ATTENDEE CODE OF CONDUCT

Westercon 66 is a San Francisco Science Fiction Conventions, Incorporated event.

SFSFC, Inc is chartered to promote and develop fantasy and science fiction in all their forms. SFS-FC events include educational and social activities. Our goal is to show how fantasy and science fiction can be serious and artistic, and fun and accessible to everybody.

We fail in that goal if we create an environment where harassment of attendees and participants is condoned. Victims of harassment will not enjoy an event and will not find fantasy and science fiction to be fun or accessible. SFSFC and its event-planning teams are committed to responding respectfully to reports of harassment and taking appropriate action to ensure harassment that is brought to our attention is stopped.

Westercon 66 abides by Wil Wheaton's Law. (www.knowyourmeme.com/memes/wheatons-law)

Credit where credit is due:

These rules are heavily lifted from Further Confusion, the SF Bay Area's furry convention. We're grateful to AAE for their work in creating a funand safe environment at Further Confusion.

If You Need Assistance

Westercon 66 convention operations (con ops) is staffed throughout the convention. One of their roles is to assist you if you have any problems at the convention. You can dial 0 on any hotel phone and ask for Westercon 66 convention operations or visit convention operations (Con Ops) on the second floor mezzanine. Remember, we cannot address a problem unless we know about it. If convention operations cannot assist you directly, they will have someone contact you who should be able to. As with all messages left with con ops, remember to give details of how, when, and where you can be contacted..

Harassment and Assault

A neat tattoo or a sexy, excellent costume does not come with permission to touch, nor is it an invitation to do so. Always ask if you may touch clothing, property, or the person. Costuming is not consent.

- · "No" means no.
- "Stop" means stop.
- "Go away" means go away.

If you are being bothered or are uncomfortable with someone's actions toward you, communicate any one of these messages.

If someone won't understand these simple rules, contact Convention Operations or any convention staff member for assistance.

Harassment is any behavior that intentionally annoys or alarms another person. This includes:

- · Unwanted physical contact
- Following someone in a public area without a legitimate reason
- Threatening physical harm.

Offenders may lose their badges, and be asked to leave the convention. The matter may be referred to the law enforcement authorities.

Treat people as you'd want others to treat your sister or brother. Complaints will be taken very seriously.

Parties, Alcohol, & Zero Drug Tolerance

Westercon 66 does not tolerate serving of alcohol to minors. If you are hosting a party where alcohol is being served, it is your responsibility as host to ensure that the age of anyone drinking alcohol is checked. You should also designate someone not to drink, so that there is a fully competent person present to deal with any emergencies that might arise.

Westercon 66 does not tolerate the use of illegal substances.

The violation of the above rules could subject you to the immediate loss of your badge and convention privileges and referral of the matter to other authorities.

Photography and Video

Westercon 66 wants you to have great memories from a fantastic convention. Photographs and videotape footage by attendees are generally allowed in all common areas of the convention with the exception of the Art Show. Specific rules regarding these matters may exist for selected events. Please consult the Pocket Program for information relating to specific events.

When photographing or videotaping individuals or costumes, use common courtesy and ask before photographing them. Respect their rights if they do not wish to be photographed or videotaped. If someone asks or otherwise indicates (remember many folks in costume do not speak) that they do

not wish to be photographed, do not photograph them!

Photography or videography for the purpose of sale or publication to the press is expressly forbidden unless written permission has been obtained from Westercon 66.

Individuals may take pictures and videotapes for private viewing or sharing with friends. We ask our attendees to be courteous to those they wish to take pictures of, especially if you wish to place those pictures or video clips onto a personal Web page or similar Internet archive. In this case, ask your subjects for their explicit permission to do this.

ZELLACON: HOW IT HAPPENED

Kevin and I have a history of hoaxing, usually inspired by something absurd. This didn't start out any different, but it became fan history.

T-Minus 29 Days. We used a free upgrade from the Fairmont Hotel to reserve a suite for Westercon 64 in San Jose. We requested it be placed on the party floor with the intention of supporting the London in 2014 Worldcon bid by giving them our parlor to throw a party.

T-Minus 26 Days. We were driving home from Kevin's parents' house. Since February we've been making this drive at least once a month. We stopped at Granzella's in Williams, CA (about an hour north of Sacramento). At dinner, we were seated at a table (made from I think a nine-pin bowling alley) with a "Golden West Adventures Tour Olive Country" map poster to our side. It was as inspiring (and absurd) as the Casa de Fruta place-mat that brought about "Hollister in 2008."

At this point, I was excited that Andy was in the mood for us to host a party at a con again. He'd been avoiding that since after Costume-Con due to Evil Genius Hall of Fame burnout --Kevin

We realized that we had no idea who else was bidding for 2013, so we started looking and found the Portland website. God bless smartphones. I then started sending Facebook and Twitter messages to people involved in our previous hoaxes to see if they liked the joke.

One lunch (and a few positive responses) later, we left Granzella's with a box of olives, olive oil and fruit preserves.

T-Minus 25 days. I sent a request to the Westercon party maven and hotel liaison updating the request for our suite be booked on the party floor. I indicated we had open party plans, but not the specifics. We wanted to ensure that the con chair could remain neutral and enjoy plausible deniability.

"Plausible deniability" is not a euphemism. It's important that the chair of the current convention not even appear to support any particular bid over another, filed or hoax. All the people involved in the Granzella's joke understood this and subscribed to it as a condition of helping. -- Kevin

We talked about the idea with fellow BAS-FAns at the Monday BASFA meeting. After the meeting was adjourned and the pun jar was shut down, a number of olive-themed campaign slogans were bandied about.

T-Minus 21 days. We started creating the voter information guide and campaign posters.

T-Minus 17 days. We previewed campaign materials at BASFA, and started developing the "OliveFacts" campaign.

T-Minus 14 days. The "OliveFacts" Twitter and Livejournal campaign was launched.

T-Minus 9 days. Our storage array crashed, locking away almost all the campaign and party materials until it could be repaired. Only the OliveFacts posting schedule calendar was reachable.

T-Minus 7 days. We announced the bid as the day's "OliveFact" on Twitter, Livejournal and the new Zella-Con Facebook Group.

T-Minus 5 days. We released The Olive Manifesto. This document was more serious than our other publications and showed a change in tone. It was at this point we started thinking about what to do if we won.

T-Minus 4 days. The Olive Manifesto was laid out and published as a one-shot fanzine in classic ditto style. It lacked the traditional fuzziness or smell, though.

The storage array was repaired. New backups were immediately created. I started printing our campaign materials. At the BASFA meeting we discussed badly machine-translated voter guides (voter information guides are commonly available in Spanish, Vietnamese and other languages) but they turned out to be too much work.

T-Minus 3 days. Mette Hedin suggested a Swedish voter guide. Rather than doing that, we wrote an opening statement for the "Future Westercons" panel and Mette translated it into Swedish.

T-minus 1 day. We moved into the hotel. Into the wrong room on the wrong floor. It screwed up our schedule mightily.

I specifically remember looking Andy in the eye over dinner that night and asking, "What do we do if we win?" We decided to see how things evolved at the bid presentations and through balloting, but agreed to each other we were willing to step up to the plate and take on producing Westercon 66 if that was what it really came down to. -- Kevin



Day 1. We put up campaign posters, moved to the correct room, printed and put up party signs, decorated the room and built a Dalek. The day's "OliveFact" was our bid party announcement.

The party was very successful. We had some interesting conversations. We realized we were far closer to winning than we originally expected.

Day 2. We participated in the "Future Westercons" panel (sometimes referred to as "The Fannish Inquisition"). The bilingual presentation was received in the spirit it was intended. The day's "OliveFact" was a reminder that voting was open until 7pm. Again, we reviewed scenarios on what to do if we won, as the buzz was swinging in our favor.

Before heading down to the Future Westercons panel, I asked Andy whether we could actually afford to take on Westercon. (We are still paying off personal debt we acquired promoting Costume-Con 26.) We realized that in order to do Westercon, it would have to be in a very different manner than the personal road show we did for CC26, involving a lot more people to do outreach and promotion all over the Westercon zone. Again, at this point we were back to "let's see what happens with the presentations and the balloting." -- Kevin



I joined Sharon Sbarsky and Rick Kovalcik for the vote count (all bids, including hoaxes, are invited to be counting staff). Over ¾ of the ballots cast were cast on Saturday after the "Future Westercons" panel. Portland lost by 1 vote in balloting (in the second count, which is exciting for electoral wonks) with a result of 41 for Portland and 42 for "Granzella's in Olive Country." This meant that no eligible candidate had earned a majority, and triggered the dreaded "Section 3.16" of the Westercon Bylaws, discarded nearly all other site selection rules and referred site selection to the business meeting.

The result was announced before Masquerade.

At "Sweets" (the dessert wine tasting party founded by Bruce Pelz), we talked with a lot of con-runners about the implications of this result. A guiding principle embraced by nearly everyone present was "Westercon should be awesome!"

We determined that, if we could fill a few executive positions, we could have a viable committee. We also started looking for viable sites that were still in the Sacramento Valley.

The Westercon 64 concom did a great job dealing with this not-quite-unprecedented situation (something similar happened around 30 years ago). Kevin Standlee, Ben Yallow and a few others stayed up late into the night building a procedurally correct agenda for the business meeting. Glenn Glazer and Deirdre Saoirse Moen scrambled to shift program rooms to accommodate the much larger business meeting attendance.

Day 3. We completed negotiations with key recruits and walked into the business meeting with a serious bid presentation. After over 3 hours of parliamentary wrangling, the attendees of the business meeting awarded us Westercon 66 in 2013. We barely made it to the 3pm spa appointments we had booked back on Friday, not anticipating a conflict on Sunday afternoon.

Those recruits were critical. If any of them had said no, we would not have accepted being nominated as a possible committee for Westercon 66. The fact that they agreed (when none of this had been on the map 7 days earlier) gave us confidence we would have the fan support necessary for producing the convention. -- Kevin

Day 4. We talked with a lot of people. We did not get our luggage packed and home until almost 11pm. We talked with more people after that, until the dead dog party was shut down.

HIGH-RANKING AGENTS (GUESTS OF HONOR)

WRITER GUESTS OF HONOR: NICOLA GRIFFITH & KELLEY ESKRIDGE

Kelley Eskridge hails from Florida, where her parents vanity-published her first book when she was 12. She has a BA in Acting and has performed everything from hair-product commercials to a season of guerilla theatre in a bikers' bar.

In 1988, she quit her job, took out a loan, and drove 800 miles on crutches to attend the Clarion Writer's Workshop. She fell stone in love with writing, which she expected, and with Nicola Griffith, which she did not.

Her novel Solitaire is a New York Times Notable novel, a Borders Books Original Voices selection, and a finalist for the Nebula, Spectrum and Endeavour Awards. Her short fiction collection Dangerous Space includes an Astraea Prize winner, two Nebula finalists, two Tiptree Prize Honor Stories, and a story adapted for SyFy. Her joint essays with Nicola are published US and Australian anthologies, and she is a staff writer for @U2, the world's largest U2 fan site.

In 2005, Cherry Road Films optioned *Solitaire*. In 2006, Kelley talked her producer into letting her do a page-one rewrite of their screenplay. That script, now titled *OtherLife*, is in development with Cherry Road, Lago Film, Angelefine Productions and BUF. Kelley has three other projects in story/script development.

Like many writers, she's had a vagabond career, from washing dishes and building stage sets to writing multi-million dollar engineering proposals. She was among the first wave of women in freelance television crews broadcasting live sports. She wrote Solitaire while working as vice president at Wizards of the Coast. As co-owner of Sterling Editing, she currently edits and coaches an international client list of best-selling, critically acclaimed, and emerging writers.

Kelley is a board member and former board chair of Clarion West. She lives in Seattle with Nicola. She loves food, drink, conversation, and a good story.



Nicola Griffith is a native of Yorkshire, England, where she earned her beer money teaching women's self-defense, fronting a band, and arm-wrestling in bars. Then in 1988 she went to Clarion to find out what this writing thing was all about.

There she met and fell head over heels with Kelley Eskridge. To stay together they had to fight. Hard. In the end, Nicola's immigration case made new law: the State Department declared it to be "in the National Interest" for her to live and work in this country. She's now a dual US/UK citizen.

In 1993 a diagnosis of multiple sclerosis slowed her down a bit, and she focused on writing. Her novels are: Ammonite and Slow River (sf), and The Blue Place, Stay, and Always (crime fiction). She co-edited the BENDING THE LANDSCAPE series (original short fiction with queer characters). Her short fiction and essays have appeared in a variety

of places e.g. Nature, New Scientist, and The Los Angeles Review of Books (where she is a contributing editor). Her awards include the Tiptree, Nebula, and World Fantasy Awards, Premio Italia, 3 Spectrum Awards and 6 Lambda Literary Awards (most recently for her multi-media memoir, And Now We Are Going to Have a Party: Liner Notes to a Writer's Early Life.) In June the Lambda Literary Foundation awarded her the Outstanding Mid-Career Novelist Prize.

Her forthcoming novel, *Hild* (set in seventh-century Britain, and about the girl who grew up to become St. Hild of Whitby), will be published by Farrar, Straus and Giroux on November 12, 2013. She can hardly wait to unleash *Hild* on the world...

Meanwhile she lives in Seattle with Kelley where she co-owns Sterling Editing, futzes with the ukulele, drinks just the right amount of beer, and takes enormous delight in everything.

NICOLA GRIFFITH & KELLEY ESKRIDGE: AN APPRECIATION

It would be easy to fill this with flashbacks of our six week stint at Clarion in 1988, where we all met. Stories abound about Clarion and its manifold impacts upon attendees, but while certain things—drinking, shotgun critiques, water fights, unbridled liaisons, divorces, marriages, and the birth of stellar careers—get considerable attention, we don't hear much about lifelong friendships. The "Clarion Bond", sure, but even that is something else. I'm talking about the real deal—friendship.

Kelley Eskridge and Nicola Griffith have become two of the best friends I've ever had, and friendship is a rare thing.

What is rarer is finding two friends so gifted.

No one knows, coming out of Clarion, who will light up the skyline with their brilliance and who will recede into the landscape from which they came. You look around and think "Good grief, they're all so much more talented than I." Years after you realize, it's not the talent (though that is vital, certainly) but the drive, the focus, the unwillingness to accept less. Combined with talent, you get Solitaire and Dangerous Spaces. You get Slow River and The Blue Place.

Make no mistake, Kelley and Nicola are very different artists. They each produce work unique to themselves, even after 25 years of being entangled and invested with each other at every level. The distinctiveness is manifest on every page. The direction each is taking is unique.

And yet, the source of the work seems to be the same. Both of them write powerfully about love.

Not in any standard-issue romantic way (although there is romance throughout): writers who do that treat love as if it were a goal, a prize at the end of a long game. Instead, in both Eskridge and Griffith, you see love as the drive, the focus, the unwillingness to accept less. That it's there, already, and important part is what we do with it.

And they show us in different ways. Kelley's work is replete with the ways in which we can open ourselves to it. Nicola's shows us the many-faceted consequences of that opening.

If art has a "function" (a term I distrust in this context, but "purpose" always seems to imply the need to justify and "point" is too reductive) it may be to bring us to recognition. Literally—to re cogita. To see things anew, to rework our conceptions, to allow as access to truth in a way previously blocked. Through art we recognize. It brings us surface to surface with truth when created honestly and fearlessly. To tell the truth well makes good art.

So along with all the other delights to be found in the work of Kelley Eskridge and Nicola Griffith—the vivid characters, the engaging plots, superb wordcraft, exoticism and invention—they give us an opportunity to experience something only the best can. For the space of a novel (or a short story) they allow us to be a little more ourselves. Vulnerable, curious, passionate, smart...human. Because they both tell the truth well.

I am pleased and amazed to call each of them Friend.

As the co-founder and owner of Hungry Tiger Press, David Maxine publishes comics, books, and CDs that keep alive the adventurous and wondrous spirit of the Land of Oz. An art major, it seems almost predestined that he would synthesize his energy and his love of music, theater, and Oz into publishing. He is known for the quality of his work, and this has carried forward to his ongoing support of Winkie Con, the longest running convention dedicated to Frank L. Baum and the world of Oz.


problems, sometimes all at the same



I remember the first time I met the guys from Radio Free Skaro at the annual Gallifrey One convention in Los Angeles. RFS was at the time a small up and coming Canadian *Doctor Who* podcast and they were adorable wide-eyed first-timers at the convention. You could see it in their faces which were reminiscent of that of a 5-year old in the middle of a candy store, trying to take it all in.

When I got to know them however, it quickly became clear that I needed to add their show to my podcast subscriptions as I found their banter to be full of equal measures of wit, knowledge and passion. While they were new at the convention they certainly weren't to *Doctor Who* fandom and I have been a loyal listener ever since.

In the handful of years that have passed since we first met they have grown impressively from an interesting little podcast from up north to a significant institution in *Doctor Who* fandom. They are currently probably the most important *Doctor Who* podcast around and a not least because of their humor as well as their serious drive to make a really good podcast.

To put a measure on their meteoric rise, they have become the official podcast of Gallifrey One, opening the convention with a live show on the main stage. They have done high quality interviews with a very lengthy and impressive list of people related to the show, not only actors but also people behind the scenes that make the show happen. I also suspect that they have actually stolen the Tardis as they manage to go to Gallifrey One, attend panels and party with the rest of us but in addition post a brand spanking new podcast every single day of the convention. If you have gone to the convention you will know that this should not be physically possible.

I think I have finally figured out the secret to their success however. They are like the boy band of DW podcasts! Any unscrupulous music producer will tell you that in order for a boy band to be successful, you pick your members to each be different from the others and appeal to a different

demographic of female teenage fans. I think they have inadvertently (and far less cynically) managed to do the same for Whovian fandom.

Steven is a walking encyclopedia and while kind and gentle can absolutely crush every single last one of you in DW trivia. Chris can find a plot hole in any episode, pedantically correct you until you're not sure what your name is and manage to find a naughty joke in the most innocent episode. And Warren reminds you of the unabashed excitement in watching a great show, provides insights into television production in general and makes you feel OK about not being as obsessively detail oriented as the other two.

They cover so much of the different aspects of intelligent fandom that if they could assemble like a transformer, they would form the single most perfect *Doctor Who* fan in existence as well as the tallest human alive. For all of these reasons I hope that you take the rare opportunity at Westercon to get to know them and their podcast if you don't already. Plus they're just a bunch of really nice Canadians, eh?


Both enjoy fandom and will guest anywhere at conventions when invited.

When I was asked to write an appreciation for Bjo and John I was hesitant. A huge part of my hesitation was that my appreciation for them isn't about fandom. So why did I agree to do this? Because when you get a chance to publicly acknowledge the impact that someone has had on your life while they're still alive, you say <u>yes</u>.

Some say you can't pick your family. I disagree.

I don't really remember when I first met the Trimble clan. What I do remember is the weekend that was the start of the road that would lead to them becoming my parents.

It's 1984 and L.A. Con II is a few weeks away. The art show needs help making art show hangings. Typical Bjo and John idea: let's get the kids to help! I get a call from Lora telling me that our weekend is going to involve burlap, twill tape, and sewing machines. Only in fandom, eh? Over the course of that weekend, we must have sewn twill tape around the edges of over fifty 8'x4' pieces of burlap.

How do you survive the monotony? You talk (and laugh...). By the end of the weekend, we were thick as thieves. I began to spend a lot of time at the house on Bronson. It was a happier place than my home. Some time passed and one day, Bjo and John asked if I would like to come live with them. Since I was already spending all of my free time there, it just seemed like a logical progression.

I moved in, and after an adjustment period, it became clear that they were the parents I needed. I was a kid who didn't understand boundaries. had low self-esteem, and had no thoughts to my future or that there was a bigger world out there that I could fit into. They taught me that parents aren't distant or uncaring but loving and involved with their children. And they were fun. We'd sit there after dinner and mom would say, "I am in the mood for a coconut macaroon. Let's go find some!" and we'd hop in the car in search of coconut macaroons. They opened up their home to Star Trek fans from all over the world, which, in turn, sparked my life-long love of travel. Because of this I've travelled to four continents and met interesting people of all walks of life.

When I mentioned to dad that being a mail carrier would be a good job, 'cause you get to walk all over and spend your time outdoors each day', he said, "You can do better than that." It's not that a mail carrier is a bad career choice or anything. It's just that he knew I was picking it because I wasn't considering every option. I was settling on it instead of recognizing that I could be and do anything. If in the end that's what I wanted, great, but make sure that I've considered all options.

Everyone knows about Bjo and John's impact on fandom. But now you know the impact they had on a lost, teenage girl who needed someone to pay attention to her and treat her as a human being. They are the best parents ever and made me the awesome person I am today.

So can you pick your family? Yes. Mom and dad? Thank you for picking me.

The Phenomenauts perform a science-fiction inspired mix of punk rock, garage and new-wave. Combined with compelling antics and theatrics, the group's message is a call to arms to defenders of science and honor across the galaxy, dealing with the serious implications of science fiction, science fact, and offering new perspec tives on Earth life as we know it.



Conceived in the amazing year 2000, the group got early recognition as the East Bay's craftiest and bravest band for their now infamous commando-style performances in which they would set up in front of large music venues such as the legendary Fillmore and perform rollicking sets powered by car batteries for unsuspecting crowds. These early "missions" landed them on the cover of multiple bay area publications, including *The San Francisco Weekly, The East Bay Express* and *Independent Musician Magazine*.

Now with three full lengths and countless USA and European tours under their tactical belts, the band's success has steadily progressed to include music videos with over half a million views, commercial and college radio airplay (charting on

the CMJ top 25), collaborations with NASA, and social activism through humorous shenanigans.

His Science in the Capital series, which is made up of three volumes—Forty Signs of Rain, Fifty Degrees Below and Sixty Days and Counting—speculates on the effects of and fixes for global warming. As an anthologist JM has edited Future Eves: Great Science Fiction About Women By Women; Time Enough at Last!: Stories that Inspired Classic Episodes of The Twilight Zone, The Outer Limits, Tales of Tomorrow and Other Vintage SF Television Series; The Legendary Women Detectives; I,

Vampire: 13 Chilling Interviews with the Undead, and Those Doggone Dogs, among others. As a science fiction and fantasy editor JM has been editor-in-chief of Galaxy magazine and Starblaze Editions, one of the pioneers of science fiction/fantasy/horror trade paperback publishing, and a consultant to Dorchester/Leisure and Carroll and Graf. As a nonfiction editor, JM worked as a senior acquisitions and development editor for Houghton-Mifflin, Jeremy Tarcher, and St. Martins. WRITERS WORKSHOP

It is a mutual-help function for either experienced or beginning writers, based on the principle that good critiquing skills make good writing skills. It provides members the opportunity to submit their manuscripts in advance and have them evaluated by their peers, selling writers, and other professionals in the speculative fiction industry who enjoy helping them grow as artists.

Participating Professional Writers & Moderators

Many published authors are besieged with requests by aspiring writers to evaluate their manuscripts. Some of these authors see this request as flattering, while others might view the aspirants as having a lot of unmitigated gall for being so presumptuous. This workshop gives these aspirants the opportunity to have their manuscripts evaluated without running the risk of the latter reaction. (Never ask such a favor of a professional yourself unless you know him or her well.)

What it's About

When the word workshop is used in the writing community, those who have been in it very long immediately think critique circle. In a critique group a few members submit their work beforehand, then the others evaluate it and prepare their comments for when they meet, which can be either a schedule where the participants meet on a regular basis or a one-shot meeting such as Westercon 66. The entrants who are "on the hot seat" then take the comments from the others and utilize them as they feel appropriate.

At Westercon 66, submissions are critiqued in three-on-three (three pros to three entrants) sections. In addition, an experienced workshopper will be on hand to moderate the group.

This is not a competition. Participants work in a quiet, secluded room to elaborate on the story structure, logistics, and style of the entrants' submissions. Due to the critical nature of this workshop, it is closed to non-participants. While most entrants find it an encouraging and exhilarating experience, others find it rougher than they expect. Out of respect, we want to spare the latter from any possible public humiliation.

Unfortunately, writers workshop participation has to be planned for in advance and is closed to everyone who is not directly involved. During the past few weeks the participants have been reading their assigned manuscripts to spend three hours at Westercon 66 citing their good and bad points. There is no on-the-spot reading for critiques.

Those interested in participating next year should contact Westercon 67 and specify interest in a critique circle workshop. Buying membership several months ahead of time keeps potential entrants up-to-date on the latest developments of the convention and the entry deadline for the writers workshop.

The Masquerade staff will review your paperwork with you and inform you about Green Room times and procedures.

Note: If your costume is a recreation of a costume from another source, you should bring some documentation for the judges, such as a few photos of the original and some information about the character who wears the costume, in case the judges are not familiar with the source of the costume.

- Every entrant must be a registered attendee of Westercon 66. If the costume maker and presenter are different people, both must be attending members.
- Purchased or rented costumes may not be submitted for judging unless they have been over 50% modified. Check with the Masquerade Director if you are not sure whether your costume qualifies for judging.
 - Costumes that do not qualify for judging may still be entered in the Exhibition category.

- Each person may appear on stage once, in one costume. No dual entries.
- You may do a simple catwalk, or create a skit or presentation.
- Time Limits: Solo entrants have one minute maximum. Entries of two or more are limited to two minutes. Large groups must discuss time needed with the Masquerade Director before the Masquerade.
- Entrants under age 18 must have a parent or guardian sign their entry form.
- This is a family show. Your costume and skit must have a PG-13 rating or better.
- No materials or effects that will leave a mess on stage or in the green room are allowed. No materials or effects that may ruin another entrant's costume are allowed.
- No live animals on stage, service animals excepted.
- No pyrotechnics or open flames are allowed.
- Weapons must be peace-bonded when not on stage.
- If you plan on wielding your weapon or using martial arts leaps, kicks and/or punches as part of your presentation, you must provide details to the Masquerade Director at the Pre-Masquerade Meeting.

Judging Categories

Participants may elect to be judged, or to enter in the Exhibition class without judging. Everyone eligible for judging (see requirements under Rules) may participate in both workmanship and/ or presentation judging.

Workmanship: This is the "up close" judging of a costumer's construction techniques. This occurs in the green room, before the show. Participants will have the opportunity to show off details that won't be that visible on stage and chat with the judge about construction tricks and techniques they used.

Masquerabe

Presentation: This is the evaluation of how your costume is presented on the stage. It is not so much about the quality of your performance as how well you show off your costume. Do you inhabit your character's body when you move on stage? Is your presentation (whether a walkthrough or a skit) appropriate to the character and costume? The judges discuss these kinds of questions as they debate which entries deserve prizes.

Masquerade Competition Classes

Novice: This class gives Masquerade newcomers a chance to compete without being judged against more experienced entrants. Entrants must have not won a major prize in any other Masquerade (except "honorable mention"). Professional costumers may not enter in this class.

Open: This class is for anyone who has won a major prize at a Masquerade, professional costumers, or novices who feel particularly confident.

Young Fan: This class is for entrants age 16 or younger who participated in the design and/or construction of their costumes. Children wearing costumes designed and made for them by adults should enter in the Novice or Open categories.

Exhibition: This class is for those who want to show off their costume in front of a large audience, but either do not wish to compete or have a costume that does not qualify for competition.

IN MEMORIAM


EILEEN TUURI

for some months before getting her own place. Eileen quickly got involved in a local Arizona convention, and wanted to do more.




Her accidental untimely demise on April 30th has come as quite a shock.

WESTERCON BUSINESS MEETING


The Westercon Business Meeting is where changes to the Westercon Bylaws are decided. Every attending member of Westercon may attend, propose, debate, and vote on changes to the Bylaws, including the rules for choosing Westercon

sites. The Business Meeting at Westercon 66 will be on Saturday, not before 11 AM (see schedule for exact time and location). The first item of business will be the official announcement of the Westercon 68 site selection, after which any pro-

posed changes to the Westercon Bylaws will be discussed. Anything passed this year will be passed on to next year's Westercon for ratification. No proposals were adopted last year, so there are no proposals awaiting ratification.

Those of you who were at Westercon 64 may have either attended or heard about the most exciting Westercon Business Meeting in a generation, where the site of Westercon 66 had to be selected by the Business Meeting. We don't expect that to happen again this year, but it goes to show just how important the Business Meeting can be, and why it's a good idea for members to attend.

The Business Meeting will be recorded on video and made publicly available on YouTube sometime after Westercon.



SITE SELECTION AND BIDDING

One of the important tasks of a Westercon is to select the site of the convention two years following. This procedure must be done in accordance with the Westercon Bylaws. Westercon 66 will be conducting Site Selection for Westercon 68.

As of the deadline, there was one filed bid for Westercon 68, for San Diego, California.

On-site Voting will take place at the following times:

Thursday July 4: 1:00 AM to 5:00 PM

Friday July 5: 10:00 AM to 7:00 PM

Ballot Count will take place on Friday, July 5 from 7:00 PM to however long it takes, with announcement of the results at the Business Meeting the following day.

WESTERCON HISTORY

In 1948, Walter J. "Doc" Dougherty of the Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society proposed that an annual West Coast convention be started for West Coast fans who couldn't afford to travel east each year. The first Westercon was held in September, 1948. It was a one-day event with an attendance of 77. It wasn't until 1951 that the Westercon became a weekend-long event, settled into the July 4th holiday and began traveling to different cities.

WESTERCON BYLAWS

As of Close of 2012 Westercon

The following document is the current text of the Westercon Bylaws and Standing Rules, as of the close of Westercon 65 (Seattle WA, 2012). No amendments to the Westercon Bylaws were ratified at Westercon 65. Linda Deneroff and Kevin Standlee prepared this document based on the results of the Westercon 65 Business Meeting. No items of business are passed on to Westercon 66 (Sacramento CA, 2013). Following the Standing Rules is the draft Agenda for the 2013 Business Meeting.

1 General Provisions

1.1 Name and Date

It is traditional, but not obligatory, that the West Coast Science Fantasy Conference (Westercon) shall take place over the July 4th weekend.

1.2 Guests of Honor

It is traditional, but not obligatory, that Westercon Guests of Honor and other notables be selected from among SF personalities residing within the Westercon geographical area.

1.3 Membership Classes

There shall be at least two classes of membership in Westercon: supporting and attending. The committee shall notify the members of their membership class in a timely fashion.

1.3.1 Supporting Members

Supporting members shall receive any progress reports or any other generally mailed publications published after the member joins the Westercon, including the Program Book, and may exercise any voting rights permitted by any other part of these bylaws, except attending the Business Meeting. All Westercons shall be required to offer supporting memberships until at least thirty (30) days prior to the opening of the Westercon, and such supporting memberships shall not cost more than one hundred and fifty percent (150%) of the voting fee charged when the site of the Westercon was selected. Any class of membership offered by a Westercon costing at least as much as a supporting membership shall include a supporting membership.

1.3.2 Attending Members

Attending members shall have all of the rights of supporting members, plus the right to attend the Westercon and the business meeting(s) held there, subject to the restrictions established by the other parts of these bylaws.

1.3.3 Restriction of Memberships

Each Westercon committee shall have the right to limit the activities of its attendees, either individually or in groups, insofar as such activities endanger, physically or legally, other persons or property.

Such limitations may include, but are not limited to, closing down parties, ejecting persons from the Westercon, or turning offenders over to other authorities. No refund of membership need be given in such circumstances. Each member, in purchasing his/her membership, agrees to abide by these bylaws.

1.4 Name Badges and Membership Numbers

All committees shall issue name badges for all attending members. Name badges for pre-registered members shall display the member's name in no less than 24-point bold type. All committees shall assign a unique membership number upon processing of a membership. This number provided to each member with the site selection ballot and with each progress report, shall be printed on membership name badges, and shall be used for site-selection purposes. In the event a membership is transferred, the old membership number, if applicable, shall be noted, both on the badge and on registration information used for site-selection voting administration. Membership badges or other proof of membership remain the property of the Westercon committee for the duration of the conference and may be confiscated for cause; no refund of membership fees need be given in such circumstances.

1.5 Archive of Bylaws

The Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society, Inc. (LASFS) shall act as an archive to the Westercon bylaws and the minutes of business meetings. Each committee shall reimburse LASFS for the costs of copying and forwarding copies of the Bylaws and Minutes to those who request them. A copy of the minutes, including the text of motions passed by the business meeting, shall be sent to LASFS within two (2) months of the close of each Westercon by the administering Westercon. LASFS shall maintain the Westercon bylaws and shall forward one copy of the current bylaws, including the text of any amendment to the bylaws awaiting secondary ratification, to the current Westercon committee within four (4) months of the close of the previous Westercon. The current Westercon shall provide copies of the Bylaws to the committees of all Westercon bids for the year which that Westercon is administering the site-selection.

1.6 Distribution of Bylaws to Members

The Westercon Bylaws, as well as the complete text of any amendment awaiting secondary ratification, shall be published in at least one (1) progress report and in the program book of the current Westercon each year. Failure to publish this information shall not affect the procedure to amend the bylaws as stated in Article 4.

1.7 Westercon Service Mark

All Westercons shall publish, in all publications such as promotional flyers, progress reports, and program book, the following notice: "Westercon' is a registered service mark of the Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society, Inc."

1.8 Responsibilities of Administering Westercon

It is a responsibility of each Westercon to enforce the provisions of these bylaws.

1.9 Committee Failure

Should a Westercon Committee declare itself unable to fulfill its duties, the Board of Directors of the Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society shall determine alternate arrangements for that Westercon.

2 Westercon Business Meeting

2.1 Scheduling of Sessions

At least one (1) regular session of the Westercon business meeting must be scheduled at each Westercon. No regular session of the Westercon business meeting shall be scheduled to start prior to 11 AM, nor later than 2 PM, nor on the last day of the Westercon. A special session, at which site-selection business shall be the sole order of business, may be scheduled on the last day of the convention, provided that said special meeting is scheduled to begin no earlier than 11 AM or later than 2 PM. All sessions occurring during the same Westercon, be they regular, adjourned, or special, shall be considered, for procedural purposes, as the same parliamentary session.

2.2 Site-Selection Business

Site-selection business shall be in order at any session of the business meeting. Site-selection business shall include, but need not be limited to, the announcement of the results of the balloting and of a winner if one is produced by the balloting, or of a site-selection resolution, as hereafter defined, if one is necessary [see Section 3.16 Procedures When No Bid Wins or is Eligible]. The winner of the site-selection may be announced prior to the site-selection business meeting, if one is held.

2.3 Quorum

For business other than site-selection business, a quorum of fifteen (15) attending members of the current Westercon shall be required. For site-selection business, the quorum shall be those attending members of the current Westercon who attend the meeting. All those persons voting at any meeting must be attending members of the current Westercon. Except as noted in these bylaws or in such rules of order as may be adopted, all business requires a simple majority to pass.

2.4 Parliamentary Authority

The current edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall be the parliamentary authority of the Westercon business meeting except where it conflicts with these bylaws or with any special rules of order which may be adopted by the business meeting.

3 Westercon Site-Selection

3.1 Eligibility of Sites

Any site on the North American continent west of the 104th west meridian, or in the state of Hawaii, shall be eligible to be the site of a Westercon, except as restricted by the provisions of these bylaws.

Provided that, upon the annexation of Australia by the United States of America or the annexation of the United States of America by Australia, Section 3.1 shall be amended to read:

"Any site in Australia, or on the North American continent west of the 104th west meridian, or in the state of Hawaii, shall be eligible to be the site of a Westercon, except as restricted by the provisions of these bylaws."

[Note: On a parliamentary inquiry based on a question of when the annexation must take place for a site to be eligible, the 2002 Business Meeting decided that a bid for an Australian site is eligible, even if the annexation has not yet taken place, provided that the annexation has taken place by the filing deadline for the intervening Westercon (the April 15th following the Westercon at which the Australian Westercon is selected), and that if the Australian site has been selected, and the annexation has not taken place by that date, then this shall constitute committee failure, as covered by Section 1.9 Committee Failure.]

3.2 Site Selection Zones

The following Site Selection Zones are defined within the area defined in section 3.1:

- **3.2.1: North:** Sites in North America north of the 42nd north parallel.
- **3.2.2: Central:** Sites in North America between the North and South zones.
- **3.2.3: South:** Hawaii; California south of and including San Luis Obispo, Kern, and San Bernardino Counties; Nevada south of and including Clark County; Arizona; New Mexico; and all countries, states, provinces, territories, or other political subdivisions southward within North America.
- **3.2.4: Other:** Any location otherwise eligible under section 3.1 not part of the above zones.

3.3 Regional Exclusion Zone

No site within the Site Selection Zone containing the site of the Westercon administering the site-selection election shall be eligible to bid, except as provided in this section. If no eligible bids are filed by the January 1st of the year of the site-selection balloting, then all sites defined in section 3.1 Eligibility of Sites shall be eligible.

3.4 Filing Deadline for Ballot

Only those eligible bids whose filing paperwork required by section 3.5 Filing Requirements is in the possession of the administering Westercon by the April 15th preceding the balloting shall be listed on the ballot.

[Note: On a parliamentary inquiry at the time of ratification of the text of the above section, it was ruled that "If the filing paperwork can be verified to be at the address of the administering convention, it is in the committees possession."]

3.5 Filing Requirements

A Westercon bid committee must provide written evidence of the following: At least two (2) separate people declaring themselves Chairman and Treasurer; an organizing instrument such as bylaws, articles of incorporation or association, or a partnership agreement; and a letter of intent or option from a hotel or other facility declaring specific dates on which the Westercon shall be held; and, for a sponsoring organization from within the United States of America, evidence that the sponsoring organization is a non-profit association or corporation within the applicable state law of the sponsoring organization.

3.6 Eligibility of Voters

Site-selection voting shall be limited to those persons who are attending or supporting members of the administering Westercon and who have paid a voting fee toward their membership in the Westercon being selected. Other classes of membership may vote only upon the unanimous agreement of all qualified bidding committees. One person equals one membership equals one vote. Corporations, Associations, and other non-human entities may vote only for "No Preference." "Guest of" memberships must be transferred to an individual before voting for anything other than "No Preference."

3.7 Voting Fee

The voting fee shall be twenty US dollars (US\$20.00) or the local equivalent unless the committees listed on the ballot and the administering Westercon agree unanimously to charge a different amount.

3.8 Minimum Rights of Voters

The payment of the voting fee shall make the voter at least a full supporting member of the Westercon being selected, and may make the voter an attending member at the discretion of the winning bid.

3.9 Prototype Ballot

The Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society, Inc. (LASFS) shall prepare a prototype site-selection ballot, including instructions for preparation of the ballot, and shall provide the prototype to each administering Westercon at the same time the bylaws are provided to the administering Westercon as provided for in section 1.5 Archive of Bylaws. Upon receipt of the prototype, the administering Westercon shall complete the ballot by filing in the information about the eligible bid committees, including the dates of the proposed Westercons, the voting fee, minimum membership requirements, including the cost of a supporting membership in the administering Westercon, and the address to which site-selection ballots should be sent. The

administering Westercon shall be responsible for the publication and the distribution of the ballots to the membership of the administering Westercon. All eligible bids received in accordance with sections 3.4 Filing Deadline for Ballot and 3.5 shall be included on the ballot. The ballot shall also include entries for "No Preference" and "None of the Above," and shall provide space for at least one (1) write-in bid. The ballot shall be a secret ballot, specially marked for preferential voting with an explanation of the method of counting preferential votes.

3.10 Distribution of Ballot

The site-selection ballot and full rules for site-selection voting, including the deadlines for voting by mail, shall be mailed on or before the May 10th preceding the voting to all members of the administering Westercon as of one week before the mailing. The ballot and full rules for site-selection, including the hours during which site-selection will take place and the location of the site-selection, shall be given to all attending members upon registration at the Westercon, or such information shall be prominently displayed at the registration area throughout the Westercon.

3.11 Deadline for Voting by Mail

All ballots received by the administering Westercon prior to June 20 shall be counted.

3.12 Bid Presentations

Each eligible bid committee shall have at least fifteen (15) minutes of scheduled program time on the first full day of the administering Westercon for the purpose of making a bidding presentation.

3.13 At-Conference Voting

Site-selection shall be open for at least six (6) hours between the hours of 11 AM and Midnight on the day before the business meeting at which site-selection business is scheduled. All on-site balloting shall be from one central location, under the supervision of the administering Westercon. If no site-selection business meeting is scheduled, then site-selection shall be open for at least six (6) hours between the hours of 11 AM and Midnight on the next-to-last day of the administering Westercon.

3.14 Verification of Ballots

Properly completed ballots shall contain: the member's printed name; the member's membership number as assigned by the administering Westercon; the member's dated signature; the member's address of record with the current Westercon; the member's current address if different; and the member's vote(s) as defined elsewhere in this article. Verification of the ballots shall consist of matching the name and number of the member with the records of the administering Westercon. Ballots received by the committee prior to June 20, and any others received by mail which may be counted, shall be held by the administering Westercon until the opening of the Westercon, at which time they shall be verified by the administering Westercon and the bidders.

3.15 Counting of Ballots

The administering Westercon shall arrange for the counting of ballots, and each eligible bid committee shall be allowed to send at least two (2) observers to such ballot-counting. The count shall be by preferential ballot. The winner shall be that bid which gains a majority of those votes expressing preference for a bid. For the purpose of vote counting, "None of the Above" shall be treated as if it were a bid. "None of the Above" and votes for ineligible bids shall count toward the total number of votes cast. Blank ballots, illegal or illegible ballots, and votes for "No Preference" shall not count toward the total number of votes cast. All vote totals of final results and of all intermediate counts shall be made available at or before the closing ceremony.

3.16 Procedures When No Bid Wins or is Eligible

Should no eligible bid gain the needed majority, or should there be no qualified bidding committee, or should "None of the Above" win, a three-fourths (3/4) majority of the site-selection business meeting of the administering Westercon may award the Westercon to any bid, or a simple majority of the meeting may decide that they are unable to decide. If the business meeting does not choose a site, the Board of Directors of the Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society, Inc. shall choose a site within six (6) weeks of the close of the administering Westercon. If "None of the Above" wins, none of the bids which were on the ballot may be selected. A site chosen under the provisions of this section shall not be restricted by any portion of this article except this section and section 3.1.

3.17 Availability of Results

The results of the balloting shall be reported to the site-selection business meeting of the administering Westercon, if one is held. A record of the results of the balloting, including all intermediate counts and distinguishing between the by-mail and at-con ballots, shall be published in the first or second progress report of the winning Westercon.

3.18 Hand-Carried Ballots

The administering Westercon shall accept hand-carried ballots, which are otherwise valid ballots delivered to the administering Westercon by someone other than the member who prepared the ballot.

4 Procedure for Amendment of These Bylaws

4.1 Method of Adoption

Amendments to the Westercon Bylaws must be ratified by the majority vote of the business meetings in two consecutive years. Proposed amendments shall be read in full by the chairman of the business meeting immediately before being voted upon.

4.2 Primary and Secondary Ratification

The secretary of the business meeting at which an amendment receives primary (first year) ratification shall submit an exact copy of the amendment to the following year's Westercon business meeting. The question of secondary (second year) ratification is debatable and is amendable only to the extent that such amendments do not increase the scope of the original bylaw amendment.

4.3 Effective Date of Amendments

Unless otherwise provided, amendments shall take effect at the close of the Westercon where they receive final ratification. Operating rules for already-selected Westercons shall not be changed by amendments to the bylaws. Rules regarding eligibility and voting procedures for site-selection are not considered to be operating rules.

Standing Rules

1. Close Debate. Before proceeding to take a vote on a motion for the Previous Question, the presiding officer shall ask for a show of hands of how many people still wish to speak to the pending motion. This rule does not allow debate on the motion for the Previous Question.


