



FLASH GORDON - SPACE SOLDIERS CONQUER THE UNIVERSE: The complete 13 part first adventure of FLASH GORDON starring Buster Crabbe.

INVASION OF THE BEE GIRLS: Listed as a "guilty pleasure" by a Chicago movie critic, it concerns human females who mutate into Bee Girls, who like queen bees, kill their mates after sex.

INVISIBLE BOY: To adults: This film was made as an excuse to put Robby the Robot back on the screen. To children: Tired of being picked on by other children in the neighborhood; see how one boy solved this problem by becoming invisible and getting a robot friend.
