Former Judge Turns Tables. Wins Prize Tolkien Dominates Masquerade

The WisCon 13 masquerade was held Friday night to a packed house following opening ceremonies. In honor of the 50th anniversary of the publication of *The Hobbit*, the theme was "The Works of Tolkien", and many costumes adhered to the theme. The following costumes were adjudged champions of their respective categories. Unless otherwise noted, all contestants were experienced masqueraders and made their own costumes.

•Best on Theme. "Ringwraith" (#20) by Amy Lynn Gray. (Editor's note: Amy, you've got to tend to your penmanship. Only our staff's collective familiarity with Tolkien kept us from identifying your costume as "Rugwraith". Does tend to conjure up some ideas, tho, doesn't it?)

•Construction. "Siamese Triplet Princesses" (#21); worn by Cindy Coloni, Janet Schmidt, and Mary Schmidt; costume by Janet Schmidt; inspired by *The Legend of Taartha*.

•Fantasy. "Sauron" (#1) by Michael Bourne, a 1st-time competitor.

•Literary. "Luthien Tinuviel and Hvan, Captain of Wolfhounds" (#13); worn by Katie Willems with Faolan; made by several friends to Katie's design specs; Faolan made by Lochlan and Maggie; inspired by Tolkien's *The Silmarillion*.

•Media. "The Mean Green Mother from Outer Space — Audrey 2" (#8); worn by Dave Margosian; made by Classic Creations of Racine from Dave's design; inspired by the film *Little Shop of Horrors* (1986).

•Most Fun. "Kerrina in the Newest Uniform for the Carhops from the 'Big Bang Burger Bar" (#12); by N. E. Mildebrandt; inspired by American Graffiti and Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy and (it says here) "a warped imagination".

•Original Use of Material. "Queen of Sony Province on the Planet Video" (#4) by Julie Shivers, a 1st-time entrant.

•Presentation. "The King of Angmar ... and His Mother" (#10); worn by Gregory Rihn and Georgie Schnobrich; made by Gregory Rihn; inspired by *The Lord of the Rings*. Greg is a long-time WisCon masquerade emcee and judge, this year entering as a contestant to make it all seem easy.

Champions receive *ta-da* a fancy ribbon and points toward higher classifications at the worldcon masquerade.

WisCon's thanks to the judges: Lori Isabella, masquerade organizer, whose judging specialty was costuming; Don Helley, Social Department head, stage presence; and Douglas Anderson, Tolkien scholar, appropriateness to theme.
