon, if one is held. A record of the results of the balloting, including all intermediate counts and distinguishing between the by-mail and at-con ballots, shall be published in the first or second progress report of the winning Westercon.

3.19 Hand-Carried Ballots

The administering Westercon shall accept hand-carried ballots, which are otherwise valid ballots delivered to the administering Westercon by someone other than the member who prepared the ballot.

3.20 Committee Failure

Should a Westercon Committee declare itself unable to fulfill its duties, the Board of Directors of the Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society shall determine alternate arrangements for that Westercon.

4 Procedure for Amendment of These Bylaws

4.1 Method of Adoption

Amendments to the Westercon Bylaws must be ratified by a two-thirds (2/3) vote at any Westercon business meeting, or by the majority vote of the business meetings in two consecutive years. Proposed amendments shall be read in full by the chairman of the business meeting immediately before being voted upon.

4.2 Primary and Secondary Ratification

In the event a proposed amendment receives a majority, but less than two-thirds (2/3) vote, the The secretary of the business meeting at which the proposed an amendment receives primary (first year) ratification shall submit an exact copy of the amendment to the following year's Westercon business meeting. The question of secondary (second year) ratification is debatable but not amendable.

4.3 Effective Date of Amendments

Unless otherwise provided, amendments shall take effect at the close of the Wester-con where they receive final ratification. Operating rules for already-selected Westercons shall not be changed by amendments to the bylaws. Rules regarding eligibility and voting procedures for site-selection are not considered to be operating rules.

Standing Rules

1. Close Debate. Before proceeding to take a vote on a motion for the Previous Question, the presiding officer shall ask for a show of hands of how many people still wish to speak to the pending motion. This rule does not allow debate on the motion for the Previous Question.

Business Passed On to Westercon 56

No amendments to the Bylaws were passed on to Westercon 56 for secondary ratification.

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What is SWOC?

The Seattle Westercon Organizing Committee (SWOC) was formed on November 4, 1990 with the intent of bidding for and hosting a Westercon. It was hoped that there would be support for this project and that the project would prove to be a way to unify Northwest fandom.

This project worked so well that not only did Scattle win the bid and host the 46th Westercon in 1992 but also went on to bid to host 2 other Westercons. Bidding was successful for both, Seattle hosted the 50th Westercon, and in 2003, they will host Westercon 56.

It has become obvious that SWOC has the desire, resources, and organizational experience necessary to take on other significant projects. Today, SWOC has moved towards helping the Pacific Northwest gear up to eventually host a Worldcon. Keeping this goal in mind, SWOC is working towards enabling the team putting on Westercon 56 to make this convention a showcase of talent and hospitality for those looking at future sites for large regional conventions.

SWOC remains committed to the ideals of openness and fairness that let them succeed in their earlier endeavors. In a continuing effort to promote and expand

the talent pool of willing con runners, SWOC has hosted several local conferences for convention planners. SWOC sponsored ConComCon 2 and 3 and, in the year 2000, it was decided by the membership of that year's ConComCon that C-Cubed, as it has come to be called, would be moved under the organizational leadership of SWOC.

SWOC is a fully-qualified charitable organization as with a 501(c)3 tax-exempt status recognized by the Internal Revenue Service. In support of this status all events sponsored by SWOC are of a literary, charitable and educational nature.

SWOC's primary purpose is to make all arrangements necessary for the effective execution of Westercon as a forum for the discussion and appreciation of science fiction and fantasy art, literature and related topics through the congregation of fans, lectures, films, exhibitions and similar activities. SWOC may also engage in other activities at the discretion of its membership as long as those activities do no preclude the primary purpose of SWOC and fall within the restrictions of SWOC's status as a literary, charitable and educational organization.
