Program Book Revisions Late-Breaking Program Changes

As always with an event the size of WisCon, some things don't go exactly as planned. Please change your program book accordingly.

•Missing Persons. Several panelists who were scheduled to appear won't be able to make it.

<u>Suzette Haden Elgin.</u> The matron saint of WisCon is actually being paid real money to appear at another conference and so has foregone her customary February visit to Madison (which <u>she</u> would have had to pay for).

Buck and Juanita Coulson. Also former WisCon guests of honor, the Coulsons will be missing this year because Juanita has recently had surgery. Phil Kaveny, who was coordinating the Coulsons' Travel Fund, has announced its conversion to the Quick Recovery Fund. Since the Coulsons are self-employed, they don't have catastrophic health insurance. <u>Terry Garey.</u> Terry is ill and unable to attend.

<u>Tess Kolney</u>. Tess is also unable to attend due to family problems.

<u>Paula Lewis</u>. Paula, who was to coordinate the readings, won't be able to make it from Baltimore. She's experiencing painful inflammation of her joints and is hoping it's not Lyme disease.

•**Program Cancellations.** The film *Children of the Damned* was unavailable. The panel "Thoughts on SF in the Third World" has also been cancelled.

•Performance Art. Allusions in the last issue of the *Mad Moose Gazette* to song and dance being performed by Gardner Dozois and Howard Waldrop were greatly exaggerated. As to what they'll actu-

ally be doing <u>instead</u> of song and dance, you'll have to attend opening ceremonies to find out.

When the con opened last year, we had sold 84 of the 100 available buffet tickets. This year we had sold 99 of the 150 available.

The standard charge for registration is \$15 (advance) or \$25 (at the door). However, program participants and workers are entitled to the \$7 rate. If you're one of those, and you paid more than \$7, stop by the registration desk to claim your refund. Refunds must be claimed by the end of March. Checks will be mailed out reasonably soon after getting the claim.
