Rushwash tea, (Saturday 2:30 pm, Madison Ballroom) Katherine Kerr will be replaced by Joan Vinge



It's been such a warm spring that there are lots of early items, though some of the really early ones (like ramps) are gone. If you want to get plants or flowers, you have many, many choices. If you just want baked goods and a chance to see abundant greenery, you'll have a great time. Check out the market's huckster room in the first block of State Street, wander around, have fun. Vendors open about 6:30 am, and most are around until about noon. If the weather's good, it will be crowded by 8:00. Here are some of the interesting vendors, with several of our favorites marked in **boldface**. Some vendors move around from week to week, some only show up infrequently, so use your own judgment.

- Shittake mushrooms (but there may be morels)
- 2. Plants in bags. Good. Trust us.
- Stella's bakery. Try a spicy cheese empanada or a rhubarb turnover, or just talk like a duck.
- Renaissance Farm pesto, and cinnamon roles
- 5. Bleu Mont dairy, our favorite cheeses
- Homemade doughnuts
- Cheesecake. Bring some back to share
- Incense and medicinal herbs
- 9. Our second favorite Honey (and a real beehive)
- 10. Sugar River Bakery. Macaroons.
- 11. Our favorite smoked trout vendor
- Nature's Bakery Organic baked goods
- Good cut flowers

- 14. Fantome goat cheeses and spreads
- 15. Out of our Gourd -- peppers and chili oil (and free samples). Hot!!!
- Oak House bakery. There are crowds, but it's not our favorite. More sugar than taste.
- 17. Summer Kitchen jams& jellies. Alphabetical order.
- 19. Forgotten Valley. The second best cheese
- 20. Maple Syrup. Try the grade A dark or grade B
- 21. Honey, our favorite (Marsden's)
- 22. The best cut flowers brighten up the convention
- 23. RP's Pasta. There are lots of cool kinds.
- 24. Ancora Coffee Roasters. A few doors down the block, but the best coffee at the market
- 25. Real Popcorn. Try some of the black.
- 26. Venison. It's Bambi! (Thumper's at another stand)
- 27. Berries, berry plants, and juices.
- 30. Buffalo. Sausage, meats, jerky. The best.
- L'Etoile's croissants. Our pick of the market for baked goods. Definitely worth crossing the street.

Wiscon Uncovers 4-D Structure of Thiotimoline! The Wiscon 22 Science Division is proud to announce that one of the great mysteries of science,

the four-dimensional structure of thiotimoline, has at last been solved! Thiotimoline, first described by Dr. Isaac Asimov, of Boston University, has one bond rotated slightly into the future. Thus, for example, it dissolves before solvent hits it, because it knows it will have been dissolved.

Determination of the structure was made possible by the pioneering tesseract work of G. Rihn, which led to the key to the unlocking of the structure by G. Schnobrich and T. Voros (shown with their model).

Exploring Party Returns Safely: Expatriate Madisonians Andy Hooper and Carrie Root led a large party of fans on a walking tour of Madison. featuring historical and geological sites of interest. Your intrepid reporter stopped to smell all the flowers, and then ran to catch up with the group. Ms. Root managed to arrange perfect weather for the occasion, as we walked from an old cornfield. past Fourth Lake, an old railroad station, and numerous attractive houses, to Orton Park for a picnic lunch. After lunch, Mr. Hooper told us about the Black Hawk War before we returned to the hotel by bus. Restaurants: there are plenty of good choices in easy walking distance. Your editor would like to recommend Ton-Ton (half a block from the front entrance), where the sushi was both tasty and served fairly quickly (cooked food, oddly, took longer), and Dotty Dumpling's Dowry, which does not serve dumplings but where variations on the hamburger include tuna steak and interesting sausage, and which had fresh peach pie Friday.

More Food News: The Tiptree Bake Sale supplied a variety of tasty snacks and raised money for our favorite cause. (Your reporter is particularly partial to the chocolate chip cookies, and is surprised to note that people actually ate the "kitty litter cake." apparently a sort of spice cake-vanilla wafer-tootsic roll mix.) In the same room, Janet Lafler, Matthew Austern, and Karen Schaffer served a variety of teas to tired and thirsty con-goers, a muchappreciated act of kindness and generosity.
