GUESTS OF HONOR

MARY DORIA RUSSELL

Mary Doria Russell is a paleoanthropologist with specialities in bone biology and biomechanics. Dr. Russell had a great time in Academe—published a lot of stuff, won a bunch of awards and grants—but eventually got fed up and quit. She spent four lucrative years writing computer manuals before beginning her novel, The Sparrow. Russell estimates that about 22 anthropologists, world-wide, read her academic publications and nobody ever reads computer manuals, so she figured that if even just her friends read her novel, she was way ahead in terms of readership because she has lots of friends. The Sparrow won the James Tiptree, Jr. Award, the British Science Fiction Association's Best Novel Award, The Arthur C. Clarke Award, the John W. Campbell Award for Best New Writer, and the Cleveland Arts Council Prize for Literature. Antonio Banderas will star in the movie version of *The Sparrow*, to be produced by Universal Studios. Children of God, the sequel to The Sparrow, was published in 1997. Russell is already writing her third novel.



TERRI WINDLING

Terri Windling is a writer, a painter, and a consulting editor for Tor Books — best known for her seventeen years of editorial work in the field of fantasy literature, where she is one of the people responsible for the steady rise of contemporary mythic fiction, "urban fantasy," and modern literary fairy tales for adult readers. She has published over twenty books, including *The Wood Wife* (a magical realist novel set in contemporary Tucson, Arizona), *Snow White*, *Blood Red* (literary fairy tales for adult readers), and *The Armless Maiden* (literary fairy tales addressing the subject of child abuse) — as well as short stories, children's fiction, and a regular column on folklore for *Realms of Fantasy* Magazine. She has won five World Fantasy Awards and the 1997 Mythopoeic Award for Best Novel of the Year. As a painter, she has exhibited work in galleries and museums across the US and abroad.

WisCon's programming will focus on feminism and gender issues in science fiction and fantasy, and — as always — will be the centerpiece of the convention. * WRITER'S RESPITE

WisCon 23 will include a full day of programming for feminist writers, beginning Friday morning with a writer's workshop. followed by lunch, a marketing workshop with an emphasis on the obstacles and opportunities for feminist fiction writers, then an informal discussion of writer's practical and artistic struggles. Many feminist authors and editors will be presenting and participating in these workshops, and writer's track programming will continue throughout the weekend with panel presentations and small, informal discussions. Anyone who pre-registers for WisCon and submits a manuscript by May 1 can participate in the writer's respite at no extra cost other than \$10 for lunch, but space is limited to 50 participants. We recommend that out-of-towners plan to arrive on Thursday evening in order to participate in the writer's respite.

The third WisCon writer's workshop will run just like the first two, dividing participants into groups of six, each of which includes one professional guest critiquer. Everyone will receive their group's stories in advance to critique, and we'll meet during the convention to discuss our reactions.

Manuscripts must be postmarked by April 1, 1999. Participants need to send five (5) copies of one short story (up to 7,500 words) or one book chapter (up to 10,000 words — and include an outline if this is not the first chapter). Please send 5 copies plus a 10" x 13" self-addressed manila envelope with S3 postage (stamps, not metered) to Amy Axt Hanson, 923 N. Lawrence St., Tacoma, WA 98406.

Please note that we will not do critiques by mail. If you want to get feedback, you have to be there. Also please note that the workshop will be held on Friday morning. This may affect work arrangements and travel plans.

KIDS PROGRAMMING



HOTEL
